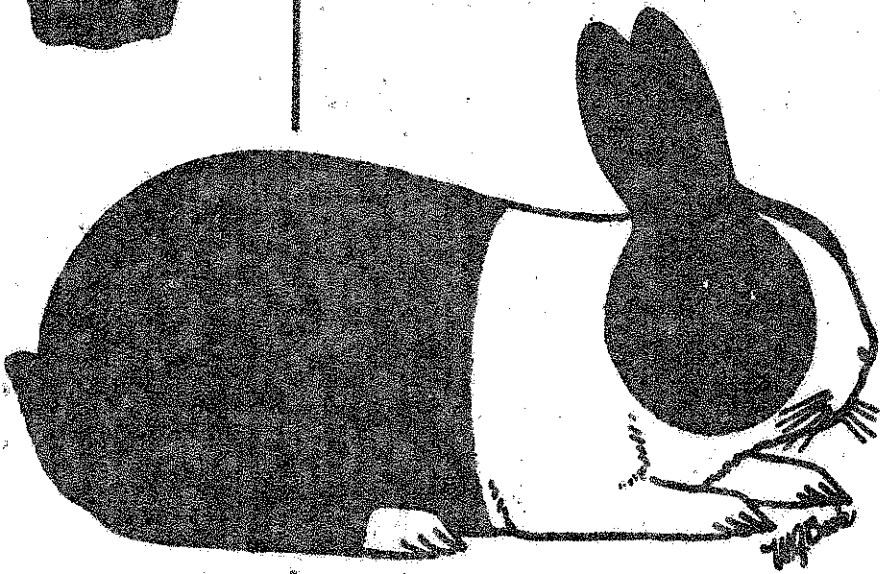
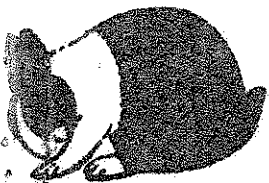

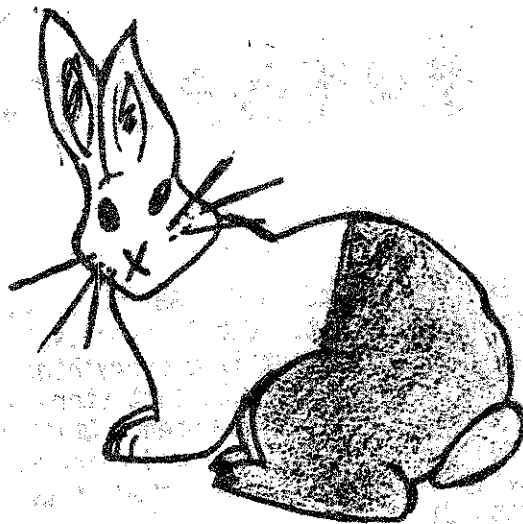

PRESIDENT'S

MESSAGE

EAT, SLEEP and TALK RABBITS family and friends have accused me of doing just that. Until recently, I could come back with "I haven't slept with the rabbits, but like everything else those days have come to an end. Not long ago, a major discount store advertised in their flyer - bed sheets with RABBITS. Now they weren't DUTCH but they were cute blue bunnies. Naturally, I hurried down and purchased the last set available. We can now honestly answer YES, when asked if we eat, sleep and talk rabbits in our household!

In this issue of the DUTCH REPORTER you'll find alot of ADRC business items. They are important to keep the club functioning but I hear the members saying they want to learn more about their rabbits and less of the politics - so my President's message will consist of - this time - bits and pieces of non-earth shaking material.

EASTER has come and gone, some of us love it as it helps to pay the feed bills while others feel it exploits the rabbit business. This year we decided to breed for and sell Easter bunnies (when we haven't, our phone has rung continually - even Easter Sunday). Being curious, I called about five pet shops in the surrounding cities. It's really surprising what you learn from "Pet Advisors" who are employed in the Pet Stores. DID YOU KNOW that rabbits can have ALL the LETTUCE they want - BUT only after they reach their first birthday! DID YOU KNOW, in addition to the new breeds being presented at ARBA Conventions, that the Pet Stops exclusively offer Mini-Californians, Dutch Lops and Angora Black & Whites! The average size of a Dwarf, we'll assume it's "supposed" to be a Netherland Dwarf, is 4 to 6 pounds according to the Pet Advisor. For these unusual breeds and others that we, and the ARBA recognize, they get \$24.99 for Dutch; \$29.99 for Satins and a "Dwarf" is \$39.99. Pellets are sold by the pound at 49¢ - that makes a 50 pound bag cost \$24.50. We'd all be out of this hobby at those prices!

During a show, a judge from the other end of the Midwest commented on a practice that was becoming common in his area. The show sponsors were assisting the judges, exhibitors and the rabbits by putting a 3# coffee can or small plastic bucket on the judging table. In it, warm water with lysol were mixed and a hand towel placed beside the bucket. When the judge handles an animal that shows signs of open abscesses or mucous from the nostrils, he can - after returning the animal to the exhibitor, pause for a moment to clean and disinfect his hands, arms and wipe his clothing where the infected animal may have brushed up against him. I know as an exhibitor, I would appreciate the extra effort of the show's sponsors as well as the judge in making every effort possible to eliminate the spread of disease.

While talking shows, I would like to bring up FUR CLASSES. Not long ago, we traveled to Tennessee to show our DUTCH and meet old friends and our new District 1 Director, Fred Mullinax and his wife Kathy. As usual, the Dutch breeders grouped together to discuss - what else - DUTCH, and the topic turned to FUR and what good Dutch fur should be. No one had pre-entered the Fur class so we spoke to the Show Secretary, asking if we could enter the class - day of the show - at the judging table. Entry was \$1. Several of the breeders chipped in a few dollars and soon had collected \$20 for BEST FUR. Time for the fur class and each breeder brought their "hopefulls", placed them in the judging slots and laid a \$1 bill on the wire cover over their rabbit. We drew the attention of every other exhibitor in the room - wondering if we were

holding an auction, lottery or what. We explained to our judge that we wanted to learn more about Dutch fur and how it is judged. He was excellent showing us examples of coarse, dead & open fur, guard hair length, fly back, etc., on a number of different animals. This fur class - which did not exist the morning of the show - drew 15 ANIMALS. While 14 did not win the \$20 pot, about 7 exhibitors came home with alot more knowledge about what DUTCH FUR should be. By the way, Paul Williams of Bristol, TN was the winner; Billy Dodge was our patient judge and teacher. We thank him.

