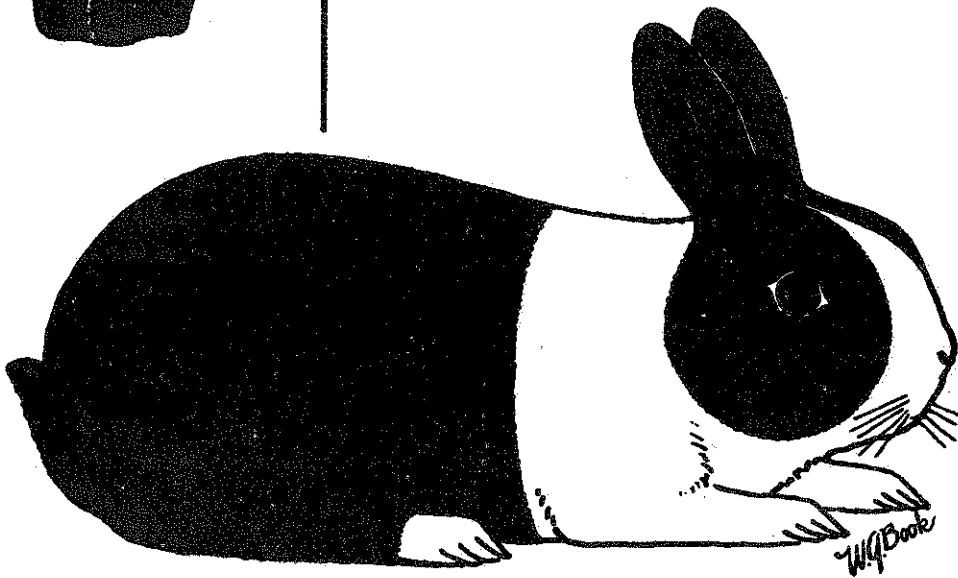


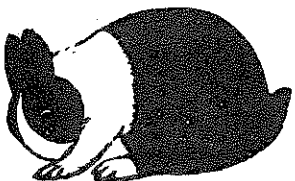

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The 1961 National Dutch Show which was held at Colorado Springs, will go down in the history of the National Shows as an outstanding show, -- one had to be there -- to appreciate the tremendous efforts, time, and money, that was put forth by the COLORADO STATE DUTCH RABBIT CLUB, and especially the complete show committee. Like all shows of this nature there are always the "wheel-horses"; -- Bill Summers who kept the work of those under him moving on a smooth and even keel, -- Bill instructed the Judges to be at work at 6 A.M. and the judging to be done in one day, -- AND IT WAS DONE IN ONE DAY. There were close to 500 Dutch entered, (much to the surprise of a few members who had predicted there would only be about 200). Once again Jack Boughton did it again, this time taking top honors of Best Dutch with a beautiful Black Senior Buck, -- Congratulations, Jack!!

The banquet was attended by some 75 exhibitors and members. Don Guthrie was M. C. of the evening, and did a good job of bringing out the private secrets of many who were in attendance. The evening was highlighted by the singing of a "Bar-room Quartette", -- Jim Blyth, you missed some darn good singing!!!

Colorado Springs, Colorado
Minutes, General Meeting

The regular meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by President Bayliss, in the Armory Building at Colorado Springs at approximately 11:00 A.M. A roll call of Officers found the following present: President, George Bayliss, Secretary-Treasurer, Jessie Weinhardt and Board Members, Tom Shufflebotham and Roger Eich. Absent were Vice-President, Clinton Dennis and Board Members, E. C. Bickley, Wm. Stedman, Jimmy Sinclair and Don Reid.

The President stated that inasmuch as the minutes of the previous meeting had been published in the Dutch Reporter, a motion that they be accepted as published would be entertained. So moved by Mrs. Wm. Pierce, seconded by Jess Williams. Carried.

A report from the Officers present was called for by Mr. Bayliss and both Mr. Shufflebotham and Mr. Eich stated that they had no report.

The Publicity Director, Mrs. Dorothea Shufflebotham reported that she had received all of the Publicity material from the former director, J. Russell Hall.

