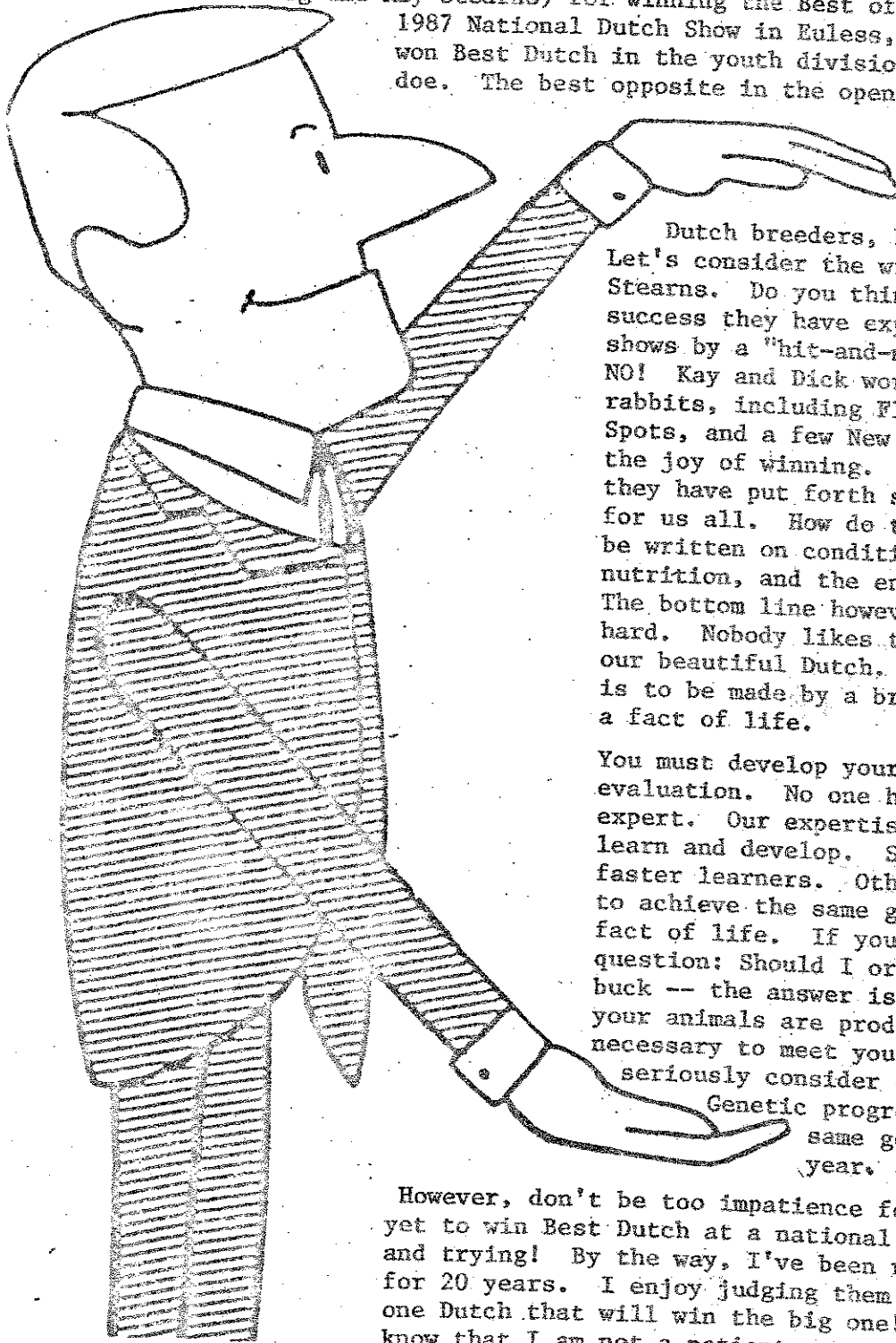

Dutch Breeders -- How do you measure up?

Congratulations are once again extended to the E & S Express (Dick Evenburg and Kay Stearns) for winning the Best of Breed honors at the 1987 National Dutch Show in Euless, Texas. Jim Smith won Best Dutch in the youth division with a Blue senior doe. The best opposite in the open was won by Reggie and Kevin Schull with Mary Maxwell winning B.O.S. in the Youth.



Dutch breeders, how do you measure up? Let's consider the winnings of Evenburg & Stearns. Do you think they accomplished the success they have experienced at the national shows by a "hit-and-miss" breeding program. NO! Kay and Dick work very hard with their rabbits, including Florida Whites, English Spots, and a few New Zealands, to experience the joy of winning. The work and effort that they have put forth should be an inspiration for us all. How do they do it? Volumes could be written on conditioning, housing, breeding, nutrition, and the environment in general. The bottom line however is to CULL and cull hard. Nobody likes to think about killing our beautiful Dutch. But if genetic progress is to be made by a breeder, culling becomes a fact of life.

You must develop your sense of live animal evaluation. No one has ever been born an expert. Our expertise is something that we learn and develop. Some people are better, faster learners. Others have to work harder to achieve the same goals. That is just a fact of life. If you have to ask yourself the question: Should I or shouldn't I cull that buck -- the answer is probably YES. Unless your animals are producing the type of offspring necessary to meet your breeding goals, you should seriously consider culling them from the herd. Genetic progress cannot be made using the same genetic material year after year.

However, don't be too impatient for results to occur. I have yet to win Best Dutch at a national show. But I'm still trying and trying! By the way, I've been raising and breeding Dutch for 20 years. I enjoy judging them and trying to produce that one Dutch that will win the big one! Most of you that know me know that I am not a patient person, so winning the big one must REALLY MEAN A LOT! Keep trying.....

Howdy 'ya all,

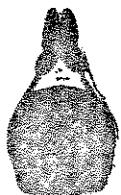
You really missed some wonderful experiences if you weren't able to attend the '87 National Dutch Show in Euless, Texas. While we nor hernalers teased the Texas folks about their cold weather, it was fantastic for the rabbits. It was especially good for those rabbits coming from the state - even as Indiana. The Evenburg and Stearns Express kept on holding and certainly they picked up the Indiana team of Reggie and Kevin Smith. Their rabbits were something but blue, that seemed to be the color choice of the three judges. While the Texas Dutch Club is small in numbers, their hospitality couldn't be beat. We had a large seller's class and some excellent animals were sold for prices much less than they should have brought. The time went to fast but the memories are the BEST. Thanks Texas!

