"BITS AND PIECES"

In the Secretarys' Message, I tried to explain that the Dutch Reporter was really late this issue; little did I know just how late it would be! I've decided to take this additional space to try to explain the new equipment.

The ADRC is now the proud owner of both a stencil cutter and newer model mimeograph. They have only been here for a week and learning to run them both is like learning to read all over again. They're really not that complicated, (I hope) but it will take some getting used to. The stencil cutter will be able to cut photographs and pieces of artwork to help dress up the Dutch Reporter, but will take a little time to learn the exact setting for the type of photograph that you are using. Black & white photos are the best quality to use. They should have enough lighting and not have any really dark background as it tends to make the photo extremely dark. Color photos, as are used for the 1983 NDS pix, are not very good. However, you are saving the "last" year price of \$100.00 per page at the printer. As time goes on, I'm sure I will learn more about both pieces of equipment. The mimeograph has an automatic feedboard, power inking, ink control by dialing, right, left, middle and full inking, print positioning by dialing, a programming counter and an automatic jogging receiving tray. (I hope you understood all of the above because I'm still not sure how it all works; - I know where the on and off is). I have discovered that I can't type a sheet without leaving a fairly decent margin. This is one thing I have learned for the next issue. (It's too bad that I didn't find it out before doing this one). In any case, I do hope that you understand the circumstances behind the lateness of the May-June D.R.

Dick Gehr, sweepstakes chairman, and I have had the pleasure of talking with many of the ADRC members in the past few weeks - some at a couple of the local shows and some by phone. After explaining about the D.R., it was sure nice to know that they were looking forward to receiving it but didn't mind the wait. I promise that it will not become a habit! For those of you who may not know me personally, I would like to state clearly that I do not take my responsibility to the ADRC and it's members lightly!

I would also like a little more of this space to URGE you to VOTE! The final ballots will be mailed on or about the first of August, along with the July/August issue of the Dutch Reporter. President's Message

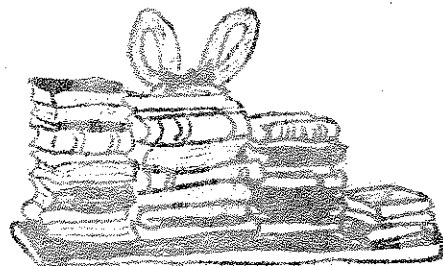

My sincere congratulations are extended to Carl Decker for winning "the big prize" in the open with a Chocolate senior buck and to Kristine McDonald for winning best of breed in the youth with a Chocolate junior buck. I saw Carl and Gary figuring their points all day long. The final decision came in the Chocolate junior buck class. Hey, how about that Seller's Class? For any of you who didn't stick around to see it, sure missed an exciting auction. Tom Dietrich, Lynn Shaw, Bill Campbell, and Al Miller did an outstanding job consigning several fine rabbits for the sale. From the efforts of our auctioneer, Bill Campbell, and the chief buyer, Bill Lorenz, along with the concerted efforts of the hard-working Seller's Class committee, the auction was the biggest sales event in Dutch Club history. The results of the seller's class are printed elsewhere in the reporter, be sure to study the results. It proves that when quality animals are offered for sale, there are plenty of buyers willing to pay top dollar. A BIG THANK YOU goes out to all the sellers, buyers, contending bidders, and of course, the Seller's Class committee.

The 1984 National Dutch Show will be held in Portland, Oregon, "City of Roses" on April 27, 28, 29. The Northwest Dutch Rabbit Club did a very professional job in preparing the bid for the '84 NDS. Excerpts from the



bid appear in the Dutch Reporter for your information. I am looking forward to travelling to Portland and attending the 1984 National Dutch Show. Let's keep those nest boxes full for Portland.

The next big show event for Dutch breeders is the A.R.B.A. Convention in Colorado Springs, Colorado October 30 through November 3, 1983. The Antlers Hotel is the headquarters and show location but several Dutch breeders are staying at the Motel 6 in Colorado Springs. I am looking forward to a large, high-quality entry of Dutch. So, keep those does bred and winners coming.

Jack Wireman volunteered to be the official American Dutch Rabbit Club historian. Jack has compiled several interesting bits of Dutch Club history. If you would like to contribute to the preservation of the birth and growth of the American Dutch Rabbit Club, please correspond directly with Jack.

Another very important item which needs our attention is an upcoming issue of "Rabbits" magazine dedicated to our Dutch rabbit. The August issue of "Rabbits" is designated for Dutch. This is a golden opportunity to show off our breed. I'm PROUD I raise Dutch, how about you? All materials relating to promoting our breed in the "Rabbits" magazine should be forwarded directly to "Rabbits", Countryside Publications, Ltd., 312 Portland Road, Highway 19 East, Waterloo, Wisconsin 53594 in care of Al Lunde, editor. The notice I have given is short, since copy deadline is July 10, 1983. This gives us a chance for some "free" advertisement for Dutch. So, I'm making this call-out for all you Dutch breeders and promoters to participate in this special issue of "Rabbits."

