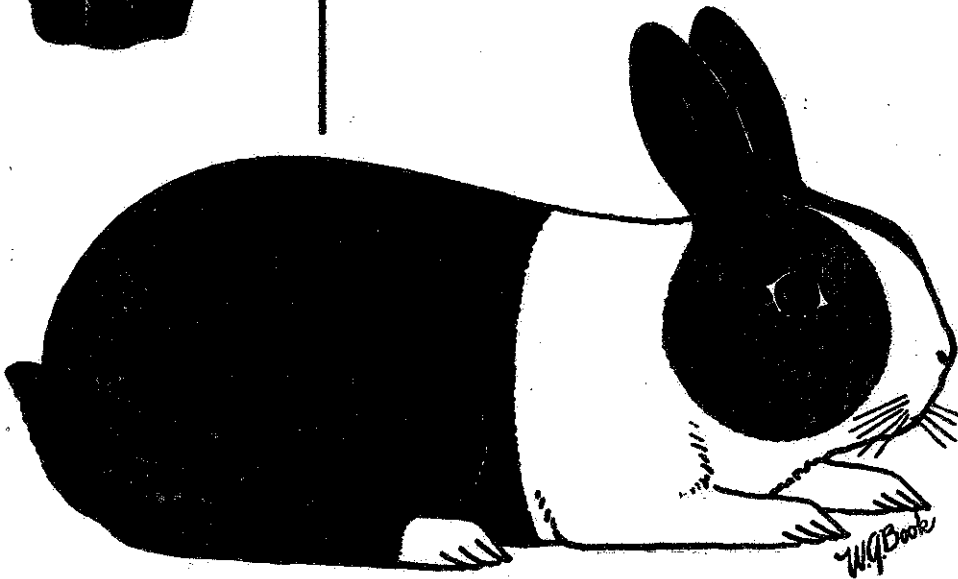

MINUTES OF AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB MEETING
NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW - WELLINGTON, OHIO - APRIL 25-27, 1958

The meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by Chm. E. C. Fickley at eight-ten P. M. with the following officers and board members present: Vice-President, G. C. Leisonring, Sec'y-Treas, Jessie Weinhardt, Directors, James Flyth, Tom Shufflebotham, Wm. Stedman, and E. C. Fickley. Absent were: President, George Bayliss, and board members, L. E. Settle and J. C. Lovit.

Board member James Flyth requested the floor and stated that due to his inability to fulfill his duties as a member of the board, he wished to tender a verbal resignation in order that someone with more time might be appointed to take his place. He was informed that this was a matter to be taken up with the board members who were scheduled to meet at 11 P. M. on this date. Mr. Flyth went on to say that he hoped we could cease our dissention over the "Gray Standard" and resume our happy family life. He said that we had a good club and should not let petty arguments destroy the fine thing we have.

Committees reporting: Educational Committee Chm. Tom Shufflebotham reported that aside from a few enquiries that had been taken care of by him through the Dutch Reporter, there was nothing to report. He expressed his willingness to work, if he was given something constructive to do - but couldn't answer questions that weren't asked.

Junior Division Committee Chm. William Stedman stated that there was nothing to report.

Ways & Means Committee - the Chairman of this committee being absent the only member present - Wm. Stedman reported that there was nothing to report.

Standard Committee Chm. E. C. Fickley stated that he had received no dissenting comments on the present Gray Standard and inasmuch as it would be impossible to change this standard under the ARBA until the expiration date of the present Book of Standards in 1960 no steps would be taken at this time.

There was a request by the Secretary for a clarification of the age limit in the Junior Division rules and it was explained that the rules in our Guide Book read "under 21" and that this was assured to mean a top limit and if the sponsoring club wished to set a lower limit it was within its rights to do so.

There was a discussion of the possibility of the "closing of the stud books" of the ARBA and Mr. Flyth reported that he had no knowledge of such purported action. Merle Emery stated that he had also read of this in the Small Stock Magazine under the name of Fred Applegate. Mr. Flyth stated that efforts in this direction had been instituted a number of years ago, but he knew nothing of it at the present time, but if such were the case, he for one was against it.

