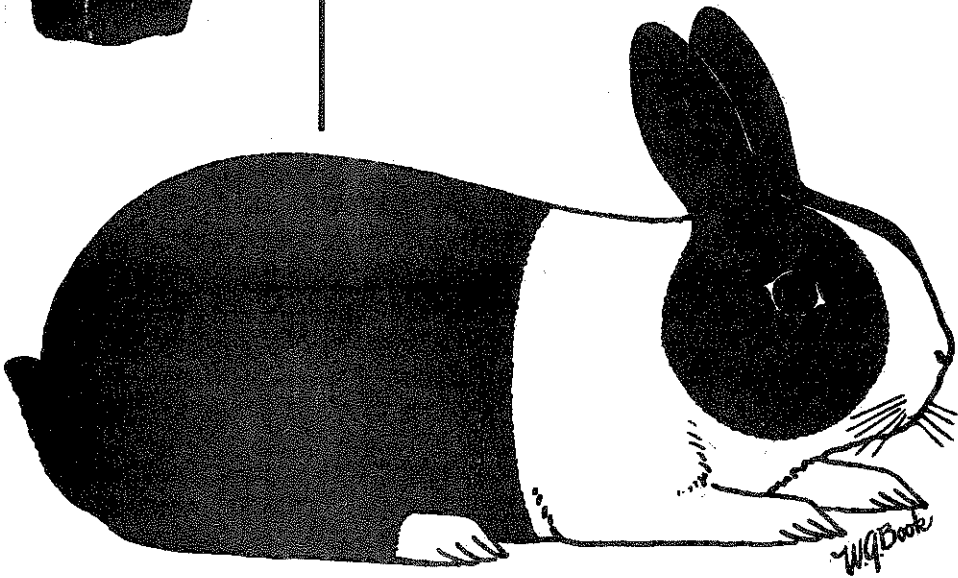
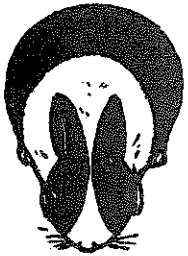

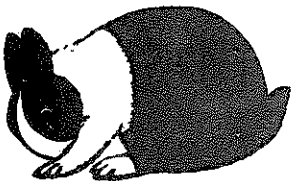

Minutes, General Meeting

The general membership meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club during the National Dutch Show held at Wilmington, Delaware was called to order at 8:45 P.M. on May 26th. by President, George Bayliss. A roll call of officers showed the following officers present: President, Bayliss, Secretary-Treasurer, Jessie Weinhardt, Director Tom Shufflebotham. Absent: Vice-President, Melvin Emery, Directors, Bill Summers, Roger Eich, E. C. Bickley, Wm. Stedman and Don Reid.

Minutes of the meeting held at Louisville, Kentucky were read by the secretary. Mr. Shufflebotham questioned that an omission had been made as he understood that a life membership for Mr. and Mrs. Harry Staneart had been included with the one for Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Sautters. He was informed that this life membership had not been included in the motion at Louisville and was instructed to bring up the matter under new business. The minutes were approved as read.

Mr. Bayliss expressed his thanks to the membership for turning out such a good vote on the new Constitution and By-Laws. None of the other officers present had any report to make and there were no written reports from those absent.

Under Committee reports, Mr. Bayliss reported that the Ways and Means Committee is inactive at the present time, so there is no report.

The Standard Committee had no report to make.

The Educational Committee activities were reported on by the Chairman, Tom Shufflebotham. He went into some detail to explain the workings of this committee, explaining that questions on the breeding of Dutch that came to his attention through the secretary's office, or from other sources, were answered, either by personal letters or through the pages of the Dutch Reporter. He regretted that there was not more activity in this department.

The Chairman of the Publicity Committee, Mrs. Tom Shufflebotham, reported on the activities of her committee, stating that the state and area representatives were beginning to function well, selling publicity items, and also sending in reports of the doings among Dutch Breeders in their areas. She gave particular credit to Virginia Pierce of Pueblo, Colorado. Her financial report, which was read at the meeting and has already been published, was very disheartening as it shows this department to be practically out of funds.