Being humane to our animals is a subject we hear about, read about and even view each time we attend the conventions. There is alot of difference between their viewpoint and ours, obviously we don't care to dress our rabbits in clothing or to uncage them to run free. On occassion, I see some of our most respected breeders treating their animals in ways which I feel is inhumane. Something as simple as trimming toenails on older breeding stock, opening the doors to their rabbitry to allow fresh air to flow in, and dumping crocks with stale, dirty water. Adding feed to a crock with feed still remaining is encouraging your animals to go off feed or eat contaminated feed from fecal deposits. Not giving your cages a thorough scrubbing, at least twice a year, will result in stained fur, an increase in the number of animals who develop sneezing spells, abscesses, infections about the genitals, increased amounts of diarrhea and other health problems. In our own herd, I notice bucks spray more in the Spring, making coops sticky; litters have more sore eyes, more infections occur in does mammary glands - until we tear down the lines of coops, pressure hose and disinfect each one from the bacteria that accumalates during the winter months when we spend less time in the barn.

Everyone wants to WIN, some so much so that they only do a good job on the items listed above with younger show stock. They forget their brood stock. The WINNING STREAK will be SHORT when the older brood stock can no longer stand on the cage floor because their toenails are left untrimmed; that infection sets in the breeding bucks and does from contaminated floors and that promising youngster comes out of the nestbox - BLIND. A true breeder has pride in all of his/her animals, whether they are winners or the stock that produces those winners.

Along this same vain, please be sure to read Dr. Terry Reed's article in this issue of the DUTCH REPORTER.

Just a few thank-you's to some of the folks at the National Dutch Show. Dallas, Jane and Eric Meyer spent a number of evenings making the lovely corsages with the DUTCH rabbit that was given to every mother at the NDS. They also served as Youth Superintendent and Secretary. Jack and Coleen

Cunningham spent many hours collecting raffle items and then selling what seemed like a thousand tickets to each of us, right Carl? The quality of items in the raffle were some of the best ever offered. I know each of these families enjoyed working together - with a goal of having those attending the '88 NDS enjoy it just as Vern and I had a ball designing and putting the catalog together. A number of men from the Illinois Dutch Club spent many hours, some took vacations to assist, to set up cooping, staple coop cards up and fill the coops with straw. Glen Carr, ARBA Secretary, judged large classes of Dutch and then - looking refreshed, guided many of us through a tour of the ARBA offices, all with a SMILE. Nick Dyer, our new Youth Chairman, sailed through the 1st (hopefully annual) ADRC ROYALTY CONTEST (photo of winners in this DR) and looked like a pro doing it. Of course, last but not least, the officers and other unmentioned members of the ILLINOIS DUTCH RABBIT CLUB for all of the work they did to make the show smooth and enjoyable.

