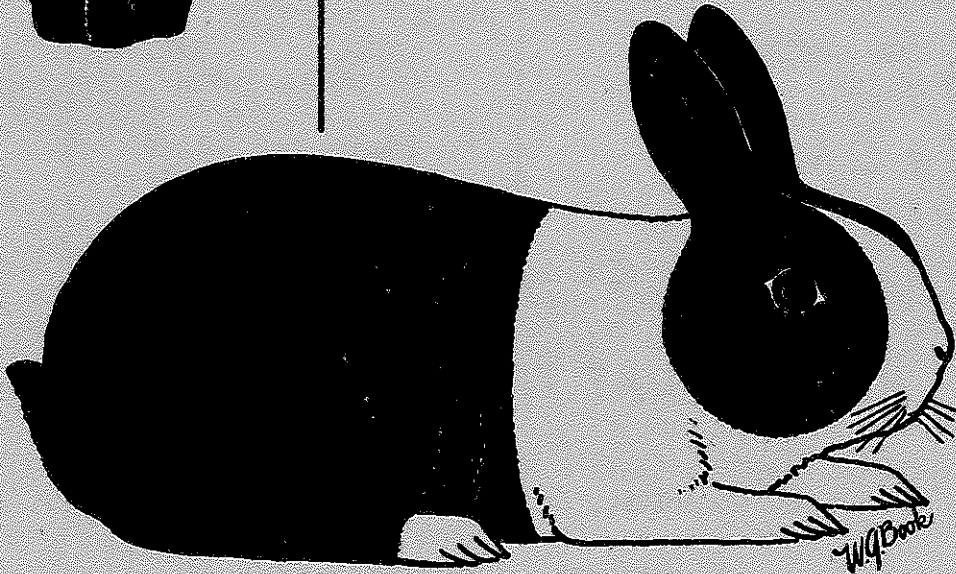
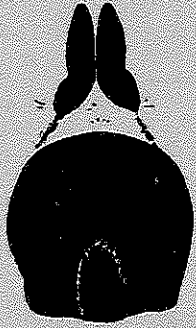
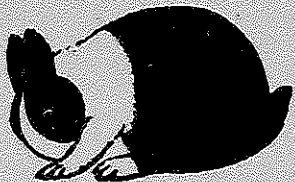

DUTCH FUROR

One of our Dutch breeders lives in a Dutch-sounding community, which is Zeeland, in the state of Michigan. His name is Gerrit Johnson.

Gerrit was born 52 years ago, and was raised, along with six brothers and four sisters, in Zeeland township on a farm. They also raised rabbits - of the "57 varieties". These were not raised for showing.

For the past 18 years Gerrit has been employed as a cabinet maker by the Slight-Loury Furniture Co. at Zeeland. After rabbits, his hobbies are eating and square dancing. Due to poor health he has not attended very many shows during the past two years. Now, however, he writes that both he and his wife are in fine health and hope to stay that way for a long, long time. They will be seeing some of you, too, at the shows.

He started raising show rabbits ten years ago, with New Zealand Reds and had fairly good luck with them. Soon, however, he ran short of space for the larger rabbits, so turned to Dutch and slowly disposed of the Reds. He still has a pair, though, just for color.

The Johnson rabbitry consists of sixty holes filled with Black, Blue, Tortoise, and Chocolate Dutch, and a few Polish. In his collection of winnings he has over 50 trophies and cups which he has won in the past seven years, plus about 300 blue ribbons and rosettes, also many ribbons of other colors. At his last show, the first of August, there were 90 Dutch. He entered 24 rabbits and took 12 blue ribbons. He says the fairs in his locality are very modest with entry fees, some not having any, some with 20¢ or 25¢ and with none over 50¢.

If any of you pass near Zeeland, in your travels, I recommend that you visit his rabbitry. I'm sure you'd enjoy it - I did.

JUST AN OPINION

Your Publicity Director, Mr. Hall, asked that I write an article on breeding Dutch for the Dutch Reporter. I am sure that there are many who have been more successful than I over the years in producing good Dutch. However, one opinion will not hurt.