Dick Gehr has been appointed Chairman of the A.D.R.C. Constitution and By-Laws committee. This committee chaired by Dick will work on updating and suggesting changes for improvements in the Constitution. Some of the present articles comprising the current constitution need clarification in order that the entire membership knows how the Dutch Club works. One constitution change already submitted to the membership present at the 1983 NDS deals with the allocation of funds to the two annual shows. You will all get an opportunity to read more about the proposed change as it appears in the minutes of the meetings held at the National Dutch Show. Ballotting on this constitutional change will be issued in conjunction with the election of officers.

In closing, DO NOT forget to send in your article and/or ad copy to Norma for the new guidebook. This guidebook has the potential of being the best ever. I am looking forward to significant contributions from young and old Dutch breeders. Take the DUTCH CHALLENGE!

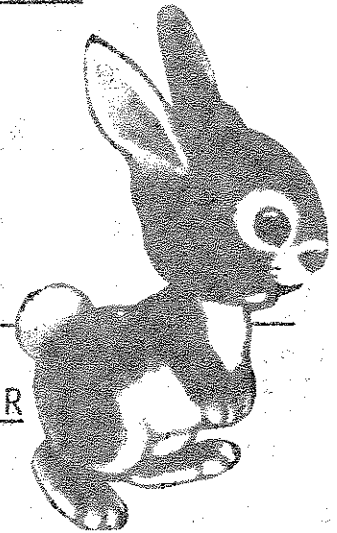
Let's all get ready for Portland, Oregon in '84 - April 27-29. If they give a show like the bid they sent in, well, LOOK OUT! It should be a really good one!

Finally having enough time to review our National Dutch Show at Canton, some important observations were in evidence.

First off, Jack Wireman must be a man who wears many hats successfully. I know that there were many others who contributed, and we all thank you for your 20 hour days.

As I was standing next to two well known breeders watching the judging, one volunteered that there were a lot of Dutch with pinched hindquarters while the other man agreed. Watching for a couple of classes, I also agreed in that about 50 Dutch judged, or observed, about one half were in various degrees of pinch. Many looked well marked with "neat" looking fur. Fortunately the judge I was watching slowly worked them out of contention. According to our ARBA standard, a slight misalignment is a fault

whereby a large deviation is a disqualification. It is rare that an animal is disqualified for this generic fault and generally, up to now, they (if everything else was good) did win. A congratulation to our judges at this National Dutch Show!

Have recently written a letter to a new judge who earlier this month, when asked while judging about the Dutch in front of this judge who were cow-hocked, the judge answered, "this is a characteristic of the Dutch Breed".

When I heard of this, the new judge must be taught what our Dutch standard calls for and we demand their competence. Many of us have destroyed well marked, furred, good upper typed animals because we did not want this "stigma" wrapped around our breed. I sometimes wonder who the new judge (not all) study under or take their internship from. Perhaps all of us should help, but please, after the judging is over! We will aid as auxiliary instructors because our hobby and sometimes our blood is in these Dutch.

In any case, thank you Ohio State Dutch Club and the one judges moral obligation to righteousness (did not really observe the other judge) and to Al Butler's contribution to a real Dutch youth learning experience.

Remember, if we all care a little bit, it will get better as we get older! (Dutch that is!)

SECRETARY'S MESSAGE

Special remembrances of another great show have now been added to those already on file within our minds and hearts. Many renewed old friendships and discussed ole' times, while some made new ones and thought about the future. The only sad thing about events like this is that there is never enough time to really get to enjoy those fine Dutch people that we only see once or twice a year. Maybe our thoughts should start to work on a remedy for this situation!

Let's look over the schedule of past National Dutch Shows: Most try to have their animals cooped on Friday evening although it may be impossible for others to arrive until very early the next morning. This is the time that most are getting settled into their motel rooms, having a bite to eat and trying to rest up from what is most usually a long drive. If you are an ADRC Board Member, you're trying to get the above accomplished & make the meeting that is usually slated for this time. I've only been fortunate to make two of these, but both have gone on until quite a late hour. This leaves no time for visiting! Judging starts at 8:00 A.M. Saturday and other than a slight recess for lunch, goes on until it's completion. Immediately following the judging is the "Sellers' Class", an event that many of us look forward to. This year, this class offered quite a selection of fine animals within a variety of price ranges. It enabled everyone to purchase excellent quality stock regardless of the size of your pocketbook. The youth "Sellers' Class" was an added attraction this year and I, for one, was extremely pleased with the participation among the youth. There were some animals entered in that class that many probably hated to part with. In any case, the Committee for this class rendered a job very well done!