In the last issue of the Dutch Reporter, Director Simonson discussed briefly the confused state that a number of us are in regarding the constitution and by-laws governing the American Dutch Rabbit Club. I would be the first to say that I can not keep up with all of the changes, way to many in my estimation for the good of the club. In the last election every one of the proposed changes were passed, some of which created problems in implementing the desires of the membership. Many of these changes had to be taken to the A.R.B.A. to be sure that the American Dutch Club was not in violation of any rule. As it stands now, anyone can submit and have published changes, and you and I vote on them without the review of our constitution and by-laws committee or any input from the officers and directors. Not all of the proposed changes were well thought out, in fact, those living in Canada have no district representative nor are they able to hold an office. This was not done intentionally but brought to the membership without due time and thought before the vote was taken. Directors Gehr and Simonson have prepared guidelines that hopefully will give us all time to digest proposed changes, allowing the membership time to voice their opinions or ask questions in the Dutch Reporter. Hopefully, it will slow down this constant change of rules to suit one or two peoples' whims. I feel that with fewer and less confusing rules, that our general membership will take more interest, after all, if you aren't able to read Spanish and the paper you are trying to read is in Spanish, how much time are you willing to give to understanding it?

Complaints are only good if they are directed to the right person (s). Many times at the show tables in the midwest, I have heard rabbit breeders complaining about the ARBA rule requiring Jr. bucks to display both testicles. The majority of judges seem to feel the rule is wrong, some therefore, choose to ignore the rule. Others, because that is the ARBA's rule, whether right or wrong, follow the standard as they should. Now is the time, if you feel this rule should be changed to allow junior bucks on the show table without testicles descended to write to: Dr. Terry Reed, P. O. Box 98, Markle, Indiana, 46770 or Glen Carr, P. O. Box 426, Bloomington, Illinois, 61701, and tell them of your thoughts. They are working toward the publication of the 1990 Standard of Perfection and decisions must be made well in advance.

March 7 we attend the Mid Jersey R & C show where about 111 Dutch were shown. Cari Decker of PA took BOB with a jr. chocolate buck and Hero Wolters of NJ got BOS with a black sr. doe. Bill took Best Steel with his jr. doe. Next we went trudging through an unexpected snow storm on March 15 (beware the Ides of March!) to Carroll Co. Maryland where Gary Pace of VA won BOB with a sr. chocolate buck and also BOS with a sr. black doe. There were about 108 Dutch shown that day. At that show I was told that the previous day at the Southern Maryland show there were about 60 Dutch shown and Jack Pugh of MD got BOB with a blue sr. buck and Ricky Wood of VA got BOS with a blue sr. doe.

Our next main event was the National Dutch Show in Texas. The show was put on by the Texas State Club, most of whom were not Dutch breeders. It was an enjoyable, well run show of approximately 324 open and 105 youth. The people were very friendly and hospitable and Bill enjoyed seeing his friends again. I understand the trophies were made by Sharon Reid, who did an outstanding job on the gold leaf plaques. BOB went to Evanburg and Stearns for a jr blue buck and BOS went to the Skulls for a sr blue doe. Both winners are from Indiana. Bill got one of those beautiful plaques for BOS Steel won by his sr doe. Rickey Wood of VA got Best Steel with his senior Steel buck. Unfortunately, Rickey did not make the show due to an auto accident earlier in the week. Our prayers and well wishes go out to him for a speedy recovery.

I, too, enjoyed the show and discussions I had about raising Steel Dutch with some of the breeders. The surprising part of the show for me was that most Dutch breeders do not watch the judging! At Mini Lop shows you'll find us 5 deep at the show table trying to figure out what the judge is looking for. The highlight of the show for me was a visit by Mr. & Mrs. Mini Lop (Clyde and Doris Jones) former Dutch breeders. Their Mini won Best 4-6 Class at the Houston AREA Convention in 1985. They sent me home with a headfull of new concepts about raising Minis. Well enough about Minis - this is a Dutch report.

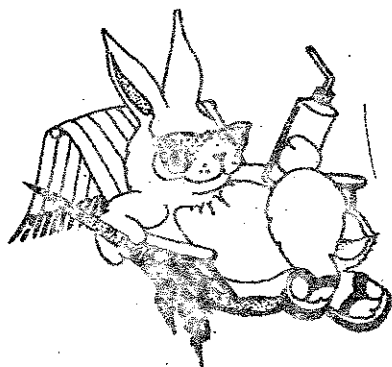
I don't know about anyone else, but I am disturbed with the ruling about bucks having to show both testicles in a normally descended position, or it is an elimination. I judged several animals at the National Dutch Show in Texas that were of excellent quality, and they were what many people refer to as "pocket rabbits". Most of these were does, and if there are does of that quality out there, I would assume there are bucks also. The trouble is, the bucks haven't dropped their testicles at that age yet, thusly preventing them from being shown.

I have written a letter to the ARBA Standard Committee requesting that they reconsider this rule, and try to make some adjustments to it so the small junior bucks are not discriminated against. After all, you can show a doe one-half the size of a buck that doesn't show both testicles, and the doe cannot be eliminated for any sexual reason. I will keep the membership informed on this subject.

The ADRC is in the midst of some alterations with the new Constitution and By-Law changes that were voted on, and I hope the membership will be receptive of these changes. It will take a period of adjustment, so bear with us during this period.

Cow hocks seems to be a major concern within our membership, as well it should be. I have written an article that will appear elsewhere in this issue, and the opinions expressed within it are mine. If you agree or disagree, it would be helpful if you would voice an opinion regarding this serious matter. As Chairman of the Standard Committee, I would like to know areas of concern that we might work on.

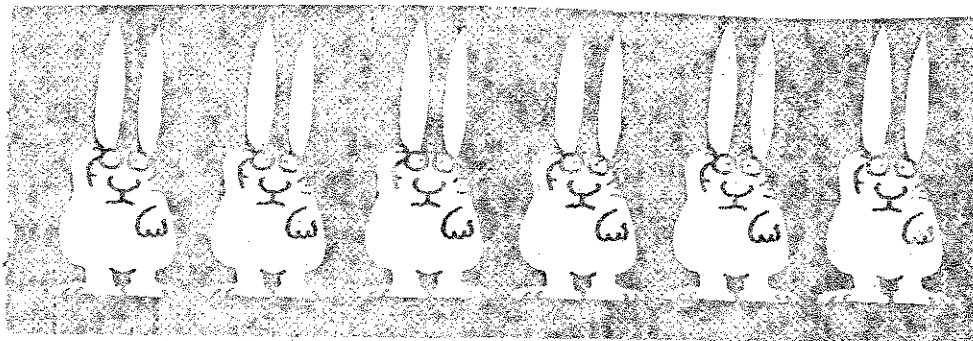

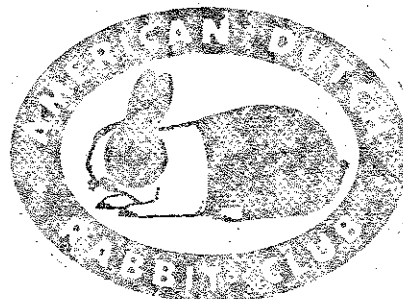

He's definitely on his way to making a mark on 'Rabbitdom'. Many of you know of or have seen Brad Stockmaster from Clyde, Ohio. He and his mother Sue, are active rabbit raisers. Brad attends many 4-H shows, Ohio and neighboring states ARBA shows, as well as attending most ARBA Conventions and National Dutch Shows. He raises all six varieties of Dutch plus a pair of Calico Dutch. Calico Dutch are marked like a Dutch with cheeks, ears and saddle colored like a Harlequin. He purchased a trio at the National Dutch show in Canton, Ohio, from the Dill's.