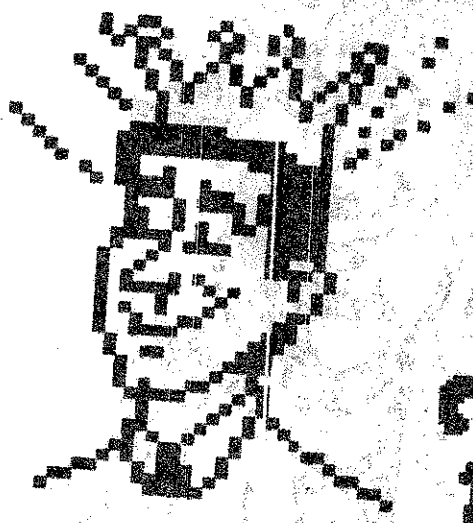

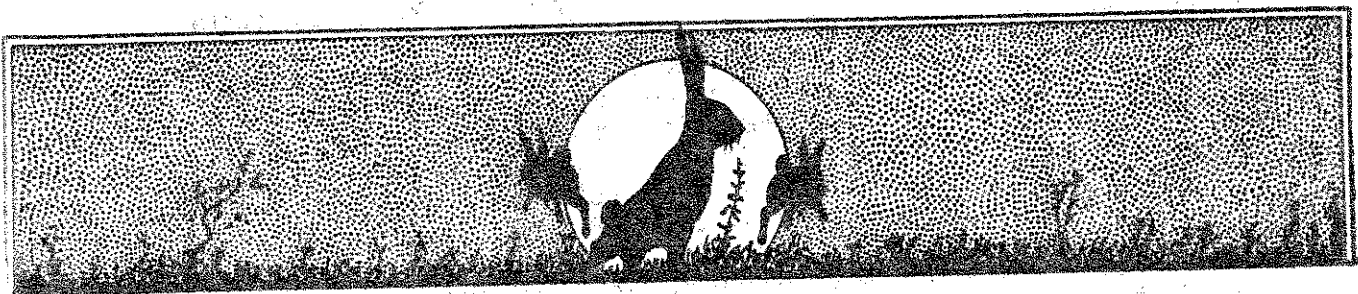
A word from your Vice President

IF NO ONE HAD A FRIEND

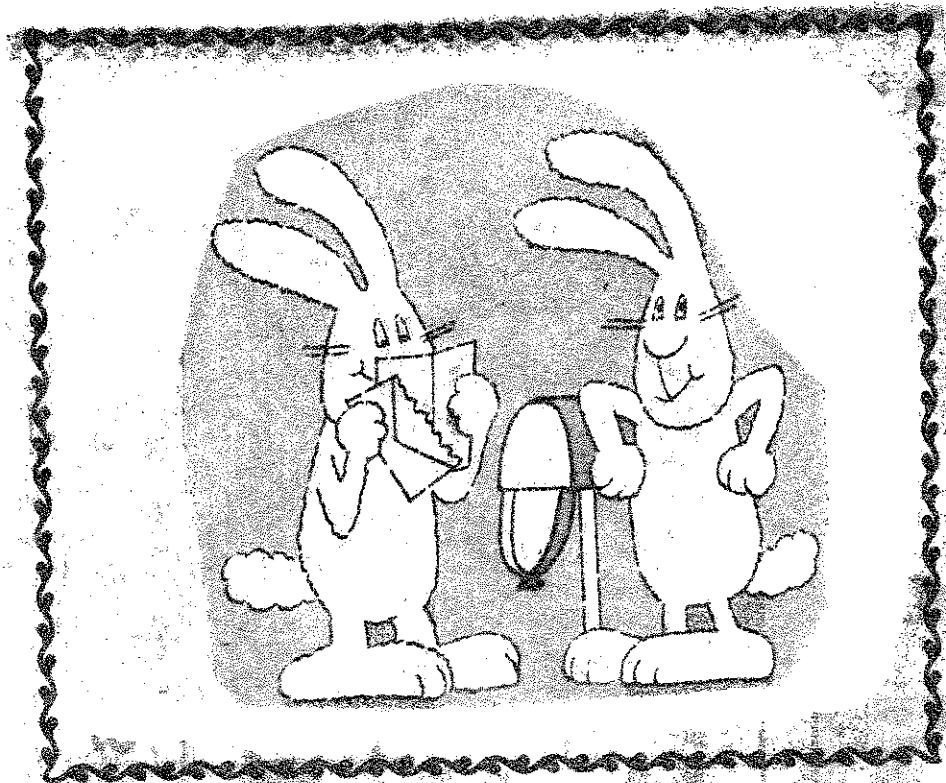
What a dreary place this world would be

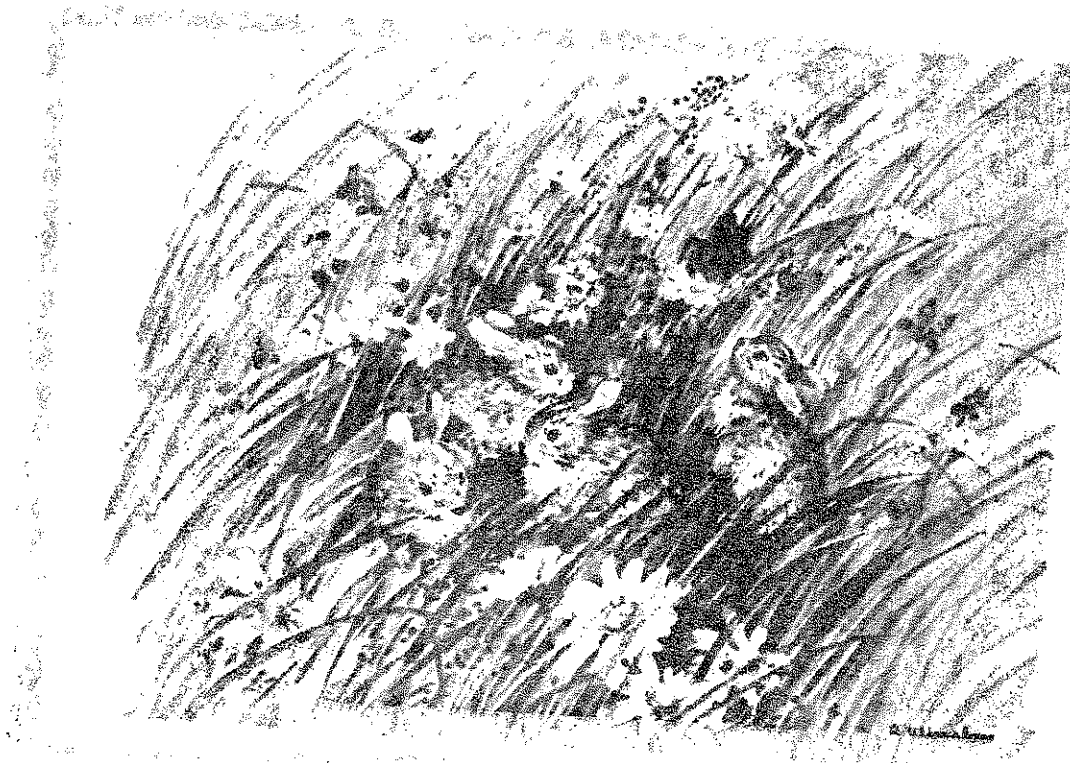

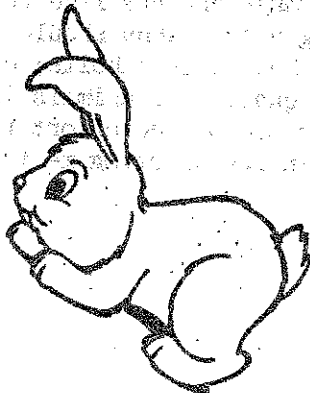

GERMAN RABBIT WITH SOUR CREAM & MUSHROOMS

| 3 slices chopped bacon | 1 Tbsp. vinger |
| 1 tbsp. butter | 1 Tbsp. flour |
| 6 samll onions | 1 small can tomato sauce |

Brown bacon until crisp. Add butter, then brown the rabbit pieces in this pan. Season with salt and pepper. Add onions, celery, carrots, bamboo shoots, Worcestershire sauce, and vinger. Simmer until tender. Add water in quantity desired, add flour accordingly to make consistency of light gravy. Add tomato sauce, sour cream and sauteed mushrooms. Delicious served with dumplings.