The banquet is usually held around 6:30 P.M. and most all attend. By the time the judging is completed, we're usually immediately into the "Sellers' Class". Upon completion of this class, we have approximately thirty minutes to go back to our motels, get showered and changed and arrive at the banquet on time. (I haven't accomplished this yet!). Immediately following the banquet is the presentation of the awards. This should not be omitted! These wins have usually come from many years of perfection along with many hours being spent in the caring for this special breed. The winners should be recognized and applauded! We now enter into the open meeting; - Has anyone the time? Getting started into this part of the schedule is usually around 9 or 9:30 P.M. and many are quite tired and have lost their interest. Possibly saying that they've lost interest isn't really the best choice of words; what has happened is that they are too tired to care, and we may not get as much accomplished as we should have. Sunday morning: - already? Our rabbits are released and goodbyes are said. Where has the weekend gone? I know that I did not have enough time to visit with many that I had really looked forward to and it may be another year before I see them again. Will each of the other weekends go by equally as fast? I believe that we should start looking for a remedy!

Some possible thoughts; - - - adding an additional judge should the entries exceed X amount of Dutch. This would enable us to have our Dutch judged and still have plenty of time to enjoy the "Sellers' Class". We would then have ample time to enjoy the show in it's entirety along with some extra time for visiting. We would also be able to make the banquet a little less winded. Another possibility is only having the banquet and awards after the completion of the show. We could get a good nights' rest and be at the showroom at 7:00 A.M. Sunday morning for the General Membership Meeting. We may all be a little more alert at this time and I really don't think that getting started around 9 or 9:30 A.M. would really make that much difference to anyone. These are only suggestions! What I feel we should be trying to improve on is making our most important weekend of the year more relaxing and enjoyable for all. Having it over before you know it, and before you can make new acquaintances and renew old friendships, isn't really what I've looked forward to all year. The ADRC is always open for suggestions on anything that may improve the American Dutch Rabbit Club and the NDS.

I'm sure that you have already noted that your Dutch Reporter has arrived "LATE"! This is due to several different circumstances. I was awaiting the developed pictures from the '83 NDS, the nomination results, promised articles and new office equipment. I now have all. The ADRC has purchased a stencil cutter and mimeograph machine that we were in need of. The new mimeograph does not have a drum as did our old. This means that we have less ink all over, our impressions from our stencil are cut much better (we have no blotch from an ink pad, as one isn't used), we have no drum to unplug and none to possibly have to replace or repair. It has a jogging paper receiver so I don't have to worry about the paper stacking correctly and makes it considerably easier for running the other side. (It is already stacked neatly). It has an automatic inker that allows you to ink a full page, half page, side page or middle when needed. The machine is not new, but it's NICE! With the stencil cutter, I am now able to put pictures in the DR at any time. You must realize that the quality will not be as that of the printer, but a lot less expensive! I'm going to try to make our own stationary and envelopes as the machine is supposed to be able to handle this. This would save us considerable fees. At the present, I drive to Bloomington, IL., (the ARBA Office) and pick up our mimeograph paper. This is about a 150 mile round trip for me, but I get to visit the office and talk with our ARBA Secretary and is well worth the time. The trip is of no expense to the ADRC and the savings on paper (white) is approximately \$12.00 per case. I was told that if I am able to do the club envelopes, they will also be able to be purchased through the ARBA office at a savings. Whatever may be needed is ordered in along with the ARBA's order at a considerable amount of savings to our organization. We wish to thank the ARBA for this service. Should you prefer, your articles can be sent to me "neatly" typed as you would like to see them appear in the DR. This way, I do not have to retype them. I can put them on the stencil cutter and your original will be transferred to the stencil. It is through the efforts and consideration of your club's officers that the above improvements were made possible.

Elsewhere in this issue you will find the nomination results. It's hard to believe that out of our entire membership (adult) that only 123 ballots were cast; 604 ballots were mailed out. The turnout percentage of ballots cast is quite low! The final ballots will be mailed out on or about August 1st. Please take the time to VOTE!!

The 1982 - 83 sweepstake year has now come to a close. All outstanding show reports must be filed with this office by July 25th, for a final sweepstakes tally and publication in the July/August issue of the DR. The sweepstakes came to an end with the close of the 1983 NDS. Therefore, any show that was held before, and including this date, will have about ten weeks to get their reports in to be counted. Not all those that I have in at this time are being printed in this issue. There are over one hundred printed and I've got quite a few left to do. It is impossible to print them all in this issue. Only those that are printed are included in your point standings. The remainder will be counted in the final total.

I talked with Dr. Terry Reed, ARBA President, at a local show a few weeks ago. He informed me that he and his wife were donating an afghan for Best of Breed Dutch at the ARBA Convention in Colorado Springs. It looks like Mrs. Reed is going to be very busy in the coming months and I'm sure that all of her hard work will not go unnoticed.