The following letter from Vice-President, Clinton Dennis was read into the minutes: "To the officers and members of the American Dutch Rabbit Club assembled at Colorado Springs, Colo., in annual meeting.

"My friends:

"It is with great regret that I am unable to attend this meeting. Sue and I had planned with a great deal of anticipation to attend this show and meeting. To enjoy the fellowship of our good friends in the ADRC and to engage in friendly competition on the show table. Circumstances alter cases and our plans were by necessity altered, however we are with you in spirit.

"As your Vice-President I feel that it is my duty to report to you my activities during the time since our last meeting, which was at Ft. Worth, Texas. As you will remember at that meeting, I as Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, proposed that certain changes in the Constitution and By-Laws be drawn up and presented to the membership for acceptance or rejection. I would like to state again that this action, at least on my part, did not stem from any malice toward our Secretary-Treasurer, and most certainly did not conote any crookedness or negligence on her part. They were based on the fact that I had found by careful investigation that we were not on a sound financial basis. During the past several months I have carried on a great deal of correspondence with officers and directors and several other members, explaining my position on these proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws. I have tried to participate in all the business that has come before the board and to give my best judgement promptly to our president.

"As Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, I have contacted the various members of my committee and asked for any suggestions and must report at this time that we simply do not have any report. It has been suggested that perhaps we could save some money for our club by mimeographing some of the things that we now have printed and I personally feel that this bears looking into. It has also been suggested that we could save some money by sending our election ballots with the DR. This would of course be true but the people that I have contacted have been practically unanimous that they do not wish to trust our ballots to fourth class mail.

"There is another matter which I feel is very important to the ADRC at this time which is the manner in which the proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws are to be submitted to the membership for approval. There have been several changes proposed, some of which were suggested by the Ways and Means Committee and some by other persons, some of the proposed changes, I believe, will have almost universal acceptance to the membership, others such as the proposal to separate the publishing of the DR from the Secretary's office, will meet with stiff opposition by some of our members. My feelings are very stron that each and every one of the proposed changes to the Con-

stitution and By-Laws should be presented as a separate change and each member should have the opportunity to vote for or against each separate change. I do not believe that they should be presented in such a manner that a member would have to vote either for or against the entire group of changes. I am informed by our President that his intentions are to present these proposed changes separately, however, I have had several people ask about this and felt that I should state my feelings.

"In closing let me clear up something that is entirely my fault. A few months ago it became apparent that in the near future it would probably be necessary for us to move and since I had a great deal of money and time tied up in my show herd and knowing that we would not be able to make long trips to shows very often in the future I decided to sell my show herd and cut down on my breeding herd. It appeared to me at the time that I could not continue to give as much time as I had been to the affairs of the ADRC, particularly the attending of shows and boosting the Dutch Rabbit, and that because of this I should not continue to serve in any official capacity with the ADRC past this term of office and I so informed our president and most of the officers and directors. When my wife found out about this she was very huffy with me and felt that I had been hasty in making this judgement and that since both of us get so much pleasure out of our rabbits and particularly our association with Dutch Breeders that I could and should continue to serve in whatever capacity that I was called upon to serve. Deferring to the good judgement of my wife and my own natural inclination I have reconsidered and wish to state that although I am not campaigning for any office, that should the ADRC feel that I can be of service, I will do my best in whatever capacity I am needed.

The above letter constituted the report of the Ways and Means Committee.

The Standard Committee was called upon for a report and as no member of this committee was present, a letter from the Chairman, Lester Wells, regarding a proposed settlement of the Gray Standard was read into the minutes by President Bayliss as follows:

" May 22, 1961

"Dear Mr. Bayliss:

"The first meeting of the Dutch Rabbit Club Standard Committee for 1961-62 was held May 21, 1961 in Oaklandon, Indiana. Members of the committee present were, Arthur Gruner, Tom Shufflebotham, John I. Scott, and myself, Lester C. Wells, Chairman. The only one absent was Carldon Gaddis.

