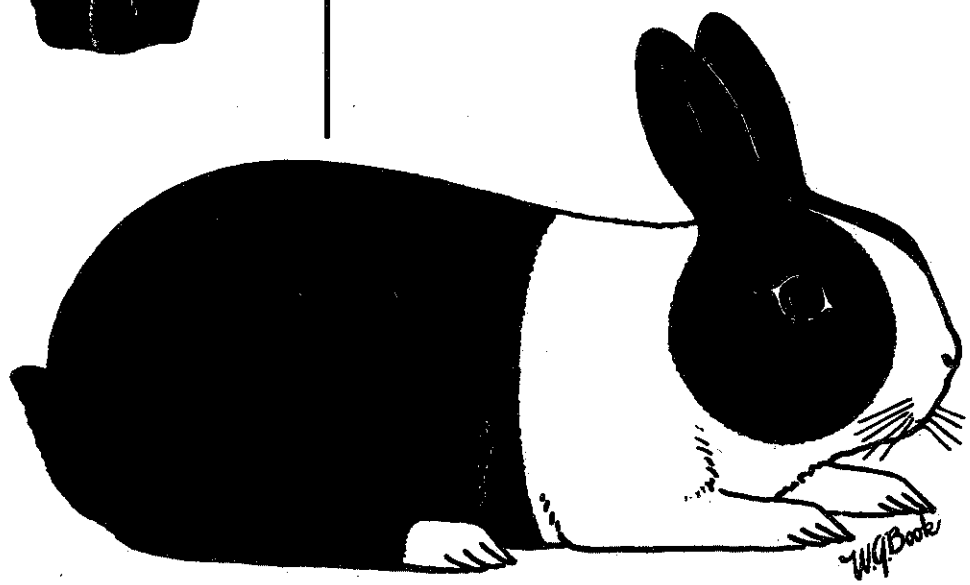

Again this month I am faced with very little, aside from routine reports to try to make these pages interesting to the membership so I spent about an hour doing some hunting for something old, but still pertinent to put in. I went through my old Dutch Reporters for the years 1954, 55, 56 and 57 (I do not have any older ones in my file) and in all of those issues I was able to find only five articles that I felt were worth re-hashing, besides two that have already been re-printed. It would seem that this problem of a shortage of interesting material is far from being a new one. With a membership of over 400 it would seem that we could find someone willing to produce something of interest to the rest of the membership more than seven times in four years. A couple of these articles were on the breeding of steels and grays and one of the ones that has been reprinted was on the selection of Tortoise, but there is NOT ONE WORD CONCERNING OUR MOST POPULAR COLORS, BLACK, BLUE AND CHOCOLATE! It would seem from this that these present no problems and that even the newest beginner must be cognizant of the principals of selection as to type, color and conformity without any need for tips and instructions. One would think that all that was necessary was for the new breeder to purchase a pair of Dutch from most anyone and start raising show winners. We all know that this is not true, else why would we have been giving such production so much of our time for so many years? I have been asked just recently, "How do you go about getting good blue dutch?" This same question could just as pertinently be asked about blacks and chocolates, or any of the other colors. Yet all but a few of us just sit smugly back and let the beginners struggle along making the same mistakes we all did.

I would be the first to admit that the Dutch Breeders as a whole, are some of the best sports in the rabbit industry and all a beginner needs to do is collar any given group of old-timers at a show and start asking questions and he will go home so loaded with advice that he will not know just who said what. How much better if some of this advice were published in the pages of the Dutch Reporter so the newcomer could go over the material repeatedly and sift and sort until he came up with a set of ideas that would work for him. I thought, surely, after my needling in the Feb. issue that my mail would soon be loaded with good material for three or four issues, but that was just not what happened. What else do you have to do these long cold evenings? It wouldn't take very much of your time to put some of your ideas on paper. Maybe you weren't a shining star in your creative writing class in school, but if you can just put your ideas down, I can usually (and you would be surprised at how many times I have done just this) rearrange and embellish your words with the needed adjectives to make for easier reading -- without changing your meaning or inserting my own ideas, either.