Brad is extremely active. He attends St. Joseph's Central Catholic High School, is a member of the Boy Scouts of America, on the Freshman Wrestling team and a member of the Plant N' Bloom Jr. Garden Club. He is presently working for the rank of Eagle in the Boy Scouts by helping the local Red Cross blood bank. He also spent last summer helping handicapped boys at a scout camp.

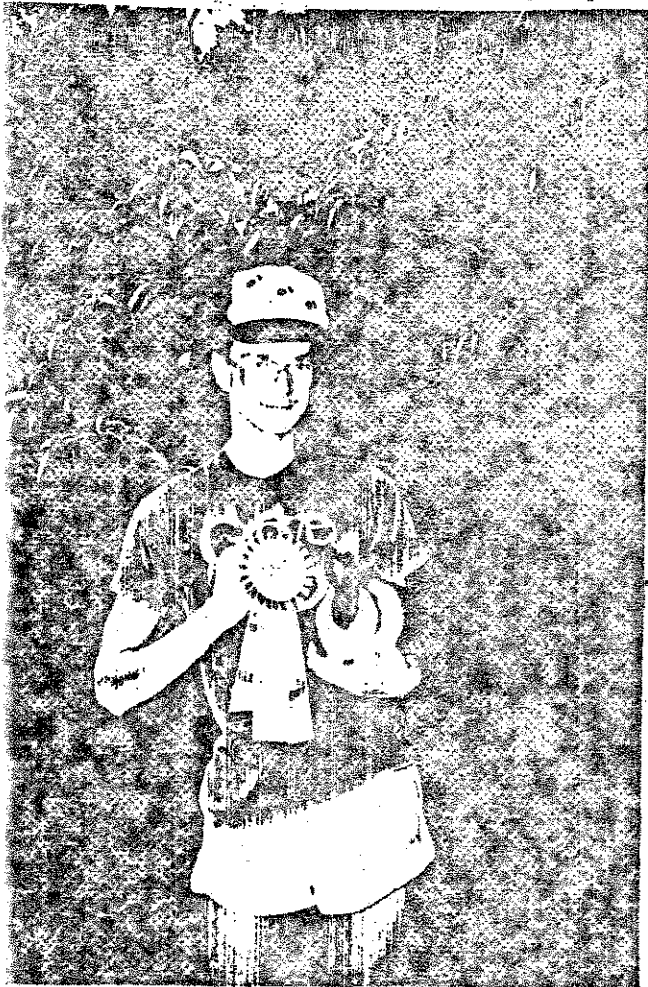
We asked Brad what work you do in the rabbitry. He replied the usual - feeding, cleaning, breeding, etc., but he also explained that he has created a market for fresh rabbit which he sells to two stores. He does the butchering himself, one of two times a month.

Brad, like many breeders of Gray Dutch, feels that while we just went through a change of color with the gray, the judges still do not agree on it and often times judge to their ideal and not the standard. It makes it especially hard to raise the grays and steels, his favorite colors of Dutch. On the subject of Dutch being judged, Brad went on to say that in his area, they still find too many judges pulling the front leg, creating a drag on the undercut. Also he says, "They often miss the blue dots in the eyes."

Brad has compiled an excellent show record with his Dutch. He had Best Blue at Canton (NDS) in '83; Best Blue and Chocolate at Portland (NDS) in '84; Best Steel, Gray & Tortoise at York (NDS) in '85; Best Jr. with a Tort. at Des Moines (NDS) in '86. He also took Best Steel at the ARBA Conv. in Orlando - '84.

Brad was named the winner of the Intermediate Div. of the ADRC Achievement Contest this year in Euless, TX. He had created one of the most attractive covers with an oil painting he drew from a Christmas card. Of course, they were Dutch!





"A lot of judges will miss type completely and just judge on markings", said Ken Preede of Westwood, New Jersey, when asked, "When your Dutch are judged, what is the most common judging fault that a judge misses?"

Ken is 16 years old and attends Westwood High School. He raises Black, Blue, Chocolate, Tortois and Gray Dutch. They keep him busy with 6 breeding does of his own, having ten or more litters this past 9 months. Ken is also involved in basketball, New Jersey District Lutheran Youth Committee, the ADRC Youth Committee and several rabbit organizations, including 4-H. Ken is in the accelerated program in High School and is in the top 10 in his Sophomore class.

In the ADRC Achievement contest, we ask a number of questions about rabbit raising, especially any difficulties they have had in raising Dutch. When we ask Ken, "What is the main problem that you have had in raising Dutch", he said, "Keeping my short stops. We started off by keeping a buck which good but it had long stops. Now I can't get the consistently short stops on my animals that I used to have."

We also asked each of our Senior contestants to give a new breeder three suggestions on how to condition a rabbit for a major show. This was Ken's thoughts on conditioning: "First of all, clean the rabbit and it's fur. I use a mixture of water and white vinegar. This cleans the coat externally and helps condition when the rabbit licks the mixture off. Second, brush the rabbit and get rid of all the loose hairs. This makes the coat thicker and nicer. Finally, I give oats to my rabbits to increase the sheen on their coat. This, with the cleaning of the coat, makes the fur look really nice and also if the texture is there, the rabbit has exceptional fur for the show. At the show I give my rabbits a 'final brushdown' and smooth their coats before I bring them to the table." How many times have you seen a breeder grab a rabbit out of the carrying case, almost drop him on the way to be judged, disturbing the fur and making the markings look poor, only to place lower in a class than maybe he should have. Taking a few extra minutes to groom before placing an animal on the show table is always to your advantage.

Ken is a peppy young man, the kind who is always there to help. For those of you who attended the APBA Convention in Columbus, Ken was one of "the three musketeers" (our ADRC Youth - Dill, Maxwell & Preede) who did such an outstanding job of caring for the Youth Dutch. I'm sure we'll see a lot more of Ken and his Dutch in the next few years.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
1987 NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW, EULESS, TEXAS APRIL 3, 1987

The American Dutch Rabbit Club Board of Directors meeting was called to order at 8:38 PM by President Scott Williamson. Officers present were: President Williamson; Vice-President Dill; Directors Dietrich, Parner, Geitzbauer, Simonson, MacKinnon and Gehr; Secretary-Treasurer Hart. Those officers absent were Directors Billups and Christ.

Marti Dill made a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes from the ARBA Convention in Columbus, Ohio as they were published in the Dutch Reporter. The motion was seconded by Dick Gehr. M.C.

REPORT OF OFFICERS: (none)

Secretary Hart gave a report of the financial status of the American Dutch Rabbit Club. Total funds available all accounts as of March 31, 1987 is \$8489.93. There was a motion made by Tom Dietrich and seconded by Dick Gehr that the Treasurer's report be accepted as read. M.C.

