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
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#### "NOTICE"

## American Dutch Kabbit Club

#### BEAT THE HEAT !!

Hot and dry! That's the condition here in central Illinois. The weather has been beautiful for the wheat harvest, but it's starting to take a toll on the fields of soybeans and corn. Extra care must be taken during these hot days to protect our rabbits.

Increased respiration rate or panting is the primary way rabbits cool themselves. Evidence of this physiological phenomenon can be observed around the muzzle of the rabbit. As respiration or panting increases, the muzzle becomes wet; indicating the onset of heat stress. To prevent this stress from occurring, keep your rabbits under shelter that has some insulation from the sun's rays. Pregnant does, heavy with young, will suffer the most from heat and left unchecked the heat can cause the doe to abort or terminate pregnancy. The closer a doe gets to kindling the more critical a cooler, more tolerable environment becomes to the safety of both doe and Temporary sterility of both bucks and does can also be a problem during hot weather. Providing no permanent damage is done to the reproductive tract, heat induced sterility is only temporary. The rabbits will return to their normal reproductive performance when the heat increment is reduced. Allow at least 20 days for this reproductive involution to occur. It takes that long for the reproductive components, particularly in the buck, to complete gametogenesis (production of the gametes - sperm and eggs). So the bottom line is -- STAY COOL!

Not only does heat cause a stress physiologically but also nutritionally. Often, rabbits will reduce feed consumption during hot spells thus affecting gain and overall performance. The temperature of the environment can also affect the stability of certain thermal-labile vitamins and feed constituents which are a part of the diet or pellet. Fresh, clean water plays an important role in satisfying the needs the rabbit has in maintaining the normal body processes. Vitamins supplemented in the water can help make up any deficiencies the pellet may have caused by excess heat or temperature.

Voting for the President and three of the director positions should be one of the top Dutch priority items on your list of things to do. I am extremely proud of the progress we have made as a club and breed during my tenure in office. I am also excited about further leadership responsibilities each officer and director must carry to continue our club's success. Therefore, I am calling for all Dutch Club members with the responsibility of voting to exercise this privilege and guarantee the future of the American Dutch Rabbit Club.

Speaking of responsibility, remember to send those articles and ads to Norma for the new Dutch guidebook. With a concerted effort, this guidebook could be the best ever published. Heck, with enough good input we would probably get enough new members to put the Dutch Club shere it belongs -- ON TOP 1! So, if you've got a successful formula, share it with the entire Dutch family.

While on the subject of families, the Williamsons are expecting an addition to our family. Would you believe the kindling date is dangerously close to the A.R.B.A. Convention in Colorado Springs. So, if everyone would cross their

fingers and hope that the Williamson baby arrives either prior to or after the convention, both Dianne and I would appreciate it.

There are also some minor standard changes that the A.D.R.C. Standard Committee has submitted for membership approval. They are listed elsewhere in the reporter for your review and consideration. A change proposed in the allocation of funds for the two national shows will be on the ballot for the membership to either accept or reject. Voting is a way to exercise your opinion on certain changes suggested by members or committees.

If any group of Dutch breeders are interested in starting a local specialty club, the following procedures will expedite the paperwork involved for approval.

- 1. Read the requirements for starting a local specialty club listed under A.R.B.A. By-laws, Article II, Section 2, p. 211 and Section 4, p. 212 of the A.R.B.A. Yearbook.
- 2. Draw up a constitution and by-laws to govern the club, making sure to state the purpose of the organization.
- 3. Elect officers as per consitution, make sure that they are both Dutch Club and A.R.B.A. members.
- 4. Send all materials to both A.D.R.C. President and Secretary for review. The president will write a letter to the A.R.B.A. supporting or approving the local specialty club if it agrees with the purpose of the A.D.R.C.

If you have any questions regarding the Dutch Club or the showing of Dutch, I will be glad to answer them in the president's message, so other members can benefit from the question and answer.

In closing, remember to vote! The American Dutch Rabbit Club needs a strong foundation to enjoy the success of a progressive organization.

#### "SECKETARY'S MESSAGE"

Each days' mail is always a SURPRISE--A surprise that you haven't received what you were expecting or a surprise that what you did receive doesn't contain all of the information that it should have!

Let's start with sanctions----when applying for a sanction, please be sure to include the date of the show, place where it is to be held, the show secretarys' name and complete address, along with the proper fees, \$8.00 open and \$5.00 youth. Be certain that you have also included the ARBA show code number! If all of the above is received, your papers can be processed immediately; without it, there can be quite a delay. There are times that a delay would be quite inconvenient as sanctions are sometimes applied for up to a few days before the show date.... Now comes the return of the completely filled out show report forms.......No judge listed, the number of Dutch say 46 when only 32 can be counted; no exhibitor sheet is filed and the BOB and BOS were both won by bucks! If this isn't enough, the tear sheet (when sent) most often states that BOB and BOS were paid along with four out of the six varieties. What about the other two? Show secretaries' and sponsoring clubs, please be aware that \$1.00 must be paid for the best of each variety regardless of the number shown in the variety as long as 10 or more butch are shown in the breed!!! In any case, when report forms are not filed correctly, it takes much time to go over each one again, write the show secretary for more needed information and sometimes correct points are not credited. It always takes less time to accomplish something when that something is done correctly the first time! It also allows me more time for other ADRC things that are equally important.