"The Gray Dutch Standard in regards to color of undercut was the only topic discussed. A motion was made and passed 100% to Allow Gray Dutch with an undercut showing to be placed and not eliminated.

"This is the wishes of the Standard Committee and we ask that the Dutch membership at the National Dutch Rabbit Show at Colorado Springs, Colo., pass favorable on the motion.

"I believe if this motion is passed it will stimulate the breeding of Gray Dutch again, and we will see more Gray Dutch in our shows. However I do believe there should be more changes in the Gray Dutch color standard in the future; but since this is the only change that the A.R.B.A. Standard Committee will approve at this time, there is no need of discussing more changes.

"Tell the members that the only motive for me in selecting all members of my Standard Committee from Indiana was so that I could get ACTION. If I cannot get action I don't want any part of it. After all we only make suggestions and the members vote them up or down.

"Tell the Gray Dutch Breeders I will be glad to hear from them on any suggestions.

Pat Herman asked did this proposal mean that Grays which either showed an undercut, or did not show an undercut, on the surface were not to be disqualified. Don Guthrie was asked to comment on the assurance that this was so and he said that he felt that

although the A.R.B.A would not permit any drastic changes in our Standard at this time that this was a step in the right direction. There was a motion by Don Guthrie, seconded by Pat Herman that we accept the Standard Committee's proposal for the Gray Standard. Carried.

A report from Melvin Emery, Chairman of the Committee for the Special Issue of Small Stock was presented, said report indicating that when all returns are in the ADRC would realize a small profit besides the tremendous amount of favorable publicity which, as a result of the quantity of extra copies furnished the Club by Small Stock, would continue for years to come, making the entire project a great success.

Tom Shufflebotham, reporting as Chairman of the Educational Committee, pointed to the Publicity Folder as one of the accomplishments of his committee during the past year. The secretary commented that the use of these folders for mailing to non-member exhibitors in our sanctioned shows, showed about a 25% return in new memberships. Mr. Shufflebotham also stated that he had done a great deal of work in cooperation with the committee for the Special Dutch Issue of Small Stock.

President Bayliss, as Chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee pointed to the copy of the proposed changes as published in the June DR and expressed a wish that the membership would understand that this was merely a first draft and not to be considered as a final proposal by any means. He also expressed a hope that a presentation in this form would bring the result that the membership present would act as a sounding board in a final draft that would be most to the liking of the membership in general. He reiterated at this time that it was entirely against his principals to present these proposed changes as a "package deal", but rather the membership would be permitted to vote on any changes point by point. He also pointed out that some of the changes as published in the DR had already been adopted by the membership since the last publication of a Guide Book, and as such were not now up for ratification.

Mr. Bayliss stated that the major change at this time was the proposal to inaugurate a Publicity and Promotion Committee under whose auspices it was proposed to place the DR.

The secretary asked for a clarification of the proposal that "all new memberships would be subject to the approval of the board". She wanted to know just what the mechanics of this would be. It was explained that she would not be required to take any specific action, that this was a typical rule of most organizations, she would accept all new memberships, but on publication of names in the DR the Board would be empowered to take action against anyone whom proof of undesirability was presented.

The proposal to reduce the commission of the Secretary to 12½% of memberships, new and renewal was commented on by Al Meier. He stated that he felt this was insufficient and that a revision based on the financial history of the club could be worked out that would be more equitable.

Bill Summers stated that he wished to go on record that his proposal at Ft. Worth was for the express purpose of lessening the work-load of the Secretary and that he did not see how this work-load would be greatly lessened by the removal of the DR from this office, as most of the information would still have to come from the Secretary's office.

Al Meier raised the question as to whether the Secretary had ever been consulted as to whether she had ever expressed a desire for a lessening of her work-load, and if she had not expressed such a desire, was there some other reason for the proposed change. An explanation of the background for the action at Ft. Worth followed in which it was stated that the DR was running approximately \$400.00 in the red. Al Meier expressed displeasure at it being expressed "in the red". He raised the question as to whether the Secretary would be willing to continue with her present work-load for less money and her reply was an unequivocal "yes".

