

SECRETARY'S CHIT_CHAT

Just a couple of matters to be brought to your attention this month -- many of the club secretaries or show secretaries are putting off to the last minute, before the shows, in writing for show sanctions. Some of the requests arrive at this office with far less than the 60 days specified in our show rules, before the opening of the show. Under the rules, sanctions for these shows COULD be denied, however this would not only create much ill-feeling, as by the time the sanction has been applied for, most of the catalogs have either already gone to press, or have even been delivered back by the printer, and contain the information that the show is a Dutch Sweepstake Show. If sanction were denied, many of our members might show under these false pretenses and be angry, not only at the show committee, but also be irked at this office for having denied the sanction. Failure of the local club secretary to apply before the 60 day deadline works an unfair disadvantage on ADRC members whose only way of knowing of the show would be through the listing in the Dutch Reporter. They may be new exhibitors, or for some other reason not on the local club's mailing list and if they do not know about the show and its being a Dutch Sweepstake might not write for a catalog, thus cutting down the competition for those exhibitors who had first hand information. I know that ours is not the only Specialty Club which requests that sanctions be applied for at least 60 days prior to the opening date of the show, and for the good of your show, please, you ADRC members who are members of local clubs, stress the importance of early requests for sanction by your secretary. Remember, the deadline for inclusion in the next month's Dutch Reporter is the 15th. of the preceeding month, and although sometimes material received after the date can be included, this is not always true.

I would also like to remind you again that the deadline for requesting the 1962 National Dutch Show is approaching very rapidly. Have you done more than talk about it? If not, better get that information together and get copies off to all officers of the ADRC before June 1, 1961.

In the April issue President Bayliss requested views of the membership, for publication in the May issue, on his message in the April issue. As you can see, response to this request is practically nil. These changes ARE GOING TO COME UP FOR A VOTE by the membership, and if you have not presented your viewpoint for the rest of the membership to consider, you can blame no one but yourself if the final vote

1961 NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW

When you visit Colorado Springs, Colorado, May 15-16-17th. for the National Dutch

Show there are many famous, fabulous, beautiful places to see.

In Colorado Springs one can go through the Van Briggle Art Pottery and see "Throwing on the Potter's Wheel". It is an art 2,600 years old. Read Jermiah 18-3 in your Bible. There is no charge for this. Or visit through the "Pioneer's Museum", or "The Colorado Springs Fine Art Center", or "The Garden of the Gods". See Moonbeam, Indian Princess Mummy, 300 years old. Her costume, leather trimmed, are trimmed with Florentine glass beeds of the 16th. century. Mon., Wed. and Fri. a Chuck Wagon Dinner is held in the Garden of the Gods. They serve 700 people in 20 minutes, \$1.75 for adults and \$1.00 for children.

The only completely lighted Canon and Waterfall in the world is the "Seven Falls". It is ten minutes from downtown. The grave of Helen Hunt Jackson is here. See "The Pillars of Hercules, Wrestling Bears, Setting Turkey, all made by "Old Mother Nature". Feed the chipmunks. There are two stairways to reach, one of 290 steps takes you to the summit of the mountain along the Falls. The other to "Eagles Nest" where all Seven Falls may be seen at once. I can be reached by another stairway up the south

wall or by way of an incline cable car for those who cannot climb.

Visit "North Pole, Colo.", "Santa's Workshop" at the foot of Pikes Peak. Santa has a chapel here. "Mother Hubard's Cupboard" is never bare. Its a unique refreshment area. Children love "The Puppet Show". See Santa's Post Office, his workshop, his sleigh, bed and desk. Pet his reindeer, and other friendly animals, goats and ponies. See Santa's helpers at work as his toy makers. See Glass Blowers, Plastic Craftsmen, Leather workers, doll makers, puppeteers. Laugh at his gnomes, elves, storybook characters all in beautiful, unique costumes. Ride in his sleigh, or in a real Wild West Stagecoach, minature train, or best of all "Santa's Magic Mine Ride".

Before you leave, scrape a little snow or ice off "The North Pole" itself, which is always frozen, even on the hottest days. It is open daily from May 14th. to June 1st., from 9:00 A.M. to 4 P.M. There is also a wishing well in which visitors drop coins to help Santa care for the poor and orphaned children. Santa's friends provide huge planes in which he flies to countless towns and cities in America bringing toys

to airports where children greet him and see the Gnomes unload the toys.

