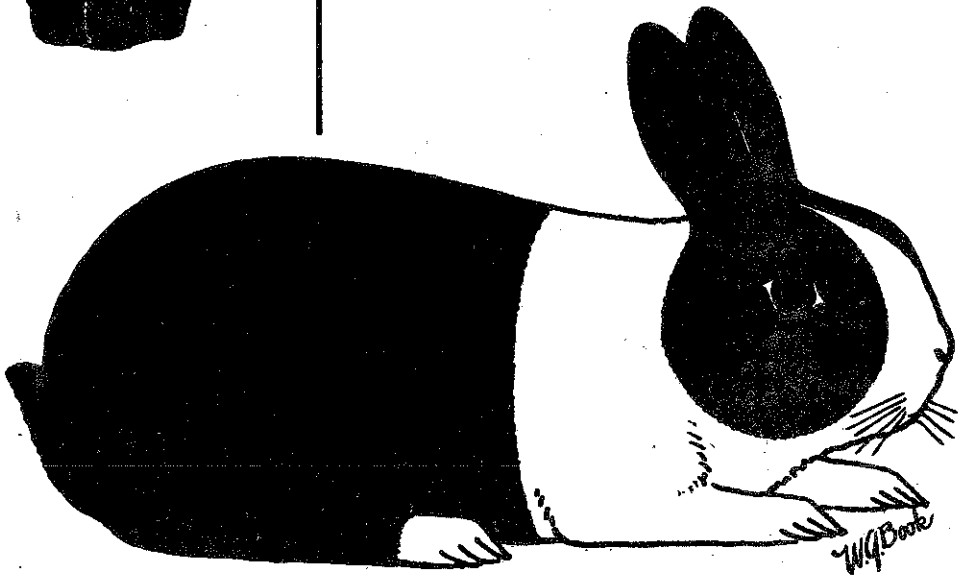

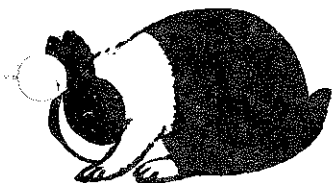

### THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We have now entered into a year which will hold much for the advancement of our Club and the Dutch rabbit which we sponsor. Your standing committees have all been appointed; I am asking the members to support these committees, and to write in suggestions to the relative committee pertaining to your suggestions.

I want to draw your attention to the office of Publicity Director and the committee which will work directly under the Publicity Director. You will find that Club members have been appointed State or area "Goodwill Ambassadors"; it is hoped that through the work performed by these appointees much will be accomplished in bringing about closer relationship between members, and putting the objects and aims of our Club before ALL rabbit breeders. I know the membership will cooperate with the complete personnel of the office of Publicity and Public Relations. A more detailed report will be given by our new Publicity Director, who will assume the duties of this office, April 1, 1961.

In connection with the enlargement of the operation of the office of Publicity, I want to touch on what I feel is definitely an important part of the duties of the Publicity Director. I am the Officer of your Club that started the advocacy of putting the complete operation, publishing, and mailing of the DUTCH REPORTER into the hands of the PUBLICITY DIRECTOR where it rightly belongs. The DUTCH REPORTER is the official mouthpiece of our Club; it's prime factor is to give out publicity, and build up public relations. I am a strong believer of NOT putting all the eggs into one basket. I feel by distributing the work-load of administering a Club into one or two committees, and if the method of operation is set up properly, very little, if any, overlapping will exist between the committees.

There has been expressions and thoughts of others that has appeared in the DUTCH REPORTER upon this trend of thought of streamlining the work-load, and putting the operation of the DUTCH REPORTER where it justly belongs. Of course it is fully understood by all, that constitutional changes will have to be made before such a change could become official. In-as-much that the Constitution and By-Laws is in the hands of a committee for the purpose of bringing it up-to-date with amendments that already have officially been made; I would like to see expressions from members published in

the DUTCH REPORTER in regards to constitutional changes that would put the complete operation of the DUTCH REPORTER into the office of the PUBLICITY DIRECTOR.

Our secretary has expressed that some 100 hours per month is devoted to the affairs of the Club. It is definitely NOT the intent of any Officer or Director of the Club to take away from the secretary any direct secretarial work or any financial compensation for such work. But this is not good administration in putting 90% of the work-load into one office. What if some unforeseen circumstances happened to the secretary? Your Club could come to a complete standstill for some 60 or 90 days,---- hence my thoughts of not putting all the eggs into one basket.