Tom Shufflebotham brought up the financial set-up of the American Checkered Giant Club for comparison -- Pat Herman said he saw no reason to follow in another's footsteps.

A motion was presented by Bill Summers that the Secretary's duties be left as they are but the financial set-up be revised to leave the treasury in the black. This was seconded by Jess Williams. An amendment by Don Guthrie would set the Secretary's fees

at 25% of all dues and 25% of all show sanctions as full payment for services. The amendment was accepted by Mr. Summers and Mr. Williams and the motion carried.

Roger Eich questioned a financial statement being published in the June DR without a prior presentation to the Board and was informed that the Secretary had spoiled the Board by such a practice in the past, as under the present Constitution and By-Laws a presentation in the DR is all that is required. He then made a motion that was seconded by Al Meier, that the Secretary-Treasurer be required to present a quarterly report to the Board. Jessie Weinhardt made an amendment to this motion that such a report be made semi-annually rather than quarterly as this would present a more accurate picture of the financial status of the club due to seasonal ups and downs. Amendment seconded by Jess Williams and accepted by Eich and Meier. Carried.

Roger Eich questioned the complimentary membership paid for Karl Schmidt who has been serving as the Club's Auditor. President Bayliss reported that this transaction was made with his full knowledge and approval, and the Secretary reported that all subsequent dues had been paid by Mr. Schmidt. It was the consensus of opinion that this was a poor policy and should not be condoned in the future.

It was decided that a year's membership should be granted Mr. Fred C. Seib for his activities relative to the Colo. Show. Al Meier stated that as a committee chairman he would donate his postage fee for 1961 plus \$1.50 additional which he paid on the spot, to be used to cover Mr. Seib's dues. The Secretary was instructed to write Mr. Seib a letter of commendation to be sent with his membership.

A recommendation by Roger Eich that perhaps the auditing should be handled by an outside committee or professional auditor was discussed.

Pat Herman brought up the question as to whether a committee had been appointed, as authorized at Harper, Iowa, for the preparation of a new Guide Book. The President reported that at this time no committee had been appointed. The question was raised that as there had been little or no change in our Standard, was there a need for a new Guide Book at this time. It was explained that many of the advertisers in the present Guide Book no longer raised Dutch, thus making it obsolete. The Secretary reported that there was only about a one year's supply of the present issue on hand. Mr. Bayliss stated that this pin-pointed the need for a new one and he assured the membership present that a committee would be appointed in the very near future.

Al Meier then suggested that since the proposal to turn the DR over to the Publicity and Promotion Committee had met with such strong resistance, why not give that committee the job of getting out the new Guide Book. This went over like a lead balloon, with Mr. Shufflebotham going on record as flatly refusing the job.

Roger Eich asked if the balance of the 4 Best Dutch Pot from Ft. Worth had ever been paid and was informed that it had not. He recommended that it be paid. He was informed that there was a balance of \$8.00 and some cents due Roger Eich and stated that being the case it was to be considered a donation to the treasury.

A letter from President Dick Parker of the ARBA with regard to actions having been taken by certain State Dutch Clubs was read. Mr. Parker did not name the club he had reference to and it was suggested that it might be the Empire State Dutch Club in Colorado Springs. No action on this letter was called for.

A letter from James Blyth, Secretary of the ARBA with regard to a conflict of rules between the ADRC Youth Department and ARBA rules was read and a suggestion was made by the secretary that perhaps it would be wise to re-activate the committee for these rules and have them revised to avoid future conflict. The President agreed that this was in order.

The President stated that two bids for the 1962 NDS had been received, but no action could be taken on these until after June 30th, according to our rules. He was informed by Roger Eich that he was in error that only the bid of the Eastern Dutch Rabbit Fanciers Club was for 1961, the bid from the California Dutch Rabbit Club was for 1963. After some discussion it was decided that perhaps the California bid was an error and was meant to be for 1962. The secretary was instructed to write the secretary of the California club for verification of the year on which they were bidding.

Roger Eich, as a member of the Ways and Means Committee asked for the floor to ex-

press his thanks, on behalf of his committee to the membership present for taking the committee off the hook with regard to reapportionment of funds.

