

YOU CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH

CARING FOR CHOCOLATE DUTCH by CLINT DENNIS (reprint)

Chocolate is my favorite color Dutch. There was never any doubt in my mind about that from the beginning back in 1949 down to the present time. I have always raised Chocolates and so long as I will be raising rabbits of any kind, I will be raising Chocolate Dutch.

Chocolate is a soft color and its greatest enemy is harsh, bright sunlight. This is true of the other colors, but it wreaks greater havor on Chocolate than any of the other colors. I have tried all sorts of ways to protect the chocolate color, but the only practical way I know is to have my rabbitry as dark as possible. A cellar would be ideal, but generally they are to damp and defeat our purpose by making it impossible to have good healthy rabbits. I have settled on a solid roof with protection on all sides so that the direct rays of the sun never shine on my chocolates. Hanging gunny sacks on the door will cut down on the amount of light in very hot, dry times.

The second greatest enemy of Chocolate color is HEAT. Heat and light go together, of course, but experience indicates that even where the light is kept to a minimum that excessive heat will fade color. It is therefore imperative that in order to have good color, you keep the chocolate as cool as possible.

The third great ememy of Chocolate color is dryness. Any hair will dry out if comtinually exposed to extreme dryness. In Oklahoma it is generally dry for about 6 months of the year. We have found that the use of evaporative coolers during the day not only provides coolness, but the added moisture helps to maintain a healthy condition of the coat. Many sections of the country will not have this problem.

Certainly all color is affected by foreign matter, all rabbits are naturally clean in nature, but many times it is impossible for them to keep clean under the condition that we provide for them. Wet hutches particularly will cause chocolate to fade and any type filth will distract from the good chocolate color, therefore we must keep our chocolates in dry clean hutches.

Chocolate color shows up better when the coat meets the Dutch standard, that is when it is short, crisp and dense. Many chocolates fail in color because the fur is thin or more often long and soft. This applies to all colors, but particularily to blues and chocolates. When I first started raising chocolates, breeders in this area told me that it was impossible to get chocolates with really good fur, however, careful attention to fur has enabled me to win several nice normal colored fur classes with Chocolate Dutch.

To summarize, breed the best possible chocolate color, keep your rabbits clean, cool and in the darkest possible place in keeping with good danitation and you will be rewarded on the show table.