Member Bill Hobin, of Cranston, Rhode Island, was called upon for a personal report of his activities and he told us of the projected formation of a New England Dutch Rabbit Club. He also reported on the marked increase in the exhibition of Dutch in New England during the past year, and predicted more activity yet, in the future. It took some doing on the part of President Bayliss, but he was finally prevailed upon to report on his own literary achievements. It seems he has had some very fine stories for children, about rabbits of course, published in newspapers in his area, and these are now in the hands of publishers and will soon appear on the market in book form.

President Bayliss reported for the Guide Book Committee, stating that the forthcoming Guide Book would be one of the best, if not the best in the industry, containing many fine innovations, including the cover, which would be quite different from any we have had to date, plus color plates, which would be included at no expense to the Club. The best bid for the printing of the book was \$8.40 per page and this was from a printer whose place of business was close enough to the home of Chairman, Tom Shufflebotham so that he could work with the printer to insure a better job on the whole. Mr. Shufflebotham reported that he had secured quite a few ads and hoped to get more at the show, but there was still a long way to go and he did not see how the new Guide Book could possibly be ready by the time of the Tampa Convention.

Under unfinished business the matter of the very bad financial condition of the Publicity Committee was again brought up, and the president assured the membership that this would be referred to the Ways and Means Committee and some action could be expected. It was suggested that authorization for payment for the Dutch booth at Tampa, out of general funds, might be in order. No action.

Tom Shufflebotham requested the floor and brought up the action taken at Louisville with regard to the ADRC's travelling trophies. He went into considerable detail explaining the commemorative purpose of those trophies, and the merit of perpetuating such memories for future generations of Dutch Club members. He expressed a deep dissatisfaction with their final retirement, feeling that they should be replaced for continued competition.

The secretary reported that the club had been requested to offer funds for the Junior Division at Tampa. Those present did not feel that they wanted to contribute to these classes.

Bob Scott asked for the floor and stated that as a judge there was a matter he would like to hear discussed, and perhaps some decision made on. He stated that he was being frequently confronted with very young Dutch Rabbits in the junior classes and the exhibitors, having paid their entry fees, resented such comments as "too young for competition" or "outclassed". He said he would like to see the membership present go on record, as either favoring a judges giving full consideration to such babies in the junior class or else take under advisement the introduction of a Pre-Junior Class for Dutch under 3 months of age. Under the ensuing discussion, some felt that although such a pre-junior class might prove very detrimental to the individual baby, because of the physical strain relative to being shown, it would serve an educational purpose in that it might show the newer breeder which individuals were really worth saving. Inasmuch as no changes such as this would be permitted by the ARBA for at least another four years, no action could be taken and the membership present seemed about equally divided as to the value of such a class.

Due to this year's unhappy experience with the judges having been selected by the club being unable to serve, the question was raised as to just what the fees to be paid judges for a National Dutch Show should be. It was pointed out that it was quite as easy for judges to attend a National Dutch Show as for any other member, but it was also felt, with such a large sum as is presently turned over to the sponsoring club, some equitable figure should be arrived at as a set fee, and then such payment be required and understood by all concerned.

The question was raised as to whether Gold Dutch could still be shown. It was explained by the secretary, that although the Gold Dutch had been turned down by the ARBA Standards Committee at Syracuse as not having shown sufficient improvement, it was still possible, not only to show them, but to present them to the ARBA again, but it should be born in mind that any exhibit, to demonstrate progress, should consist of no less than four rabbits, a senior buck and doe and a junior buck and doe which

are offspring of the two seniors.

A motion was made by Tom Shufflebotham that an Honorary Life Membership should be granted to Grace and Harry Staneart of Middletown, Indiana, in recognition of their long service to the ADRC. Motion seconded by Robert Scott and J. Russell Hall. Motion carried.

A motion to adjourn at 10:35 P.M., was made by Robert Scott, seconded by Al Meier, Jr. Motion carried.

Many more pages of advertising is needed for our forthcoming Guide Book. On another page you will find a full report by Chairman, Tom Shufflebotham and I would like to suggest that if you have not placed your ad for this fine publication, you make use of the blank enclosed with this issue of the Dutch Reporter and send your ad either to Mr. Shufflebotham, or to Mr. Bill Summers whose address appears on the form.