Al Herman rose to ask why an error in his points at two shows had not been corrected. The secretary explained that up until this time, time had not permitted the necessary research to make the correction. He wanted to know when such corrections would be made and was assured that it would be taken care of before the close of the series, which usually took at least two months after the close of the National Dutch Show which terminated the series. E. R. Parks then asked for the floor and went on record that most times he had found that errors in points were usually the fault of the show secretary and not the ADRC secretary.

A motion for adjournment at 1:50 was made by Roger Eich, seconded by Jess Williams. Motion carried.

Best gray, Roger Eich, and Best opposite gray, Dale Zentner.

In the fur class there were 38 entries with the following results: 1st-Bill Summers, 2nd-Jack Boughton, 3rd-Sweet Success, 4th-Jack Boughton, 5th-Roger Eich.

In the junior division Kathy Hume won Best of Breed and Best Opposite Sex was won by the Flaglers.

There were many who said this was the most attractive show room they had ever seen anywhere and the credit here goes to Pat Herman and Freddie Seibel. Best Dutch in the National Show of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was won by Jack Boughton, Chesterland, Ohio. Best Opposite Sex Dutch by Roger Eich, Tempelton, Iowa.

The show held at Colorado Springs drew 450 entries in 6 colors -- no Golds were shown. Officers and exhibitors came from all over America, some bringing animals, others shipping in. Many of us met people we had corresponded with, old acquaintances and made new friendships.

Judge Tom Shufflebotham of Valparaiso, Indiana was Senior Judge and Don Guthrie,

Lamoni, Iowa, Junior Judge. I'm speaking of years, because most Dutch breeders know of the lifetime of 45 years Tom has given of himself and his time to the rabbit industry. It is these old-timers who can contribute much to training boys and new breeders to carry on with the work they love and which will live after they have passed away. His wife I had met thru correspondence since I was appointed Colorado Representative of the American Dutch Rabbit Club. I had also corresponded with Jessie Weinhardt, that capable secretary-treasurer of the Club. I am sure that with Mrs. Dorothea Shufflebotham in charge of Publicity and Promotion, Nation-wise our Club can grow. Our membership has increased over the past year and we must all take an ad -- even a breeders card, in the Dutch Reporter and get as many new members as possible. I am taking three boys age 13-15 to Club tomorrow. Two of these boys love their rabbits enough that they were out cutting grass to feed them. I didn't have grass to cut as we have a power mower, but they were willing to wash my kitchen and bathroom walls and woodwork so they got the job. These are the boys that men like Tom can train for future rabbit breeders. Our Club charges \$1.00 per year for youths under 16. It costs them just 20¢ a month for their refreshments and they learn to raise rabbits, put on shows and the courts don't get these boys. Every Club should consider a Junior Club.

"The Hare Raisers Club" of Littleton (a 4H club of girls) acted as carriers for the ADRC Show. Their skirts were the 6 colors of Dutch, with white blouses with Dutch rabbits matching their skirts sewed to the pockets. The girls were: Cecile Rice, Carolyn Murphy, Linda Smith, Doris Chaney, Linda Smith, Judy Steel, Alice Herman and Kathy Hume. Bob Rice and Mrs. Don Tucker of Wheatridge are doing a splendid job with this group. Their carrying was very efficient and the girls were very courteous to anyone getting in their way when they were moving classes.

Don Guthrie acted as Master of Ceremonies at Eddie's Candle Light Inn. He knew something about everyone there and also remembered many jokes concerning them. I knew he was a capable show Judge but that was the first time I knew he was a good M.C. also.

All 1st. places received trophies, also Best of Breed. Cash prizes were also given. I had the best time of all meeting new people, greeting old friends. I really enjoyed the show though I only saw one class judged -- spent the rest of the time in my booth which was next to Dorothea's, handled the Publicity, answered questions, etc. I am feeling better this month so got to the Pueblo May show, also.

Show Sup't Bill Summers went three straight nights with 3 hours sleep per night -- checking in animals, supervising Judges and carriers and awards. The checks, trophies, etc. were ready when the breeders checked out.

