Entries were good, a little over 300, and thanks to John Miller, Superintendent, and his associates, the management of the show-room was well handled.

The general meeting was well attended, and one or two subjects of importance came up for discussion. The report is that one of these subjects pertained to the weights of our Dutch rabbits. Now members, this is like stirring up old mud, and I ask each member to read the Secretary's report on this particular subject. The report on this weight subject has two very good answers within itself, one is given by Mr. Pat Herman,

the other refers to the breeding does.

I earnestly ask the membership to voice their thoughts and findings on this allimportant subject through the medium of the DUTCH REPORTER, this in turn will give the
Standard Committee of the A.D.R.C. food for thought to work with. . . something the
committee has not had in the past. This subject vastly concerns each one of you; in
the past I have served as Chairman of the Standard Committee of the A.D.R.C. I have
also served on the Standard Committee of the A.R.B.A., I feel I know some of the important questions and answers pertaining to this weight issue, and as long as I serve
as your President I am not going to allow some 400 members of our Club to become the
pawns of a minority few.

I especially invite the thinking and feelings from our members in the states of Florida, Texas, Colorado and Oklahoma. These are some of the states that not only produce a very good showroom Dutch, but also have a great commercial value. Through action taken at Harper, this issue will be put to the membership for vote, after a report from the Standard Committee of the A.D.R.C. and I sincerely hope this vote

will be JUST and FINAL.

Write or contact your Officers and Directors and let them know what action you want, you voted them into office and they are there to carry out the wish of the MAJORITY.

AMERICAN DUT H RABBIT CLUB Minutes - Board of Directors Meeting

Harper, Iowa - April 8, 1960

The meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by Vice-President, G. C. Leisenring at 11:00 P.M., April 8th, with the following Officers and Directors present: Jessie Weinhardt, Sec'y-Treas., G. C. Leisenring, Vice-Pres., Directors, E. C. Bickley, Tom Shufflebotham, Roger Eich, Wm. Stedman, and Clinton Dennis. Absent were: President, George Bayliss and Director, Jimmy Sinclair.

The meeting was opened by the reading of a letter from President Bayliss to the

hoard, said letter being entered into the record.

The bid sent to the American Dutch Rabbit Club by the Colorado State Dutch Rabbit Club for the 1961 National Dutch Show was presented to the board, along with another bid being submitted at this time by the Ohio State Dutch Rabbit Club. Both bids were discussed but inasmuch as bids may be received up until June 1st. 1960 for the 1961 show, no definite action could be taken at this time.

A motion was made by E. C. Bickley that permanent dates be set for the National Dutch show each year - such dates to be the last week-end in May. Second by Wm. Stedman. Five votes were cast for the motion with Tom Shufflebotham casting a "no" vote.

Carried.

Mr. Bickley suggested that inasmuch as the National Dutch Show is no longer singular in that we now permit other clubs to hold Dutch Sweepstake Shows on the same date, the sponsoring Club should be permitted to select their own judges, with the only restrictions being that said judges should be of national reputation, members of the American Dutch Rabbit Club and could judge no two consecutive National Dutch Shows. This was discussed, but no action taken.

There was a motion by Roger Eich, seconded by Wm. Stedman that the offer of the National Trophy Supply Co. to print the publicity folder drawn up by Tom Shufflebotham

and J. Russell Hall be accepted. Carried unanimously.

The subject of a new American Dutch Rabbit Club Guide Book to be presented to the membership in 1962 was brought up. It was agreed that work should be started on same. It was mentioned by E. C. Bickley that certain weaknesses in the present Standards and Constitution and By-Laws would need to be corrected first. There was a motion by Clinton Dennis, seconded by E. C. Bickley that a new Guide Book and Standard should be readied for presentation in the 1st, quarter of 1962. The motion was amended to include instructions to the President to appoint a committee to begin work on a new Guide Book as soon as possible. Carried.

A motion was made by E. C. Bickley, seconded by Wm. Stedman that Small Stock Magazine should be allowed first chance to publish the new Guide Book, provided their bid

was of a competitive nature. Carried.

A motion was made by Roger Eich, seconded by Clinton Dennis that the meeting be adjourned at 2:40 A.M. Carried.

AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB Minutes - General Meeting Harper, Iowa - April 9, 1960

The General Meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by Vice-President, G. C. Leisenring at 10:45 P.M. A roll call of Officers and Directors showed the following present: Jessie Weinhardt, Secty-Treas, G. C. Leisenring, Vice-President, and Board Members, E. C. Bickley, Tom Shufflebotham, Clinton Dennis, Roger Eich and Wm. Stedman. Absent were: President, George Bayliss and Director Jimmy Sinclair.