It was stated that two new electronic typewriters have been purchased by the ADRC for use by the Secretary-Treasurer and Dutch Reporter Editor. The Sweepstakes Chairperson also has an electronic typewriter in her possession, making the American Dutch Rabbit Club the owners of three (3) excellent quality pieces of equipment.

Al Butler was on hand to give a report on the Publicity Department. All inventory is 100% paid and total funds available are \$874.58. The Publicity Department is in the process of working on picture illustrations of what this Department has available. President Williamson noted that a special thank you should go out to Barb & Al Butler for their promotion of the ADRC.

Marti Dill gave a report on the Youth Committee. She stated that she was unable to obtain the Quiz Bowl equipment and will attempt to use hand signals as the alternative. She is working with the ARBA in regard to their purchasing this type of equipment for use by Specialty Clubs and for use with the ARBA Youth Contests also.

Discussion was held on the feasibility of sponsoring the youth by the purchase of a \$50.00 savings bond for the \$25.00 fee as publicized. No action was taken on this matter at this time.

A communication was received from Diane Solomon in regard to the breed tapes completed at the ARBA Convention in Columbus, Ohio. A copy of the Dutch tape will be available to the ADRC in the near future for a cost of \$12.00.

Dick Gehr gave a report on the ADRC Standards Committee. He stated that ARBA President Reed has volunteered to be on the committee. Director Gehr noted that some of the Dutch standard printed in the current copy of the ADRC Guidebook is incorrect. He stated that for "clarification", the steel color description should be reviewed. Some items regarding disqualifications are

listed as eliminations in certain areas. Director Gehr is to review and make the necessary changes and publish same in the Dutch Reporter.

Vice-President Dill stated that the good and bad pictures of the Dutch in the Guidebook should be reviewed and possibly revised for future use.

Vice-President Dill reported that she has had no correspondence from Director Billups in regard to the next upcoming Guidebook. She stated that the next edition published should carry the ARBA Convention and National Dutch Show winners as far back as possible; she would also like to see a list of all past officers. New artwork is also a consideration and she asked that anyone capable of such submit examples for consideration.

Diane Geitzenauer presented a sample pamphlet on the Dutch breed for consideration as an informative source as discussed at the '86 ARBA Convention. Although the pamphlet was "excellent", the standard needs to be condensed so that possibly more information about the club can be included. Diane Geitzenauer, Al Butler, Dick Gehr and Norma Hart are to work on this and get back to Diane so that it can be ready on or before the ARBA Convention in Portland, Oregon.

Our new Dutch Reporter Editor was commended for a job well done! Our last issue is thought to be a record in size and contained plenty of reading material.

Director Dietrich said that the Seller's Class has been running very efficiently. He was approached in regard to a youth putting a rabbit in the Open Seller's Class. Discussion was held on this and the majority of the Board felt that there were no specific rules against this and it should be allowed.

President Williamson noted that the ARBA Convention Committee for the Dutch in Portland were; Jim Kelly, Breed Chairperson; Bonnie Kelly, Breed Secretary; Dianne Williamson, Youth Breed Secretary; George & Maxine Parmer, Advisors. Dick Gehr will be the open judge. George Parmer noted that additional specials had been added to the prepared specials list that was sent in for publication. The additional specials were those that were collected at the ARBA Convention in Ohio and from the Northwest Dutch Rabbit Club. President Williamson noted that we should add a specials page in the Dutch Reporter before National Dutch Shows and ARBA Conventions. This would enable the donor to list desired placement of specials and possibly encourage more donations. He asked that we find a volunteer for breed secretary and chairperson for the '88 ARBA Convention in Madison, Wisconsin. George Parmer suggested the Cosmopolitan Motel for your stay in Portland, Oregon at the ARBA Convention. He said the Dutch banquet would be held there Monday evening and it appeared to be the most reasonable in room rates. Anyone requesting more information can contact Director Parmer.

The Illinois Dutch Rabbit Club submitted a bid for the 1988 National Dutch Show to be held in Bloomington, Illinois on May 6-8, 1988. The ADRC Board accepted this bid and further information will be given at the General Membership meeting and via the Dutch Reporter.

NEW BUSINESS:

Director Gehr is to set up guidelines for awarding Life Memberships in the

ADRC. Current paid Life Membership is 20 X the adult fee or \$140.00. Currently, only past ADRC Presidents and nominees are awarded this honor.

Director Dietrich commented on letters received regarding Canada and Foreign areas not being included in the new districting. A discussion was held and it was determined that a resolution would have to be made and voted on by the membership to change this. Director Gehr noted that we may want to incorporate a stipulation requiring a certain number of signatures from active ADRC members to accompany any resolution submitted. This would also have to be accomplished through a resolution voted on by the membership.

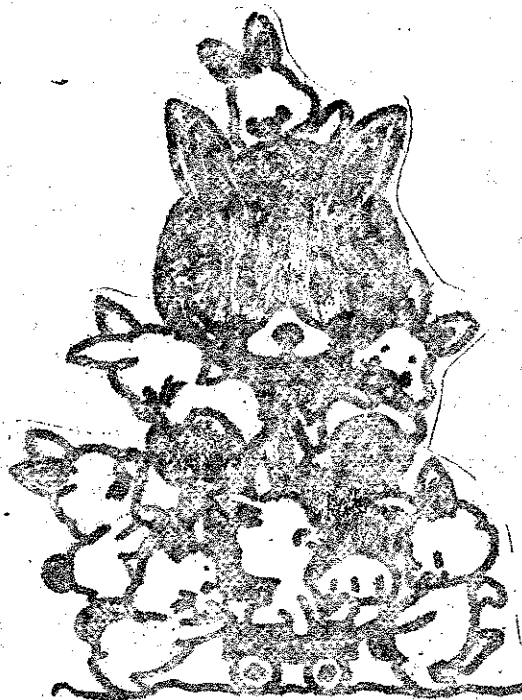

MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING
1987 NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW, EULESS, TEXAS APRIL 4, 1987

The meeting of the General Membership was called to order by President Scott Williamson at 7:30 AM.

Those answering roll at this time were: President Williamson; Vice-President Dill; Directors Dietrich; Geitzbauer; Parmer; Simonson; Mackinnon and Gehr; Secretary-Treasurer Hart. Those absent at roll were Directors Christ and Billups.

Al Butler made a motion, seconded by George Parmer that we dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last general membership meeting as they were published in the Dutch Reporter. M.C.

Secretary Hart gave a Treasurer's Report of the financial condition of the ADRC. Alan Miller made a motion to accept this report as given. The motion was seconded by Mark Pecaric. M.C.

Al Butler gave a report of the Publicity Department stating that the inventory is 100% paid for and that the Publicity Department is in very good shape.

Secretary Hart read the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting. Vice-President Dill made a motion to accept the minutes as read, seconded by George Parmer. M.C.

