I feel sure that Mr. Hall, along with myself, can probably quote the material in these magazines practically word for word, so let's get them into the hands of people who do not know what they say and might profit by the information so available.

We here in Michigan, along with many others, including your ARBA officers are deeply concerned with what the rabbit clubs are doing to themselves and their members by the practice of holding what amount to private shows. By this I mean shows where you take your rabbits in on the morning of the show, have them judged from the crates and as soon as your breed is judged, loading them in your car and taking off. (Any of you who attended the National Dutch Show in Hamburg last spring, and stayed over for the local show held in conjunction with it, will know exactly what I mean.) It is my personal feeling that *does not secure, either a new breeder, or a member for one of the rabbit organizations, local club, ARBA, or one of the Specialty clubs, is a complete failure. The only way this potential failure can be overcome is by making a two-or more-day show exactly that and by advertising it locally as such; holding it in a spot easily available to persons other than exhibitors, and arranging to have the rabbits on display during the time advertised, so that when people come in to "just look around" they won't be confronted by an empty space or a room full of empty coops. Who knows, one of those "lookers" might have been a potential breeder looking for stock to buy and a club to join. Believe me, we are only hurting our-*any show selves.

DUTCHENG TIPS

Breeding Black and Blue Dutch by Tom Shufflebotham (As published in Small Stock Magazine several years ago.) Almost anyone you may talk to on this matter will have a different idea of breeding black and blues to im-

prove the color. As little Johnny "staff-sergeant" Baker says, "It's just one man's opinion."

I lay no claim to being an expert on genetics, in fact I couldn never follow the explanantions I have seen on genetics. My explanation of breeding proceedure is that of a very much interested breeder who has always tried to hold and improve color of both black and blue, and have acquired some very definite ideas on the subject.

There are those who will tell you that you can hold color of both by straight black to black or blue to blue breeding. However, I have never found this to be the case: I feel pretty sure of myself when I state that you must use both black and blue cross to hold and improve the color of each. It has been my experience that straight blue to blue breeding if carried to great lengths, tends to lighter blues, or mealy colored blues that fade rather easily. In the blacks, black to black matings carried too far tend to introduce rustiness.

I have and do, carry my breeding pure for several generations, but always bring in the black to blue or the blue to black. I grant that complications can arise here: the chief one is wall or speckled eyes. However, I have found a satisfactory method of combatting this hazard. I know that if you take a black that has been black bred for generations, mate it to a blue of several generations of pure blue breeding, you can expect speckled eyes in your litters. I am certain that the sec-

ret is in the fusing of the two colors.

I feel that the color in the Dutcheng strain compares favorably with the best I have seen and eye trouble is practically non-existent in my strain. In the first place the blue is considered nothing but a dilute black, which I am sure is the case. Also that blue is recessive to black, the other is the impure black (which in reality is a blue). This latter is the one that carries the best black color, it has more depth and sheen to it than the straight black. There are, in fact, very few straight breeding blacks. My best colored blacks are not the straight bred blacks but rather the impure ones. The only advantage that the straight bred black has over the other one is that it carries a little deeper eye color.

In my years of dutch breeding, I have never seen a black in a litter from two blues, regardless of how the blues were produced. Mated blue to blue, the result has always been 100% blues. On the other hand it is quite common to get blues from black to black mating. These blues are generally the best colored blues and are the ones that should be mated to blacks to improve both the color of the black and blue. Infusing the black to blue in this manner, you lessen the prevalence of eye trouble, speckled, wall and so forth. It has not proved wise for me to mate a blue of several generations of straight blue breeding into my blacks - in fact, I feel that this is

where the eye trouble originates.

When mating one of the black bred blues back into the blacks the ratio of blacks in the litter will be almost 100%. They will all have black coats, but some of them will actually be blues. Some of them would be true breeding blacks and others would be blue. For this reason blues sometimes show up in the black to black matings. I have never thought it too important whether the blacks are true breeding black or not, but if you wish to find out, I would suggest that the rabbit in question be mated back to a blue. If the resulting litter is all black then the black is a pure black; however if the litter contains blues, the black is an impure black. Mated to another impure black you will get a percentage of blues in the litter. These are usually the best colored blues. The blacks, too, will be a deep black. I find the only drawback to this type of breeding, is that some of the blacks will not have the deep hazel eye color that is necessary. However, this is more than compensated for by the fact that speckled or wall eyes seldom appear in the litter.

In my experience speckled or wall eyes generally come from straight or pure-bred black matings. Perhaps an expert in genetics would go about producing the same results in a different manner. I, however, am very well satisfied with the results I am attaining by the matings as described. Many breeders and judges have asked how I get and keep the color in my black and blue stock. I hold no secrets; this is it!

RAISE DUTCH COM ERCIALLY? - YES!

We have nothing but Dutch in our rabbitry and are raising them on a commercial basis.

If only the Dutch breeders would push the Dutch on a commercial basis - right now, instead of calling them just "fancy", they could easily make them one of the top commercial breeds.

Look at the top commercial breeds now - what have they to offer that we do not have?

We have so many advantages over the heavier breeds. 1/2 the hutch space, we have proven this. 1/2 the feed for resting does. 1/2 the feed for breeding bucks. Very few sore hocks as compared to the heavier breeds. Very few that ever have ear canker They are much hardier and healthier, much more active, better breeding in hot weather also will produce and raise more young better in hot weather - they just simply take the heat when others won't. 60% plus, dress-out. Yes they have colored furs and we do not save ours at the present time. My argument is with the better dress-out than W.N.Z. and others, we can afford to throw away the fur.

We buy all of the Dutch we can get around here, paying 33¢ per pound live weight. It makes me sick at most of the processors, what they are paying for Dutch, due to

the color.

If this and other articles I have written were not so, someone would jump me. For proof to anyone, visit our rabbitry. You are welcome.