Had a very interesting report from our good friend Ernie Parks of Parks' Petland Rabbitry in Arizona the other day. Those members out his way really have to travel to get to the shows, and during most of the year this travelling has to be done during the cool night hours to get their rabbits to the shows alive. In case of a breakdown, which occasionally happens, they stand to lose many good show rabbits. Anyway, Ernie brings to my attention the show report for the San Diego (Calif.) Cty. Fair, which you will find published in this issue. Seems Ernie had Best Dutch, Best Opposite Dutch, Best of all six varities, and Best Opposite of all varieties except Chocolates. The next week he did the same thing at the Orange Cty. Fair (also Calif.) except for Best Opposite Steel. He states, "First time I've ever done it and I've been showing Dutch since 1939."

I want to express my thanks to everyone of the winners of leg trophies at the Wilmington, Del. show. This is the first time since I have held this office that I have ever received 100% acknowledgement of the receipt of any group of trophies I have mailed out. When I send out the Sweepstake trophies each year, I am very fortunate if one or two of the winners bothers to drop me a line to let me know if they ever got their trophies. I can usually assume they got them, as people seem to be very quick to complain if they don't get something they feel they have coming. It takes quite a bit of effort to get these trophies assembled, packed and mailed and it is very gratifying to know that the recipients are appreciative enough of this extra effort to let me know they were delivered.

Speaking of the sweepstake trophies, the series for 1961-62 closed with the National Dutch Show at Wilmington, but there are still two show reports not published in this issue, so the standings herein published cannot be considered final. I have never had a catalog for the North Florida Show held at Jacksonville on April 7-8th., nor have I ever had a report or a catalog for a show sanctioned for the Okla. State Ergrds. in Okla. City on May 5-6th. Also there was a show sanctioned to the Tenn. Valley Rabbit Club for the All Southern Show to be held in Nashville on last Nov. 4th. I have written to the secretaries for the materials to fulfill the requirements for

these shows, with no response, any member having earned points in any of these shows and wishing credit for them, perhaps it would help if you got in touch with the show secretaries to see what can be done. If no reports have been received by publication date of the Sept. issue, the series will be declared closed and points on them will not be counted.

OUR NEW GUIDE BOOK

At the ADRC National Show held in Harper, Iowa, it was decided to sponsor a special edition of Small Stock Magazine, and the production of a new Guide Book was also discussed. The special edition of Small Stock has become a splendid reality, but the matter of the Guide Book is still unresolved.

At the Louisville Convention of the ARBA the Guide Book was again discussed and a committee has since been named. Reluctantly I accepted the chairmanship of this committee and have appointed my assistants -- the solicitation for ads has been underway for some time and to date I must admit that I am disappointed in the memberships response in this field.

The total cost of putting this book in the hands of the membership may run as high as \$1,250.00 if we are to have the type of book I am planning. I don't think anyone will give us much argument to our claim that we have the finest Guide Book ever published on one breed of rabbits. Our present plans are to put out an even better issue, and to do this it is necessary that the membership cooperate and buy some good advertising. This is the only way we have of defraying the cost.

If you will read the financial report of our secretary in the last issue (July) of our Reporter you will see that there is no money on hand to help finance this project. I realize that it is going to be much harder to sell sufficient advertising this time as our present membership is only in the neighborhood of 400, while when the last edition was published we had a membership of approximately 600. We will either have to have a larger percentage of membership ads or we will have to go outside of our membership for ads -- this, I know, can be done.

To date I have received through the advertising committee, only about \$150.00 worth of ads. This is no do-it-yourself job as far as I am concerned -- and yet I have collected over twice that much. Part of this, of course, was solicited at the ADRC meeting in Wilmington and part at shows in Indiana and Ohio. On the other hand, I have sold the back page to a local restaurant and the inside cover to a local feed company, both for \$30.00 each; and a half page to another restaurant and another half page to a motel. I am sure there are people with whom you do business who may profit from our advertising -- these Guide Books frequently travel with club members as they travel about the country. However, you will have to go out and get these ads -- they do not come to you!

So far we have sold only 20 pages of advertising, so you see we still have a long way to go. If your name does not appear on the following list of members ads received, please do not delay in placing it quickly!

