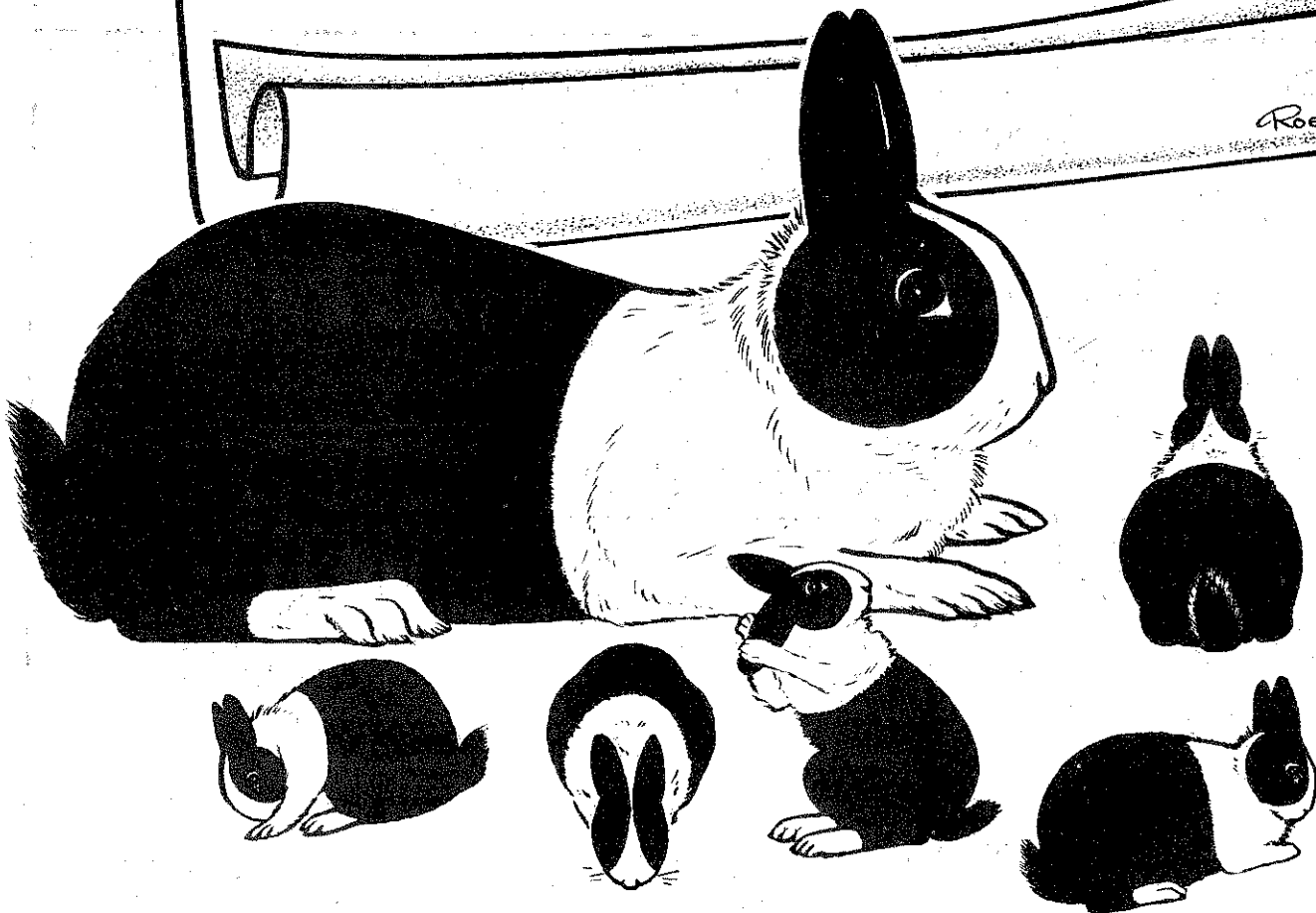

Our Annual National Dutch Show is rapidly approaching and the Ohio State Dutch Club sponsoring this years event is hard at work preparing all the necessary details to insure for you an outstanding Show and Convention at Norwalk, Ohio, April 22-23-24. Reports to date from the various committees in charge of arrangements are most encouraging and promise many pleasant surprises for the Dutch Breeders.