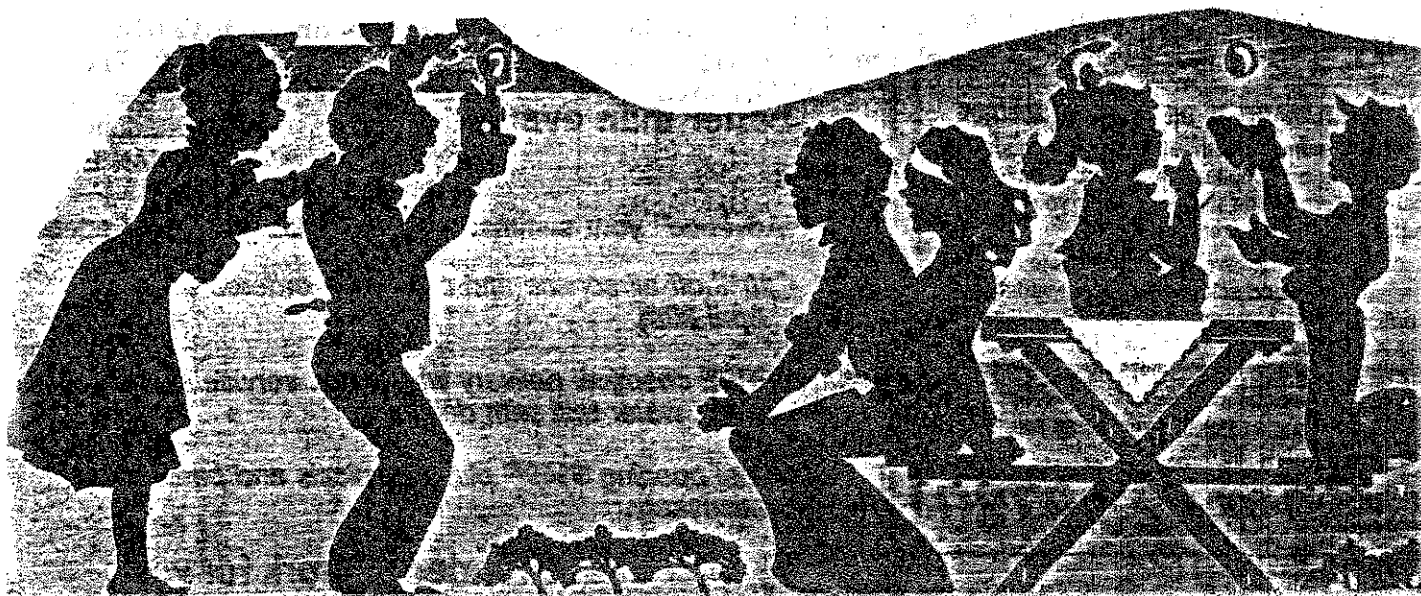

From your Director - District 3 Bill Reid

I have just returned from the 1988 NDS and what a show it was. There were over 600 Dutch and all seemed to be of high quality. The Illinois Dutch Rabbit Club headed by Dick and Norma did an outstanding job, and everyone seemed to have a good time. After the banquet on Saturday night, Glen Carr opened the A.R.B.A. offices and took a large group on a tour. I was amazed to learn how much work was involved in running the A.R.B.A. The Board of Directors decided on Jeanine Powers as our new Dutch Reporter Editor. She has a big responsibility ahead, and we certainly want to support her as best we can.

Jeanine has asked us to discuss "nest boxes" in this issue. I make wooden nest boxes using 1" X 10" boards for the bottom and back and 1/4" plywood for the sides. The inside dimensions are 12" X 9 1/2". The back and sides are 9" high and the front is 7" high. There is enough room for the doe to nurse the babies, but not enough room for her to rest in a separate corner from the babies. I cover the bottom of the nest box with about 2 to 3 inches of pine shavings and then add an ample amount of coastal hay (fine, long-stem hay) not straw. When I remove the box from the cage, I simply empty the shavings and hay, hose the entire box with high pressure water, and place it in the sun to dry.

The Texas State Dutch Rabbit Club will be having a State Dutch Show in conjunction with the Southwest R.B.A. annual night show on September 17, 1988. After a long summer of no shows, this show kicks off the fall show season and always has a large entry. We will have a short business meeting to elect new officers and hope to get the TSDRC more active again. I hope to see all the Dutch breeders plan to attend. Anyone needing more information about the show can contact me.

It is not too late to breed for Madison. Keep those nest boxes coming.

As you can tell, Maxine and I made the trip just to see the many Good Dutch rabbits, but most of all, the gathering of all your old friends and swapping of rabbit news while you renew old friendships. Of course old Mother Nature helped make life interesting for a lot of us. We, in Oregon, are used to some electrical storms, but not tornado watches. Maxine and I were lucky, we did make it home that night, only three hours behind schedule. There were those, I understand, that were stranded for the night at the airport.

NESTBOXES

We have been asked to say something on Nestboxes - well what can I say? Through the years I think we have used just about everything and called it a nestbox. I will say that the Dutch seem to adapt to most anything you give them, far better than other breeds we have raised.


I prefer to use wood, I don't like to use a metal box especially in the winter (the babies get next to the side and get chilled). My nest boxes are approximately six or seven inches high in the front, sixteen inches long, eight or nine inches high in the back and ten inches wide, with about the back third of the box covered on top. I guess there are some people who will use a cardboard box, all I ever got out of a paper box was a messy cage and dead babies. Needless to say I gave that up years ago.

In our nestboxes we put a good layer of "lab chips". They are just washed and cleaned wood chips. We never use cedar because of too much dust (usually resulting in sore eyes in the babies). Then whatever kind of hay we are feeding we fill the box and the doe is happy.

For those of you who haven't been at this to long - that front of the nestbox must be high enough so the mother doesn't drag her little ones out (she has no way of putting them back -- like a cat or dog).

Now in closing I want to say that THE NORTHWEST DUTCH CLUB invites all of you to come to PORTLAND, OREGON in April, 1989. We will be hosting THE NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW. More details will be in the next issue.

I have to run breed some of those Dutch and see if there is a winner in the house.



NESTBOXES

Vern Dill

Every rabbitry owner we know has nestboxes that are of that own breeder's design. Some assign a specific nestbox to a particular doe and she will use that nestbox for every litter she kindles. The main drawback that I can see, is the amount of space required to keep them in, however, it prevents diseases from transferring - one box to another as different animals use them. Metal nestboxes of sheet metal conduct cold and magnify barn noises, like an echo chamber.