The American Dutch Rabbit Club held a Sunday morning meeting at which some business for the betterment of the Club was settled. Now if we can "each one win one" as we say in church and everyone gets a new member, his own ad and another, it should be a growing Club, a living Club, an example for the other Specialty Clubs. We don't have to take a back seat for anyone, our rabbit "the Beautiful Dutch" is a part of American Heritage. Our Pilgrim Fathers thought so and what was good enough for my ancestor, the second Governor of Plymouth, Wm. Bradford, is good enough for me. He thought enough of Dutch to bring the first ones over on the Mayflower from Holland, so you see our Dutch have geneologies as well as pedigrees.

A LITTLE BACKGROUND

As Publicity Director of your Club, I think perhaps I should be allowed to explain just how I got that way. In the first place, since traveling around the country I know that many of you know that I was asked to fill this vacancy only after a number of others had refused to accept the appointment. Some of these others who have refused this job, have piously suggested that they would be only too happy to serve their Club -- well, my question, bluntly, is just why didn't you?

It has also been suggested that the matter of "personal gain" might have affected

my decision. Just how do they suggest that this "personal gain" might be brought about? There is no intention of paying any salary for this work -- and since Tom does not maintain a large herd of rabbits that we might peddle through my contacts, I cannot conceive of any way or making this personal gain! May I point out here, that the 12½% allowed the publicity director will hardly meet the annual expense of magazine ads (\$60.00 to Small Stock, \$45.00 to Small Stock Farmer) and the annual booth and ad expense for the ARBA Convention, which is another \$45.00. Add postage (and postage is considerable) and wrappers and you will have well over another \$10.00.

Since taking over this office I have had considerable correspondence and mailing -- the sale items are moving quite well and each letter requires an answer, whether or no we have the items on hand. We are out of several items and I am trying to reach a sensible decision on re-ordering. However, it is a bit difficult to work at any decisions when I know that I am under such decisive criticism. In fact, should I hear much more of it I will mail this stockpile to anyone who will accept it! I just may mail it to some of the critics!

When I married Tom I thought that he was merely a super-salesman, interested in spectator sports, quite the urban dweller and citizen. To be accused of the things I have been accused of -- well, I must admit that it smarts a bit. But believe me, it does not hurt -- because you see, I know the truth and only the truth and only me, myself, can hurt me.

If it is the wish of the Club that I do not do this job, I will gladly send the materials to someone who wants the job more than I -- someone, perhaps, who may be able to do a better job than I am planning. I have no doubt that there are other members more capable than I -- but can someone tell me why they have been so hard to find?

I can assure you that I will do my utmost to do what I can for the Dutch Club -- for after having lived with Tom for so many years I cannot help but have acquired some of his dedication to the Dutch fancy. Having traveled through so many states and having met so many fine people through these Dutch rabbits, I cannot help but feel grateful to the ADRC.

As for personal gain -- it certainly should surprise no one to know that actually our Dutch interests cost us much money each year. There is postage expense -- there is considerable expense in attending these meetings and conventions -- there is a huge block of time donated -- there is effort expended. But gain? No gain -- unless fine friendships and happy times can be checked off as gains? That's silly again -- for there is the real worth of our Club associations!

Upon receiving the June issue of the Dutch Reporter, I began the usual ritual of reading it from cover to cover. I was drawn back to the article titled "Fancier or Meat Houd", written by my Hoosier friend, Tom Shufflebotham. There were points in the article I cannot agree with.

First, let me make my position clear. I consider myself a fancier and have no ax to grind with commercial breeders. I, too, think the work that Mr. Milliken has done with the Dutch rabbit is very commendable. No doubt his course of action is a matter of necessity for a commercial-minded rabbit raiser.

Perhaps there are many who "keep books" on their back-yard enterprise. I don't. The raising of Dutch is a hobby and I would no more think of keeping books on them than I would to keep a record of my fishing expenses. I have a brother who is an avid golfer and bowler and I have never seen him run to the ledger after a day on the course or a nite with the boys. Here again I have no bone to pick with the breeder who wants his back-yard rabbitry to be self-supporting! To each his own! I'll wager, however, there are thousands like me who are breeding rabbits with one paramount thought in mind, namely -- to see how close we can come to the Standard of Perfection.