President Williamson asked the membership to consider serving on an ADRC Committee. If you would like to be included on one of the Committees, please notify the chairman or President Williamson of your intentions.

Marti Dill gave a brief report on the Youth Committee. She questioned whether or not there was enough participation to continue the Quiz Bowl. Vice-President Dill asked for possible sponsors for the youth division in regard to savings bonds, royalty contests, etc.

George Parmer spoke on the '87 ARBA Convention in Portland, Oregon. The Cosmopolitan Motel is approximately 5 blocks from the showrooms, 15 minutes from Portland International Airport, has two levels of free parking and is possibly the lowest priced motel in the area. The ADRC banquet will be held at the Cosmopolitan on Monday evening.

Bill Reid gave a brief report on the '87 National Dutch Show. He stated that the Texas Dutch Breeders tried very hard to make this show enjoyable for all. They had 324 open entries and 105 youth. The Texas Dutch Rabbit Club was well pleased with the turnout and hope that everyone has a good time. Bill Reid stated that they will begin releasing rabbits at any time after all judging is completed to accommodate exhibitor's departure schedules.

President Williamson introduced all of the ADRC Officers. Director Charles Christ had arrived late and was present at this time.

Director Gehr gave a short report on the 1988 National Dutch Show. The

Illinois Dutch Rabbit Club will sponsor this event and it will be held May 6-8, 1988 in Bloomington, Illinois. ARBA Secretary Carr has agreed to open the ARBA office and give a personal tour to those who are interested. More details on the '88 NDS will be printed in the Dutch Reporter at a later date.

Director Tom Dietrich said that the Sellers Class will be held upon completion of all judging. Entries will be cooped with ample time to look over the rabbits. He asked that only quality animals be entered. He stated that this was definitely not the time to cull your herd. Rabbits purchased in the Sellers Class are to assist the breeder in improvement of his/her herd. It also helps to support the American Dutch Rabbit Club. The Sellers Class Committee has the final decision on screening those rabbits entered.

NEW BUSINESS:

Alan Miller stated that when he attends a National Dutch Show he would like to have something to show for it. He suggested that the NDS sponsors be required to give placement ribbons, both open and youth, for 1st. through 5th. place. Alan Miller made a motion to this effect and it was seconded by Maxine Parmer, M.C. by majority. Each National Dutch Show sponsor must award top 5 placement ribbons with appropriate wording. Wenton Carlton will donate a rosette for each 1st. place animal at the 1988 NDS. Scott Hilliaason will donate 2nd. through 5th. placement ribbons for the '88 NDS.

Dick Evenburg stated that he would like to see the ADRC require 3 open judges at each National Dutch Show with the ADRC adopting the payment of the third judge up to \$250.00. These judges are acquired from the "top three" selection on the ballot by membership vote if at all possible. President Hilliaason stated that we can act on this but it must be placed on a ballot for entire membership vote. Dick Evenburg made a motion, seconded by John Baker that this be placed in ballot form. Discussion took place in regard to a third judge and two (2) amendments were added to the motion: #1) The three open judges must be ADRC members and are chosen by and from the membership; #2) A third judge will be mandatory if the Board deems it necessary. Payment of the third judge will be made, up to \$250.00, by the ADRC should this third judge be mandatory. The amended motion now reads as follows:

(TO APPEAR ON THE FINAL ADRC BALLOT INCLUDED IN THE JULY-AUGUST ISSUE OF THE DUTCH REPORTER)

The ADRC requires three open judges, chosen by and from the membership at each National Dutch Show. The ADRC Board of Directors has the authority to change the number of required judges if deemed necessary according to the entry. If a third open judge is required, the ADRC will make payment for this judge up to \$250.00. The open judges at the National Dutch Show shall be the top selections from the ballot if possible.

There was discussion as to judges being ADRC members. It was felt that if a judge was interested enough in the breed and wished to judge at a National Dutch Show, he or she would be willing to join. There was also discussion as to why the ADRC should help with the expense of a third judge if necessary. It

was stated that the locality of the show had much to do with the amount of expense involved. The Iowa Dutch Club lacked approximately \$12.00 from meeting expenses for the '66 KDS.

It was stated that the amendments to the motion be included accordingly. The original motion with the added amendments was passed unanimously and it is to be placed on the final election ballot for membership recommendation. M.C.

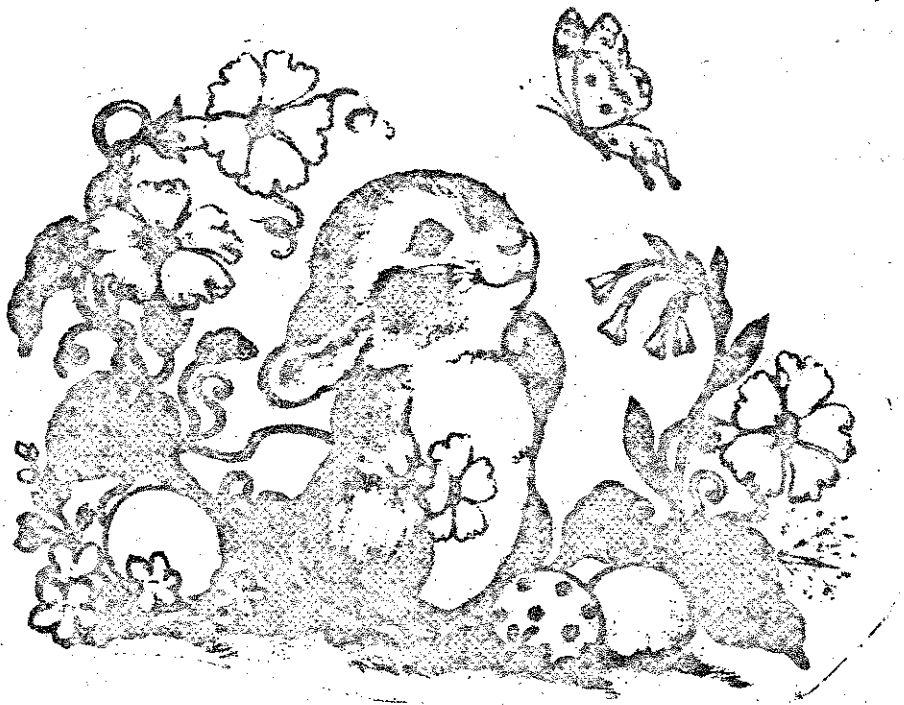
Myrl Milhahn suggested that the Sellers Class series be earmarked. President Williamson stated that the Board would look into the feasibility of this.