I make TWO SIZES of nestboxes, a SMALL SIZE - 7" high, 7" wide and 10" long. We use these for Marti's Netherland Dwarfs and my Holland Lops. The LARGER nestbox is 5" high, 8" wide and 16" long - really too long for the Dutch but work well with the meat rabbits; Silver Martens, Cals, Satins, etc. One drawback to the 5" sides is the ease with which the kits with eyes still closed can "pole vault" over the sides. This could mean a loss of kits during extreme weather. All nestboxes are made from 1" wood on the sides, front and back. We DO NOT add a top or resting area for the doe. If a top is desired, holes should be drilled to let moisture escape.

The bottom of our nestbox is made of window screening. When the box has been assembled, I flip it up-side-down, lay window screening over it and staple the screen around the wooden edges. A carpet knife easily trims the surplus screening. We have found several reasons why we like the screened bottomed nestboxes; 1) cool in the summer, preventing long summer ears in kits, 2) disinfecting is easy and can be done in a shorter amount of time since saturation time is less, 3) manure and hair build up is easier to remove from corners, and 4) insulation boards like styrafoam and Celotex can be cut approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ " smaller than the nestbox bottom and placed underneath during the winter months to keep newborn kits from freezing. As a habit, we always include a piece of Celotex under the nestbox during the kindling and first couple of days in case the doe isn't a good mother at first. The Celotex board is removed (during the summer) 3 to 5 days later when the kits have sufficient hair to remain warm.

By using the window screening any moisture from afterbirth and does or kits urinating goes through the screening and onto the insulation board below or through the cage flooring if no insulation board is used. We've all seen the TV ads for Pampers where the moisture goes through the top layer, keeping the baby 'dry and comfortable'. The screening does much the same for the kits in the nestbox.

On occasion a doe will dig at the nestbox bottom 'till she digs through. Take CAUTION when lifting the nestbox out of the coop the first time - you may have baby bunnies dropping like raindrops (similar to raining CATS & DOGS!)

Sanitizing of the nestboxes is 'SUPER SIMPLE'. Andrea, our daughter, is in charge of nestboxes. When pulled from a doe and litter at 17-21 days, they are stacked in a corner for her to take

care of. She takes them outside, shakes loose the contents and then drops them into a 50-55 gallon plastic drum that has been cut in half. The drum is always kept filled with water and an Amway product called L O C. The reason for using L O C is it won't cause other critters running about to be sick if drank. The nestboxes are left in the water/LOC solution for approx. 5 minutes, taken out and hung on SPIKE NAILS on the north outside wall of our barn, allowing them to SUN DRY. They are kept there until needed for the next doe. * NOTE L O C is great for removing excess tattoo ink - won't irritate skin.

To fill nestboxes we use straw - that's all. Excess hair from over-exhuberant does is saved and placed in a ziploc bag for future use. No rejection has ever occurred, even when hair from a severely moulting buck is saved.

DO NOT REMOVE hair from the nestbox in summertime as it serves as insulation from heat. Cool air is circulated from the nestbox bottom when the screening is used.

MINUTES OF THE ADRC BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

1988 National Dutch Show May 6-8 Bloomington, Illinois

The regular meeting of the ADRC Board of Directors was called to order at 6:30 PM by President Dill.

Director Gehr made a motion to dispense with the reading of the previous Board of Directors meeting as they were printed in the Dutch Reporter. The motion was seconded by Director Parmer. MOTION CARRIED

Vice-President MacKinnon stated that he was pleased with the fairgrounds, motel and show so far. He feels that the club is on the move and things are running smoothly.

Secretary Hart reported that she has been busy with the NDS. The ADRC memberships are staying about the same with new members and renewals. The amount of sanctions issued is increasing and she feels that there should be a questionnaire in the Dutch Reporter asking members opinions on various subjects.

Director Pecaric felt that the entry method of no ear numbers was a very good idea. Shows in his area are holding their own with 60-120 Dutch being shown. A few Dutch breeders have been lost due to health, etc., but he feels that new breeders will pick up.

Director Simonson stated that shows in his area aren't as big as they used to be. The Iowa Dutch Rabbit Club is sanctioning a show with a pot luck dinner, .50 entry fee and will be more or less a 'fun' show.

Director Wireman reported shows are up and down. He keeps various records on the Dutch exhibits in his area.

Director Gehr said he has spent a lot of time preparing the NDS. He also stated that he has received many calls for breeding stock, and the Dutch breeders should be promoting the breed by selling good breeding stock.

Director Christ stated the number of Dutch are up and there are more specialty shows being held. Some breeders are trying to give a youth a Dutch in order to gain new members for the ADRC.

Director Reid reported that he has only been to two shows this year. Numbers of Dutch are down somewhat. He has asked for input from members in his

district and said that all seems to be satisfied. A question arose regarding the youth sweepstakes and he addressed the situation. The Texas Dutch Club has been inactive but plans are to get things rolling again.

Nick Dyer of Oklahoma was introduced as the new YOUTH CHAIRPERSON and had some very positive ideas and suggestions.

Director Farmer expressed his appreciation and compliments to the Illinois Dutch Rabbit Club for sponsoring the 188 NDS. The Northwest is down considerably in Dutch exhibited. Prospects look good however with new breeders becoming active.

President Dill stated that quality breeders in her area only seem to come out for shows with better paybacks, thus causing a decline at some of the shows.

The Audit Committee was not asked to attend the Board of Directors Meeting. The Audit Committee found the books to be accurate and in order. Director Wireman was asked to submit their report as follows:

Upon test checking the Secretary/Treasurer's books, some items submitted for payment were questioned as follows:

1) January 12, 1988 Check to US Postmaster for \$50.00. Norma stated that this was for the Non-Profit mailing permit. She also advises that we save \$40.00 to \$50.00 an issue.

2) October 13, 1987 Check# 1567 paid out \$337.61 to Scott Williamson for specials at Portland ARBA Convention. Invoices checked in detail and all checked out properly.

3) Life Memberships Account in the amount of \$1203.56. The Auditing Committee feels this money needs to be moved to another account that makes more money.

4) Norma was questioned about a bill from AB DICK for \$3022.16. Her reply was that it was approved by the Board for new DR equipment. Upon further questioning we found that we received no special pricing when we purchased the two new machines together. Norma also stated that she had some problems with the machines and needed instruction manuals to help operate. These were not included in the above price and was purchased later at a cost of \$3.99. When asked if this helped she stated that she was still having problems with operation and was very messy to operate. When asked if it was under warranty, she could not answer the question. We also understand that each Dutch Reporter takes approximately 7 cases of paper per issue. The Audit Committee questions if there is some way to cut costs.