The top of "Pikes Peak", named for Capt. Zebulon M. Pike, of the United States Army, who made an unseccessful attempt to climb it in 1806. On July 14, 1820, Dr. Edwin James and two men of Major Long's expedition made the first recorded ascent. There is a toll charge because of the necessity of removing seven million cubic feet of snow yearly, in the spring. The peak rises from 7,391 feet at Cascade to 14,110 feet at the summit. All toll receipts are used for maintenance and improvement of and along the road. Colorado needs your help to prevent forest fires. Use your ashtray. It is illegal to throw pipe ashes, cigar stubs or cigarette stubs out of car windows.

Overnight camping is not allowed on the city watershed. Elsewhere, build fires only in fireplaces which have been built for campers and tourists convenience. Be sure your campfires are out and grind out cigar and cigarette stuble in a patch of

bare gravel.

If you don't care to drive to the top of Pike's Peak, you may travel up in a Plexiglas coach Diesel Electric Train. You may take a bus marked "Manitou" from Colorado Springs and change at Soda Springs to the Cog Road Bus that runs to Cog Station. Leave Colorado Springs at 8:10 for the morning trip or 1:10 for the afternoon trip. You may drive your car to where parking is free while the trip is made.

Coupon and prepaid ticket orders honored at our Colorado Springs office, including bus fares, both directions between Colorado Springs and Manitou Springs, Cog Stateion.

Pike's Peak Round Trip \$5.50, adults, Children \$2.50 plus Federal tax.

Manitou Springs attractions are "Pike's Peak Ghost Town", a full size old western metropolis, where pioneers traded and had their fun. See President Roosevelt's \$35,000 Bullet-Proof Car. See the 1903 Cadillac, 1906 Buick, 1908 Maxwell and other early-day horseless carriages. See the King of Portugal's \$31,000 Rolls Royce, see the general store, the saloon, man in jail, Well's Fargo Office with its 1860 stage-coach, old newspaper office, old-fashioned home — all buildings furnished from the pioneer days of the west.

There is the Mt. Manitou Incline, seen by Cog Road, there are Burrow which may be rented. I had so much fun once riding a Burro to "The Cave of the Winds", which lies deep beneath the majestic Rocky Mountains. Before the age of man "The Cave" was sculptured by roaring underground waters. They fashioned caverns, pathways, tunnels, and alcoves deep into the mountain's heart. There are 19 separate rooms, "Canopy Hall", "Crystal Palace", Majestic Hall", Bridal Chamber", The Valley of Dreams" and

many more.

While in Manitou don't miss "The Cliff Dwellings". It is in Phantom Canyon, between the "Garden of the Gods" and Manitou Springs on El Paso Blvd. The Cliff Dwellings date back to 1019 A.D. and extending to 1273 A.D. Here are homes of prehistoric aboriginal civilation, their forts, kivas, towers and sacred places. You may explore them room by room. In Tewa House, bodies of Cliff Dwellers, pottery, weapons, burial urns, artifacts, etc., may be viewed.

If you like, you may go by train or drive to the Royal Gorge, which is located between Pueblo and Colorado Springs, close to Canyon City, or take a train through the Gorge on the World's Steepest Railway, which has never had a passenger accident.

If you go by car, you may take an incline R'ilway which will drop you to the floor of the canyon where the "Little Papoose" is. There is a hanging bridge over the Gorge. Drive over, stop, look over, or walk over through the avenue of State Flags. Dine at the Cliff Terrace Cafe. The "Angel's Trail" skirts the very rim of the Gorge. "The Cactus House" will mail native flowering cactus and rock specimens anywhere in the United States. Entrance fee at Main Gate of Park, includes round trip on bridge, access to all Park facilities such as Angel Walk, Point Sublime, etc., adults \$1.00, children under 12, 50¢, children under seven, free. Free parking anywhere in park area.

The Hanging Bridge of the Rio Grand Railroad is unique in railroad history. At this point the sheer walls of "The Royal Gorge" are so narrow the railroad is suspen-

ded over the Ankansas River on the world famous hanging bridge.

If you like to ski, there is the Ski Broadmoor. If you intend to ski, bring warm clothing — otherwise it will be "Springtime in the Rockies" when we see you for THE NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW WHICH IS READY FOR YOU! If you don't see me, it will be because I couldn't make it. I have had two weeks of sinus, two weeks of bronchitis, a heart attack, hospitalization, all of which ran into twelve weeks.