The Dutch Reporter has been classified as ONE of the best club organs in the United States and with a little more support from the membership and officers there is no reason why it cannot become THE best one. I shouldn't have to yell "HELP", but that is exactly what I am doing. One good article is bound to bring forth another from some other member whose ideas differ a bit from the original writer and the ball keeps rolling once it is started. WHO WILL GIVE IT THE FIRST PUSH?

I would like to remind you that your club derives a small profit from each and every magazine subscription that is mailed in through this office to Small Stock, National Rabbit Raiser and American Small Stock Farmer. Blanks for sending in these subscriptions are sent out with each new and renewal membership card and with every set of show sanction papers. Why not send your next renewal to this office?

Also, I would like to call to your attention the printed material at the bottom of page one of EVERY Dutch Reporter. I am often asked, "Just when is the deadline for material for the Dutch Reporter?" It is right there for you to check on whenever you need to know. Although the deadline is set for the 15th. of the month preceeding month of publication, I can often squeeze small articles in which arrive after that date, but when they come in on the 28-29, it is just too late to do anything about them and they have to be held over for the following month which sometimes makes the material out of date.

Good belt, good undercut, stops look pretty good, but youngster, you will never get past Cy Lowit with that mouth drag. Maybe you will be a doe and a good breeder so you can stick around for awhile.

WOW! What the dickens have we here! Old Lady you did come across at last. This one sure looks great, but of course, rather small, so guess we will wait awhile and look him over again when the fur comes out. Two more yet. Pretty fair, so you can have four and see that you make a good job of the nursing business.

Just received the Dutch Reporter for February and have read it from cover to cover. Am also enclosing three dollars to cover cost of same providing that the Show reports are continued in the REPORTER. If they are not, please give my membership to a youngster who is just starting up.

I agree with Mary Stohrer wholeheartedly. Why must we have all this bickering. Why can't we just enjoy raising good Dutch, or I should say, trying to raise good Dutch?

I am going to tell you why I am in rabbits. In 1946 I retired from the US Air Force and went home to Akron, Ohio. Somehow, and I will never know why, I happened into a rabbit show at Akron in the early spring of 1947 and while there met Al Meier, Jr., and his grand Dad, Al, Sr. They talked me into starting in Reds as a hobby. I did. I got in with all four feet. Had ads in all the Rabbit Journals, gave money

to all the shows and showed my Reds all over the country under the name "The Kenmore Reds". I never had more than seven at any one time and placed tenth in the National Sweepstakes in, I believe 1948. I wrote to every Red Breeder I could think of that year, had over 96 Reds in the Akron show with seven Grand Champion Sr. Does in the Sr. Doe Class. I wanted to become a Registrar and later a Judge. Then it happened. We had a small show and a Registrar was assisting the Judge in Judging the NZ Whites. After the show was over it was brought to light that the Registrar had given his rabbits to another fancier to be shown at that show, which were NZ Whites. This Registrar later became a Judge and was a good one, but the damage had been done, I sold all of my rabbits, dropped out of the ARBA, and have not joined since. Mind you, the ARBA had been notified of this action and took none. Later, here in Columbus, Paul Markel gave me a couple of Dutch and I started up again, just to have something to do. Mr. Jack Boughton talked me into joining the ADRC and against my wishes, I did so.

The reason for the above is this; it clearly states why one man who was very much interested in rabbits, who was giving his time, money and efforts for the betterment of same, suddenly quit.

I sincerely believe that no change in the rules of any club or organization should be ABLE TO BE CHANGED OR AMENDED WITHOUT AT LEAST TWO THIRDS OF THE MEMBERSHIP VOTING ON SAME. Let's all relax for a few months, and think things over. I believe the Show Reports should be continued as in the past. That is what made the DUTCH REPORTER what it is. Do we want to kill it? Remember, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is not necessary to belong to any organization to show rabbits or to raise them. Does one show a rabbit for a ribbon or the fifty cents he may get back? NO! He shows it to see how it compares with rabbits from other rabbitries. HE CAN DO THAT AND NOT BELONG TO ANY CLUB!