Mr. Leisenring spoke to the membership gathered, explaining that since he was extremely tired after having judged all day, he would like permission to turn the meeting over the E. C. Bickley as chairman. Permission granted.

The meeting was opened by the reading, by the secretary of a letter from President

George Bayliss expressing his regrets at being unable to attend. Said letter being entered into the record.

There was a motion by Tom Shufflebotham, seconded by Wm. Stedman, that inasmuch as the minutes of the meetings held at Syracuse, New York had been published in the DUTCH REPORTER, a reading at this time should be dispensed with. Carried.

A financial report sent to the Secretary by Publicity Director, J. Russell Hall was read and accepted on a motion by Pat Herman, seconded by Walter Cook. Carried.

The minutes of the meeting held by the Board of Directors on the previous evening

were read and after a slight correction were accepted.

An explanation of the reason for the Board's action in changing the dates for the National Dutch Show from April that had been held in the past, to a permanent date in May was made by E. C. Bickley. He explained that it was the thinking of the Board that we were too liable to find inclement weather in April in many parts of the country which could be devastating to our show, and also there was the constant factor of the Palm Sunday and Easter Holidays which eliminated two week-ends in April. The recommendation of the Board was accepted.

A Special Dutch issue of Small Stock Magazine was opened for discussion. The question was put to Don Guthrie as to whether Small Stock might be receptive to the idea at this time. He stated, "Very much so" - it was good for the breed, because of the fine publicity it created, good for the breeder because of all of the good advertising it presented and good for Small Stock because it creates special interest. He was asked how long it would take to prepare such an issue and said that to do a good job required considerable time, and he would recommend at least six months. He explained that there were several such special issues in the plans for the coming months.

Mr. Guthrie was questioned as to just what requirements Small Stock would make for issuing such a magazine and explained that the set-up with the other clubs was that they were to guarantee one page of ads for each three pages of articles. Small Stock will furnish the necessary cuts and will give the sponsoring club 200 free copies for distribution, through their Publicity Director.

Pat Herman asked if we have the authority to make arrangements for, or initiate

proceedure for such an issue and was informed that we do.

A motion was made by Pat Herman, seconded by Ray Grables that such a program be

initiated for April 1962. Carried.

Don Guthrie announced that such a plan had the full approval of Small Stock Magazine. He also stated that Small Stock would print and furnish free of charge, any envelopes and paper needed for soliciting such material. A brief history of the past Special Dutch issues of Small Stock was given by Tom Shufflebotham and Jerry Leisenring. During the discussion which followed it was brought out that there was still a small supply of the last Special issue left and these were now in the hands of Russell Hall, Publicity Director. The question was raised as to the best method of disposing of this present supply by Mr. Leisenring. It was suggested by Tom Shufflebotham that these should be mailed to all persons requesting information on Dutch rabbits and perhaps to all new members. The thought was that perhaps the Educational Committee Chairman might be in a position to make the best use of these copies.

Bill Summers asked for the floor and made a motion that the necessary stpes should be taken to reduce the minimum weight of Dutch from $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 pounds. This created a very lively discussion, the two principle arguments on this subject were: Those for the change maintained that it was necessary to keep a small buck in order to prevent a gradual increase in the size of the breed and it didn't seem right to bar such small animals from the shows. The argument against reducing the weight limit was that does that were bound to result from such a reduction in the size were poor mothers, being difficult to breed and having very small litters which they did not raise very well. It was also felt that if it were permitted to show 3 pound Dutch, we would soon be finding that many of our Dutch would be decreasing in size until we would find ourselves with altogether too many 2 3/4 pound Dutch. The motion was amended to read that the subject should be brought before the American Dutch Standards Committee to be worked out and oresented for action via a written, mailed beallot. It was explained that by this action, it would be possible for the Standards

Committee to instigate such action for presentation to the general membership for such a vote, but we were barred by the American Rabbit Breeders Ass'n. from making any drastic changes in our Standard before the time of the issuance of a new ARBA Book of Standards which would be in 1965. Pat Herman asked for the floor and remarked that it had been his observation that few if any Dutch were being produced at this time, to fit the Standard we now have, so he wondered just what the purpose was in instigating a change at this time, rather than working to meet the present Standard. After a great deal of heated discussion, the motion was seconded by Hulda Ohlemacher and put to a vote, count of which showed 13 for and 8 against. Carried.