This job which I have keeps me very busy, therefore, the following opinions are my own and what I have gained from experience. I do not propose that these will meet the approval of all the readers of the Reporter, but wish to say I will not argue the point as my time is limited.

First of all, for one to breed good Dutch, he must have a good knowledge of what is desired. The selection of breeding stock is most important; one must get a good knowledge of this otherwise he may by luck produce a good one, but will never be a consistent breeder of good Dutch. Type is a very important factor in the makeup of a good Dutch because the smooth rounded type shows off the markings to a much better advantage. Type must be studied carefully and those having best type should be used as breeders. Many go for markings alone. This is a mistake. Type can be bred into a strain and carried through for generations if the proper selection is carried on. Color too is a very important factor and one that most Dutch fail in today. This, too, can be stamped into a strain. Many in going over their litters select those with the best markings, thus they fall into the trap of losing their color and type. Building up a strain of winning Dutch rabbits cannot be mastered in a year or two. This takes

a lot of time and study of the rabbits at hand. Color and type should first be mastered before markings are considered in building up a strain.

Of course if you just wish to luck, a winner now and then, you can go as you please. But to be a consistent winner takes time and study. My opinion is that careful selection of the best type and colored rabbits you have, should be bred together and closely related so that you will be working in the same blood lines. The crossing of various strains only leads to confusion. While you may purchase a winning Dutch and one that looks good from outward appearance in the blood may be just the thing that has been bothering you. To study your rabbits and know what each one will do is the greatest benefit to the Dutch breeder or for that matter any breed of livestock.

In the selection of breeding stock, one should have the best they can afford and above all else have good type and color. In other words, it is hard to describe the proper type required in Dutch. Therefore, if possible one should attend shows and look the winning Dutch over. Dutch should be short and rounded in every respect. Long, boney and rough-bodied rabbits should never be used for breeding. Their coat should be smooth and slick with a bright healthy eye. Our standard describes the various colors in which Dutch come. There are probably as many faults in each color as there are colors. In black, there are those with white hairs, brown cast, fur so poor that the undercolor shows through and other faults. In blue, we have those that are too light, some with kind of an agouti color. Still others with sort of a silver tipped guard hairs. These things must be avoided when you are selecting good breeding stock. Some believe that by mixing the colors the best results can be obtained. In this I disagree. When you are breeding Dutch for color, you are not mixing paints. And I am of the opinion that is where this very old idea came from. Color effects all breeds of rabbits. And is just as important in English rabbits as it is in Dutch. Some years ago, for my own satisfaction and that of a good fancier, I was in partners with at that time, we decided to breed only those does and bucks of our strain that threw mostly blacks and kept selecting the best color in the blacks produced by these matings. In three years time, this stock we were working with had markings that were so black they had a green sheen on them. They were the blackest markings I had ever seen in an English from that day to this. This experience has led me to believe that mixing colors does not help.

I have, in the past couple of years visited Dutch breeders who would have several colors in their litters. To me, if we are to succeed in breeding good Dutch, we must set our sights and aim at what we want. That picture of the perfect Dutch must be ever a mental picture in our minds. To me, Ben Swinburne was the greatest Dutch breeder of all time. I watched this man over the years. He bred Dutch here and handled many of his Dutch at shows. He could sell a good trio and at the next show he would have something better. He bred black only to my knowledge. Before Ben went back to Scotland, I got a trio from him. This proved to me that he was a master breeder. These Dutch produced all black in every litter and a good black, too. Their type was good. They varied in markings so most of them leaning towards the heavy side. I do think the Dutch breeders of today are mixing too many colors and are not paying enough attention to tupe. Sure, there are many good Dutch today but there are many more Dutch breeders today, too. No one can tell you how you can produce winning Dutch. They can give you their ideas and you in turn can test these out and see how they work for you. Maybe they will not.

In closing, if you really want to produce a winning strain of Dutch, select the best in color and type. Stamp this into your strain, then work for markings by breeding against marking faults. Or balancing them with the breeders you are using. Do not buy every winner you see but rather work with the rabbits you know, and you know what is behind them and what they will produce. Sometimes certain bucks will produce better with certain does. We call this "nicking" and this is important to watch and to keep mating these rabbits together. This of course is only my thoughts. If you think any of them worthwhile, try them. If not, follow your own plans, I could be wrong.