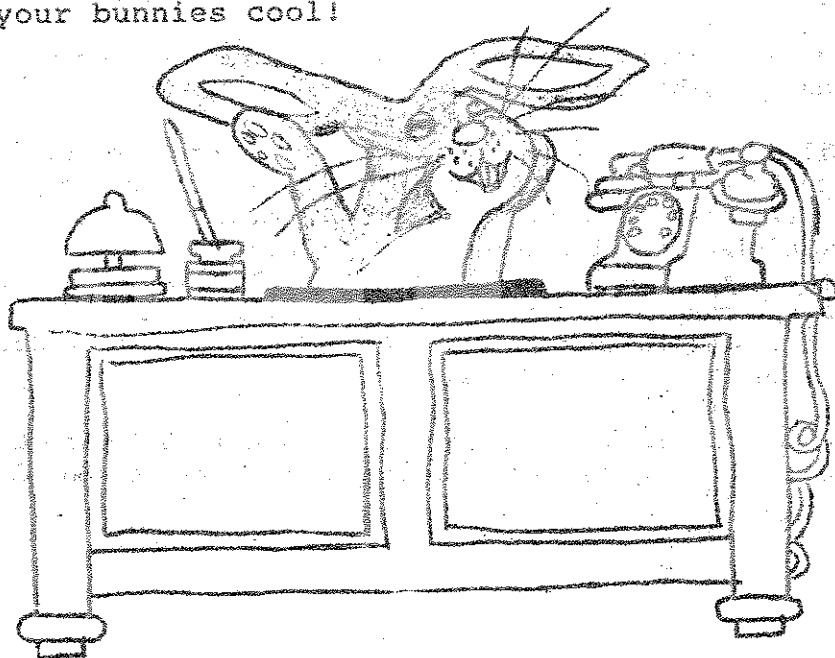

"MINUTES OF THE 1983 BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING"

CANTON, OHIO
MAY 6, 1983

The ADRC Board of Directors meeting was called to order by President Scott Williamson in Canton, Ohio, May 6, 1983 at 8:20 P.M. Officers answering roll were; President Williamson, Vice-President Wireman, Directors Geitzenauer, Gioielli, Carlton, Williamson, Dietrich, and Secretary/Treasurer Hart. Directors Watters was absent. A motion was made by Director Geitzenauer and seconded by Vice-president Wireman that the reading of the previous meeting be dispensed with as they were published in the Dutch Reporter. M.C.

A report on the financial condition of the ADRC was given by the the Secretary/Treasurer. Director Carlton made a motion, 2nd. by Vice-President Wireman that we accept the report. President Williamson then appointed an audit committee of Roger Eich, Myrl Milhahn and Director Carlton.

Officer Reports:

Director Williamson stated that some of the judging of Dutch is confusing to the youth. Judges seem to be reading the standard differently. He also reported that the quality of the Dutch in the youth has gone up considerably.

Director Carlton stated that the attendance at shows is up when certain judges are obtained. He says that the placing of animals is still questionable among some judges. He stated that a Dutch can be "Best in Show" one day and first off the table the next. Director Geitzenauer reports that many of the youth in his area prefer to show in the open class. The Dutch exhibited at the local shows tend to be between 70-110. He also stated that the ARBA should be carefully examining the judges to be certain that they are still capable of performing their duty.

Director Wireman says that Dutch are down in some areas. Some of the older breeders aren't getting out as much as they used to. He stated that the youth seem to be showing a little more interest but some still prefer to show in open competition.

Director Gioielli reports that there are quite a few youth in her area but the clubs don't care to obtain ARBA youth sanctions.

Director Dietrich states that Michigan has a strong youth group although the amount being shown is somewhat down.

President Williamson stated that the ARBA is currently moving on a program to improve the judging system. There could possibly be a re-evaluation of judges in the future.

Al Butler gave a report on the financial condition of the Publicity Department. Some new items may possibly be introduced in the near future.

Director Williamson gave a report on the youth regarding comment sheets that will be given out to each youth member asking their opinion on the youth programs to be initiated. These comment sheets will be published in the Dutch Reporter and all youth members are advised to fill them out and return to the youth chairman. At the present, the youth program has been self supportive. Director Geitzenauer suggested that because of the scarce population in some areas, we regionalize the youth sweepstakes according to Districts as does the ARBA. It was recommendation of the Board to the Youth Committee that this be done.

Director Dietrich gave a report on the new Seller's Class rules. Director Gioielli made a motion, 2nd. by Vice-President Wireman that the Board approve these rules. M.C.

The bid for the 1984 N.D.S. was submitted by the Northwest Dutch Rabbit Club for April 27-29, 1984 in Portland, Oregon. A motion to accept the bid was made by Director Gioielli and seconded by Director Carlton. M.C.

Director Geitzenauer suggested that we select a club historian. President Williamson appointed Vice-President Wireman to that position.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee was appointed by the President with Dick Gehr as Chairman along with Bill Geitzenauer and Jack Wireman. Everyone will be informed of the proposed changes and those that are already in effect and not printed in the present guide-book.

