

AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB
Minutes -- General Meeting
Bakersfield, California - April 20, 1963

The general meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by President George Bayliss at 9:00 P.M. following the Banquet at the Farm Bureau Hall in Bakersfield, Calif. The roll call of officers found the following present: President Bayliss, Secretary-Treasurer, Jessie Weinhardt and Director Tom Shufflebotham. Absent were: Vice-President, Melvin Emery, Directors, Bill Summers, E. R. Parks, W. C. Stedman, Roger Eich and Don Reid.

Minutes of the previous meeting were suspended as they had been published in the

Dutch Reporter.

The officers present had nothing to report.

A complete report was given on the new Guide Book by chairman Tom Shufflebotham. He stated that the cooperation of his committee, especially Bill Summers and the membership had been very gratifying and that a total of \$1,200 had been collected with a few commercial ads to be paid upon receipt of copy, which should put our new Guide Book well in the black. A delay had been created by a strike in the plant producing the color plates, but these had now been shipped and should be in the hands of the printer when he returned to Indiana. After proof-reading and O.K. ing of copy the completion of the book should move along rapidly and it should be ready for mailing in a matter of weeks after his return home.

The Publicity Director, Mrs. Shufflebotham, reported that the new order of arm patches she had ordered had now been delivered and were available for sale at this show and she expected the larger back patches would be on hand on her return home. She was filling her back-log of orders for arm patches at the old price of \$1.00 each or 2 for \$1.50. The supply of stamps is running low, but more would be ordered real soon. The booth space for the ARBA Convention at Sedalia had been contracted for and our Club's ad in the Convention catalog had been placed. The financial report of this committee was presented. It was also reported that an oil painting of a Dutch Rabbit had been delivered to her here and tickets were on sale. A drawing would be held during this show and another painting ordered for Sedalia.

The subject of a permanent solution to the lack of funds for the Publicity Dep't. was discussed and Mr. Bayliss reported that one of the recommendations he had re-

ceived from the Board was for the allotment of either 121% of all memberships collected and $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all sweepstake fees be set aside for this purpose, or 25% of all sweepstake fees. (Either of these systems would provide approximately the same amount during a year's time.) The question was raised by Fred Cremer as to whether the Board had the power to establish such an allotment, and he was informed that their power was limited to assignment of funds on a temporary basis only.

There was a motion by Tom Shufflebotham, seconded by Fred Cremer that $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all dues and $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all sweepstake fees be allocated to the Publicity Department and be

paid on a quarterly basis. The motion carried with one dissenting vote.

Further discussion brought out the fact that such action in this meeting could be counteracted at a subsequent meeting so another motion was made by Mr. Weinhardt, seconded by Elmer Paquette that the question with regard to allocation of funds as expressed in the above motion be placed on the June, 1963 ballot. Carried.

A motion by Fred Cremer. seconded by R. Herschbach that repayment of the recent loan of \$250.00 to the Publicity Department from the general fund be cancelled.

Carried.

Considerable time was spent discussing the change in form of publishing show reports in the Dutch Reporter. It was brought out that feeling in this matter was running very high with the majority of the membership expressing an opinion on the subject feeling very violently against the new form. It was brought out that those members present at this meeting could vote for a change back to the old form, but then it could be changed again by a like group at a future meeting, but if the subject were voted on with a written ballot then the only way to change it again would be by a future written ballot. With this in mind a motion was made by Elmer Paquette, seconded by Dorothy Bayliss that this item also be placed on the June, 1963 ballot. Carried.

A recess of 10 minutes was called for a coffee break and when the meeting resumed the chairman took the opportunity to express his and the American Dutch Rabbit Club's thanks to the California Dutch Rabbit Club for their efforts on behalf of the American

Dutch Rabbit Club and for their fine attendance at this meeting.