REPORT FROM EULESS

Our Texas hosts made good on their promises for a well-run and rewarding 1987 National Dutch Show on the weekend of April 3rd. The exhibitors were pleased with the hospitality and enthusiasm of the organizers, and with the convenience of having the accommodations (show room, lodging, and restaurant) under one roof near the Dallas-Fort Worth airport. Some 300 animals were entered in the open class and about 100 in youth. Evenburg and Stearns once again won Best of Breed, this time with a junior blue buck; other winners are listed elsewhere in this issue. It was a buyer's market for the seller's class--too many rabbits for too few buyers. Tom Buell took top dollar with a senior blue doe from E@S stock that sold for \$120. The awards presented at the evening banquet were very handsome indeed, especially the plaques designed and produced by Sharon Reid. Hats were passed to help fund next year's show scheduled for Bloomington, Illinois. We decided at the membership meeting to provide rosettes and ribbons at next year's show, as well, and money was pledged then and there to buy them.

Some discussion was heard during the day about the European way of rabbit judging. Their practice is to judge each rabbit separately and award points. Placing is determined solely by the final scores without the rabbits ever having been shown side by side. Such a method certainly sounds objective and would force the judges to adhere to the standard of perfection. On the other hand I think we Americans prefer the excitement of watching the judge select from among the finalists still on the table, and it also is instructive to be able to compare them. Someone will always second-guess the judge's choices in any event, and quality is certainly in the subjective eye of the beholder whether judge or exhibitor. For example, what if ten show quality rabbits were judged by, say, five judges, one judge at a time without knowing how the other judges had placed them? There is small probability that there would be uniformity in the first through fifth places: judging is still very subjective. Exhibitors must be fatalistic and hope that, on the average, they will get their share of winnings if their animals are quality specimens. The best breeders are going to win again and again regardless of the luck of the draw with the judges.

As always, there were tales among the breeders about altering animals in varying degrees to mask a fault or disqualification. One gets the impression that this practice is not uncommon, as with that almost

perfect Dutch who has a few white hairs in the wrong place. So out they come with tweezers. Well folks, the rules say not to do it. We do have strict standards of perfection, and the vagaries of Dutch markings and colors make the breeder's task sometimes heartbreaking. Truly with our Dutch, "many are called but few are chosen." On the other hand, they are prolific creatures, so if things go wrong, breed those does and 30 days later you will be blessed with new candidates for the show table. And, after all, no one said it was going to be easy.

The breeders also exchanged the usual stories of instances when the does were not conceiving, or litters were not surviving, or mature animals were dropping dead. While the symptoms were often the same among different breeders, the diagnoses and treatments certainly varied. How little we know about rabbits! There are so many variables from rabbitry to rabbitry in terms of housing, feed, sanitation, and climate that general conclusions about anything are speculative. Perhaps the only thing we do know is that Dutch are tough, adaptable, forgiving little creatures who, when provided with clean food, fresh water, good ventilation, and room to grow will do very well indeed and will reward their owners accordingly.

The airlines continued to be a pain in the neck because of their lack of consistency. Each ticket clerk has his or her own interpretation of the rules. One breeder has had instances of being charged per rabbit, others per cage, both by the same airline at different locations. Another airline charged different fees per carrying cage, again at different locations. One airline clerk at Dallas consulted her computer and announced that a veterinarian's health certificate was needed before she would accept the rabbits so they could accompany their owner home. The owner protested that the airline had not required a certificate to fly them to Dallas, so why did they need one now, and how could one possibly be obtained on a Sunday afternoon, and the owner was damned if he was going to leave his rabbits behind in any event. The frustrating thing was that the clerk wanted a piece of paper that said "health certificate" on it but could never have determined if it actually described the rabbits before her. (She would not have known the difference between a Flemish Giant and a Polish.) In any event, the threat of a law suit and an angry appeal to a supervisor finally got the rabbits on the airplane and home.

So it was a good weekend nevertheless. Your reporter looks forward to seeing colleagues in Portland this fall and in Bloomington in a year. May there be many good shows with many good Dutch in the meantime.

T H A N K S F R O M T E X A S

The 1987 National Dutch Show is now history and things are getting back to normal in this part of Texas. On behalf of the Texas State Dutch Rabbit Club I want to thank everyone who entered rabbits, advertised in our catalog, donated specials and helped us at the show. Our club made all the arrangements and did the leg work, but it was you, the members of the A.D.R.C., that made the show possible. Hopefully we will be able to help other clubs that sponsor the NDS in the future.

We were pleased with the number of rabbits shown and the number of exhibitors who attended. The quality of the rabbits was outstanding and the exhibitors were the most pleasant group imaginable. You really made the show worthwhile for us. The judges did an excellent job even though some of the classes were large and of high quality. The winners will be named in the show report. Congratulations to all.

I hope to see all of you in Portland and then at the '88 NDS in Illinois. Until then, take care, breed those does and promote the Dutch.

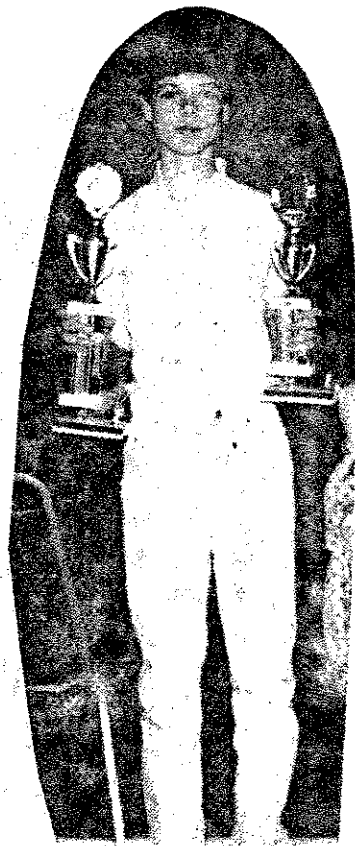
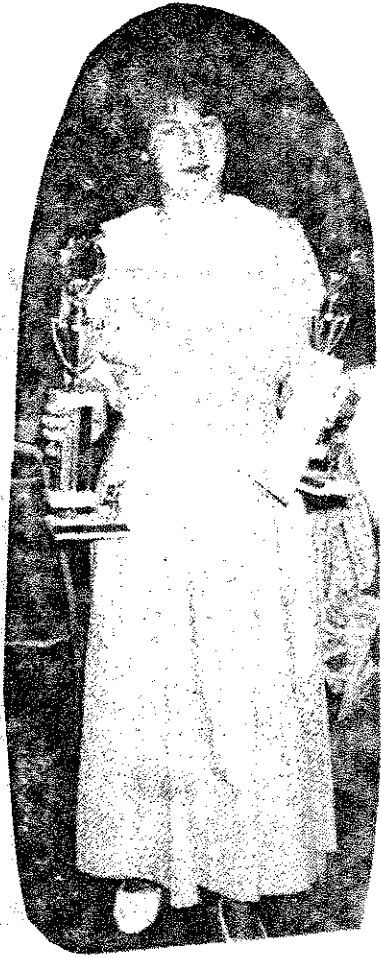

One of the most present controversies surrounding the Dutch rabbit is that of "cow hocks". It is my belief that an error was made when the wording "severe cow hocks" was eliminated from the ARBA General Disqualifications in the Standard of Perfection.