President Williamson gave a brief Audit Committee report with a recommendation that a set allotment be given the sponsors of the N.D.S. for specials along with a set amount towards Dutch at each ARBA Convention. Director Williamson moved to accept the Audit Committee's report and recommendations; it was seconded by Director Gioielli. M.C.

There was an extensive discussion on the Gray color and clarifications needed in the Dutch standard. Director Geitzenauer received letters all in favor of the brown-gray. The membership will be addressed on this matter and the color of gray to be written up and presented to them for their approval.

Quality points were discussed. Director Carlton made a motion, seconded by Director Geitzenauer these not be permitted. M.C. Director Geitzenauer made a motion, 2nd. by Director Dietrich that the points be doubled at ARBA Conventions and Nation Dutch Shows to encourage larger entries. 7 yeas - 1 abstain

A motion was made by Director Carlton and seconded by Director Williamson that the sweep-stake awards be clarified in the rules to read: Top ten in open to receive an appropriate award and 6-10 to receive a special ribbon. The top five in youth to receive an appropriate award and 6-10 a special ribbon. M.C.

A letter was read from Mike Lovejoy suggesting that Dave Holland be awarded a life membership in the ADRC. Motion to accept the recommendation by Jack Wireman and seconded by Barbara Gioielli. M.C.

Wilbur Williamson suggested we check on additional equipment needed to benefit the publishing of the club newsletter, the "Dutch Reporter." Approved.

The Yorkshire Dutch Rabbit Club in England donated rosettes to be presented to the winners at the 1983 National Dutch Show. Director Gioielli made a motion, 2nd. by Director Geitzenauer we reciprocate the gesture. M.C.

A motion was made by Vice-President Wireman and 2nd. by Director Carlton that the Best of the colors be picked by both judges with the final decision being that of the senior judge. M.C.

Director Carlton made a motion to adjourn, 2nd. by Director Dietrich.

"MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING, 1983 NDS"
CANTON, OHIO

The meeting of the general membership was opened by President Scott Williamson at the 1983 NDS, Canton, Ohio, May 7th. at 9:30 P.M. All officers were present with the exception of Director Watters. There was a motion by Al Butler and 2nd. by Wenton Carlton that the reading of the previous meeting be dispensed with as they were published in the Dutch Reporter. M.C.

The minutes of the Board of Directors meeting were read and a brief treasurers' report was given. A motion was made by Steve Wireman and 2nd. by Mark Pecaric that they be accepted. M.C. President Williamson then asked for a brief report of committees:

Director Williamson introduced those responsible for the youth program and it's progress. Williamson stated that the youth need to be kept busy with something that will prove beneficial to them. The youth membership has grown considerably. Director Williamson donated six books entitled, "Reach out for a New Life". A short drawing was held with six youth receiving a copy of the book.

Al Butler gave a report on the Publicity Department and possible introduction of a few new items. He also stated that booth space for the 1983 ARBA Convention in Colorado had been reserved.

President Williamson asked for an audit report: Roger Eich of the audit committee stated that the books were in excellent condition with the availability of cross-checking all invoices. The audit committee suggested the possibility of raising the NDS allotment to \$500.00. They also suggested that due to the condition of the books and the ability to cross check all monies, the secretary be able to break down the percentages at the end of each month instead of on a daily basis.

Director Dietrich gave a report on the "Seller's Class" that brought in \$145.00 in the youth and \$1432.50 in the open; a total of \$1577.50 This is believed to have been the best ever held by the ADRC. The Seller's Class Committee thanked the sellers and buyers for their quality animals and their support! They wish to express a special thank you to Bill Lorenz for his excellent support of this class!

The Northwest Dutch Rabbit Club were very well organized in their bid for the 1984 NDS. The bid was accepted and the '84 NDS will be held in Portland, Oregon, April 27-29.

President Williamson reappointed Dick Gehr as Sweepstake Chairman. Mr. Gehr had a current sweepstake standing available for the membership. Mr. Gehr was thanked for a job well done.

In new business, a motion was made and unanimously passed by the Board to double all sweepstake points at the ARBA Conventions and National Dutch Shows. This is a show and sweepstake rule and is not in the Constitution and By-Laws. This is to take effect with the 1983 ARBA Convention.

Discussion was held on the allocating of a specific amount of funds to the Dutch specials at the ARBA Conventions and National Dutch Shows. Possible fixed amounts for open and youth with the ADRC matching "collected" specials up to a certain amount! This would be a Constitutional change and would require approval of a majority membership vote. The Constitution Committee is to work on possible needed changes to present to the membership.

A cash collection was taken up for the 1984 NDS with \$137.46 being collected.

Nathan Frisby of Kentucky questioned the proper color of the Gray Dutch. He made a recommendation that the description of the proper color of the Gray be printed in the Dutch Reporter. The membership can then express their views on what they feel should be the correct color.