The Treasurer's report from June 31, 1957 to Jan. 1, 1958 was read and approved

on a motion by G. C. Leisenring, seconded by Al Emery.

Under unfinished business, the Secretary gave a report on the progress of the exchange memberships with the British Dutch Club. It was reported that there had been three such exchanges made to date, and anyone else interested in participating in such an exchange should report such a willingness to the Secretary.

The question of the "Seller's Class" was brought up, and the question as to whether it was a profitable venture or not was raised. The Secretary reported that the income from this venture had been published in the November 1957 Dutch Reporter. The total amount received for the sale of this class at Little Rock had been a hundred and twenty-four dollars, and fifty cents. After payment of the thirty dollars in prize money this left a balance of ninety-four dollars and fifty-cents. (Subject to correction - see minutes of second meeting.) Mr. Shufflebotham then wanted to know why such a profitable venture had not been included in the 1958 National Dutch Show. He was informed by National Dutch Show Secretary, Merle Emery, that inasmuch as no prize money had been authorized for such a class at this time, it was felt by the show committee that it would have to be left out of the present show.

Mr. Elyth introduced the subject of National Publicity for our organization and raised the point that most of our advertising up to this time was reaching, through our trade magazines and our ARBA Bulletin, mostly already established breeders who probably knew all about our Club anyway. It was his feeling that it would be much more worthwhile for our Club to advertise in the ARBA's "Successful Beginning to Rabbit Raising." The Publicity Director, Mr. Gerald Leisenring reported that his funds were limited and he felt that we were duty bound to spend a certain amount on booth space at our National Convention Show and in catalog advertising for that show and the National Dutch Show and that about covered the amount he had to spend. The Secretary then stated that as the amount of money allowed the publicity fund was based on a percentage of the money received from members' lip dues, it behooved each and every member to put on a personal membership drive to obtain as many new members as possible, this would in turn make more money available to the Publicity Director for such advertising.

After a vote of thanks to the Committee for the 1958 National Dutch Show for a good job well done, it was reported by Mr. Al Emery that he hoped the various members would support the local advertisers in our catalog as best we could before leaving the hospitality of Wellington on Sunday. He informed us that there would only be one restruant open on Sunday morning and that he hoped we would all express our thanks by filling our gas tanks from the pumps of one of our supporters before leaving town.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Osmon were introduced as Dutch Freed Chairman for the 1958 ARBA Convention and they reported that they had been experiencing fine cooperation from the breeders present and if they had missed tapping anyone's pocket book lightly we were to believe it was entirely unintentional and they would try to take care of them before they left on Sunday.

Meeting adjourned at 9:30

MINUTES OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

AT WELLINGTON, OHIO - APRIL 26, 1958

The Mountain went to Mahomet and a Board of Directors meeting was called to order by Chm. E. C. Pickley at about 11:30 P. M. Present were Vice-President, G. C. Leisenring, Secretary-Treas. Jessie Weinhardt, and Board members, James Elyth, Tom Shufflebotham, E. C. Pickley and Wa. Stedman.

The first order of business was the consideration of the request to resign from the Board of Directors of the American Dutch Rabbit Club of James Elyth. He explained that due to the pressures in his time required by his job as Secty of the ARBA and a growing feeling that officers of the parent body ought not to hold executive office in the various Specialty Clubs he felt it was for the good of the order that he tender his resignation. He wanted it thoroughly understood that his resignation did not involve any lessening in his interest in either the ARBA or the Dutch rabbit, but rather

that there were other persons within the organization who could devote more time and energy to the interests of our Club. He wanted us to know, also that in his capacity of Sec'y of the American, he was ready and willing at any time, to do anything he could to further the interests of our breed and our club. His resignation was accepted unanimously.