Now let's go to memberships.....I receive many envelopes that just contain a check along with a tear out for the Dutch Club from another rabbit magazine. The check has two names......I have no information except that the check was signed by one of the two listed on the check. This doesn't necessarily mean that the membership is to go to that party and I've found that sometimes it doesn't! Please list in full whose name the membership is to go under!

The next item is awaited correspondence: If this office can find the time [and believe me, this is no 9 to 5 job] to write for something needed, then I feel that the other parties involved can make the effort to at least reply. My time is as valuable to me as it is to everyone else. I too have a full time job and I'm trying my best to do it to the very best of my ability! Without your cooperation, this job takes more time than should be needed; without your cooperation, your monthly publication comes out late; without your cooperation, this job is more than tough!

It is because of all of the above that I have decided that no matter who you are, there will be no exceptions when something is needed from you. Please keep this in mind. There is no reason that the entire membership should have to suffer because of the inconsideracy of some. My family, the ADRC and my Dutch mean very much to me, but when it starts taking more than 24 hrs. of any given day to accomplish something that should have taken 4 or 5 hours, it's time to do something about it! On other areas; the heat around the country has taken a great toll on our rabbits. Wany members have reported that alot of their herd has died due to this heat. 94° to 104° hasn't been unusual around here. Thank goodness for air conditioning but heaven forbid the electric bills!

The final election ballots have been mailed....Please take the time to VOTE! The percentage of those who voted in the nominations left much to be desired! It is your vote that places the officers in their seats and the Dutch judges behind the tables at ARBA Conventions and National Dutch Shows.

On this ballot, you will find the Constitution and By-Laws Committee recommendations. They have gone over these thoroughly and believe that the changes are needed in order to continue to have the ADRC prosper. Look them all over carefully and mark "YES" or "NO" in the appropriate space. You will also find a clarification on the "Gray Color" submitted by the Standard Committee. I had hoped that there would be more from this Committee but it is all that I have at the present time. Possibly they will submit more in the near future for a membership vote. I was not aware that the standard could not be changed as often as the Organization felt necessary. I am told that it can only be updated every five years, in the years divisible by five...I'm learning something new all the time.....In any case, if you don't take the time to VOTE, don't complain afterwards...the ADRC can only be as strong and progressive as you make it!!

Let's go into a little about the National Dutch Shows....I have been asked the following questions: after remarking on what I felt should be, I decided to see how the membership felt. #1 Shouldn't only ADRC members be allowed to show at the National Dutch show? #2 Shouldn't only ADRC members be allowed to participate in the "Seller's Class?" (enter a rabbit) #3 If there is more than one bid for the next years' NDS, shouldn't the bids be read to the membership present at the open meeting and let those attending voice their opinion before the ADRC Board makes the final decision as to the location? #4 Would it be possible for the general membership present at the time of the Board of Directors meeting to be allowed to participate? ——— Possibly some of our ADRC Board or ADRC membership would like to voice their opinions on the above! In the last issue of the Dutch Reporter I stated that this office was always open for suggestions that could possibly make improvements....to date, I have received none. I'm sure that someone has some thoughts that they feel would benefit the NDS and those attending! Why not share them!!

I'm VERY PLEASED to announce that our ARBA President, Dr. Terry Reed has graciously agreed to do a column in the Dutch Reporter. Any question you may have should be sent directly to him; Dr. T.E.Reed, D.V.M., Box 98, Markle, IN. 4670. Please state your question and ask that it, along with your reply, be published in the Dutch Reporter. Mr. Reed is one of the most knowledgeable veterinarians in the country and is doing this as a courtesy to the ADRC and it's membership. Should you not wish to follow his advice, this is your prerogative. As Dr. Reed stated in previous correspondence, "when discussing a biological situation, there are many variables that alter certain management techniques and diseases." Should you be in disagreement with his answers or theories, you always have the option to disregard. However, extremely biased, derogatory and critical articles WILL NOT be tolerated. As the extremely efficient, capable and caring Dr. Reed always says, "remember, you can disagree without being disagreeable."

Now that I have again taken up more than my share of space, I will close this message with; my thoughts are always working for the betterment of the ADRC and it's membership.... yours can be too.....VOTE!!!

#### "THE AWAKENING"

As one of your elected Directors, it is one of our jobs to protect both the club from floundering, and it's members. Having visited numerous Dutch rabbitries and received countless notes and letters this past year, have heard what the majority would like to see.

In the classification of Sweepstake Show Rules, the sponsoring club to pay \$1.00/variety is 20 years behind the time. Most people talked to would like to see at least the individual entry fee required per variety. This would amount to about \$1.75 required, but worded to the amount of an individual entry fee to make it follow the cost of living.

The Standard Committee should be chaired by a Director or officer of the ADRC with 3 other members of the ADRC. Two out of the four members, (including the chair-person) must be ARBA licensed <u>Dutch</u> judges. Their responsibility would be the same but they must give a written or verbal report at least twice a year or they will be disbanded.