At this time I wish to sincerely thank the members whose voting resulted in selecting me to be the junior Judge at the coming National Dutch Rabbit Show. It is an honor to receive, and an expression of confidence which I greatly appreciate. The work-load of the Club's affairs at the meetings to be held at Colorado Springs is going to be very heavy; as President of your Club I justly feel that the Club's business should receive top priority, so I am declining the judging assignment to devote most of my time while at Colorado Springs to the Club's affairs. I know whoever are the judges, fair and just placements will be made.

In closing I want to stress the importance of support to Mel Emery in his work of preparing material and soliciting advertisements for the coming Special issue of SMALL STOCK MAGAZINE. This project needs the full support of the complete membership. Let us all get behind Mel and supply him with the data and advertisements he needs in putting this project over to a huge success. The first Special Issue the Club sponsored was GOOD, the second issue was BETTER, let's make the third one the BEST.

#### WHAT I THINK

I feel that it is my duty as a director to express my views on some of the matters that were brought on the floor at the Ft. Worth meeting and I may say here that I am convinced that Mr. Dennis and his committee deserve a vote of thanks for the fine work they started.

I must admit that until these matters were brought to my attention that I had always accepted without dispute the financial reports made to the club but since that time I have spent much time and thought in checking the reports for the past several years and it is my thought that if all current obligations were paid the ADRC is bankrupt. I have a firm suspicion that the "falsified set of figures" referred to in Mrs. Weinhardt's recent article are mine and I challenge anyone to prove them so. If anyone would care to examine them I would be most happy to supply copies. All club directors have seen them and to date I have complaints from only one director.

One item where club cost is high is the Dutch Reporter. For the fiscal year of 1960 (Jan. 1 to Jan. 1), postage and supplies for the Reporter amounted to \$425.00. Ads brought in \$125.75 (of which 50% went to the secretary), leaving a cost of \$365.00, nearly 85% cost over income. Since the membership voted to keep the Reporter on a monthly basis it is evident that the handling of the Reporter needs close and immediate consideration. You will note here, too, that the cost figures do not cover remuneration for the publishing work.

There would be three ways of decreasing the cost. First charge the members an additional \$1.25--300 members would cover the deficit of \$365.00 which we are now running. However, may I point out here that we are already charging a membership fee of \$3.00 while the greater majority of specialty clubs are charging \$2.00.

Secondly we find that over 50% of the Reporter space is taken up with sweepstake reports, so it is only reasonable to expect the 50% to come from Sweepstake sanctions. This would leave approximately \$175.00 to be met by other means. Immediately we think of ads--and while we are thinking of ads I should like to point out the present cost of \$3.00 per breeder ad and \$5.00 for double, amounts to 25¢ per issue. Small Stock is asking \$5.00 for half that space for one issue and although Small Stock does have a larger coverage than our magazine, ours is aimed at all Dutch breeders where the natural market lies. A quick glance shows us that doubling the cost of ads

would not meet the entire publication cost as again 50% goes into secretary's commissions. Even tripling the cost, under our present set-up would not meet this.

Third, since raising Dutch is strictly a hobby with most members, all members should be willing to help cut down costs either by paying more or by sharing the work. The latter seems logical as we should not permit nor ask one member to do all the work.

Our secretary has stated that at present she is spending over one hundred hours per month on club affairs. This is definitely too much time to expect any one member to devote to an organization--paid or not paid. It defeats its own purpose--first it places too much responsibility in one spot; secondly it generates inertia among club members as it is an axiom of organization that a working member is a good member and the more working members there are the stronger the organization. Although there may be an exceptional person who can give such huge blocks of time, it must be kept in mind that accidents can take such people entirely out of the picture and it could be virtually impossible to find a replacement. Besides putting too much responsibility in one hand it is also putting too much power in one person. This is not democracy.

I have written to secretaries of other specialty clubs to find how they operate and still stay out of the red. None of them charge as much for dues as does the ADRC, none of them charge as much for sweepstake sanctions as we do. Few of them granted more sweepstakes than we did. Last year we sanctioned about 250 shows; our financial report here shows an income of \$1,250, 50% of which went to the secretary. The American Checkered Giant Club, charging only \$3.00 per sanction, sanctioned 100 shows, paid out \$150.00 for trophies for sweepstaks and \$50.00 for ribbons. We paid out about \$70.00 for trophies. (Editor's note: I'd like to call attention to a slight oversight here, on the part of Mr. Shufflebotham. We also paid out \$220.76 for Rosettes and Ribbons, \$17.50 for envelopes for same, and about \$15.00 for postage for mailing same, or a total of \$253.26 additional expense on sweepstakes. JW) The ACCG have dues of \$2.00 and yet are operating on an even balance and have a reserve fund of over \$1,200. Why? Because of different management--one that could be applied to our club.