5) Various bills submitted for payment were questioned. Three examples follow: Bills submitted by Marti Dill for photostating ADRC Guidebook 6/24/87 for 111 copies at 11.44. Other items submitted that month brought the total for photostating to \$27.15. Also question phone bills submitted for 15 September '87 through 19 October '87 in the amount of \$72.86 for 11 calls ranging from 12 minutes to 70 minutes each. The audit committee questions the validity of these calls. Also questioned was phone bills submitted for \$86.26 from 1 December '87 through 26 December '87 for 15 calls ranging from 3 minutes to 58 minutes. The audit committee also questions the validity of these calls.

Secretary Hart addressed some problems with the publication of the Dutch Reporter, First Class Mailings and the time involved in publishing the DR. It was felt that the size of the Dutch Reporter might be lessened in the future. After much discussion, it was felt that a reminder to check the expiration date on the labels of the Dutch Reporter should be printed on the back cover, thus eliminating the expiration list in the DR.

It is to be looked into about possibly trying to obtain a smaller print typing element to print the show reports. The Board wishes to thank Martha Jackson for doing a fine job as sweepstakes chairperson.

The sweepstakes committee recommended that the sweepstakes year be changed to run from January 1st. through December 31st. with a "short" year in order to make the transition. Director Gehr made a motion to accept the sweepstakes committee's recommendation and change the sweepstakes year from NDS to NDS to January 1st. through December 31st. The motion was seconded by Director Wireman. MOTION CARRIED. (NDS Rule #9 will be changed).

Director Simonson stated that the NDS committee feels each club does their best and alot of rules for the show sponsor should not be implemented.

The Board discussed accepting the NDS bids "up to" two years in advance. This would better help in acquiring judges. Director Wireman made a motion to change NDS show rule #2 to state that a bid can be accepted up to two years in advance. This motion was seconded by Director Simonson. MOTION CARRIED. It will be advertised that the bids for the 1990 NDS will be reviewed and a location awarded at the ARBA Convention in Madison, Wisconsin.

A bid was presented by the Northwest Dutch Rabbit Club to sponsor the 1989 NDS in Portland or Beaverton, Oregon. A motion to accept the bid was made by Director Gehr and seconded by Director Christ. MOTION CARRIED. More information will be provided later.

A discussion followed regarding the judges for the 1989 NDS. It was determined that a third judge was not feasible. Director Gehr made a motion to let the show sponsors use their discretion as to have 1 or 2 open judges. The motion was seconded by Vice-President MacKinnon. MOTION CARRIED.

A thorough report was given by the publicity committee and some new ideas were discussed. It was requested that the officers spend some time in the booth at the NDS and ARBA Conventions.

Discussion took place regarding the appointment of a Dutch Reporter Editor. Applications were gone over and the matter was tabled until a later time.

The Board was presented with several candidates for Life Memberships.

Mark Pecaric made a motion to grant Delmas Cockey a Life Membership seconded by Norma Hart; 5 Aye - 1 No - 3 Abstain; MOTION CARRIED: Mark Pecaric made a motion to grant Dale Zentner a Life Membership seconded by Wayne MacKinnon; All Aye; MOTION CARRIED: Jack Wireman made a motion seconded by Lowell Simonsen to award John and Becky Crawford Life Memberships; 7 Aye - 1 No - 1 Abstain; MOTION CARRIED.

Dick Gehr reported that there were 629 total entries in the '88 NDS; 492 open and 147 youth. It was hoped that all would enjoy the show.

A discussion was held on expenses for officers. Vice-President MacKinnon made a motion to allow \$25.00 every other month for expenses for the President and Secretary. The motion was seconded by Director Christ. MOTION CARRIED.

The First Class mailing fees were discussed and it was mentioned that the postage fees are escalating quite high. Director Wireman made a motion, seconded by Director Parmer that the 1st. class mailing fees be increased to \$8.00. MOTION CARRIED. Those presently receiving 1st. class will continue to do so until their year ends. It will cost \$8.00 thereafter.

The 500 mile radius rule regarding the issuing of sanctions during the NDS weekend was discussed. Director Pecaric made a motion to reduce the distance to a 200 mile radius. The motion was seconded by Director Christ. MOTION CARRIED.

A discussion was held regarding the ADRC paying for 'GOOD' color pictures of the Dutch to be included in the next ARBA Standard of Perfection. Director Gehr felt that the ARBA should withstand the cost of these as the Standard of Perfection is the sole property of the ARBA.

A discussion was held on the transition period for the election of ADRC officers. An article will appear in the Dutch Reporter addressing this.

Being no further business, Director Parmer made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Director Christ. MOTION CARRIED.

President Dill stated that the Board of Directors has interpreted that the voting procedure for balloting on judges will remain as in the past with mail balloting of the entire adult membership. Being no further business, a motion was made to adjourn by Director Wireman and seconded by Mike Stinehelfer. MOTION CARRIED.

Should there not be enough candidates to fill the necessary offices, the President will appoint people to fill the vacancies with Board approval.

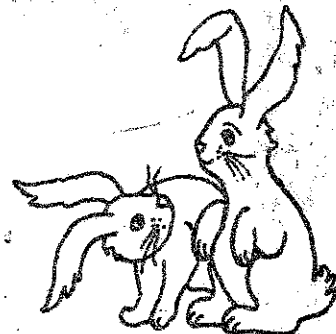

WHY ENTERITIS AT WEANING?

Enteritis (diarrhea), fatal or chronic, is most commonly seen in hobbyist's rabbits one week prior to weaning to two weeks after weaning. Of course, this condition can occur at any age; but, not with the frequency and to the degree that is seen at "weaning" time. For one to understand enteritis in rabbits to some degree, one must have a workable knowledge of anatomy, physiology, nutrition, chemistry and many other areas and then "total" comprehension cannot be accomplished in all situations.

Specific situations occur at weaning time that should be given consideration by the hobbyist so a more complete understanding of "enteritis" may be accomplished.