At this point, the Board of Directors will select a new committee by a two thirds vote requiring the same bi-yearly report. The reason this is being pushed by members is in fact academic as the Standard Committees', for the past 20 years, have not produced any significant changes necessitated by our progressive Dutch rabbitries.

As to "full neck" being disqualified; if it ever happens, we will lose a huge amount of Dutch shown and the bottom line, it would hurt our club members. It is a fault and should be so listed as one.

The Gray Dutch, as specified 20-30 years ago, was a nice looking animal but tending to lose rings in the agouti fur. We have progressed past this point and developed the tan gray or brown gray because of insufficient data being presented to our judges. It is now at a point where the true gray are in the minority and it would hurt our people to disqualify the tan/brown/gray. Without our people, we are not a club dedicated to improving the Dutch rabbit, - and who can say it is not an improvement? Rules and laws are made by the thousands each year and dropped by the same amount because some are serving the needs of our communities and government. Well, what about our Dutch Community? Darn, let's stop "pussy footing" around and get it in gear!

Yes, I blame me too, but you other Directors and motivated Dutch people verbally kick some posteriors and help us to get it going!

I strongly urge our new Standard Committee to address immediately the clarification of stops, full neck, color of eyes on a Blue Dutch and color of undertail on a Tort Dutch so they can be resolved by the 1984 NDS.

Raise Dutch with this body type and a good portion of the time you should do well at the shows. You should also have some very appealing animals that you can spend alot of time admiring.

Our next big National Show is the ARBA Convention in Colorado Springs. I've got a few tough looking juniors who keep asking me for directions to Colorado. Hope everyone can attend or send their best.

## FROM ARIZONA

Hello from hot Arizona! The temperatures are climbing now up in the 100's. We had a couple of super hot days - 112 & 114 where I live.

I will try to finish the article I started in the March-April Dutch Reporter:

In breeding rabbits with disqualifications, I always follow a couple of rules: I never forget that a rabbit must have good type, fur,

color, head and ears. If they do, then I will breed with the follow-disqualifications:

- 1. Missing toenails
- 2. Small bloch or color spot in white area of Dutch
- 3. Rabbits who have had legs, toes or tails broken.
- 4. Tied rabbits

In using this rabbit to breed, I make sure that they have a small spot and that the tied rabbits are close. I never use a tied rabbit with a colored front leg or a rabbit with a large colored spot in the white area. I have found that you can get good rabbits from these disqualifications if you are careful and use only good type, fur, color, head and ears.

The disgalifed rabbits that I never use to breed are the following:

- 1. Bad teeth these, I never use and I disagree with breeders who file or cut the teeth. I have never gotten anything except bad teeth from this group when bred together.
- White ears bad results

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- 3. Split stops seldom do you ever get good stops with this fault. Generally, stops are bad on offspring.
- 4. Rabbits with one testicle I have never had any good results with these rabbits.
- 5. Cow Hocked Crooked Legs Screw Tails and other bad defects.
  Theyer use these rabbits to breed to!

If a person is careful and watches closely, he can use the first group and come up with some good results. However, the last group, - I have had no good results with.

In color mixing I do very little as I prefer to breed my blacks to blacks, blue to blue, etc. If you do mix the colors, some of the better color crosses are as follows:

- 1. Blacks -Blues, watch the eye color on the blacks
- Black Chocolate, I never breed the blacks out of this cross back to my blacks. It will dilute your black color.
- 3. Tortoise I have never crossed them with any other color
- 4. Steels I prefer to breed steel to steel, however, you can cross black and gray . I have never tried it, but others have told me blues can be crossed with steels.
- 5. Gray here again, I like to breed gray to gray. A steel gray cross is used, but watch the belly color. Black and gray cross is used at times with fair results.

I hope that I have answered or helped some breeders who may have questions on the breeding of Dutch. I realize that I am not an expert on this but have 15 years of experience. If there was a watch word in breeding Dutch, it is GOOD TYPE, FUR, COLOR, HEAD & EARS....CULL VERY CLOSELY!

I would like to take this time to thank the Ohio group for a wonder-ful time and they did an excellent job with this years' National Dutch Show. Hope to see you all in Colorado Springs, and don't forget that 1984 NDS in Portland, Oregon.

"A S K T H E D O C T O R"

#### QUESTION:

I am a Dutch fancier but I like to save my mis-marked animals to sell for meat and to assist in feeding my family. I have heard that castration of young Dutch males is possible and not a difficult proceedure. Is this true? And if it is true, could you please describe the proceedure?

A. M. - Michigan

Many true Dutch fanciers may find this offensive; however, castration is a very simple technique that is performed relatively easy on any breed of rabbit. In my own opinion, castration is probably more beneficial to those individuals that raise fancy rabbits in the size range of the Dutch than any other breeds.

The Dutch animal that is bred in accordance with our Standard of Perfection will not reach a nice usable size until they are approximately twelve to fourteen weeks of age. Some will not develop to this size until some time later than twelve to fourteen weeks of age and this even becomes more valuable to this type of individual breeder sho also wishes to use the Dutch carcass for a source of edible protein.