Mr. Leisenring requested that he be relieved of his duties as Publicity Director of the ADRC. He stated that he had held this position for a number of years and felt that perhaps someone else might be able to solicit more cooperation from the membership at large. He also stated that his interest and love would always be with the Dutch Rabbit, its breeders and our Club. On a motion by Tom Shufflebotham, seconded by Wm. Stedman, Mr. Leisenring's resignation was accepted with one dissenting vote by Mr. Plyth.

On a motion by Tom Shufflebotham, seconded by G. C. Leisenring it was recommended by the Board that in the nineteen-fifty-eight, fifty-nine Sweepstak Series of the ADRC the offer of the Rosettes at present awarded to second through tenth place be deleted from the Sweepstake offer and the cost of the Trophy for first place be limited to ten dollars. It was felt that the expense of the present plan and the expression of dissatisfaction with the awarding of the Rosettes, that is their impracticality, by the membership at large made this recommendation timely. Carried.

SECOND MEETING OF THE AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB
WELLINGTON, OHIO - APRIL 27, 1958

The meeting was called to order by Chmn. E. C. Pickley at 12:25 P. M. with the following Officers and Board Members present: Vice-President, G. C. Leisenring, Secretary-Treasurer, Jessie Weinhardt, Board Members, Tom Shufflebotham, James Plyth, and E. C. Pickley. The minutes of the meeting held the previous night were read and approved, with one correction by the Secretary. Under the statement of income from the Seller's Class at Little Rock, the profit was decreased by a payment of twenty-five percent of the selling price, which was paid back to the donors.

The minutes of the Board of Directors meeting held on Saturday evening were read and approved by the board.

It was stated by the Chairman that the only item taken under consideration by the board that required action by the general membership present was the recommendation regarding the Sweepstakes Awards. Discussion was called for.

There was a motion by Merle Emery, seconded by Gladys Quinton that the recommendation by the board be turned down.

Several points were brought out in discussion. Mr. G. A. Furke said that he felt we would be defeating our own purposes by making such a drastic change. He felt that the fee paid for a Sweepstake Sanction warranted more than a single trophy for first place and that those who could not climb to the top of the series would become discouraged and quit showing.

The Secretary then stated that there had been many complaints regarding the so-called "sunflower" rosettes that were being awarded at the present time. It was the opinion of many members that these rosettes were much too big, that there was no way that they could be effectively displayed by the winners and that they were generally unacceptable.

Suggestions were requested as to what the membership did want in the way of awards if the large rosettes were discontinued. The Chairman stated that if the recommendation were voted down at this time, it would be in order for the membership to express their desires so that the matter could be taken up at Springfield and something more to the liking of the membership could be offered at that time.

The Secretary suggested a Trophy for first place, a plaque for second and a small one for third. Merle Emery suggested a Trophy for first place with smaller rosettes for 2nd. through 10th. place the entire cost not to exceed twenty-five dollars.

The question was called for and the vote was to reject the recommendation of the

board.

Mr. Al Emery asked for the floor and thanked everyone for their patronage and cooperation and made the following statement, "If we've pleased you, tell others. If we haven't pleased you, tell us."

The meeting was adjourned at about 1:10 P. M.

I imagine by now that many of the donors to the Dutch Pot have wondered what happened to the money, and how come they don't get credit for it in the Dutch Reporter.

The truth of the matter is, that right after the Convention at Little Rock, I decided to go south instead of going north coming home. This seems to be quite a habit with a few rabbit breeders and bankers, going south after they get their hands on some money, however, my case was just a little bit different. I had a show to judge at Beaumont, Texas, and then, in view of the fact that we were so close to New Orleans, and Mrs. Lowit had never been there before, we decided to take in the sights at New Orleans, and, of course, the Dutch Pot came along with us, but it didn't last very long.

Then, in view of the fact that we were already at the bottom end of the United States, we decided to take a couple more weeks and drive across Texas, which it seemed like it took a week to do, on into El Paso and back home by way of Phoenix, Ariz. and Los Angeles. Consequently when I got home there was enough work stacked up to last me a life time, but it only took me about three or four months to get completely caught up. So---I apologize for the delay in getting this information to the Dutch Reporter, and I know that my laxity in handling this matter promptly will make George Rayliss more than happy to accept a volunteer for the collection of the Dutch Pot at this coming Springfield Convention.