The show as you learned from my article last month will be held in the St. Paul Gym in the heart of Norwalk, Ohio just (3) blocks from Convention Headquarters, the Avalon Hotel. The Banquet and entertainment will be held in the dining room at the show site at 7:00 P. M. Saturday April 23rd, followed by a general assembly meeting of the A.D.R.C. members and executive staff. Judging will begin on Friday April 22nd, and continue on Saturday until completed. I can assure you that after hearing of the planned menu for the Banquet from the Chairman, Mrs. Hulda Ohlemacher that you are in store for a most elaborate and very tasty dinner. 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THE AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB'S NEW GUIDE BOOK

Guide Book and Standard Committee

Spring will soon be here again and with it the show season for a large number of our clubs. Spring will bring another new intensified breeding season when we each hope to find in the nest box that perfect or near perfect Dutch. With this show season we will find ourselves confronted with a new standard for the Gray and the elimination of the AOC classes. We will still have six colors and twenty-four classes to show in and that should be a challenge to any breeder. If I could win the Best of Color in any one of these six colors in a large, strong competition I think I would have been repaid for my efforts and patience. Then if I could win the Best of Breed of the entire show, I know my efforts at specializing in only a few colors would be reward enough. Let us each pick our favorite color or colors and endeavor to make the Dutch Rabbit better and more popular.

We know "YOU CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH" but lets prove it over and over again to the other fellow until the entire rabbit world will have recognized it. The Dutch is a very popular show rabbit in most sections of the nation, but here on the South Plains of Texas he is also a very popular meat rabbit. The housewife wants a small rabbit that will compare in cost with the chicken when purchased at the neighborhood grocery store. The Dutch fills this need as it is the correct size for a meal of a small family of two or three. By popularizing the meat qualities of the Dutch we can dispose of our mismarks and surplus and have the best left for the shows.

I thank the membership for the good confidence vote you gave me in the election to Director of the AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB. I will continue to do all I can to further the interests of the Dutch Rabbit and our club. For several years now I have raised nothing except Dutch, some good and some not so good. I thank you for your cooperation in sending in advertisement for the new Standard and Guide Book. I think the present Guide Book and Standard is one of the best, but our supply will soon be exhausted and the Standard and the Show rules have changed. The One Day Sweepstake shows and the Junior Department have been added since the printing of the last Guide Book, so the present one is not up to date. Just how good the new Guide Book and Standard is, and just how much information it contains will depend entirely upon the membership as we intend to use all the money received for advertisement in printing the book. We will have to include certain essentials in the book, but other information that will be of much benefit to the membership will be included if money is available for the printing. However this is not the only important reason why you should send in your ad immediately. This Guide Book and Standard will in all probability be in use for five years. All present members and all new members as they join during that time will receive a copy. This advertisement will be good for at least the five years and many persons will keep the Guide Book much longer. This is very reasonable advertisement, even if you have nothing to sell at this time and just want

to keep your name or your rabbitry before the public. I pay this same amount for an ad in our local spring show catalog, that will reach only a few Dutch breeders and will be kept at best only a few weeks. The Advertisement is the best that could possibly be secured for the price. I doubt if you could secure better advertisement at several times this cost. Will you consider your loyalty to the club and the benefits to be secured in the advertisement in the Guide Book and Standard, and then send in your advertisement before it is too late. We must be able to supply new members with a Guide Book when the present supply is exhausted, and we each want an up to date Standard and show rules for our reference at all times. You Judges and Registrars, especially need one of the up to date Standards, and you need your advertisements in the Guide Book and Standard. When we study the selection of a Judge for our local shows I always want to know if the man in question is a member of the Dutch Club, and if not I personally prefer one that is a member of the AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB. This may be a little selfish, but then I raise Dutch and Dutch only, so I want a Judge that I can depend upon knowing his Dutch. You judges are welcome to join our club, receive our new Standard and Guide Book and use it when necessary.

To A. D. R. C. Members:

Due to very bad weather conditions to avoid drivina a 65 mile trip, the ballots for Judges for the 1955 National Dutch Show were counted a few days late, on February 6 at which time there was a meeting scheduled with some of our Club members in attendance. I hope this will meet with your approval.

Ballots were cast from all parts of the U.S.A. with a very good representation of the COUNTRY, but to my estimation not the Club, when one takes into consideration that Ohio, where the show will be held, ans nearly 100 Club members alone. However, I received a letter from one of our members who gave me a little "insight" on why he did not vote in this election, that is, "he did not intend to exhibit, and he thought it totally unfair under this condition for him to help select the judges". Each to his own opinion, of course; but I wonder if this may be one reason for light voting in the election of Mational, and ARBA Convention, Judges.

Some of the envelopes containing ballots also contained dues, correspondence, etc. and had to be opened. This was agreeable with your Secretary, and I am pleased that those who did this has this trust in me. Other envelopes containing ballots only, were marked with the word "ballot" on the outside, and were not opened. In cases where it could be ascertained that the envelope contained only a ballot, these envelopes were not opened. There were a total of 75 ballots contained in envelopes that were unopened until time of counting.