As stated earlier, this may be offensive to the true Dutch fancier; but the Dutch rabbit has a very desirable carcass of outstanding quality when they reach about twelve to fourteen weeks of age that is of ideal size for the small family or particularly to the older family where there is only one or two members for each individual meal. By using the mis-marked animal as a source of high quality protein, can also assist many of our producers in paying the feed bills for their hobby.

Many of our Dutch males, after they reach an age of eight weeks, have a tendency to become aggressive and fight with one another if they are colonized or kept together. By castrating the male animals when they are approximately eight weeks of age, one can readily house several animals together without any type of fighting problems that causes injury to the carcass. Castration can be performed on the males anytime after the testicles have descended into the scrotum. This normally occurs about six to eight weeks of age. The proceedure is very simple and it is almost painless to the young males and the after effects goes unnoticed except that the animals tend to be much calmer, are not aggressive and can be housed in a colony fashion.

The proceedure for castration is as follows:

STEP 1. First, assemble the needed equipment: a pan containing a disinfecting solu-


tion such as merthiolate or alcohol, a knife or scalpel with extra blades and cotton swabs. Thoroughly scrub the knife or scalpel with soap and water before using it, and keep it soaking in the disinfecting solution between proceedures.




STEP 2. You will need to have two people to perform the operation: one to restrain the rabbit and one to perform the operation. One person should grasp a large amount of the rabbit's skin at the nape of the neck with their right hand, turn the rabbit over and support its rump on the table or on his/her knees. The hind legs should be held forward with the base of the left hand as pressure is exerted down on the pelvis to "trap" testicles in the scrotum. If the rabbit tries to struggle, extend its head and neck somewhat.

STEP 3. Once the rabbit is in the above position with testicles


well exposed, you are ready to operate. The second person should wipe the scrotal area with general antiseptic, such as merthiolate or alcohol, then remove the knife from the antiseptic solution in which it has been soaking.



STEP 4. Cut through the skin and into the teste (on the long axis of the body) with an incision of sufficient length that the teste emerges from the scrotal sac.



STEP 5. Grasp the teste between your thumb and forefinger.



STEP 6. Pull the teste and attached cord from the body in one swift motion. If small strand of tissue remains on the outside of the incision, remove them by pulling them away. Repeat this same proceedure on the other side of the rabbit, and wipe both incisions with antiseptic. Then release the rabbit.

On very young animals, it is sometimes difficult to get the testes trapped in the scrotum. Applying gentle pressure on the abdoman will often help to keep the testicles in the scrotum.

#### Question:

I am a true Dutch fancier and only save those youngsters when kindled that have promising markings. How much age variation can I use in placing a youngster with another litter of young?

T. P. - Ohio

With your type of situation, one should breed several does at one time in order that you can consolidate the litters to one or two does with six or seven per litter and re-mate the remainder of the does in two to three days after the kindling process. Most Dutch does are noted for their characteristic of being extremely good mothers and having excellent milk production. Many Dutch does are used as surrogate mothers for the fostering of young of other breeds to these does.

When discussing the fostering of young from one litter to another, one should keep a couple of facts in mind and that is that the young kit only nurses the doe approximately one time per day and at the most, twice a day. Another very important factor is that there is very little value in the colostral milk of the rabbit. Colostrum is not essential to the young rabbit kits for survival like it is in many of the other species of livestock. Another misnomer in most rabbit circles is the fact that the young kits do not need to nurse the doe immediately after kindling. If the young kit is kept warm, they can readily survive for forty-eight to seventy-two hours without suckling a doe or taking any type of fluid per mouth.

Considering the above fact, one can usually vary the size of fostered young on a doe four to five days without much difficulty. Most Dutch does will readily accept such circumstances and do very well at raising the young.

While discussing this subject, one should also consider another technique that has been quite successful and very beneficial in raising young fostered animals. If one has a doe that kindles and wishes to consolidate litters but does not have another doe to consolidate the young onto or if the doe should happen to die for some reason during kindling, the manager can use an alternating nest box system to rear the young. Rather than place a new born young with a nest of kits that are two to three weeks of age, one will be much more successful if they divide the surrogate mother into two nursing periods. The two to three week old young becomes nest box 'A' and the new born kits from one or several does that have been consolidated into one litter is labeled nest box 'B'. The doe is then allowed to be with nest box 'A' for a period of about twelve hours and then the nest boxes are exchanged and she is allowed to be with nest box 'B' for approximately twelve hours. While the nest box is not with the doe, it should be kept in a very warm, dry area so that the young will not chill. This practice has been very successful and can be used with does that have very large litters. If the doe should kindle ten to twelve young, there usually will appear to be two or three or four runts in the litter that does not get the required nutrition. If the litter is divided in half

#### "DEFECTIVE BONE STRUCTURE"

After having just written about pinched hindquarters, I observed at the National level that it is ironic that a letter arrived today concerning this. One of the breeders I talked to at Canton wrote me inquiring what to do if most of his stock was in that state. He didn't want to dispose of all his stock and start over, but recognized that something must be done.