They have about the same membership as we. At the beginning of each year they put \$300.00 into the secretary's fund for operating cost. The secretary receives 25% of membership dues, no other. Their secretary draw 25% of \$2.00, which is 50¢; our secretary draws 12½% of \$3.00 which is 37½¢, plus 50% of sweepstakes sanctions and Reporter ads.

All sweepstakes records are handled by a sweepstake secretary who does the work as a volunteer. Secondly, the Checkered Giant News, published bi-monthly, is published by an editor, assisted by a typist who cuts the stencils; they pay the editor \$100.00 annually, the typist less than half of that. The entire cost of their publication for the year 1960 was \$333.29, labor, postage and materials. Their issues run to 20 or more pages.

I have a complete file of Reporters issued by our club. This was initiated in 1946 when Lou Souers was president of the club. John Griffiths was the publisher and the issues were good and interesting, issued on time each month. When Mrs. Grables was secretary, Mrs. Weinhardt was the publisher (not the editor) of the Reporter.

It was suggested at Ft. Worth, and I am heartily in favor of this, to separate the Reporter from the office of secretary, and to place it in the hands of a publicity director. Since the Reporter is an item of public relations it naturally falls into the duties of the publicity director. Since other specialty clubs journals have been and are handled on such a basis I see no reason why such a set-up would not operate efficiently for our club at the present time. Since there are several state Dutch clubs now sending out their own bulletins a consolidated committee could work with them to organize such materials into a worth-while national publication, the Dutch Reporter.

If it were the intention of the club to keep the Reporter merely a secretary's report to the membership I would see merit in leaving it where it now is; but since other clubs are handling their bulletins successfully from an editor's desk I see no

reason for feeling that the Dutch fanciers could not do likewise.

I should like to point out that since there were several skipped issues during the past two years, that setting the Reporter up with its own editor, dedicated to planning, and producing a bulleting interesting to all members, such a contingency might be forestalled. This is merely a long-winded way of saying that sorting out the duties assures more attention paid to each duty--and a better, all around job. It seems that an editorial board should come up with some interesting reports--and this again is definitely public relations.

I would favor our paying our secretary 25% of membership fees, new and renewals, and none of the sweepstakes sanctions. All of the specialty clubs contacted kept all of the sanction fees.

I feel that the Reporter handled as suggested at Ft. Worth would prove satisfactory and I suggest that these matters be brought before the membership meeting in Colorado. I recommend that our Constitution and By-Laws be revised to this extent and to close the loop-holes which have been draining our treasury.

#### NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW

Well, folks, I hope you are writing in for your show catalog (Sec'y's Note: I wish to beg Mrs. Pierce's pardon, but this is not necessary as catalogs will be mailed to all whose dues are paid through June 1, 1961. Better check your card or the address label on your Dutch Reporter. J. Weinhardt) for "The American Dutch Rabbit Club National Show at Colorado Springs, Colorado. Write Don Tucker; 11710 W. 38th., Wheatridge, Colorado.

The Dutch Breeders who visit this show are in for a real treat. They may visit the World famous Spencer Penrose Zoo, founded in 1927 by millionaire Spencer and his wife Julie who are buried on the mountain in a private shrine not open to the public.

"The Shrine Of the Sun", Colorado's memorial to Will Rogers is halfway up the mountain. Its chimes echo for 20 miles. Inside the Shring which is built from stone of one giant granite boulder is a coach house with a world famous collection of carriages. One was built in 1863, one belonged to the 21st. president of the United States. The Ski lift accomodates 890 persons and is open winter and summer to carry people to view the panorama below of gorgeous mountains.

It is a non-profit organization which is now cared for by the Spencer Penrose Zoo and Zoological Society. Adults are charged 25¢ to visit the zoo and children are free. There are 600 animals and 191 species. The 1960 feed bill was \$50,000.00. A male Gorilla is valued at \$10,000.00. These animals are from every part of the world. The sale of their offspring helps defray expenses also. Their cages and dens are built in the side of the mountain. A Polar bear enjoys his bath and den.

There are Penguins, cranes, lions, leopards, black leopards, black panthers, kangaroos, zebra, elephants, every variety of ape and the monkey family, gila monsters, snakes, giraffes and many more.

WE DON'T KNOW ALL OF THE ANSWERS - BUT WE TRY

Dear Mrs. Weinhardt,

I was referred to you by Mr. James Blyth, Secretary of the A.R.B.A. He suggested that I ask you about some material for my Science Fair Project, dealing with heredity in Dutch rabbits.