Generally speaking, our elections are becoming heavier in number of votes cast. This shows a keen interest in the welfare of our Club's activities.

I do beleive that ballots, with return envelope, should be mailed to the membership First Class Mail, and should NOT be sent via the Dutch Reporter. I sincerely hope that in the future it will be possible to do this. I believe, too, that Ballots of ALL Elections, regardless of what the Election is, should be counted by the regulary appointed Election Committee. As in the past, the Secretary has counted the ballots for the election of National Show Judges, This WOULD BE a new precedent; but one worthy of consideration, inasmuch as it would be more business-like, and in the hands of those who are experienced.

However, in this election, we were fortunate to have a very good, and experienced committee, and our thanks to them for helping us. The following is the report:

(ditor's note: Over the past few months there have been several requests for information on "Breeding Steel Gray Dutch". I am pleased that we do have some new Steel breeders in the offing, and since they do want to get started right on their project, I feel that there are experienced Steel Breeders who may want to share their knowledge with the novice. The following is the first in a series of articles on the breeding of Steel Dutch. If you have any secrets for successful Steel breeding which you may want to pass on, send them to this office, they will be appreciated.)

### BREEDING STEEL GRAYS

by Tom Shufflebotham

I have been requested by our good secretary to write a few lines on the breeding of steel grays. I have done this several times in the past, so I trust that some of the older members will pardon the repetition, and I hope that some of the newer breeders may get some benefit from it.

Should any of you ask me which I considered the most difficult color to breed in the Dutch, without hesitation I would say, "Why, steel of course". Should you ask me which I consider the prettiest of the colors my answer would be the same. In my estimation they hold their color between moults better than any of the other colors. They are the most difficult color to breed because they are a "made color" and very seldom breed true to color. I say this after an extensive ten year breeding operation in steel, inbreeding. Only once in this period did I get litter of 100% steels. Of course one of the hardest things to get in any color variety is GOOD COLOR and I think this doubly true in the steel. I think that one of the things that confuses many of our breeders is our definition of steel; I have seen and handled many grays in the steel classes and I likewise have seen steels in the gray classes.

Quoting our color description: "A dark uniform steel gray color. This color is brought out by a moderate amount of light gray tipped guard hairs evenly distributed over the entire colored portion of the rabbit. Color to resemble the fresh break in a piece of steel; to be free from white hairs, sandy, brassy or brownish tints, with slate blue undercolor carried down to the skin. Under portion of tail, belly and inside of hind legs to be as near body color as possible. Avoid extreme brassiness; Head, ears or feet too dark or not enough gray hairs distributed over these portions." Here are a few of the faults of our present steel that need the attention of the selective breeder; ears too dark, with lack of ticking; too dark down the center of the back; brassy colored haunches and feet. A good steel should be as evenly ticked throughout, head, ears, saddle, and feet, as possible. Try to get the belly color as near the back color as possible. A good steel should have a good, clear hazel brown eye.

Now as to breeding. They are a "MADE" color and do not reproduce true to color as do our other varieties. It is a matter of fusion of the colors that go into the production of a good steel. I doubt if many of the old time breeders of steel will ever agree on what goes into the making of good steel. I have produced quite a few good ones myself and it is my experience that I speak from. The grays themselves are true breeding and will generally throw 100% gray litters. To get the steel, black must be introduced into the gray. From such a mating it is very probable that you will get a steel or two. However, it is from these resultant blacks that you get your steels, and from a mating between them and your working grays you will get a larger percentage of steels in your litters. I myself never found steel to steel matings successful. Gray to steel-gray will produce some steels for you, but they do not produce as good color as those procured from the gray to the gray-black (that is, a gray from the gray-black mating). One thing that should never be done is to mate any of the blacks that you get from these matings back into your black strain, even though they may be fine colored blacks. To me they are useless in your herd except in steel breeding, that is back to another gray. Bred with black or blues they throw stock that has far too many white hairs. There is a possibility that in some of your black to gray matings there may be a blue-gray. If that should be so it is wise to mate them back into the steel as I think it gives a cleaner colored steel. I would say mated to a gray bred black - or one of your steels - or should you want to produce

the blue-gray for your steel breeding, a blue to a gray should give them in your first litter. Some of my better steels were produced in this manner. I think that this practice tends to breed out a lot of the brassiness that you will find to some extent in all steels.