After some hours of arguing with myself, I was about to write him and say "you are the one at fault because of your priorities." Getting my book of genetics out, the solution could be worked out, I think.

The quickest method is to purchase a buck that is not pinched and breed to every doe, eliminating any young that show signs of it at culling time. It would be tough, ruthless, but it is quite necessary. These selected normal young must, in fact, be interbred again reducing the chance of incidence or repetition.

It could be developed with the introduction of a doe or two, but would most probably, depending on the herd size, take years to align.

Either way you attempt to correct this major fault, it will hurt, but if, like this fellow longtime breeder, you recognize it is starting to hurt, five years from now you will be doing both yourself and the Dutch Club some good. It must be tough to face prospective purchasers and either ignore it, hoping for the best, or stating it is a fault in my line which I have ignored. Remember, it is a disqualification if it is very prominent. Perhaps someone else has a solution other than this who has tried it and been successful. None of us are perfect, but we try for perfection.

Here's to better Dutch!

## VENTILATING YOUR RABBITRY By Roger Eich

Many times Dutch breeders become so involved in the breeding program trying to get that perfect specimen that they overlook some of the other important aspects needed to give the animals a healthy environment.

Heat, humidity, drafts and manure buildups are a few of the most common items we have to deal with in proper ventilation.

Personally, I feel a rabbitry with all single tier cages hung above an earth floor has a definite advantage over those tiered two to four rows high. Usually the single tier set up can easily be ventilated by adjustable panels and a small exhaust fan.

One must keep in mind a rabbit cannot survive too long if he is forced to sit in a draft. Usually respiratory problems set in fast, so it is important to use the ventilating panels properly to avoid this problem.

In areas where one encounters extreme hot and cold weather conditions, insulating

and placed in two separate nest boxes and each nest allowed to be with the doe for a twelve hour period of time, there will be a tendency to be fewer smaller, under developed rabbits that are reared. This is a trait that many individuals do not realize that the doe rabbit has and a technique that can be very successfully used in our Dutch rabbitries.

This technique can also be used very successfully by those individuals that try to kindle in the winter months and do not have an area that is adequately heated when the weather becomes very, very frigid. With this proceedure, the doe is allowed to kindle in a nest box and then the nest box is placed with the doe for thirty to fortyfive minutes per day. The nest box is then removed and placed in an area that is warm and dry and then the nest box is replaced with the doe once or twice every twenty-four hours for the doe to nurse the young. This has been a very successful practice in some of our very frigid areas of the country when individuals prefer to kindle on a year around basis. By using this technique, some persons can produce young the year around where otherwise they would not be able to produce young from January through March. These practices have been used with many breeds of rabbits and they are particularly successful with the Dutch rabbit because of their characteristic of being excellent mothers and extremely heavy lactators.

the ceiling and maybe the sidewalls of your rabbitry could be very beneficial to you. Keep in mind, once you try to keep the heat in and the cold out, the air must be on the move much of the time or a high humidity problem may arise. I will touch more on this later in this article dealing with a compact rabbitry.

Cleaning the manure once a week must not be overlooked unless worms are used. Manure not only contributes to the humidity problem but it could create a severe ammonia buildup.

Not all Dutch breeders are fortunate enough to live on an acreage where space is more readily available. Many times these breeders are forced to use a more compact rabbitry if they intend to keep alot of rabbits. Let's visualize a rabbitry using a building 24' X 42' with insulated ceiling and side walls, it would have a cement floor with the 12 inch manure wells recessed at least 2 inches below the main floor and equipped with at least one drain outlet for each waste run. Without a drain on a cement floor would be complete chaos, as the urine buildup would accumulate to the extent it would drive many up the wall.

Now, if we used 2' X 2' tapered pens so metal drop pans could lay directly upon the cages, this would save some space between the three tiers and give approximately 192 holes. Say we started the rows of pens 3 foot from one end, that should leave about a 7' X 24' space on the opposite end for feed, etc. By using 3' isles and two 3 foot clean out areas between the back to back cages, this would leave a walking space around the entire outside walls of the building.

This may sound like an ideal set up to many, but in reality it is or could be a tough situation when it comes to proper ventilation.

First of all, you will need forced ventilation, usually an attic fan mounted in the roof of the building is used. You may want two, however we will talk about one at the far end of the building. This fan could be regulated by a humidistat, however, I like the idea of a timer as it saves more heat in times of cold weather. This fan will work very satisfactorily in the summer but for areas where the weather gets cold, you would need to build a boxed in air chute to let the fan draw the air from approximately 3" below the floor level of the lowest hung cage. In the warmer weather, a door located near the top of this chute should be opened up to let the fan draw directly off the ceiling.

As far as the intake of fresh air on a set up like this, you could open panels in the summer time but when cold weather arrives and you heat the building, you may find it necessary to have the windows made in such a manner to be able to drop the top side inward and this way the new air would flow upward and the exhaust would be pulling the air out two or three feet from the floor.