For this project I am making comparisons of color and markings of the young from my pair of Dutch rabbits. I am trying to determine whether or not the Mendelian laws of heredity are applicable.

I would appreciate any material you may have on the history of the Dutch; especially of the Blue Dutch. In my experiment I am breeding a Blue buck and Black doe.

I would appreciate a reply at your earliest convenience.

Dear Miss Otto,

I am taking it for granted that since the information requested is for the Science Fair Project, that you are a high school student.

It is quite a project that you have taken on, and one that I am afraid that can not be completed in just a few months. I believe that it would take at least seven generations to prove the Mendelian laws of heredity are applicable on color and markings. I am mailing you under separate cover a Special Dutch issue of Small Stock that has some very educational articles in it.

It would take me too long to go into this thoroughly by letter. I feel sure that I can help you, and I enjoy working with the 4 H.

You state that you are working with a Blue Dutch Buck and a Black Dutch Doe. I would have to know a little more about the background on these animals to give you the correct information that you are looking for, As you no doubt already know, the Blue is recessive to the Black, and it is possible for you to mate these two animals from now until doomsday and never get another blue amongst their offspring. That depends upon the Black Doe. If she is what is known as a true breeding Black, you will never produce anything out of your matings but pure breeding Blacks. If, on the other hand, you have some Blues in your first mating, she is not a true breeding Black and you may follow up your experiments from there and you will get a pretty even percentage of both blacks and blues in your litters. It is possible for you to get a true breeding black buck, you could mate him to 200 blue does and every one of his offspring would be black. On the other hand it should be an impossibility to get anything but 100% blues out of a blue to blue mating, as both parents would be recessive (blue). I have been breeding Dutch for over 50 years and have yet to see a Black come out of the mating of two blues (although I did read an article by an English Dutch Breeder claiming that he had produced as many as 7% blacks out of blue to blue breeding. On the other hand it is possible, and it occurs quite often, blues appearing out of black to black matings, and when this happens you are 100% certain that you do not have two true breeding Blacks, none of the parents could be true breeding Blacks. Should even one of them have been, then it should have been pretty near impossible for anything but black to turn up in their litter. To prove which one of the two was not a true breeding black, you would have to take both blacks, mate them to blues, if the resultant litters from the two of them show any blues, you could feel certain that none of the two blacks are true breeding, yet on the other hand, should one of the litters prove to be all blacks, it is more than probable that the black is a true black. You would have to try one more mating to make sure. If it does prove to be a true black, then as I have stated it should be impossible to ever get any blue out of him or her, regardless how

many matings you make to blues.

You state that your experiment is for both color and markings. You will find any one of the facets very interesting, and you will generally find that the best colored blues are the ones that come out of the black to black matings, and likewise the best colored blacks are generally the results of black to blue matings. This is especially true if the blue is out of a black to black mating. If you had the time to work on your project there are so many things that you would be able to prove. On the other hand it is going to be hard to prove anything with just the two Dutch that you have. It is possible for them to have three or perhaps four different colors in your first litter. If I knew more of the background of the two parents, I would no doubt be able to advise you more positively. Should there be any chocolate or tortoise in their background it could be that they will show up in the litters. For a project that you have started on, it should have been very important that you started out with blacks and blues that contained nothing but those two colors in your pedigrees and I am hoping that they were as this would make your project more simple.

You will find the complete history of the Dutch Rabbit that you requested in the Special Dutch issue that you will receive. That is the reason I did not touch on it in the letter. I am also enclosing an application to join the ADRC. Our Guide Book would be a big help to you and would answer most of your questions.

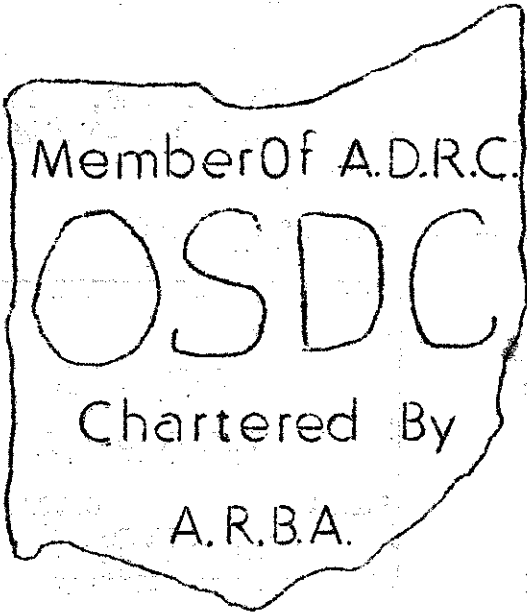