IF I WERE TO START AGAIN IN DUTCH

We have heard some folks asy, "The best is the cheapest in the long run", and I believe that statement is true when applied to Dutch rabbits, if used in the highest sense of the words. I will explain what I mean, below. Formerly I was of the opinion that I could buy fairly good stock and raise my own Dutch, improving as I went along. Just how many months or years do you think it would take? That would depend upon the quality of stock started in with.

First and foremost should be good type, color, and markings. Each of these three things, alone, can be large problems. Good type should be a "must" when purchasing new stock. Color also is important. Markings should be good, and they cannot be controlled as well as the first two characteristics. But, as the English say, "What you put in must come out", so in purchasing stock if you buy from a person who has been breeding over a period of years, he would have a good idea as to the background

of each animal and what sort of young to expect.

Other qualities necessary in new stock which many do not think of at first, is the ability to produce young at any time of year, to be good mothers, gentle to young and not "ornery" to the breeder, raise litters of at least four, withstand rapid weather changes and dampness, also heat.

You can, by rigid culling, produce rabbits to meet all or most all of the above qualifications, but only after years of painstaking work. For myself, I'd rather pay more cash for my start by purchasing stock from an experienced old-timer who had already eliminated all or many of the undesirable qualities.

(This is not "bally-hoo". I have no stock for sale.)

WHAT CHANGES?

This is written for the purpose of directing a course of proceedure for the future. It seems that the membership is crying out for a By-Law change to take the load off the secretary's shoulders. Well, perhaps it's a good idea and no one takes this job to make money, for if they did there are many jobs around that pay better for far less work.

I propose a change for breaking up the load into four sections, plus a special section which is somewhat in effect now, but which no one seems to bother about.

- 1. GENERAL SECRETARY to take charge of and record the new and re-newal member-ships with the following rewards: for a new membership the secretary will receive 10% of the membership fee. On renewals the secretary will receive 5%. This secretary will be known as the recording secretary or official club secretary.
- 2. PUBLICITY SECRETARY to take charge of any and all publicity items or otherwise the club desires to sell. This is the only function as this is quite a load in itself, but is not anything like 100 hours a month, which is a great load.
- 3. SWEEPSTAKE AND SANCTION SECRETARY to take charge of issuing all sweepstakes reports and sanctions for any and all shows, desiring to comply with the rules and regulations of the A.D.R.C. To also compile all points and record same in a legible manner.
- 4. ADVERTISING AND EDITORIAL SECRETARY to handle all incoming advertising and editorials. To also keep a record of the duration of advertisments and enlist the help of the State Dutch Club's secretaries for furnishing club news and editorials (educational) that this club or that club has found out.
- 5. PUBLISHING SECRETARY the above secretaries to hand in, on or before, a specific time each month, all correspondence, reports or otherwise, to be used by the publishing secretary. Her or his only job to be the actual stenciling, arranging, mimeographing and mailing of the information obtained.

The above jobs had at one time or another been part of one secretary's job. I believe the directors could take over all of the jobs and should be appointed by our president. To be a director of our club is a great privilege, but has little or no work required of it. The committees named do not do their jobs, with one exception. How many of the directors or committeemen write articles expressing their thoughts on various subjects? God only knows that the majority of them know more about Dutch than I and many more of us do. I for one, think that these committees should be revised as they just aren't doing the job.

This gray Dutch problem is a mess and has been for more than 20 years. I suggested 1/2 year ago that someone really put their finger on it and get the general concensus of the problem, then GET IT DONE or put it into writting, finally that it is an undercut or it isn't an undercut. I'm tired of this pushing, on one another, a certain subject that should be resolved BY A COMMITTEE and stuck to.

REGISTERED DUTCH?

Occasionaly we read articles in the Reporter and other publications urging us to register our Dutch with the ARBA, and sometimes we are criticized because there are

so few Dutch registered compared to other breeds. I think there is a good reason for

this and would like to explain why I think so.

A few years ago I decided to build up a small herd of red, white and blue registered Dutch. I registered all my breeders that would register and butchered the others. As soon as I had a few youngsters that would register with a red seal on the certificate I again butchered the older ones.