He stated that the brown-gray description by Al Meir is the preferred color with the majority being shown in this color category. He stated that this situation should be corrected as soon as possible. President Williamson stated that it was not possible to have this matter settled so as to be completely satisfactory with all, however, action would be taken as soon as possible to avoid any further confusion. Mr. Frisby stated that he would help whenever it was possible. Due to the lateness of the hour, the meeting then went on to a short discussion by Tom Shufflebotham on Gray Dutch, the Standard Committee and the distribution of double points at the NDS and ABEA Conventions.

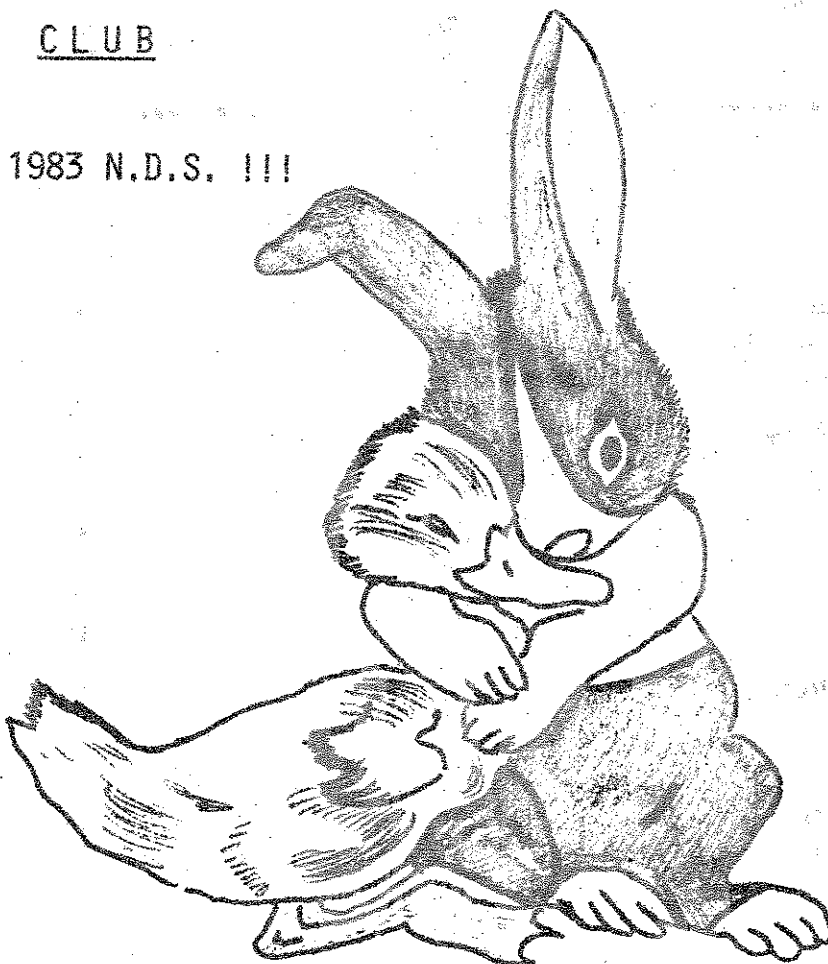
President Williamson entertained a motion to adjourn. The motion was made by Alan Miller and seconded by Steve Wireman. M.C.

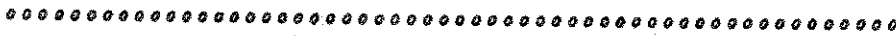

Editor's Note* READ ON !

"Introducing the BROWN GRAY" by Scott A. Williamson

Gray color has currently become an issue but has been a long standing problem in the Dutch fancy. In an effort to unify Gray breeders selection efforts, a new description of Gray has been formulated by the A.D.R.C. Standard Committee. Before the new color description can be submitted to the American Rabbit Breeder's Association Standard Committee, it must first be approved by the membership of the American Dutch Rabbit Club. With this in mind, the election ballot will contain a section for the membership to vote on the change in color description for the gray variety. The proposed change will read as follows:

BROWN GRAY - The brown gray is to have an agouti coat, showing distinct bands of color when the fur is parted. The color of the fur at the base of the hairshaft to be slate blue, followed by a straw colored band, next a thin band of black, finished by a chestnut brown tipping to the undercoat. The entire body, head, ears, topside of tail, and hind feet comprising the agouticolor should be interspersed with an even distribution of black guard hairs. The broadest ring should be the base, followed by the intermediate straw-colored band, finishing with a balanced width between the black ring and chestnut brown tipping. Failure to show ring color over the back and rump and down the sides would be cause for disqualification. Narrow black lacing on the ears is desirable. Eye circles should be narrow and straw colored. The belly color should be a white or cream surface color with a slate blue under color extending from inside the rear legs over the belly to the undercut. When not showing on the surface color of the belly, the undercut is determined by blowing into the fur. The slate blue undercolor will then determine the placement and shape of the undercut. The topside of the tail must match the body color with the underside of the tail to be the same as the belly color. Eyes-dark brown.

