A True Story of a New Dutch Fancier and how it Starte......

We have shown rabbits since 1963 and always admired the Little Dutch as we called them.

It all started at the lowry City, Mo. Judges Conference and Rabbit Show, March 1968.

We were ready to leave and Mr. Eabert (Fibber) McGehee from Tulsa, Okla. Says, "John have you got an empty carrying case?" I said "yes". He handed me a little Black Dutch buck and says, take this home to your little bou, Lane. Lane was 5 years old then, and was home with his Mother as there was serious illness in the family. I arrived home with the little buck, tatooed G1 and gave him to Lane, who promptly named him Fibber G1. It was cold and snowing so a box about 20" wide and 2' long was brought initinto the house and placed in one corner of the kitchen for Fibber's house.

Within a week he was house broke and Lane carried him around like a doll. It was just a few weeks until all the neighbors knew that Brown's Rabbitry had a Dutch rabbit.

Fibber was quite a rabbit. We let him run around the house and he became a music fan, Stereo, no doubt. When he was loose and the Stereo was turned on Fibber premptly would go to where one of the speakers was sitting on the floor, park his back side against it and stayed there until the music stopped. He performed for one and all.

Every day the sun was shining and ground clear, Lane would take Fibber out side in the yard and turn him loose to run around. The neighbors thought that was something because Lane could catch Fibber anywhere. He would just sit there and let Lane walk up and pick him up. Lane started to Head Start School in June and talked about Fibber to the Teacher, till she asked him to bring him to school. A number of kids had never touched a rabbit and Lane and Fibber were great hits with the class. Fibber is quite a show-off. Lane told the teacher he liked music so she turned on a record player and sat one of the speakers on the floor. Lane turned Fibber loose, he promptly hunted up the speaker and stood with his front feet on it. Then turning around he sat down beside it. Lane was the proudest Dutch owner alive.

When we visited Mr. & Mrs. R.H. Pearson, our close neighbors and long time Dutch Fanciers, Lane promptly told them about Fibber. Mr. Pearson said, "We have some young in the nest box and as soon as they are old enough to wean I will give you a little Black doe" A few weeks later the doc arrived and Lane named her Molly which is tatooed in her ear. We tried to get him to tatoo her L1 but true to rabbit breeders he had his own ideas and nothing would do but Molly. He stood there to see that his Mother put Molly in her ear. With a pair now, he could hardly wait for Molly to get old enough to breed.

Lane had owned Californians since he was six months old and for two years was the youngest member of the Speciality Club. Now owning Californians and Dutch, his first love is the Dutch. Every show that we attended, Lane wanted Fibber to go. He has one Blue and several second and third place ribbons to his credit. Finally Molly was old enough to breed, Dec. 20, 1968. then on the 21st of Jan. 1969, Molly had seven babies, she raised them all. Lane was the happiest Dutch breeder in Mo. Every time some came to look at the rabbits he had to show them the Dutch and her babies. Molly let Lane play with her and the babies, he had to go see them to make sure that they were all there. With the help of Mr. Pearson, who told us what to look for in Dutch we decided two of the little does were good enough to keep. The other five were sold to kids around the neighborhood for pets. Every kid who seen them wanted one. One little boy came to see them and wanted one but didn't have the money and asked if we would keep it till the week-end till he could sell enough pop bottles for the money.

Our love for the Dutch grew and on May 9th and 10th 1969 we went to Tulsa, Okla. to their SpringShow. We bought a trio of Chocolates Dutch from Mr. J.E. O'Malley and at the Springfield, Mo. spring show, two mor Chocolate does were bought from Jim & Marilyn Muskoff, Sparta, Ill. Mrs. Brown promptly claimed the Chocolate Dutch. In July we visited Tulsa, Okla. again and the O'Malley's and Jack Lockhardts. Five more Choc. two Blues and one Blcak, one Steel was brought back to Mo. Our interest in Dutch continued to grow. Mr. Pearson and I visited Mr. Larry Matherly in Brookline, Mo. There I picked up three little Gray does and a buck. We started showing Dutch at the Howell County Fair at West Plains, Mo. July 1969. Fibber was the second Sr. Bk. and Lane was very happy with him.

The next show was at the Ozark Empire Fair, August 1969. We had best of Breed and B.O.S. but as only two breeders were present no champtionship legs were awarded. From there we went to the Mo. State Fair, Sedalia, Mo. Aug. 1969, where Lane Jr. Black buck won his class and won BOS Dutch, and was Lane happy. At the South Central Mo. Fall Show, at West Plains, Mo. Lane Scored again, a son of Fibbers was 1st black Jr. Bk. and BOS Dutch. We also won the B. Display Trophy. At the Imperial, Mo. show we won several blues and the Dutch Display. After that we went in deeper, Mr. Pearson had bought Mr. Matherly's herd of Dutch which were blacks, blues, torts, grays and steels and decided to sell them. The entire herd including a 16 by 21 building was bought and moved to Brown's Rabbitry also the Dutch Mr. Pearson wwns, except his Steels.

Brown's Rabbitry had every color Dutch and a herd of Dutch numbering close to the 100 mark, counting babies.