WHAT ABOUT THE GRAY STANDARD?

This is written in regard to the Gray Dutch Standard. Notice, I said, "Gray Dutch Standard". Can anyone tell me why we should have a special standard for one variety of Dutch? Perhaps, at that time, he or they, were strong enough to push their point across. Now I've spoken to a man in the Eastern states area who raises quite a few grays, but they have an undercut showing and he stated to me that if nothing is done about Gray's until '61, well, he would eat them and raise English where one and all varieties are the same for one breed. I, for one, want a change, or rather, I want the undercut on my Blacks to be consistent with my Blues and Grays. Somebody, all of a sudden, started yelling undercut on Grays and all clubs are losing entries in their shows. Let's get on the old proverbial ball and either give the Grays:

1. No undercut
2. An undercut

If the second is the majority, I will show Grays. If the first is the majority, I will eat Grays.

Our Dutch Reporter is circulated to all members, every month. Why not have a small ballot slip printed on one of the pages, to be cut out and mailed to the chairman of the Standards Committee and find out whether the Gray breeders are pro or con?

WE DON'T KNOW ALL THE ANSWERS - BUT WE TRY

Dear Mr. Shufflebotham:

I am a bit mixed up as to what can be registered and what cannot. I have just started with Dutch, but have raised all kinds for about fifteen years and kept most of my breeding stock registered.

Here is my problem: I ordered a trio of Dutch from what I thought was a breeder of good Dutch and he sent me a trio that cannot be registered. They have a few defects. It was my understanding that they were not show stock, but good breeding stock. They were not ear marked and I had to write several times for the pedigrees. When they arrived the ages I am sure are not right for the rabbits. On the pedigrees not one registration appeared. Now if I raise any from these that are not mismarked can I register them?

I have made it a policy not to sell anything that I would not want to keep and was of the opinion that others felt the same way as I. I guess we all are just playing around with them as I have never made any money with them.

I know that you are busy and you did not sell me the rabbits, but before I go back on my Dutch friend, I do want your opinion in this matter of registration of the offspring. I know in other breeds you would have a very hard time registering junk.

I belong to the American Dutch Rabbit Club and do like the Dutch Reporter.

Dear Mr. Matthews:

I thank you for your letter of inquiry concerning the stock you have purchased and the question of registering your Dutch.

Personally, I register very few of my Dutch. I have always been against the system as applied to Dutch, and I have been on the Standard Committee of the Dutch Club many years. To my way of thinking, the system is unfair to the Dutch because there are many points or facets on the Dutch that would prohibit registration - in the main these refer to the markings which you do not have on self-colored rabbits. I have always felt that a Dutch that has no general disqualifications that apply to all other breeds should register.

I do not know from whom you purchased your Dutch - but to be honest with you, a great many of my breeders would not register - mostly due to some defect in their markings. Here is what I would call a good pedigree (and I don't put too much stock in these as a good pedigree can be made up by anyone) - there would be but one blood line shown on it, there would not be a mixture of colors in it, and the weights of

the individual animals would appear. You must make sure that the breeder you are dealing with is upright and honest and has had some experience with Dutch. The most important thing in breeding is color and type. These must be bred in, whereas Lady Luck has quite a hand in the markings. Markings without color or type mean nothing, for to have a winning Dutch you must have color, type and markings.

If you have a good strain of Dutch, good color and type and a good background there is no reason why you should not be able to produce a winning Dutch out of an animal that is mismarked. Example: in one litter you could have a big winner, also a mismarked animal. Of course they both have been bred the same way for generations, so why would not the mismarked one be able to produce a winner on a par basis with the winner? There is one thing you must avoid and that is not to breed the same faults in markings together.

There is nothing to stop you from registering the stock that you raise from the rabbits you have purchased if they meet all requirements. I trust that this information will help you and I will be glad to answer further queries.

FROM THE EDITOR'S MAIL-BAG

Dear Mrs. Weinhardt:

Thank you for your letter and membership card received this morning. I was glad to learn my opposite number in the American Club. I shall be writing to him by the same mail as yours. I had tried unseccessfully to get his name.