ACIDITY - CHANGES IN THE GASTROINTESTINAL TRACT IN
ADULT RABBITS VS. SUCKLINGS

The adult rabbit stomach is more acid (lower pH) than most other species of animals. The pH range in the adult rabbit's stomach is from one to two. Due to the extreme acidity, there are only a small number of bacteria and micro-organisms in the stomach and small intestines of the adult rabbit. The stomach of suckling rabbits has less acidity (stomach pH from 3 - 6.5) than adults; and, after weaning, the pH in the stomach drops to a pH of 1 to 3, depending upon age and conditions.

It has been theorized that due to the higher pH in the stomach of sucklings; and, rabbits just weaned, the incidents of enteritis (diarrhea) increases due to the fact that the bacteria are not destroyed in the stomach and the (bacteria) can flow into the small intestines and cecum to cause the various types of enteritis. One must clearly understand that the presence of a balanced bacterial flora in the cecum is essential for efficient and healthy digestion without incidents of diarrhea.

The cecum becomes "inoculated" initially with the bacteria that are ingested and pass through the stomach and small intestine into that cecum. It has been posulated that the earlier, and more correct the young rabbits have the balanced flora established in the cecum, the more resistant that particular kit is to the various types of diarrhea; as well as, the healthier the animal appears.

With the above information: (1. Due to the elevated pH in suckling rabbits, the bacteria ingested can cause diarrhea; and, (2) The earlier the cecum is inoculated with the proper bacteria the incidents of diarrhea is decreased) one can readily realize how precise the timing must be; and, by altering the above, one can enhance or reduce the incidents of enteritis depending upon the acidity within the stomach at various chronological times in the rabbits life.

VOLUME OF FEED CONSUMED IN PROPORTION TO BODY WEIGHT

A weanling rabbit (one week prior to weaning and two weeks after weaning) will probably consume more total food volume per pound of body weight than at any other time in their life. The amount of feed consumed is totally related to volume and is not restricted by the weanling rabbit in any way by the concentration of nutrients or the caloric intake as is done by some species.

The above information becomes extremely important due to the fact that the feed provided

to these weanlings can vary greatly in the amount of nutrients per ounce of feed consumed; as well as, and probably more important, the amount of energy (calories) per pound of feed.

As related in the first section, the number of bacterium and the balance of the bacterial flora in the cecum is extremely important in preventing, or enhancing, the incidents of enteritis. In addition to the acidity of the stomach, controlling the number of bacterium reaching the cecum and the age of the rabbit when these bacterium reach the cecum is important. The amount of energy present in the food stuff that reaches the cecum will be extremely important as to how fast the bacterium proliferate and what "balance" the bacterium attain.

If the weanling ingests an excessive amount of energy (not volume of food), this will allow for certain types of bacterium to proliferate in the cecum and produce the signs; and, often death, that is associated with enterotoxemia. This is more prevalent in weaning animals due to the food volume that is ingested in proportion to the body weight. This will not be as critical in "older" animals due to the fact that the proportion of feed consumed to body weight will be lower.

This should emphasize the importance of food formulation in respect to the nutrients and energy for the weanling rabbit.

PARASITE INFECTION

The young kits will express the stress of early parasite exposure at about the age of weaning. These kit's immune system have not had the opportunity to develop any resistance to the parasite infestation particularly, coccidia. The damage to the lining of the small intestine can be very severe due to the protozoan infection. This increases irritability and the motility of the intestinal tract. Therefore, food that is consumed moves from the stomach to the cecum much more rapidly than in non parasitized kits.

The increased motility of the intestines will accentuate the complications of the above two items. (1) Allowing more instability of the pH of the stomach and small intestine; thus, preventing establishment of a constant bacterial flora in the cecum; (2) Allowing for an enhanced amount of energy to reach the cecum due to the increased motility of the small intestine. Again, by understanding the weanling's body reaction to internal parasites and that weaning age is the idealistic time for the affect of parasitism to develop, one can understand the reason for the increased incidents of enteritis in the weanling rabbit.

SUMMARY

Enteritis in weanling rabbits has been a tremendous problem for the rabbit fancier. The causes for this can be related to:

1. Acidity change in the stomach of the suckling and adult rabbit.
2. Volume of food consumed in proportion to weight of the weanling.
3. Incidents of parasitism in the weanling rabbit.

Each of the above items specifically relates to the number and balance of the bacterial flora in the cecum. It is important that this balance must be maintained to reduce the incidents of enteritis in the weanling rabbit.

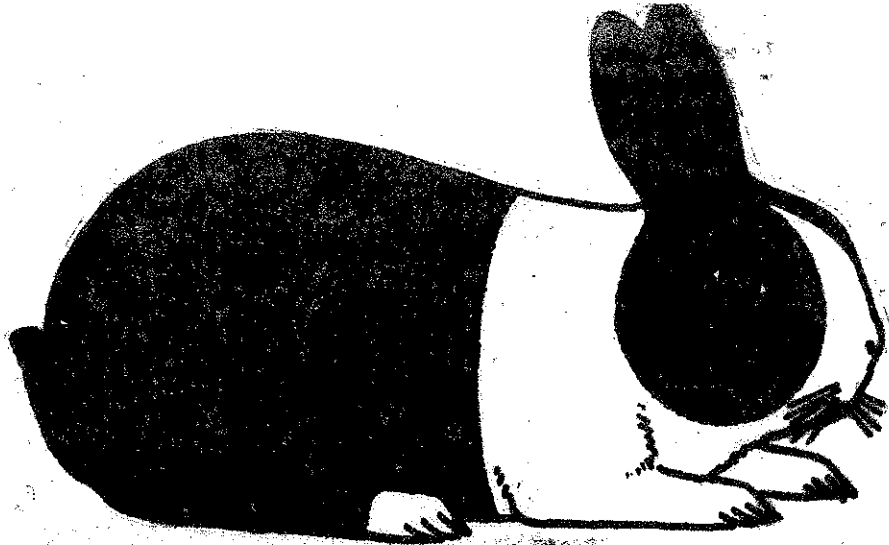
This is all for now as I have to get ready for Bloomington and the National Dutch Show. I feel this will be a big one and maybe even the biggest to date....On with the DUTCH!