Don't forget also fellow breeders, that just because I have already collected \$103.00 that you have to stop there. You can send any additional amount you want in to the Secretary, and I know Jessie will promptly print the names of any additional donors, and the money will be added to this Pot. This has been very interesting and I think it has created quite a bit of interest, and helped the number of Dutch shown at the various Conventions since we started this.

AKRON (OHIO) RABBIT CLUB NEWS

(Editor's note: Although it would be impossible to print reports on any great number of rabbit club's activities, once in a while we get a report that contains something of such universal interest that we just have to pass it along. JW)

The Akron Rabbit Club held its election meeting with sixteen of its twenty three members in attendance and re-elected the officers of last year.

The Club has plans for an inspired program for 1958-59 and will bring the rabbits and rabbit meat to the attention of the local public. It was proven during the May meeting that by making known, to the open meeting, any problem which exists, that so often someone else may have had and solved the problem and is anxious to lend a helping hand to his friend. This was the case where a member had had an experience of curing a diseased rabbit several years ago of a condition which was now plaguing a local rabbit raiser. All of us learned a great deal by being able to listen to the experience as related by this member and we hope to have open forums on many subjects related to rabbits.

LOOKING BACK

DUTCH - FANCY and COMMERCIAL

There are very few breeders, I suppose, who could qualify as being either strictly fanciers or strictly commercial breeders. Most commercial breeders are to some extent fanciers, and practically all fanciers sell enough rabbits to be called commercial. However, most of us think of ourselves as either fanciers or commercial breeders. The majority of Dutch breeders would probably be classified as fanciers. Therefore, we will first consider the Dutch as a fancy rabbit.

The fancy rabbit differs from the commonly called commercial breeds in somewhat the same way that fancy groceries differ from staple groceries. A purely fancy rabbit is not judged by qualifications other than the appeal to an imaginative fancy, with the ornamental and decorative qualities taking precedence over the more staple qualities. He evolves from the imaginary an ideal, and is characterized by variety, superiority in quality, refinement of finish, variegation of colors, and is selective-

ly bred to a given type with such fanatical zeal that he oftne proves an extravagance as a whim or hobby. Needless to say, however, the attainment of the best in the finer points is absolutely dependent upon the soundness of body and health.

Thus we have the Dutch, probably America's most popular fancy rabbit. No other fancy rabbit offers such a variety of color, nor affords opportunity for such imaginative color creations. Six colors are already standardized in America, and since several breeders are making splendid progress with new color creations, it will probably be only a short time until at least two more colors are added. (Ed's. note; Don't forget that this article is now ten years old.) Therefore the fancier who thrills to the possibility of creating something new finds in the Dutch an unlimited opportunity for adventure.

Then there is the fancier who has a yen for the spectacular, whose taste runs to flashiness and bold color combinations. He too, finds the sport-modeled Dutch to be the answer to his prayers. With the shining white of the base color thrown in bold relief against the glossy contrasting color, and the distinctive lines of demarcation cutting decisively and uniquely the patten of the markings, there is nothing staid or staple about the Dutch. Beyond a doubt he is rabbitdom's most colorful sport, and the liveliness of his color scheme seems to be caught up in his very nature, for he is an active and vigorous spirit, endearing him to all who become well enough acquainted with him to appreciate his coolrfulness.

Again, he merits much consideration from the fancier who likes to show his stock, because of his adaptability to varying situations. His smallness of size makes it possible to house him in the least amount of space, and enables one to ship him great distances at frequent intervals without suffering loss of weight or prineness of condition. His strong constitution and his remarkable adaptability to climatic changes make him immune to a multitude of petty little illnesses that plague exhibitors on every hand.

A well-bred Dutch is a natural showman. After one or two shows, or with a bit of home grooming, he seems to understand that his greatest asset is his looks, and he takes pride in posing for the judge in such ways as to reveal to the best advantage his strong points. He is good looking and knows it.