The United Kingdom Dutch Rabbit Club does not issue a Membership card, but does issue a Year Book, also Members can purchase a badge for the coat lapel.

I expect I am one of your eldest members; I am now in my 81st. year. I had my first Dutch about 1896, but in those early years, like most lads I chopped and changed my breed very frequently. When World War I broke out I soon volunteered for the Royal Army Medical Corp, which meant I handed my stock over to another. When that war was over, though I was then 38 I went to school and then to college. Whilst I was working in large parishes it was not convenient to keep any stock. When World War II was drawing to an end I moved to a country parish and had more liesure, and started again with Dutch. I have been fairly successful, though not this last year or two. Have you noticed that the well-marked ones seem to be at intervals, perhaps missing a generation? Of course where a large stud is kept this may not be so noticeable.

At the moment my numbers are small, I don't want too much work; but a small stud keeps me active. A near-by farm and fruit tree nursery, and a little further away a vegetable market garden supplies me with abundant supply of green food for collecting and carrying home. Generally speaking, English Rabbit people feed much green food, in fact some say oats or pellets are almost unknown by their stock as they feed almost all greens and hay.

There seems a tendency for rabbit breeding for table purposes to become popular. Many breeds, and crosses seem advocated, but I fancy the best proposition is to keep pure Dutch, and have two strings to ones bow, i.e. mis-marked ones for table and well-marked for show or sale to prospective new breeders.

The nearest Clubs to me is the City of Portsmouth and a smaller one, Portsmouth and District. The former does put on some good shows, especially the one held on August Bank Holiday (first Monday in August) and the next two days.

For some years now I have concentrated on Blacks and Blues, but at the moment it is all blacks unless there should be a blue in a young nest.

Now knowing my corresponding number the Dutch Reporter will have an added interest. Generally you have far larger numbers in classes at shows.

Now I guess I am wearying you as I wander on, so I will bring this to a close by wishing you good sucess in the Dutch Fancy.

A QUESTION OF ETHICS

I know full well that the promotion and advertisement of our breed and our club is close to the hearts of all of our members. One of the finest methods of such promotion is by having stationary printed with a beautifully marked, well typed Dutch as the principle feature of the heading. I wonder just how many of us have given much if any, thought to the source of such pictures? If one has been fortunate enough to have produced such an outstanding rabbit, then there is no real problem. All one has to do is get a good photograph of that rabbit and have a cut made of it for his own personal use. Many of our members have done just that and can explain, with forgivable pride, that the picture is of such and such rabbit, Best Dutch at this or that show, or Grand Champion No., whatever. If you had followed this course, say with an outstanding Tortoise you had raised, and one day you saw a letterhead, bearing some perfect strangers name and address, but with the picture of YOUR rabbit, perhaps shown as a Blue or a Black, what would your reaction be? Wouldn't you feel that someone was "stealing" your stuff? Many of us would be more than willing to grant permission for the use of such a picture, especially if credit were given, below the picture, to the owner of the rabbit, and original owner of the cut.

Just supposing you took it into your head that you liked the design of the Ford Motor Co. emblem and decided to use it on your letterhead, perhaps substituting your name for "Ford" on it - can you imagine the repercussions that might follow should such plagiarism come to the attention of company officials?

Several times recently, I have been asked if one or another member might use the cut that appears on our club's official stationary for personal use. I have neither given nor denied permission, but it is my personal feeling that the use of this emblem in its present form would tend to imply that the American Dutch Rabbit Club was making itself responsible for any actions taken by such an individual member and I do not believe that the rest of the membership would condone such implication. There is an answer to this problem, and that would be to follow the lead of the ARBA and redesign the cut to contain the word "member" somewhere in the design and then mats for such a cut could be furnished to the membership on the same basis as we now offer the "Ideal Dutch" mats that our Publicity Director has on hand. If enough interest were shown in such a project, and you can express your interest by dropping a card to Clinton Dennis, Chmn. of the Ways & Means Committee, then the matter can be taken up by the Board of Directors at some future meeting.

In the meantime, if you are contemplating using a cut of a Dutch rabbit in your printing, and do not have a suitable picture, please, please have the courtesy to request permission for using someone else's picture, and then give that person full credit for what is his.