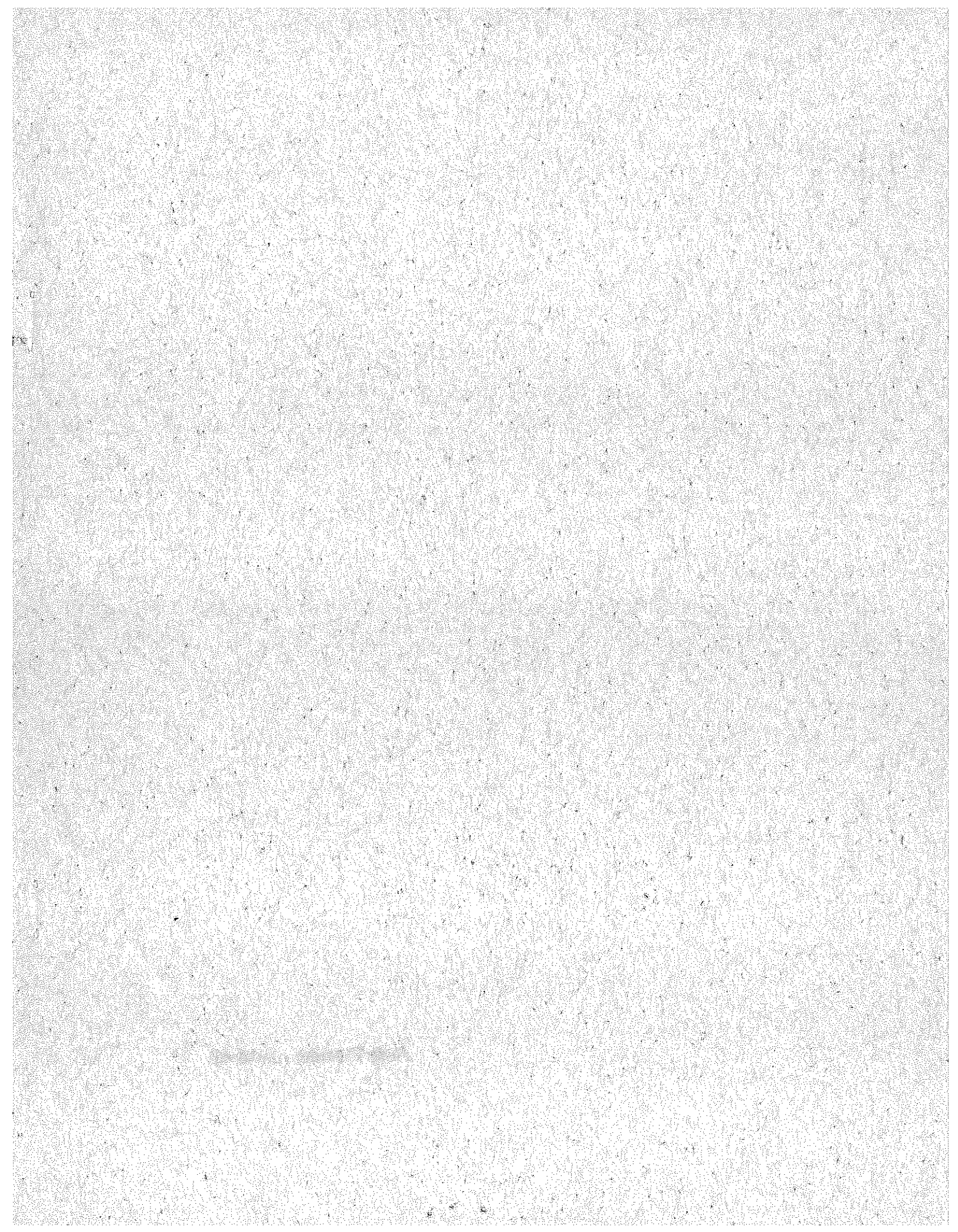

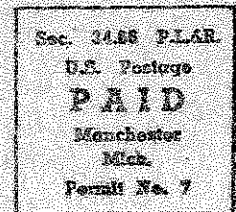