Keep in mind, every rabbitry has it's own situation and such items as how to set the timer on the ventilating fan, keeping the barn at 40° in cold weather and what types of heat should be used in a rabbitry are only answered after careful study of each individual rabbitry and even some actual experimenting may be tried to really satisfy one's needs.

There are some large rabbitry equipment suppliers who can be very helpful to you in determining your ventilation needs. Much of this is free for the asking.

This past winter, I visited four rabbitries that were all heated differently. The first one used natural gas heat with a thermostatic controlled blower. The second used a Kerosan kerosene heater. The third used electric milk house heater and the fourth used solar heat in the daytime if the sun was out and earth heat at night. This particular individual was a contractor and asked that I not use his name, although he did agree to let me pass on his information. He buried an 18" tube, 6 to 9 foot under ground into the knoll behind the rabbitry. It extended out into the hillside 40' and came back, so all in all, I figure he had about 95' of tube buried. He used a round fan that fit into one end of the tube

and pulled the air out of the rabbitry and through the tunnel and back in. Remember, the temperature of the earth at certain depths is 55° Winter and summer.


I felt it was quite unique as we used to keep the water in the chicken house down on the farm from freezing by digging a 6' hole in the middle of the barn and place the chicken water above it. There would be enough warm air continue to come up around it to keep it from freezing even when it was 15° below 0 outside.

I personally like the electric milk house heater as they can usually be purchased for less than \$30.00 each. They have two wattage ranges of heat and have a built in thermostat and fans to force the air. Two of these heaters located on opposite ends of the 24' X 42' building I used as an example would be sufficient to keep the water from freezing up to temperatures of 20° below 0 on the outside. It will surprise you how much body heat the rabbits themselves contribute.

#### "PROBLEMS WITH FEED?"

Just a note - maybe of interest. How many people have problems with feed? High protein, low protein, fibre content, etc. - are they satisfied, or do they wish for more? I used to feed one particular feed all the time, but during the weather changing time - weaning - stress time, I would have diarrhea problems with the little ones. On the advice of someone, I switched to another feed which was medicated with exettracyclene --- I maybe lost one all year! Now, a few months ago, they changed it. No medication and the ingredients were changed, I though they said they didn'tl, but you can see the difference, and alot of fines. I lost three does having little ones, my best does to beat! Two other people lost does also and the others with little ones didn't hold up their condition very good. One person sent his doe to the University to find out the reason. She was undernourished --- needless to say, five of us that I know of switched feeds. We all are now on different feeds. I'm feeding a non-medicated feed, 17% protein, 2% fat, 14.5% fibre. It also contains molasses, fishmeal and whey. I don't know how it's going to work out, but I guess I'll find out!

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Dear Norma.

I received my Dutch Reporter the other day, and it is just fantastic. You are doing such a super job!

I read the article "Dutch Weight - Growth Chart Requested" by Dan Rohrer, Jr. I have always kept records of rabbit weights ever since I have had purebred rabbits. It has always helped me when it comes to saving replacement stock as it helps to evaluate a doe's milking ability and other important aspects. When I started raising Dutch rabbits I kept up the same practise of keeping weight records on them also.

Since I have only been raising Dutch since the fall of 1981 I am fairly new at the breed. I have produced several winners so I must be doing something right, however.

I am including a growth chart, of a sort. I never weigh bumnies before three weeks of age, so I have no weights for that age group. All litters were born from the spring of 1982 up to the present with no litters born in the coldest months. Number of kits per litter range from 2 to 8 with the overall average being 5. I realize that this isn't as good as it should be but I have a frequent turnover of certain does, and I now have some that average 8 or 9 per litter. Does are bred back at 42 days unless they have 4 or less young, and then they are bred back at 14 days. Many young Dutch are sold or otherwise discarded by the time they reach 8 weeks of age, so that is the reason that there are not too many weighed after that time. Due to a shortage of cage space, I save only the best young, and I cull very severely. Also, a friend of mine has a partnership, of sorts, with me, and she gets some of the show stock for her herd.

The enclosed chart is pretty much self explanatory. The chart shows the age of the young weighed, the number weighed, and the weights. In the weights column, I have also included least weight and the most weight of certain individuals, plus the average of all young weighed in that age group. The 3-week age group includes 16 litters of young. All adults in my herd are from the same strain of Dutch and weigh 4 pounds to 4 3/4 pounds at maturity.

I hope that this is the information that you are looking for. If you have any questions, please write.



#### EXPERIMENTING WITH ENVIRONMENT AND CEMETICS

What makes a doe a "man eater" in the hutch and a "pussy-cat" out of the hutch? Do any of you have such a Dr.Jekyll and Mr. Hyde? We do and it has prompted us to institute some research into the "why" and "how to get around it".

"The Man-eater", as we fondly call her, is a very good Steel breed doe but tough to care for. I was recently asked how I water her; my answer was "very carefully". She not only charges when you open the hutch door, she charges when you walk any where near her hutch. Yet, when you manage to grab her and put her on a table, her personality changes completely and you can handle her in the same manner as any other non aggressive rabbit. So you say, if she is so hard to handle why not hit her in the head and be done with it; she'll only pass the trait along to her young. That would be a quick and easy answer but it would not supply the answers to why is she like that and what can I do about it.