The next step was a generation with a red and white seal on the certificate. After about three years time and a good many dollars of expense I had ten does and two bucks that were registered red, white and blue. But soon I realized what I had done. By keeping only rabbits with markings that would register, I had sacrificed type! I was getting rabbits with type more like a minature Checkered Giant than a Dutch. Besides losing the type, I was getting about as many mismarked youngsters in my litters as I had originally. Now I have reversed my program. I am keeping only breeders with good type and color even though they are mismarked.

Type -- either good or bad will produce itself more cinsistantly than will markings and mismarked breeders will produce about as many good marked young as a pair of

almost perfect marked ones.

Now, I know that our Guide Book places 50 points on markings and 35 points on other features with only 15 points on type, but I contend that if we do not have type we do not have a Dutch. I know from experience how hard it is to put youngsters with almost perfect markings into the meat pen just because he is a little long and rangy and keep one for a breeder that is disqualified because of markings but does have good type. But I am convinced that it has to be done to consistantly produce the kind of Dutch we all admire on the show table.

Maybe good Dutch can be raised and bred to produce red, white and blue stock gen-

eration after generation, but I failed to do so.

individually so that each may stand on its own merits.

DUTCHENG TIPS

There is an old saying - "once in Dutch, always in Dutch" - and this returns forcefully to mind when I start remembering. Thinking of the Special Issue of Small Stock coming out in June, I find the biggest majority of those interested in the Dutch vancy 25 years ago are still active. Reviewing the first edition I find these well-known names appearing - president, John Furrer; vice president, Charles O. Lewis, still an active member and active breeder; Matt Welling, secretary-treasurer, still living but not active in Dutch affairs; the directors were Jim Blyth whom we all know is still alive and very active; Robert M. Scott, one of the old school who is no longer with us but who has left a capable son to carry on in his place, Judge Robert Scott, Jr. who is well known to many of us; "Gillie" Gilbert is another who has passed on, but whose work in the Dutch Club still carries influence; other directors were H. G. Puffer who used to show some of the best, and Harold Brear of Detroit - both of these at present out of the fancy.

At that time George Bayliss, who is at present our president, was secretary-treasurer of the California Dutch Club; among that club's members then were Bob Sprague who is still active in Dutch circles as a breeder and a judge, and Herbert Eldridge who I imagine would be one of the oldest breeder-judges and fanciers. Also a member of the CDC was Judge O. F. Goetel. I, too, was on the board of directors of the ADRC at that time and it was Squeak and myself who had the honor of putting the first specBal Dutch edition in the hands of the Small Stock editorial staff. Time certainly flies but the friendships made through the Dutch club fancy seem to live forever!

Scanning the list of authors of the articles appearing in the first issue we find that after 25 years we still have many of the early members who can weild an effective pen and who are freely dispersing their know-how and knoledge to all who will listen. We find "Chocolate Dutch" by Chas. O. Lewis; "The Attractive Dutch" by Judge Goetel; "That Dutch Spirit" by Judge Eldridge; "The Judging of Dutch" by Tom Shufflebotham; "Breeding Dutch in Winter" by Ben Swinbourne of Scotland (Ben, by the way, had just left our shores to return to his native Scotland); "Raising Dutch" by D. F. Strickland (all of the old timers will remember the Strickland Brothers who for a while were unbeatable); "One Dutch Breeder to Another" by Geo. Bayliss; "Suggestions for Breeding Dutch" by Judge W. H. Kennedy (although Bill is today better known for his Polish, he was then very active in the Dutch Club and was as much responsible as anyone for the reorganization of the club in 1934. Other articles were Gillies' "In Memoriam" by H. C. Gilbert; "Tortoise Dutch and Their Color" by Chas. Williams; "Improve the Dutch Head" by Jim Blyth; an article by G. E. Mitchel of England, "Comparison of the B.D.C. and the A.D.C. Standards". Of course there were several other well-written, interesting and educational articles by other breeders - those noted were done only to point out the merit of the old sayings "You Can't Beat The Dutch" and "Once in Dutch, always in Dutch".

After re-reading all special editions and devouring them word by word, I still find them very interesting and stimulating. I hope that I am here to review several future editions. I trust that you are each giving Mel Emery the help he needs to make this issue as outstanding as those of the past - I know he has many interesting and educational articles lined up, but there is still room for more.

I have been known to have several brainstorms in the past regarding fancy interests and can feel one coming on now - would it be worth while to publish articles each month from the past special issues of Small Stock? I think many of these articles are as pertinent today as they were when written and should provide good reading for both old and new members.