I am sure that it is almost an impossibility to produce steels that will breed true to color, that is, to find 100% steels in your litters. It is a challenge to any fancier who likes to do experimental breeding. The production of a good steel carries much satisfaction and gratification - after that, you just try to get another one like it.

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WANTED: DUTCH BREEDING STOCK URGENT!!!!

The above headline may not be news, within itself; but behind this headline is some STARTLING NEWS.

We have a letter here ON FILE from one of our FORMER members stating "Until I can own, breed and exhibit Dutch, I have dropped my membership from the very fine American Dutch Rabbit Club". This letter contains names of nine of our prominent Club members to whom this former Club member wrote and WAS NOT ABLE TO BUY Black Dutch. I must say in the letter to this office, the buyer specified "juniors, preferably two to three months old: not necessarily top prize winning stock, but stock from an established strain, capable of producing some real youngsters". Ordinarily, this is not much to ask for. But for the present, I feel the buyer would have been apt to have received an offer of probably a doe ready to breed, or possible even a bred doe. Furthermore, I believe it wiser for the novice to buy their Dutch at an age ready for breeding, or already in production, rather than to choose those so young. By the same token, the breeder may choose to hold his Dutch until they are

well on their way to becoming senior age, for these reasons: The problem of white hairs is usually past by the time the Dutch is four and a half months old; (no reputable breeder will want to sell a Dutch having white hairs) by this time, you can also rest assured that if the Dutch does not have an "eye-speck" by then, it will never have one; and the males will have developed two good testicles, if they have not, they can be butchered by the breeder. Now, it is not once in a blue-moon that problems of this sort may come to light, but that one time may justify the reason for not selling babies.

THIS IS URGENT: If you have any Black Dutch, or Dutch of any color for that matter, for sale, please write to this office, and I will forward your offer to those who need stock. Or, if you prefer, write for names and addresses of potential buyers. If there are others who need stock, send your name and address to me, and perhaps we may be able to make everyone concerned a little happier.

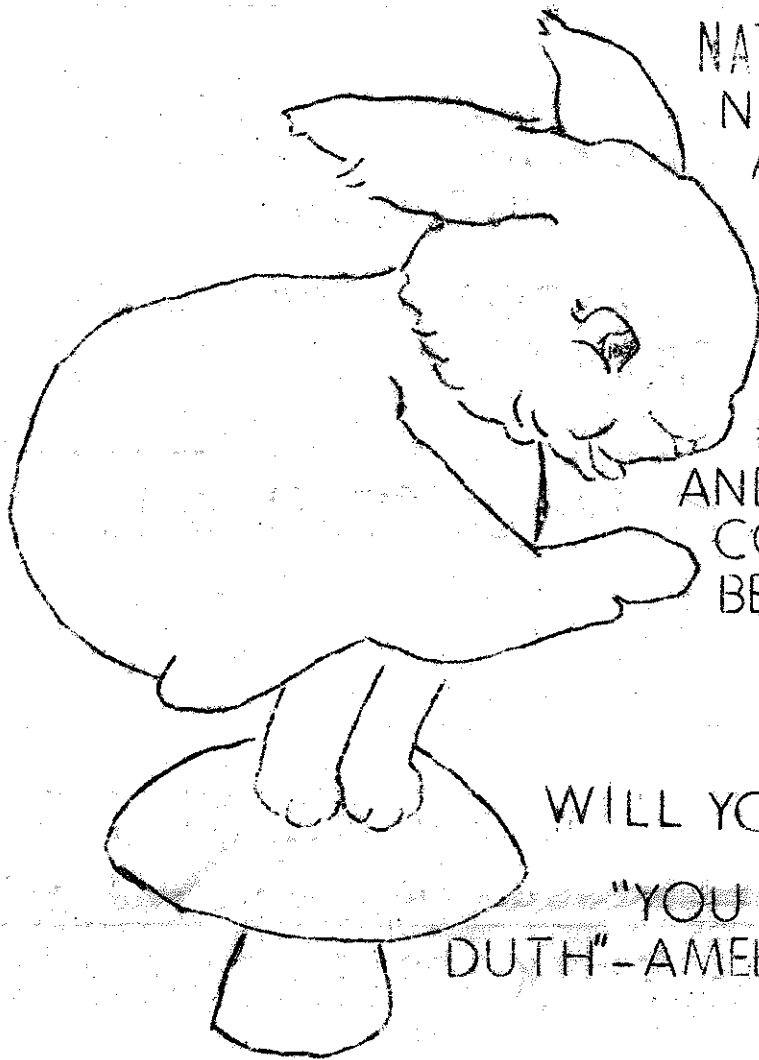