YOU CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH

BREEDING TORTOISE DUTCH

(Ed.'s Note: This article first appeared in the November 1957 Dutch Reporter and is being herein reprinted by request. JW)

The fancier that has selected Dutch as his hobby has one of the most varied color choices of all breeds shown today, with the possible exception of the Rex rabbit. The matter of color is one of my "obsessions" in the selection of Dutch, and it is especially important in the tortoise Dutch, which is perhaps my favorite of the colors.

The production of good tortoise color is only achieved through the most careful and selective breeding; luck enters into the production of markings to some extent but color is only achieved by the most thoughtful selection of breeding stock. It is possible to have an animal that carries correct markings but fails as an exhibition winner simply because it fails in color and type.

By reviewing our standard we find points placed as follows: Type, 15; fur 10; color 13; eyes 2; (and since eyes are judged for color, this actually gives us 15 points for color) feet and legs, 2; head 5; ears 2; tail 1 (and since ears, feet, tail and head are judged for type this would give us 25 points on type). This gives us 50 points on color, type and fur, and leaves 50 points for markings. Since type includes the conformation of the head, body, ears, feet and tail; and the points on markings cover the saddle, undercut, blaze, cheeks, neck and stops; you can see the importance of color to a good Dutch as no other factor is rated with so many points. You can see from this that color bears an important place in the make-up of any of the six color varieties of Dutch.

Shadings are very important in the composition of a good tortoise. Bearing in mind that the color standard is only an ideal it is still my belief that the color interpretation is not being followed correctly by most breeders and judges. Color is difficult to describe but let us look at our standard on tortoise -- "shoud be a bright clean orange color, blending into smoky-blue shading over the rump, carrying well into the haunches. The top color should carry down into the under-color, blending into a dark cream color next to the skin. Tail should match match the top body color, under tail to match shadings; light tails are permissable, but very undesirable. The shadings on the head should be darkest at whisker bed, blending into lighter shadings on the jaw, and darkening again at the ear base, blending up the ears to match body color, ears to have lacings to match shadings. Fault: White harris, smut or smudge throughout the orange color."

It has been my experience that many judges are paying too much attention to the bright orange color of the back, and paying little or no attention to the shadings or tail. Without the shadings you do not have the true tortoise color; many tortoise are being placed that resemble the color described in the working standard on gold Dutch,

which are actually nothing more than tortoise without shadings.

The standard calls for smoky-blue shadings over the rump, to carry well over the haunches. The pattern for the shadings should be similar to the conformation of side markings on an English Spot, and should carry all the way around the lower portion of the rump and tail (that is, the underpart of the tail) and should match the shadings of the rump. The standard reads; "light tails are permissible, but very undesirable". This is a defect that is being passed by both judges and breeders alike. The shadings should carry down to include the undercut so that the undercut becomes very distinct. Shadings on the head should be as described in the standard. It would be nice to produce a tortoise with ears colored to match the top color of the back and the shadings to be around the ear edge; I have yet to breed or see one like that. In my opinion, a tortoise that carries good shadings and a good colored tail is to be preferred over the one that carries a bright colored back with an "undesirable" light colored tail, and lacking the desired shadings.

The tortoise is a true breeding color and will throw nothing but torts when bred tort to tort. There have been many experiments advocated to produce correct shadings. One is the breeding to blues, taking a blue-fawn from the mating and mating this back to a dark colored tort; or using an out-cross to a black. I have tried them all in my many years of tortoise breeding and am now convinced that the best results are achieved from tort to tort matings. I prefer taking a dark colored animal, mating it to a light colored one, and discarding all with light colored tails as it is never wise to breed in any undesired feature. I find that it is difficult to pick out the best colored torts until they have attained their adult coat, as the color of torts generally become darker with each succeeding moult. This seems particularly true of the back color. I always keep the youngsters showing the darkest shadings when they come out of the nest box. In the selection of breeders, select first for color and type. Never mate two animals with the same fault in markings as the fault becomes intensified with each generation. It is wise to use either a buck or doe with reasonably good markings although it is best to use a buck that has very good type and is as well marked as you can get him, as you can use him on several does. Then pray that Lady Luck will be with you on the markings, and don't get discouraged when she isn't. The perfect Dutch has yet to be produced -- and it may be you who produces it! It is this hope that makes the breeding of Dutch the challenge it is -- and keeps you in Dutch.