There being no further business a motion was made by Fred Cremer, seconded by Wm. Weinhardt that the meeting be adjourned. Carried. Meeting adjourned at 10:30 P.M. Respectfully submitted,

PREPARING, CONDITIONING, and GROOMING for SHOW

The successful exhibiting of Dutch starts, of course, with an animal having the markings, type, and color of a potential winning exhibit. The appearance of any animal, and a possible improvement in his placement, can be helped to some extent by a little outside heop from the exhibitor. Some of the things which can help the animal present a better appearance will, I hope, be outlined in what promises to be a short article.

I might add, the grooming of a Dutch for show requires no special magic, tool kit, surgical instruments or beauty aids. This is not an article on faking — the animal still must have the necessary natural endowments present at birth.

PREPARATION:

The preparation of a show specimen comes, of necessity first in the order of events prior to the successful exhibition of any animal. This initial step begins with the time of weaning and separation of the young potential winner. Essentially, this step consists of training your Dutch in show table manners — a fractious animal, expecially in the hands of an impatient judge, can suffer a penalty in his placement merely because the judge is unable to examine and appreciate his good points.

Two or three times a week, or oftener, your Dutch should be placed on a covered table and calmed by gentle handling and stroking. After he has been gradually accustomed to handling and being lifted for examination, the next step is to teach him to

remain in a fixed position in a typical Dutch pose.

If you experience difficulty in getting your animal to remain in position, or even place him in position, I have found that placing my hand over his eyes, and stroking his back and hindquarters, will allow the initial placement. When he has settled down, remove the hand from the eyes and, with the fingers, stroke his head gently, with the grain of the fur, between the eyes.

Once you have the animal gentled to the point where he remains posed for an appreciable length of time, you can further his education by adding a couple of more rabbits

to the table. Once you have him trained, it's a good idea to continue handling once or twice a week from then on.

CONDITIONING:

The condition of a rabbit on the show table, aside from normal moult, is a reflection of the owner's management. I have found that little is required for proper conditioning beyond ordinary good care in most cases. I feed individual animals a regular commercial rabbit pellet in a quantity that will be cleaned up in a twelve hour period. A couple of mornings a week, in my rounds of feeding the does and litters, I give the singles a handful of hay. Once or twice a week, for rabbits intended for showing, I'll sprinkle about a tablespoonful of horse feed on top of the pellets. This is a commercial horse feed which, besides its basic grain mix, contains molasses and, most importantly, linseed meal. It's the linseed meal which will help in putting a little additional bloom on the coat. Be careful in feeding this horse feed as the molasses will sometimes act as a laxative — keep the quantity small.

In my perusal of "Fur and Feather" I find the English breeders make quite a thing of conditioning for show — while never having tried their methods, I'll pass some of the practices along for what they are worth. They very firmly believe in feeding a mash once or twice a week, particularly to nursing does and rabbits being conditioned for show. This mash is usually prepared of equal parts of whole oats and rolled oats, 1/3 part barley (crushed or rolled), and 1/3 part wheat. This is moistened with water and enough bran is added to make the mixture crumbly and not sloppy. For show animals the mixture is sometimes moistened with mikk instead of water, and an egg and some linseed meal (in small quantity) is added to the mixture. I believe if I were going to make a mash I would use the horse feed along with rolled oats instead of the grain mixture and dry this off with bran.

GROOMING:

The actual grooming of the rabbit is a simple operation and is helped considerably if the rabbit is kept clean to begin with. Our most successful exhibitor beds his rabbits on serval covered with a layer of straw. We both believe that the straw acts as a natural grooming agent in adding some polish to the coat.

Many times, when bedding on sawdust or serval — as I do, it becomes apparent that dust has collected in the coat and tends to dull the color. In this event, I give the rabbit a good brushing with an old military hair brush to remove the dust particles. After the brushing I give a good hand grooming against the grain of the coat. The coat should now be fairly clean and the "slicking" up can now begin.

The actual finish grooming is done with slightly moistened hands -- I spit in mine; everyone to his own choice. The grooming with the moistened hands is done from the head back to the tail, and a fairly good pressure is applied in the grooming -- enough so that the animal tends to slide backwards.