This doe's full sister and full brothers show nothing of this characteristic nor did her ancestors which I have traced back 9 generations. We have a theory we are pursuing that suggests the possible answer is in generation upon generation of very close inbreeding. In order to gather more data we are presently using 2 breeding patterns; one of very close inbreeding, which is what we've always done and one of much less close relationship. We hope to say in time with a high degree of certainty whether our theory is valid or not.

In conjuction with the genetic research we are also working on an environmental experiment to answer the question how to get around this undesireable trait. This doe throws large litters with a good percentage of show animals; just what every breeder wants. Four weeks ago this doe kindled 9, 5 of which were quite good marking wise. The 4 mismarks were, thru force of habit, eliminated immediately and the 5 good ones were transferred to another doe to raise. What we wish to observe, over a long period of time, is the behavior of these 5 as they grow older and the does among them start to produce. We made a mistake in eliminating the 4 mismarks. We should have left them to be raised by their natural mother for later comparison with the 5 transferred. However, we will correct that mistake with her next litter. It will be interesting and perhaps beneficial a year or 2 from now if we can establish an environmental control for a possible undesireable genetic characteristic.

We've been somewhat criticized in the past for reporting on our genetic findings but we feel genetics and now possibly environment are very important to the continued development of the Dutch rabbit and we plan on continuing to report our findings for whatever use they may be to a fellow breeder. Remember genetics and environment were the deciding factors in what you are today; why would it be different in your rabbit?

#### WHAT DO WE DO WHEN WE DON'T HAVE PEDIGREED PAPERS

It is always important that we request pedigree papers when we are buying stock from other breeders. Sometimes, if papers are not available, it can create quite a problem.

Even though the breeder is absolutely positive the animal is purebred because the animal certainly does meet the Standard of Perfection, it doesn't prove anything because the papers are missing. Sometimes what happens is records get lost, or important breeding information is never written down in the first place.

Without pedigree papers, it is almost impossible to get the rabbit registered. It's a sham too, because you can have a beautiful rabbit that wins alot, and not be able to register him. That means, if you don't have registration papers, no Grand Champion Certificate.

If you don't have pedigree papers, and you wish to have your rabbit registered, here's what to do:

- 1. The Official Rules of the ARBA under Registration Department, Section 83 states that no rabbit or cavy can be registered without pedigree unless entered at an Official Convention Show of the ARBA and passed favorably by a committee of three licensed Judges. In other words, what this is saying, is that three judges will together examine the animal to be sure that it meets up to the Standard of Perfection.
- 2. The Official Rules of the ARBA under Registration Department, Section 83 A states that recognized Standard Breeds that are imported without pedigree may be registered if they qualify, with proof of importation.

If by chance, it is impossible for you to get to a Convention, you can do two things:

- 1. Don't use the animal at all for breeding.
- 2. Use the animal for breeding, but start a whole new pedigree.
  By this, I mean just list the Doe or Buck (whichever the case may be) as the Sire or Dam of the new babies. If you do enough breeding, the name of the rabbit that never had a pedigree to start with will be way off into the third generation, and then finally, off the pedigree completely.

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

# Decker studies genetics, then takes chances

STROUDSBURG — Judges of the American Dutch Rabbit Club decided in April that Carl Decker's "Pride-O-Deck's ACI" is the best Dutch rabbit in the country, based on about 32 pages of breeding and judging guidelines in the club's guidebook.

But how much does a Dutch rabbit differ from the little brown bunnies hopping around hill and dale in the Poconos?

Not much, says Decker. Color is different, and the body shape a bit different. Mostly behavior is different.

Decker tells of a time some breeders released some Dutch rabbits not far from the fields of the Monroe Beagle Club. The Dutch rabbits cross bred with the local rabbits. When the beagle club ran trials soon after, the cross-bred bunnies ran differently than the rabbits the dogs were used to, confusing the dogs and ruining the trials. The breeders had to promise not to release any more Dutch rabbits.

Pride-O-Deck's ACI (the letters are a code that tells Decker which rabbits produced this one) won the best of breed trophy at the national American Dutch Club rabbit show in Canton, Ohio. The rabbit also won best chocolate (a rabbit that is brown and white) last year. (The rabbit is 3 years old.) And this year, for the first time, the English, who are particular about their rabbits, awarded Decker's pride their best of show award the first time they've done so with an American rabbit.

The Dutch breed is at least 125 years old. It's divided into colors — chocolate, black, blue, gray, steel gray and tortoise. Decker counts 32 separate genetic traits that affect a Dutch rabbit's competitiveness. These are all things examined by a judge, and considered by a breeder when he's mating a pair of rabbits.

There's type, or body shape. The rabbit should be a chunky fellow, without a long neck, with nicely rounded haunches that are larger than its rounded hips, round belly, and so on.

The markings include the blaze, which is the white strip up the middle of its face from nose to ears; the saddle, or white front portion of its body; the cheeks, of color, circling the eye and running into the ears: and the stops, or white portions of the hind feet. These must all be smooth, clearly defined, symmetrical, and the right size and shape. The head must be of the right, round shape, and ears proportional and held just

The fur should be short, dense and lustrous. And the color should hairs in it.