At the Southwest Mo. Rabbit Breeders Show Ozark, Mo. Nov. 3, 1969. Lane scored again with Best Jr. black doe and the BOS. Dutch, a little doc 7 weeks old, a grand daughter of Fibber and Molly.

After that we had sickness in the family that prevented us from attending the Mo. State Convention at Sedalia, Mo. Dec. 6, 1969. At the present our Dutch herd numbers 150 head counting babies, all colors. People who come here to buy the meat breeds hardly ever leave without one or two little Dutch in their arms for pets. Our calls for Dutch babies are hard to keep filled

Only having raised and shown Dutch a little more than a year, I can assure you the Brown's are boosters of the Dutch Rabbit. We are all three members of the AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB....Best wishes to every Dutch Breeder in 1970....

From Al Meier re: the Standard Committee Action. ADDENDUM.....

The recent issue of the Reporter showing the results of the balloting on the Standard changes gives me reason to understand why the the ARBA committee never got a request for the changes. Mone of these items passed the requirements for Standard changes as required by the American Dutch Rabbit Club. Article 1V, Section 2, If these changes, revisions or additions are approved by a three fourths majority——etc.

The only one close was the limiting weight on juniors, 178 for and 62 against, total 240×75 , requires 180 votes to pass.

FROM OUR MEMBERS......

Mr. Don Reid, Pres. ADRC Dear Don:

After all these years, I have never been asked the question you asked concering the eye color of Blue Dutch when you called the other evening. It really puzzles me, now that I think of it, that the eye color in the Blues has never been brought up.

As to Mr. Chinn's letter to you, relative to the eye color of Blues, I have always taken our standard the way that it was written, and had never thought about the pupil. Quoting from the standard: eyes should be hazel in Blacks, Steels, Greys and dark __ blue in Blues, brown in Chocolates. Eyes to be clear, bright and bold, free from spots in iris and free from any other discoloration. Both eyes to match in color.

Mr. Chinn's letter intrigued me so that I checked the c.es of the rabbits in my rabbitry Blues, Blacks and Tortoise. I was surprised to find that the color of the pupils in all three colors appeared to be the same. It was a dark color, difficult to describe the exact shade, it being so dark in color, The iris, the part around the pupil, of all three colors was as described in the Standard.

The iris in the Blues vary in shade of color as the fur varies in shade in color. The exact shade of Blue, be it eye color or fur color, is very difficult to describe with words.

My curiousity still aroused I began to check the eyes of people and found that the pupil of their eyes were much the same in color as the pupil color of rabbits. The color being the iris of the eye. The only exception would be the pink eye, the pupil in such a color would be pink, the pink eye being found only in the albino.

I feel that it would be a good idea to review the Standards with the idea in mind of changing the wording on eye color of all breeds, with the exception of the pink eyes to read the color of pupil to be dark.

In the Dutch Rabbit Club Book there is an article I wrote concerning color breeding of Blacks and Blues. It mentions eye color and the resultant problems with speckled eyes and methof of preventing such a problem. This article might be of some benefit in answering your question.......

I realize that personal letters to all of the membership would be financially out of the question with the present cost of postage, but we used to put a "slip" sheet in the Dutch Reporter before each of these shows with a sample ad page, giving sizes and prices and a line for listing any specials each member wanted to give. We realize that costs in all areas have risen, but I think that the settemp of the Dutch Club in providing funds for our National Dutch Show are the best of any club's in the organization. We set aside 25% of all memberships and sanction fees to be split between the National Dutch Show and the the ARBA Convention Show with 25% going for Convention Specials and 75% to the National Dutch Show Fund. In the past this has amounted to: 1965-\$346.46 NDS: 1967, \$340.73; NDS: 1968, \$415.87. 1969; \$434.18NDS both, 68 & 69. & \$69.11; ARBA Convention Specials. At the present there is \$364.95 in the 1970 NDS Fund which is payable on demand to the committee sponsoring that show. We also have \$42.00 earmarked for the 1970 Convention with six more months to accumulate. So you can see that with some contributions from the membership our National Dutch Show can be even better than in the past. Come on you-all let's support this hard-working committee...

As for myself, handling an average of 10 pieces of mail every day, processing close to 300 show reports a year, which involves prepar ing the blanks for mailing, recording the date and sponsor in a card file; checking . It off the report when it is returned (on the file), going through and checking anywhere from 2-3 to 35-40 exhibitors for the expiration dates of their memberships; (when the show secretary doesn't forget to send me a list of exhibitors this goes a bit faster) Figuring points on the report sheets, transposing same to a file for each exhibitor member, making out a card for each exhibitor winning a special-believe e me, will am more than happy to send these cards to A1 Miller and grateful that he does

Anyway, let's all get busy and get a new member this month and sell - sell - sell our enthusiam for our Dutch for without that enthusiasm we certainly wouldn't be the live-wire club that we are.

I hope that elsewhere in this issue you will find the ARBA Standard Committee's ruling on the changes which our membership voted to request on our Standard. Our Standard stays as it was—the ARBA Standard Committee voted all the changes down. You can still show a $5\frac{1}{2}$ # junior (if you want to) and senior bucks will remain at $3\frac{1}{2}$ to $5\frac{1}{2}$ pounds. Oh well, we have to admit that their reasoning is sound enough.