The belly, chest and crotch should be combed out with the fine end of a regular comb -- this will remove dead and wooly type hairs from these areas. The finishing touches to the whole grooming operations are performed by a final wiping with a silk cloth. When uncrating at the show, a quick dry-hand grooming will leave the animal fit for the table.

SHOULD WE INBREED?

We all probably have read articles on the breeding of animals, and when it comes to rabbits or Dutch in particular, the writer advises the beginner not to try inbreeding.

The reason for that is that the bad points of both parents and ancestors will be bred into the young and cause much disappointment. These authors advise out-breeding.

I will admit that if animals with the same faults are bred together, that the progeny probably will inherit them. But what of the good points? They also apply. Have you ever noticed how wind animals breed? They don't hunt all around trying to find an unrelated mate. Take foxes for instance -- they look pretty much alike.

In starting, the breeder should have stock with as good type and color as possible, which can be fixed into his strain. Even breeding brother and sister together can be

done, if not carried on indefinitely. "Cousin Breeding" has been tried with success, advocated by Alan Sole (Feb., 1963 Dutch Reporter).

If a beginner in raising Dutch buys some from this breeder and some from that breeder, then starts inbreeding them right away he can see by the results the bad points he has acquired, also the good points. If they are too bad he can dispose of them at once. When they are not too bad, by selective inbreeding and close culling he can purify his stock and improve the herd. An improved her is what we all want, and to do it we have to stick with it.

It was no fault of the committee that the rabbits and members did not appear -- they gave it their utmost and we owe each and everyone of them a rousing vote of thanks for the many hours of preparation they put into the planning and execution of the show. I know that one of the most anticipated experiences of any National Dutch Shows is the opportunity for the local exhibitors to enter their rabbits against those from other parts of the country, in competition which they do not ordinarily meet in the general run of their local shows. For various unknown reasons this experience was denied the breeders in the California area and I am sure it was highly disappointing to the majority of them. It is one thing to take credit for a winning in a National Dutch Show, but I feel sure that much of the luster is lost from such a winning when the competition is no different from last week's local show. The breeders in any given area know pretty well how their rabbits stack up against the fellow's in the next county or across the state line, but the general purpose of a National Show is to bring in competition which they do not ordinarily meet. A winning in that sort of competition is far more satisfying and I, at least, am very sorry that things did not work out for our California members along these lines.

We did see some very good Dutch and the winners definitely deserved their awards, but how much more thrilling it could have been had their been more entries from other parts of the country. Of course rail express over any great distance would have proven not only expensive but rather hazardous, due to the length of time on the road. We took one of our own babies out, in an especially built light-weight aluminum crate -- she went on the same jet with us -- only about six hours on the trip and the cost was only \$5.72. I realize that most of us couldn't ship any great number of rabbits in this manner, but how much did it cost you for gas and oil to go to that last show in your own state? If just half of our members had shipped only THEIR VERY BEST DUTCH in this manner, think what it would have meant to the show committee and the other exhibitors at Bakersfield? In fact a shipped in rabbit did win Best Opposite Dutch!

You will note in the minutes of the meeting that the membership present at Bakers-field voted to have the question of the new form of the show reports placed on the ballot in June, giving each and every member an opportunity to express his desires as to how future reports will be published. Many of you have already spent time and postage in writing me, mincing no words as to how you feel about them, now you have an opportunity to really do something about it in a way that can be counted. It is always appreciated when the membership opens up and expresses themselves on any subject with which they are either in agreement or have an argument with and the fact that so many of you have proven you are ACTIVE members by expressing your opinions is

deeply appreciated by all of your officers. At least we are not stumbling in the dark and you will ALL have an opportunity to have a voice in the final decision.

Along this same line I would like to state that I have received many more letters and articles expressing opinions on the subject, but after the action at Bakersfield, I feel that we can use the pages of your Dutch Reporter to much better advantage than by publishing any more of them. How about concentrating on something of a constructive nature to help your fellow members do a better job of raising Dutch? We never have too many articles of this nature; and we can always use more ads to keep your Dutch Reporter coming to you.