The Dutch is one of about 60 breeds of rabbits. Decker estimates that 5.000 breeders breed them for competition, making them the most popular breed. But it's also the toughest breed to produce a trly exceptional rabbit in, because the markings are so complex.

Pride-O-Deck's ACI won over 437 other rabbits at Canton. Judges choose best senior rabbits in each color (those over 6 months), best junior in each color, then the best of the opposite sex (if a buck won. the does are opposite sex). Then they choose best of breed.

The genetics involved in breeding that big winner are complex enough that breeders differ on how to do it. Decker will breed a blue with a black to hold the strength of the blue color; some breeders reject that notion.

Decker will try a rabbit with a wide blaze matched with one with a narrow blaze to produce a good blaze. A black can be mixed with a chocolate to darken the brown.

"Up until just recently." Decker says, "genetics was considered mathematically exact. It isn't. A computer wouldn't help

"This is what makes it such a fascinating thing. When you look in a nest box, you may find what you want, and you may not."

Decker relies on intuition as much as science. "Two and two isn't four, completely." he says. "It may be four-and-a-half or three-and-a-half."

Another thing Decker does that many breeders don't do is to look at the grandparents of a rabbit for characteristics, rather that looking just at the dam and the sire. He believes this may be why he is so successful.

There is some hard information involved, of course. Decker says that a rabbit's 31-day gestation period is generally accurate to the hour - except, Decker says, that a thunderstorm can bring a rabbit in early.

Beyond the work of breeding, be rich and true, with no odd white is there anything in these rabbits to give pleasure?

They have personalities, Decker says. They usually like people and take to being handled. "I've seen little girls dress them in doll clothes," Decker says. "I've seen them trained to be led. I've seen them housetrained."

As if winning a national first place wasn't enough.

## Stroud man's rabbits bring him

## tranquility, trophies



TROUDSBURG — In 1952, Carl Decker worked in the personnel office of Worthington Mower. Like many Americans, he tended to take his job's problems home with him. Like many Americans, he needed a form of relaxation to take his mind away from all that.

He tried stamp collecting and coin collecting. They didn't help. Then someone gave him a pair of tortoiseshell Dutch rabbits, and Decker's problems were solved.

These days Decker works for Patterson-Kelley. But when he comes home for an evening, he can step out behind his house on Clay Avenue in Stroud Township and enter the hutch he built and he's with his herd of 50 to 75 prize Dutch rabbits. In 10 minutes, peace is with him. "It's the best life insurance you could

have," Decker says.

Decker started his hobby because the rabbits brought him tranquility. But he soon developed it into something more exciting. He has studied genetics in rabbit breeding and has spent years competing, at the highest levels, with his rabbits. He has 30 national trophies — believed by an official of the American Dutch Rabbit Club to be the most ever collected by a single breeder.

Decker travels the country, choosing the toughest eight to 12 competitions a year to enter. His partner is Bill Geitzenauer, a New Jersey resident who teaches mathematics. The two have traveled together since 1957. "We have a pact," Decker says. "If something happens to me, he gets my bunnies. If something happens to him, I get his." This will enable the survivor to keep the strain strong, he says.

The rabbits produced by Decker and Geitzenauer have made an even bigger

name for themselves than indicated by the truckloads of trophies the pair have captured. They've distributed their rabbits over time, often giving them to people who want to get started. "When we get beat, it's usually by our own rabbits," Decker says. "But that's what it's all about — improving the breed."

Decker has had to learn a lot, of course, to gain top national honors. He has performed surgery on rabbits. A few months ago he removed an abscess and two teeth from a rabbit that's now doing well. Several times he has performed the bunny equivalent of Ceasarean sections on pregnant rabbits, saving little ones and the doe. He has learned enough that he thinks he can write a book about Dutch rabbits when he retires, and travel on the lecture circuit.

And with it all, he says, "I have the satisfaction of having a hobby that's kind of a science. I've learned something new every day for 31 years."

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
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
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TO BE COBBY IN TYPE, COMPACT IN FORM AND LIMB. GOOD DUTCH TYPE CONSISTS OF A NICELY ROUNDED BACK, BEGINNING ALMOST IMMEDIATELY BEHIND THE HEAD AND PROGRESSING OVER THE SHOULDERS, LOIN AND RUMP TO TAIL. SHOULDERS SHOULD BE ROUNDED AND SLIGHTLY NARROWER AND LOWER THAN HIPS. RIB SPREAD SHOULD BE SO THAT THE SIDE LINES CARRY STRAIGHT THROUGH FROM THE SHOULDERS TO THE HIPS. A GOOD DUTCH SHOULD HAVE NICELY ROUNDED HIPS, VERY SMOOTH, ROUNDED UNDER VERY GRADUALLY AND SMOOTHLY. THE DUTCH SHOULD RETAIN THE COBBY, STOCKY APPEARANCE WHETHER IT WEIGHS 3½ POUNDS OR 5½ POUNDS.
