

OUR JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

The thought of a Junior or 4H Department of the Durch Club has been running through my head for some time now. I've hashed it over, pro and con, in my mind and even have written some letters to several members about the possibilities of such a department. Would it succeed or would it be a hopeless failure, if such a program would be set in motion? The only way to find out would be to try it out.

It all happened at the spur of the moment, and caught on very quickly with the Club Officers. We decided that it was about time that something should be done to encourage youngsters to raise and show Dutch Rabbits. There had to be a beginning, and I am glad to say that the Michigan State Dutch Club has started the Junior Department, just as they started the National Dutch Shows over twenty years ago.

The plans were quickly formulated, and put into watting order. Our very able Secretary was appointed Director of the new Department by our Club President Bayliss in order that the A. D. R. C. would have an official who would be able to act, and report, on any matter that needed immediate attention.

The FIRST JUNIOR DEPARTMENT SHOW of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was a huge success. There were 71 Dutch exhibited by twenty-one youngsters from six states. By checking both the Open and Junior Department show reports, you will note that several youngsters exhibited in both departments, and gave a fine account of themselved in competing against the oldsters.

In the past our American Dutch Rabbit Club has cone nothing to instill interest in the young people to continue, or even commence, Butch breeding. Now we have opened the opportunity for our Club members to encourage youngsters in their hobby, or small business operations. The future American Rabbit Breeders Association members,

are the youngsters of today, many of whom will "grow into" these organizations if properly encouraged and informed. Our future will be sound if we can continue this new policy. The A. D. R. C. Junior Department shall have a part in all future National Dutch Shows, as this was provided for by our membership at the Detroit meet-There will be a Committee appointed by our Pre dent to establish rules, etc. for these future Junior Shows. It will be up to the Tlub members to provide Specials etc., for their shows. The small costs should be off of by the compensation of seeing the enjoyment of these youngsters receiving their trophies, cups, ribbons, etc. "for keeps" on the rabbits they have raised.

Remember, our Junior Department is still in its infancy. Let's help it grow strong

and hardy in the ensuing years!

Dear Mrs. Grables:

I am writing you about the Jr. Department in the National Dutch Show. I believe it is a good thing to encourage these youngsters in their endeavors in Dutch breeding. We will need these young and energetic breeders in a few years.

I will not go into the subject of future leadership, as nature in its own way will take care of that for us and we will enentually pass from the picture. What I wish to go into is the fact that we have been missize the boat a long time on the Jr. Department.

We have been working at it from a give-away proposition which is the wrong approach. We will have to give these kids some kind of assurance that they can make

some money from their rabbits as projects in 4-H, FFA, or Boy Scout and Girl Scout work, or they will pass us by for other projects that have been sold to them either by their leaders or parents. Our primary job is to educate the leaders, and let them educate the kids. I am formerly an Agriculure Teacher and know of what I wpeak along

Another thing: there is a rule in the ARBA show rules whereby the show must offer a Jr. Department in the show. They don't specify any premiums be apid or any other thing, but you must have it in case the youngsters would like to show among themselves. It would be nice if this rule had some teeth in it. Something would be done about this situation, were that the case. So, it will not be the democratic vote that decides the question, but the ARBA show rules. In that case, I say that if the American Dutch Rabbit Club is going to sponsor a Jr. Department in the show, let's make it a good one, and go "whole hog" so to speak. The present one is a good starter, but I believe there are some improvements that can be made.

Now, the improvements as I see them. Never let the same rabbit be entered in Junior and Open competition. That is sticking the junges necks out a long way. In the first place, the class changes, and also probably the judge changes. The kids get two remark cards and they are not even similar. Te is more confused than ever about the worth of the exhibit. I have seen this happen many times and it just won't work. Next, charge an entry fee. A small one perhaps, and return ALL of it to the exhibitors and more if at all possible. Be sure the udge is instructed to judge according to the standard written for that breed. We'er be lenient on Junior exhibit , as that is encouraging them to be even more lax than hey already are, and I know that teen-agers, regardless of the circumstances will become lax, if they aren't lead by the strict and narrow.

Set the shows up where the kids will have something to compete for and not where every one of them gets something. Encourage the production of meet, as this is the door to success in any venture as the leaders see it, so give them credit for having a brain or two, whether they do or not, but when it comes to judging the breeding

classes, be strict and insist on quality and not quantity.

How many more youngsters are there around the country, who given a little encouragement, could do equally well with any breed. The meems to me that this puts it pretty squarly up to us as established breeders to give them the needed help and incentive to make them ready to take their places as the FUTURE RABBIT BREEDERS OF AMERICA! FOR BEGINNERS! EYES

J. Russell Hall

One time I read an article on Dutch written by a prominent English breeder, who wrote a good many little tips about our favorite breed. One of these tips was that rabbits should be prepared for shows ahead of time by handling them, and daily rubbing of their fur to help improve the condition of the coat. Some breeders do not do this, and many times they are heard to say, that they picked some certain animal out of its hutch and brought it to the show, "just like that."

I watched the judging of the Junior Department at the recent show in Detroit, and noted that the fur of a number of those Dutch could have been improved by working on them beforehand.

Another thing that many breeders do (even I, Myself, at times) is to put several young does together in a hutch after they are weared. This should not be done if any one of these individuals is to be saved for future use. That one should be placed in a separate butch where no harm can come to it. If young animals are in a butch together there is a tendency for one or more to try riding the others. When any of these resent this action there is apt to be a fight, resulting in torn skin and possible infections. So, the best way of prevention is to use separate butches, even if it means more work in feeding and even more construction. The above applies to bucks as well as does.

Another cause of trouble which often happens with he inexperienced rabbit breeder is the leaving of a doe, unattended, in the buck's hunch at breeding time. If the doe doesn't accept service at once she should be take out and tried again the next day. If she is left in there, harm could come to one or both of the animals. A young friend of mine put a buck in a pen with several does and left him all night, and in the morning the buck was dead.

In hutch construction, care should be taken to see that your stock is not in drafts, which sometimes happens when wire floors, or partial wire floors are used. Nor should they get wet. Rabbits are susceptible to colds and pneumonia just the same as you and I; and so they should be kept dry and out of drafts. Although I lik wire floors, I have found that they do get clogged at times and have to be cleaned. So for this New York climate, especially, I think so d floors are to be preffered. Of course that means cleaning once or twice a week, but most of us can arrange to do it week-ends, and if necessary, between.