There was a motion by Pat Herman, seconded by Clinton Dennis that the Dutch Reporter should be used as a medium of presentation of ballots when the time came for a membership vote on the subject. The motion was withdrawn when it was explained that it was out of order due to the fact that the previous motion allowed only for instigation of proceedure for presentation by the American Dutch Rabbit Club Standards Committee.

Al Herman asked for the floor and presented the problem of our Gray Dutch. It was bothering him, along with several other members present that there was so much discrepancy in the judging of Grays under the present Standard. Walter Cook said that he had been consistantly showing his Grays and one show would find them placed and in the next show they might all be disqualified. Mr. Bickley asked for the floor as Chamirman of the American Dutch Standard Committee, and explained that because of the small response he had received when he asked for opinions as to just what was desired in Gray Dutch, it had been his feeling that the membership had been satisfied with the Standard as it is now written, so he had taken no action on writing a new standard for Grays. Don Guthrie made the suggestion that a letter be written to Dick Parker, President of the American Rabbit Breeders Ass'n., asking him if the ARBA Standards Committee's offer made at St. Paul in 1956 regarding this Standard still held and if it did, action should be taken accordingly. It was pointed out that no change could be made effective until time of publication of the next ARBA Book of Standards in 1965.

A report of the Ways and Means Committee was made by the committee's chairman, Clinton Dennis. He reported that he had looked into the matter of Dutch decals and had found that these were available for about 18¢ apiece. He also reported on his investigation of decorative stamps with our Dutch emblem on them and had found that these could be obtained for approximately \$4.00 per thousand. Discussion showed that the membership present were in favor of obtaining these two items through our Publicity Department for use before the Ft. Worth Convention. Mr. Dennis also recommended that we raise the price of our Dutch Reporter ads from \$2.00 for the single breeder ad and \$4.00 for the double breeder card to \$3.00 for the single and \$5.00 for the double. A motion was made by Clinton Dennis, seconded by Tom Shufflebotham that the price of advertising be raised as recommended, with a stipulation being made that President Bayliss appoint area representatives for the purpose of securing additional advertising for the Dutch Reporter, said appointments to be made by July 1, 1960. Carried.

There was a motion by Tom Shufflebotham, seconded by Mr. Leisenring that we arrange for the purchase, through the Publicity Director, of 500 Decals and 5,000 stamps for resale to the membership. Carried.

Wm. Stedman asked for the floor and stated that he thought the American Dutch Rabbit Club was overlooking a good maney making proposition by ignoring the possibility of furnishing leg bands, such as those used by the British Rabbit Clubs for sale to the membership. There was considerable discussion on this subject during which time it was brought up that such a practice might be not only frowned upon by the American Rabbit Breeders Ass'n. but might be forbidden. It was brought out that this item had proven quite a money maker for the Pigeon fanciers in America. A motion was made by Pat Herman, seconded by Al Herman that this club should explore the possibilities of such a venture. Carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:00 P.M. on a motion by Roger Eich, seconded by Wm.

Stedman. Carried.

WATS & MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

Many times this little fat man has pulled up to a well laden table of excellent food but the good ladies that prepared the banquet at Harper, Iowa must have had me specifically in mind. Never in my years of rabbit raising have I been fed so abundantly at a rabbit banquet—and real rabbit, too. The show was a rousing success in all respects and those of you who were unable to attend really missed something.

Your Ways and Means Committee has been active since the first of the year in a sincere effort to come up with something that could relieve the American Dutch Rabbit Club Treasury. We have been loosing ground for several years and have reached the point where we are having difficulty in keeping our h ead above water.

It was first suggested that we should raise the amount of the sweepstake sanction but we determined that we are charging as much as any of the other clubs at this time and did not feel that we should use this method to raise any more money than the actual cost to the club. Upon investigation we found that we are now netting approximately 35ϕ on each sanction so we recommended that we leave the sweepstake sanction like it is.

For a number of years the Dutch Reporter has been costing the club above the revenue it brings in. We ascertained that this amounted to approximately \$25.00 per month. In view of increased costs of postage, paper and supplies we felt that the advertising rate should be increased, so we recommended to the meeting at Harper that the rates be increased from \$2.00 to \$3.00 for a breeder ad and from \$4.00 to \$5.00 for a double breeder ad. This was accepted by the club at the meeting at Harper. We realized that with the present amount of advertising we cannot break even on the Dutch Reporter even at the increased rate, therefore we suggested that our president appoint area representatives to sell advertising in the Dutch Reporter and this was approved. Our President has assured me that he would carry out this proposal. Now Dutch Breeders we can raise rates and appoint people but we have to have cooperation from the breeders in order to make this thing go. Many people say they have

no dutch for sale but do you know of any better way to support your club and promote your breed? Would you be willing to see the Dutch Reporter cut from its present outstanding position because of lack of funds? You people who write asking about rabbits might help by simply stating that you saw the ad in the Dutch Reporter - you people that have other breeds can certainly benefit from including the remark that you have these other breeds. I find that many times Dutch breeders refer their friends that are interested in other breeds to me because they have been informed by my ad in the Dutch Reporter that I do have other breeds. Let's all get behind this program and make the Dutch Reporter really self-supporting and relieve our treasury of this drain.