Yes, I have culls in my litters, too. Plenty of them. But, we enjoy fried rabbit on the table and I have many friends who enjoy the same delicacy. I've sold a few to the lab. man, too. Even in light of this I wouldn't call myself a commercial man.

I read Mr. Milliken's article in the Special Dutch Issue of Small Stock Magazine and found it most interesting. It was interesting to the point that it was nice to hear how a commercial breeder goes about making a commercial rabbitry pay for itself. But, how many Dutch Fanciers plan for 6 to 8 litters per year from a doe? How many wean the litters at 3 to 4 weeks of age? Not many! I'll make book on that! I won't argue the point that Mr. Milliken has done it. I understand he has the records to prove it. But, Tom, just because I usually have one for the pot or a few to sell to rabbit hungry friends, it doesn't make me commercial! And I disagree with you wholeheartedly when you say -- "the more does a breeder keeps the more commercial he must become." A fancier is a fancier and a commercial man is a commercial man. There roads are separate and apart and the quicker all concerned wakes up to that fact the better it will be for the entire fancy. And not just the entire Dutch fancy, either.

Why do I feel as I do on this point? I'll tell you. As a fancier a specific breeding is planned. The mating is made. After the doe has kindled, what is the fancier looking for when he peers into the nest-box for the first time? Well, from my standpoint it just isn't to see how many youngsters I can count! I'm looking for that elusive "flyer". And if it happens to be there I wouldn't give a continental if she had only kindled four.

I just don't honestly believe that a commercial raiser is looking for the same thing. I don't believe he can be. He must have production and weight gains. These

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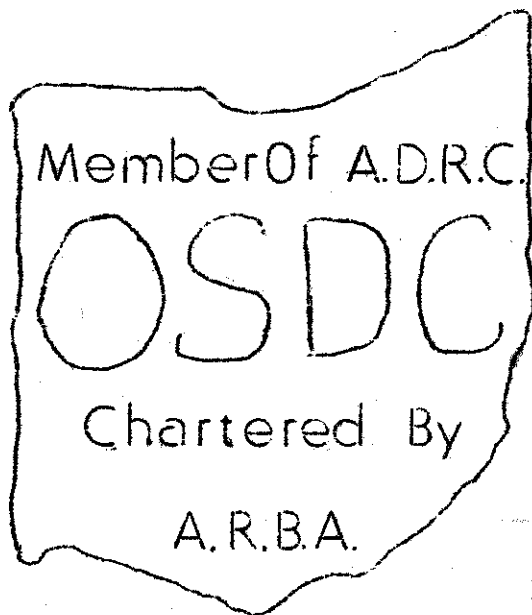
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are the things he must have if he is going to make his entries on the right side of the ledger.

Would the commercial man give a hoot if a real good producing doe had hair like a collie dog or was spotted like an old paint pony? Maybe he would but I just don't think so. In short, would he give a tinker about markings at all so long as the numbers and weight gains were there? Again, Tom, you might say "yes" but from this corner I'll keep saying "no".

Take the markings and type from the Dutch and what have you? Well, it sure as thunder isn't a Dutch. A Mr. Richard Perfect, in England, recently submitted an item in Fur & Feather in which he stated he raised a White Dutch. Needless to say there were quite a few members of the UKDRC that lambasted him but good for such a remark. And rightfully they should.

So far as the standard committee working toward a good working standard to fit the Dutch meat pens, I'd say you already have one. I'm one of those who believes that the disqualifications that appear in the Dutch Standard of Perfection applies all the way down the board. This is probably because I agree with Jimmy Blyth 100% when he says -- "there should be no meat classes in the shows in fancy breeds."

So, Tom, I'll close with this quote from Small Stock Magazine, written by A. D. Colbeck, (England), -- "can't run with the hares and hunt with the hounds." You make the choice!