On page 7 of the ARBA Standard of Perfection, "COW HOCKS" is defined as "Hind legs that turn inward at the hock, causing the foot portion to turn outward from the body". Technically, this means that any rabbit whose hind legs are not perfectly parallel, or that don't turn inward at the toe portion (similar to pigeon toed), WOULD BE COW HOCKED.

If cow hocks was a disqualification, this means that 90 percent of the rabbits shown today could be removed from competition for this trait.

On the other hand, in the 1981 - 1985 ARBA Standard of Perfection, SEVERE COW HOCKS was listed under General Disqualifications. This appeared on page 38, and was contained with "Crooked feet or legs, bowed legs, and deformed bones". According to this, "severe cow hocks" is a deformity or abnormality.

This leads us to where the disqualification would occur in the present ARBA Standard of Perfection. Today, disqualifying rabbits for cow hocks falls under ABNORMALITIES, on page 23 of the 1986 - 1990 ARBA Standard of Perfection.

There is no doubt that cow hocks is a severe problem within our breed, but the word "severe" is the key. If the angle of severity constitutes an abnormality, then the animal should be disqualified.

Determining whether the angle is severe enough is what the judge must base his or her opinion on. As this is his or her opinion, or judgement, the call is not subject to protest.

Many breeders seem to believe that cow hocks have become more prevalent in herds due to the fact that judges have not been disqualifying animals for this. I am still of the belief that the breeder is as much at fault as the judge concerning this matter. But regardless of where the fault lies, the situation requires much attention.

I have asked the ARBA Standard Committee to consider adding "SEVERE COW HOCKS" back into their next Standard of Perfection, under General Disqualifications. Should they decide this is not favorable, I will ask that "SEVERE COW HOCKS" be added to our Dutch Standard as a disqualification.

Until the time that the wording is plainly written for all to see, an animal disqualified for cow hocks would fall under the ABNORMALITIES disqualification. This would constitute the fact that the animal was "severely cow hocked". Whether the judge used the wording "severe cow hocks" or not, this would be the reason.

I am trying to clarify this so as to curtail any misconceptions that since "cow hocks" is not listed in the present ARBA Standard of Perfection, an animal can still be disqualified for it. Just remember that if this occurs, the animal is "SEVERELY COW HOCKED".

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAW CHANGES

At the 1987 National Dutch Show in Texas, Lowell Simonson and myself volunteered to approach a couple of issues concerning the ADRC Constitution and By-Laws. After corresponding by mail and phone on these two subjects, we have reached proposals that we feel would be beneficial to the organization and its members.

First, I would like to give you a brief history of the items, then an explanation of our actions, and finally the proposals.

The first subject is Life Memberships. As there is nothing in our C. & B/L pertaining to this, it was felt that some guidelines should be set. At the present time, the only definite Life Memberships that are awarded, are to past Presidents of the ADRC. This was acted on by the Board at the York, Pa. National Dutch Show. What Lowell and I are proposing, is that anyone having paid 35 consecutive years of adult membership regardless of age, or anyone having 25 consecutive years membership at the age of 65 be awarded a Life Membership. Also, a person would still be subject to having a Life Membership awarded to them by the Board of Directors for outstanding and meritorious service to the ADRC.

It is our opinion that anyone having paid for an adult membership for 35 consecutive years is indeed a devoted supporter of the Dutch Rabbit, and deserves to become a Life Member of the ADRC. In the same respect, a person that is 65 years of age that has devoted at least 25 consecutive years to our breed, is also deserving of this honor.

The second subject is the changing of our Constitution and By-Laws. For the past few years, it has been very difficult to keep up with the changes that are taking place within our organization. It is equally difficult for a person to form an intelligent opinion on changes to our rules, when the changes are just thrown out in front of them a few days before a decision has to be made. Lowell and I are proposing that a requirement of 25 signatures of ADRC members be necessary to consider a change to our C. & B/L. This would prevent someone that was in disagreement of a certain item from just putting in changes that could be confusing to the membership. This way, at least some of the membership would have to be in agreement with the change, or it couldn't get off the ground. We are also proposing that the change be submitted so that it will be published at least 6 months before a vote is taken on it. This will give the membership the necessary time to form an intelligent opinion on the change, converse with other people at shows, and voice their opinions regarding the subject through the Dutch Reporter. Also, according to the times specified in the proposal, the National Dutch Show would be held during the "holding period", so members could get together with other members from different parts of the country to exchange thoughts on the subject. We are trying to make it easier for the membership to have time to be fully informed about the change, and have some discussion regarding the same. This is something that can't be done as it now stands.

The proposals that will appear on the final election ballot for you to vote on are as follows:

1.- Add to ARTICLE IV of the Constitution;

Section 2: Any member having paid 35 consecutive years adult membership, regardless of age, or that has 25 consecutive years membership in

the ADRC upon reaching the age of 65, shall be awarded a Life Membership.

2.- Change ARTICLE IX of the Constitution to read:

Any alteration of, or amendment to the Constitution shall be made by way of a resolution. This resolution to be submitted to the Secretary of the ADRC with the signatures of twenty-five (25) adult members in good standing of the ADRC. Said resolution to be submitted no later than January 1st of the year in which the resolution will be voted on. The Secretary shall send copies of the resolution to each Officer of the ADRC, and shall have the resolution printed in the January-February issue of the Dutch Reporter so that the membership shall have ample time to form an intelligent opinion on the resolution. The resolution shall also be printed in the issue of the Dutch Reporter containing the final ballots on which the resolution will be voted. The ADRC voting membership shall then cast their ballots by mail. The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of all eligible votes cast. All amendments shall take effect January 1st of the year following their acceptance.

3.- Change ARTICLE VII of the By-Laws to read:

Any alteration of, or amendment to the By-Laws shall be made by way of a resolution. This resolution to be submitted to the Secretary of the ADRC with the signatures of twenty-five (25) adult members in good standing of the ADRC. Said resolution to be submitted no later than January 1st of the year in which the resolution will be voted on. The Secretary shall send copies of the resolution to each Officer of the ADRC, and shall have the resolution printed in the January-February issue of the Dutch Reporter so that the membership shall have ample time to form an intelligent opinion on the resolution. The resolution shall also be printed in the issue of the Dutch Reporter containing the final ballots on which the resolution will be voted. The ADRC voting membership shall then cast their ballots by mail. The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of all eligible votes cast. All amendments shall take effect January 1st of the year following their acceptance.

Please take the time to review these resolutions, and the explanation of each. It is believed that they will be beneficial to the ADRC and its membership.

CORRECTIONS TO THE GUIDEBOOK

In reviewing the Standard as printed in our current ADRC Guidebook, there have been some misprints. It should be noted that the following items are printed incorrectly in the Guidebook.