THE TRIGGER

By Bill Geitzenauer

About a year ago, the statement was made by a long time Dutch breeder that breeding was done by finding combinations and not by genetic reasoning or deductables. This has kind of irked me that perhaps after 33 years I have been wrong and all my friends were too.

Well, it is a Saturday afternoon and I decided to investigate. Having kept records since 1958, (25 years) I have concluded that the following appear to be true when going back thru them:

1. When bred, using inbreeding techniques of trying to eliminate a weakness on one of the related participants, it was found that about 40% of the litter did not have the weakness.
2. When out crossing or using two participants that were not related or previously bred for a certain quality, the result was about only 15% did not have the weakness bred for.
3. In the above #2, the 85% did, in fact, show up 2 extra weaknesses that were not present in my original line but surfaced during the chance breeding.

From this, I at least can conclude that close breeding or following genetically one line thru the process of inbreeding must then enhance the chance of eliminating a fault without having one or more surface.

It is probably true that there is a chance of producing an excellent combination of Dutch into a litter of kits that are highly desireable, but, would not venture a guess on the odds.

Have also traced the out cross combinations in the past 25 years and found that I have purchased for myself a total of 8 rabbits from 6 different breeders. The first time these were bred into my line they produced no show animals, but kept some out of each litter that looked like good breeders. When these grew up and were bred to my line or back to the purchased animals, they did (all but one my record shows) produce a more consistent litter in which at least one was good show and up to 5 were at least "fair" show. Again proof that just plain "chance" breeding, ignoring genetics, or hoping for a combination without the effort of combining like a good chemist will probably, or most probably, produce nice Easter rabbits.

The Trigger, con't.....

This little investigation resulted thru record keeping. A pedigree should be able to be traced at least 6 generations with "tough" breeding records that include:

Kindling Date

Stud Used

Characteristics of parents & grand sire/dam

What was desired in the mating

Amount of kits born

Amount of kits weaned

Characteristic of the litter in general, both positive and negative

Without at least 4 of the above 7 facts, I don't know how a breeder of Dutch could ever be called a fancier or master breeder.

Yes, we would all like to mate two Dutch, unrelated, that we picked up cheaply and have 6 show animals in each litter having our "peers" look at us and say "good" boy or girl. It just doesn't happen like that overnight, unless you purchase someone elses' strain which has been worked on and sorted out, probably at a high price! Then what do you have? Why of course, someone elses' strain of Dutch, - not yours of course!

Isn't it about time you pulled the "trigger" and got to it?

DUTCH WEIGHT - GROWTH CHART REQUESTED

Your Education Committee has been forwarded a request originating from John F. Weeks of Orfordville, N.H. John wrote to Norma looking for information on the weights of Dutch covering a period from one week to 6 months. In subsequent correspondence with John, he stated his assumption that such a weight chart would be common information among the breeders of a particular breed. He suggests that such a weight chart could make it possible to estimate the milking ability of the doe as well as presenting another way to judge the quality of a rabbit for use as a breeder.

I do not ever recall seeing or hearing of such information being tabulated for the Dutch breed. Has anyone out there ever compiled such data for their Dutch? If so, we call upon you to share it with your fellow breeders so it can be presented in the Dutch Reporter for the benefit of all. It occurs to us that to be meaningful, such a chart

would have to be carefully documented concerning the adult weight of the particular line of Dutch being recorded. Since the standard allows an approximate 40% variation in adult weight (3½ to 5½ pounds), it is obvious that such information would be meaningless without knowing the targeted adult weight also. Actually, it would appear that several such growth charts would be necessary to fully cover the subject.

Anyone having reliable information on this subject is asked to please contact Norma Hart or myself.

TALKING DUTCH

Back in 1952 when I first started raising Dutch, Black was my favorite color. Since that time, Blues and Chocolates have been added for more challenge and spice.

Type is the most important consideration in developing a strain of show stoppers. It is pitiful to see a well marked, good colored Dutch look so bad when the head is narrow or pointed with cow-hocked, duck footed posterior. Just tears your heart out to know that a fellow fancier can be so far off base.

Regardless of what color you breed, the breeding of Dutch is the same. I prefer saving Dutch with more color (less white) over lack of color. Color must rank second in my book as a "must" before anything but type. Intermixing black and blue has been established without spotted eyes in my rabbitry for some years now. Originally it did play a major role, but by culling hard the spots were eliminated. As to chocolates, they should be bred to chocolate for as long as 5 or 6 generations. Then mixed with black (preferably one with a good percentage of black background or absence of blue) for one generation.

As to markings, keep low cheeked marked Dutch and tight belt, short stopped animals over the opposite. Uneven cheeks mean trouble. Attempt to eliminate unevenness in your breeding program when saving or it will come back to just destroy you. If it is a necessity, keep a slightly high cheeked animal (but never a buck) over one that is uneven if you must save something.