Actually, if we can make the Dutch Reporter self-supporting, our treasury should be in good shape before long, however we felt that we should come up with something new to promote our breed and insure our reputation as a live wire club. Your committee recommended two items at Harper and both were accepted. First we are going to have made up 500 Decal transfers which will be similar in design to our shoulder patches, and will be suitable for placing on automobiles, carrying cases, etc., or any other smooth surface. This will be the first specialty club that I know of to have such an item and we believe it will be effective at least for a short while. Secondly, we are going to have printed a number of stickers which can be obtained in large numbers at a very nominal cost and are suitable for placing on correspondence, decorations on any paper material for banquets, etc. This is not a new idea in rabbit circles, but has been successful for other clubs and we felt that it could make us a little money every year almost indefinately. I hope that some of our breeders will write articles that will give us all ideas as to how they use these stickers and thereby promote the sale.

A number of breeders have suggested that perhaps we could raffle something off and make some quick money. This has been used by other clubs and successfully. We would like to have your thoughts about this. Also any other ideas that you have as to how we could benefit our club and particularly how can we raise money. You send your idea in and we will try to work up a really constructive report for the Fort Worth meeting.

YOU CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH

THE DUTCH RABBIT IN FLORIDA

by James D. Collins

(Ed.'s Note: The following article was copied from the April issue of FLASH NEWS the bulletin of the Florida State Dutch Rabbit Club.)

"Fun in the Sun". These four little words make up one of the most frequently used Florida Publicity slogans. And it can very well be used in promoting the interest in the breeding of the Dutch rabbit in the State of Florida,

To begin with we must have fun with our rabbits and we all know we get plenty of

sun. That warm sunshine is what brought most of us to Florida.

For the fun part of this topic, I have never known a successful breeder of any kind of livestock that did not enjoy working with his favorite breed. We rabbit breeders are very fortunate in having the Dutch rabbit to work with. Its striking contrast in colors and its precise markings are undoubtedly a thing of great beauty. The perfect Dutch, to the best of my knowledge and belief, has yet to be bred and we all have an interesting goal to achieve in producing a near perfect specimen. We can always strive towards this goal and although we don't make it this year we can try, try again and in the meantime we hope to win in open competition and produce better animals than we did last year. And from a fanciers point of view, we do not have to wait until they mature to cull them. They can be culled at birth (as in the case of extra large litters) or most surely at fryer size.

Secondly, the Sun Element, comes into the commercial phase of rabbit producing in the State of Florida, I, for one, am a converted New Zealand breeder. I first bred New Zealand Reds nearly fifty years ago in my native State of Massachusetts. Since my advent in Florida I developed a winning strain of New Zealand Whites (which were also the processors delight). The only trouble was the processors wanted a steady year round supply of fryers and I just couldn't get summer litters. From May to October the conception rate of my herd was nearly nil. I investigated other breeds and strains and discovered that most other breeders were having the same trouble with the larger or "so-called" meat breeds of rabbits. Also, as the Florida show season is mostly in the winter months, it left me without a strong string of junior and 6 to 8 months show stock. I was advised to try "Dutch" and from the very beginning my does produced, even in the hottest months of the summer. My records showed my Dutch

does were producing more pounds of meat, annyally, than were my "meat-breed" does and on less feed. In addition to this our processors were paying a premium for Dutch

frvers.

Needless to say, I am now exclusively in "Dutch" (Chbcolates, by choice). It is unnecesary for me to write of the many other advantages Dutch rabbits have over the heavier breeds, in the south, as you all have read about these facts, as so ably reviewed by Judge Oliver Milliken.

But one word of warning, do not be "sold on" "Toy Dutch". Our standard weights are from $3\frac{1}{2}$ to $5\frac{1}{2}$ pounds. Buy stock or breed up your own stock to the full $5\frac{1}{2}$ pound maximum. The breeders of the heavier breeds never breed for the minimum weights so

why should we?