- 1.- Pg. 17...Under SENIOR WEIGHTS, it should read 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 pounds, not 3 1/2 or 5 1/2 pounds.
- 2.- Pg. 18...Under EYES, the point allotment should be 1 not 2.
- 3.- Pg. 20...Under UNDERCUT, the last sentence should read "This also applies to the DISQUALIFICATION", not elimination.
- 4.- Pg. 21...Under SPLIT-STOP, the second sentence refers to the split-stop as an elimination, and it should be a disqualification.
- 5.- Pg. 21...Under ELIMINATIONS APPLIES TO ALL COLORS, these items are all DISQUALIFICATIONS. This section should be omitted as they are already listed under "DISQUALIFICATIONS APPLYING TO ALL VARIETIES".
- 6.- Pg. 21...Under DISQUALIFICATIONS APPLIES TO ALL COLORS, the first sentence should read "Three colors IN Black, Blue, or Chocolate". The sixth sentence should read "When the foot stop reaches ABOVE THE HOCK, RUNNING INTO THE LEG", not "when the foot stop reaches the first joint above the hock".

Our weather has been hotter than normal for this time of year. We haven't lost any rabbits from the heat or humidity but, by July and August I may have something to complain about.

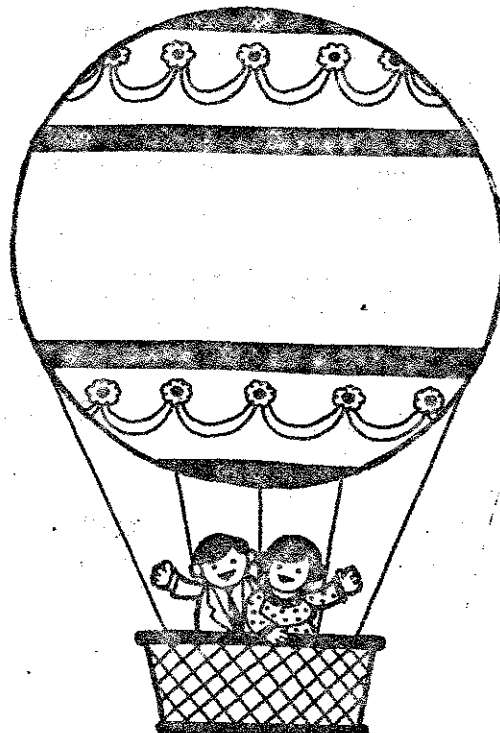

Starting in Dutch

By Al Meier

I have written, at various times, other articles on this general subject. I have the feeling that people have not been following the instructions carefully because I have not seen a perfect Dutch (except for the ten or fifteen I found dead in my nest boxes on occasion) at any of the shows or conventions.

I thought perhaps this time I'd better back off a little farther and get a bit more basic in the suggestions. Perhaps the first thing in order is to spell out some essentials of personality necessary to becoming a Dutch breeder (note, breeder, not "raiser"). Anyone with hutchies and feed can raise Dutch—the trick is in becoming a breeder.

There are but very few qualifications for becoming a Dutch breeder; not the least of them being a realistic appraisal of what it is. If you realize that, at best, it can offer you a continuous source of enjoyment with nothing in the way of monetary reward. If you mull that last statement over for a bit you'll find that it means you can enjoy a wonderful hobby less expensively than most any other except bird or girl watching.

Becoming a successful breeder depends, not a little, on being patient and not expecting to breed something sensational in your first litter. If you succeed in producing an outstanding animal so soon—chalk it up to luck because, remember, you still have to build a family of closely bred animals in order to develop some degree of consistency in the quality.

Now that we have prepared the potential breeder we can start preparing for the rabbits. Let's take up the subject of hutchies in terms of size and number. Hutchies should be about 36 inches wide, 36 inches deep, and at least 18 inches high—this height will allow you to

stack four high if pressed for room, and two high for comfort in cleaning and feeding.

Most importantly, I feel the number of hutchies should be limited to twelve and preferably just eight or nine. The limiting of the number of hutchies forces the breeder to practice rigid culling and tends to keep the breeding within a narrow family.

I am certain the prospective breeder has a much better chance for success if he sticks to one color and holds this one color into one closely related family. It is the opinion of most top Dutch breeders that any of the colors, except possibly steel, can be bred indefinitely without color crossing. Tortoise require a certain amount of blending because you are dealing with two color factors in the base, or background color, and the shadings. All the other fixed colors viz., black, blue, chocolate and grey are best achieved by staying within the color and selecting for intensity of color.

In selecting your stock the only value the pedigree has for you is some basic factors as follows:

1. Does the pedigree indicate that the animal stems from a source which enjoyed success in producing top show animals?
2. Does the pedigree show a mixture of colors—the only allowable combination would be black and blue, or black and chocolate in chocolates only.
3. Does it indicate some semblance of line or inbreeding as indicated by the appearance of at least one animal on both sides of the pedigree.
4. Show records of any animal indicate the presence of some desirable features somewhere in the ancestry—but, unfortunately, very few breeders tell of the presence of faults.

Ideally, I would like to start with two litter sister does which counter balance one another in not having the same faults. More important is that they each have at least one marking which is pretty close to ideal. Neither should have too much white on them—if they're going to be off on markings, let it be in terms of being a little heavy on color. I consider a properly shaped marking to be more important than the amount of color. Cheeks of ideal length which are square, angular, or have what the English call bonnet strings, are not to be chosen over well rounded cheeks. The same general comments hold true for stops, saddles, and undercuts.

The color of course must be sound in that it is free of white

hairs or a brassy cast. A little leeway can be given on the body type of a doe if it leans a little toward length and a size of around five pounds. The head should have a good muzzle and be capped by ears which have substance.

The buck should be cobby in type and better under 4½ pounds than over. He should have a good full, well rounded, masculine head. He should have at least two good markings and should especially have the good markings in any section where the does are weak. He should very definitely be inbred, or line bred—it is my belief that an outcrossed buck is worthless unless used as a full sister; I personally wouldn't own one.

If the two does are old enough to breed, it is a good idea to ask the breeder to breed them to a buck he would use on them if he retained them for his own use. If he has no particular preference as to a buck, I would then breed at least one of the does to the father of the buck that was purchased with the does.

From here on it's now a matter of breeding and applying selection. Out of your first litters, keep the three best young does and, when old enough, breed them, along with the two old does to your own buck. After this generation from there on it's a matter of keeping the five best

does each succeeding generation—but, only if they are better than their dams. If a doe does not produce anything better than she is in two litters I would eliminate her also even if it meant ending up with only a couple of does.

We are trying to develop a family which, by reason of genetical makeup, can produce a good average of show quality animals. We do this by breeding closely, and culling strictly. The best we can hope for in outcrossing is producing the average of the breed. The average is not good enough to win and will only place somewhere in the middle of the class.

Remember, it is better to breed from an animal with one outstanding feature than to use one which is average in all-round features. Correct the faults by breeding to an animal with the correct feature—not one whose fault is the other extreme; for instance, high cheeks do not correct low cheeks or vice versa. Mate to the animal with perfect cheeks.