In closing, I must say that it takes time and planning to develop something worth while. It just is not putting two together and hoping it will happen. There must be good points on each participant that counteract the others weak point to produce prime Dutch. Don't forget that the second generation and third generation in back contribute much to the genetic output. Actually, the third generation has consistently proven it contributes heavily on the now product. Here's to better Dutch-----which you just cannot top!

*NOTE I received this letter and would like to share it with the membership. I'm sure that Eric wouldn't mind as it is of interest to everyone. I also wish to thank him for letting us know who took BOS at the Iowa State RBA. Gary Grimm has now been credited with the proper points. Norma....

Dear Friends,

We had a problem that really brought out to us the fact that the ARBA and other clubs should try to help educate veterinarians about rabbits.

My rabbits started dying.; the does with babies and the kindling does. I first thought it was a disease and changed to medicated feed. Then, it occurred to me that the rabbits were not ill, they would be fine and then in two hours...dead! I took five does to have an autopsy performed by the Livestock and Poultry Commission in Little Rock. The pathologist called and told me my rabbits died of lead poisoning.

The pathologist came to see if there was any way lead could be getting to the rabbits besides feed and water. There was none, as we have all wire cages in the barn. We checked the water, feed and hay. I lost over half my herd.

Lead was found in the water and the feed. We had a filter put on the water and we changed feeds. The veterinarian said that he would not have checked for lead had he done the autopsy. This was maybe a one time thing, but had it not been for the Livestock and Poultry Commission running a complete autopsy, we would not know what happened.

Most veterinarians admit that they don't know that much about rabbits. We should work to help them learn. You never know when you may need their help.

(One thing not said is that we must be very careful where we get our hay. Hay grown too close to the road has lead in it due to the leaded gas in cars.)

RABBIT HEALTH

For this issue of the Dutch Reporter, I wanted to write about something that is not really written about or researched in our rabbit world. This article was written in collaboration with Dr. Robert Zemel, DVM, and Dr. Cohen, DVM, of the Windsor Animal Hospital.

What do you do when one of your bucks rips his scrotal sac? This may happen if two bucks are fighting, or he may rip it on a sharp area such as wire, etc. You can tell that it is ripped because the testicle

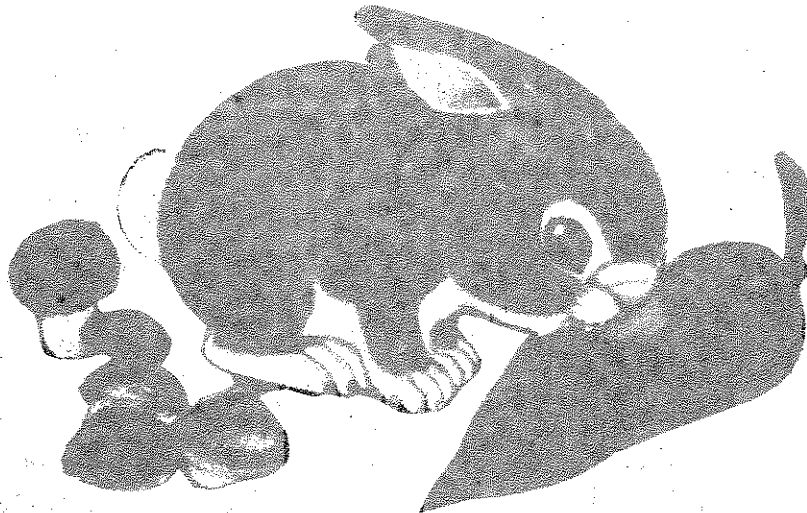

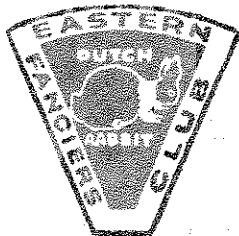
itself will just hang from the animal's body. It will look something like a big earthworm.

The first thing you should do if you want to save the rabbit is take it to the vet. Since the sac is very thin, it is impossible to put stitches in it to try to save the testicle. This is what is involved in removing the testicle:

1. They tranquilize the rabbit according to it's weight. The rabbit is given "Rompon" which is an injectable tranquilizer. It is also given "Ketaset", also a tranquilizer.
2. The testicle is then surgically removed by the vet.
3. After surgery, the vet will give a "Gentocin" injection which is an antibiotic to prevent infection.
4. The rabbit will have to stay there a few hours after the operation for observation and until he comes out of the tranquilizer.
5. You can then bring the rabbit home and give him care there. You should make sure the cage is very clean to prevent any infection. The rabbit would be given an oral antibiotic called "Hetacin-K". The rabbit would also be given "Panoiog" which is an antibiotic ointment to apply to the area where the testicle was removed.
6. You should give the medicines to the rabbit for about a week. Then make an appointment for the vet to check the rabbit to make sure everything is going smoothly.
7. It's very risky when this kind of thing occurs, because rabbits are so prone to infections. Once the rabbit is off the medicines and all of the surgical scars are healed, he can resume a completely normal rabbit life. You can even breed him because the other testicle would still be in tact.