Then again, the Dutch is the eternal delight of the perfectionist. The perfect Dutch is yet to be bred, but many fanciers have spent their entire lifetime chasing the elusive rainbow of perfection. There are seven distinctive makings on the Dutch, and to get all of them even near perfection on one animal is a goal that will take up the spare time of generations of fanciers. Add to that task the perfecting of type and color, the maintenance of stamina and the ability to produce in kind, and the most tenacious perfectionist will spend a happy threescore years and ten in pursuit of the impossible perfect.

Need I say more? Truly, the Dutch makes its own appeal to the most exacting fancy, and challenges the skill and ability of the cleverest of men. So much for the fancy package.

But now we come to the staple groceries. Though man doesn't live by bread alone, he does thrive on bread, in fact it is quite essential. Most of us have to think in terms of financial returns from our investments. And here again, contrary to popular opinion, the Dutch is a winner. Perhaps if I were going into the rabbit business as my sole means of making a living, by the usual methods of producing and selling meat, fur, breeding stock and other by-products, I would select a breed more thoroughly proved for its productiveness in that field. But for the vast majority of breeders, the need is for a rabbit that can be raised in the back yard, taking up the smallest amount of space, requiring the least amount of time, demanding the least amount of initial investment, and promising a fair return in financial profit. And this is where the Dutch shines. Per litter the Dutch does not produce 32 pounds of live fryers at 8 weeks. But for the same amount of feed, and in much less space, he will equal any breed for the production of meat, and it is said by many that the meat is a much sweeter meat and of much finer texture. In our own rabbitry, we have proved beyond a doubt that we can clear \$12 per doe per year on meat sales alone. This figure of course, does not reveal a true picture of the commercial possibilities of the Dutch. For one thing, we do not breed for meat primarily, and consequently we do not allow a

doe to ever raise more than four young, but we do get four and five litters per year. The price we get for our meat is governed by the price we pay for feed.

The Dutch doe is a wonderful mother, being able to transform a comparatively small amount of feed into a miraculous amount of nurishment for her young. Ordinarily she is not temperamental and rarely loses any part of her litter. By the time the young are 8 weeks old they are plump and fat and will butcher out a very high percentage of edible meat, as there is little offal and waste.

The laboratory is possibly the most profitable outlet for the cull stock that the fancier inevitably raises. Frankly, this is our chief source of revenue from our Dutch. At present, with around 100 producing does, we are unable to meet our contracts without buying stock from other breeders. Of course, we are very fortunate in our location, as several laboratories are near by. However, the point to be made is that there are many laboratory experiments that are best performed with the Dutch rabbit. Again their size and their hardiness are a deciding factor. They take up a small amount of space. They make for economy in that experimental drugs are administered most often in proportion to the weight of the subject. They can be shipped at minimum cost per head. There is less variation in size and weight at a given age. They mature at an earlier age than larger breeds. They will stand a lot of rough treatment.

So, I give you the American Dutch Rabbit, the fancier's delight as a hobby, and a profitable little meat producer, as well as one of the very best laboratory animals. If you want to get rich I would suggest you drill for oil, or mine gold, or play the ponies. If you want a pet, I suggest a dog or cat or even a profane parrot. If you want a pastime recreation that you can have one day and leave off the next, perhaps golf is your field, though even there one needs regular practice. If you are seeking something you can master in a month, a year, or a lifetime there are such simple things as philosophy, metaphysics, anthropomorphism, etc.

But—if you are a red-blooded American man, woman, or child, and you have initiative, a desire for adventure, a bit of sporting blood, respond to a challenge, thrive on adversity and opposition, possess patience and determination, and are interested in rabbits that will spark your imagination and demand your best effort, YOU CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH! Or if you are interested in raising rabbits that will return you a fair profit on your investment of time and money, and you do not expect them to make you rich overnight or a big business-man in a year, and you are willing to go halfway with any rabbit that will do that - YOU CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH! He is the fanciest of the fancy and the safest of the commercial.