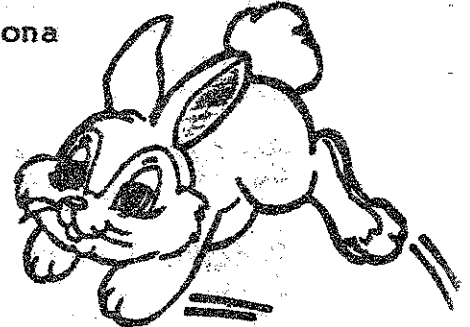
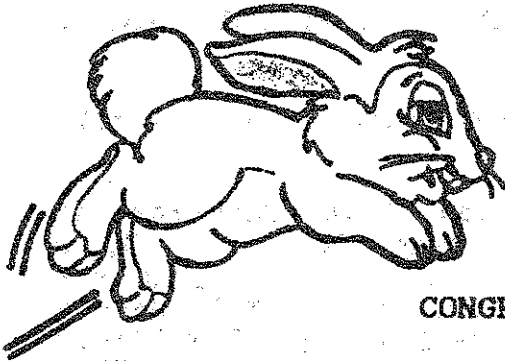

"GRAY DUTCH; WHERE DO WE STAND?"

I have been around and among the dutch since before I can even remember, and many of my best and earliest memories are of dutch shows and conventions where my parents happened to take me. Perhaps some of you older dutch fanciers would remember those days, even as I remember you. One of the Colors of Dutch I can best remember as a young child was that of the gray dutch. I've often wondered whether these memories of the beautiful gray dutch my parents raised and showed (rather successfully I might add), led me to start my personal rabbit experience with a pair of Chestnut Agouti Netherland Dwarfs. But, somehow even though I raised Netherland Dwarfs for many years, I was always drawn to the Dutch. I watched my father progress through black, blue, steel, tortise, chocolate and gray as I grew up. Even as I watched the rabbit grow in popularity and change as the ideals changed, I also watched the dutch club grow and change. Some of the changes, as with anything perhaps seemed inappropriate at the time, but as with anything so enduring as the dutch rabbit (and it's following of breeders), even inappropriate changes were weathered and the club drew its strength from the adaptations made. It would appear that the slogan "you can't beat the dutch", was incredibly insightful.

I have seen the turnover from Jesse Wienhardt's "secretary's chit chat", through Doris Leibel's "Dutch Den news" and on through Larry & Dorren Bengtson's secretary's reports and the Golden Jubilee in Janesville (yes I was there though I've probably changed since those days), and even on to Norma Hart's "From the Desk of your secretary." In fact I can vividly collating and stapling and labelling the 700+ Dutch Reporters that were sent forth from my family's living room only 10 years ago. (Only, can it be that many years already?). Yes, things have changed. . . I am now a junior at the University of Minnesota, though I still have the rabbits. I have given up the Netherland Dwarfs, and now I (and my father when he has the urge), am raising some Dutch. The C1's of days past have gone, but the future looms ahead bright, and hopeful.

Perhaps I shouldn't say this, but I haven't seen my ideal Dutch for many a year. I realize emphasis may have shifted, but I really miss the big buck heads of days past, and the larger numbers of Grays and Steels which used to grace the showrooms. I also miss the true gray color, which seems to have become more rare in its most perfect form. Today's gray has shorter fur, ergo weaker color. Unfortunately balancing type to color the gray with better type often has the upper hand. Not that it should be any other way, but it would be so refreshing to see those grays with both. Since I hear it so often it would be hard to resist quoting my father whose many (he won't tell me exactly how many) years of Dutch breeding seem to staggeringly outnumber mine

"the grays are too often a group of individuals produced through a variety of breedings from steels, or by crossing a gray individual with a black, blue or what have you. Indiscriminate color breeding probably causes more poorly colored animals than any other single factor.

I would suggest that you cull your grays closely for color, breeding only those with the correct color in spite of the temptation to use those otherwise outstanding individuals who are too brassy or lack a full length coat. The grays have carried a good coat of fur traditionally, and many a tough fur class has been won by them. Quit treating the grays as poor country cousins, put as much thought and effort into their breeding as you would for a good black, and I guarantee that you will produce grays that can compete for BOB

Today's Gray Dutch has fallen into the vise of shorter fur, something which can't help but destroy the good gray color. I believe that if we wish to improve the quality of the gray dutch that it is necessary to concentrate to a much greater degree on their fur and color. What good is the black dutch with inordinate amounts of white hairs, of the brassy steel, the faded blue, the sunburned chocolate and the smutty tortise? These are all problems which must be dealt with to produce quality in any color. Gray is no different.

I write this out of respect of the rabbit, the club, and especially the breeder. Doesn't the Dutch deserve to be the best it can be?

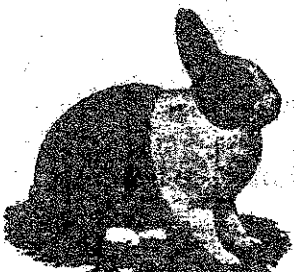

More on Cowhock by Judge Doris Leibel

Whichever way you look at it, cowhock is a general disqualification. This condition occurs in many breeds, but seems more noticeable in the marked breeds as the breeders have a tendency to save marking over what some consider a minor fault.

Good Dutch raisers would not tolerate this condition in their breeding stock.

I have raised Dutch continuously since 1946 and learned early that you dispose of animals that show this defect or tendency as it does continue to "show up" in succeeding generations. It doesn't go away and if anything gets worse.

Equally at fault are the judges that do not "call" this general disqualification as they feel there is reasonable doubt and this can happen..

I have worked under and been trained by many whom I consider Master Judges. Cy Lowit, Don Guthrie, Claire Barclay, many good rabbit conversations with Dick Bernhardt, John Fehr, Jimmy Blyth to name a few. These people were willing to share their expertise with sincere newcomers.

When I see pinched hips one should explore further. Gently raise the animal about 6" and drop them, easy, on the table. They should fall into their natural pose. If the Stops are sticking out from the body, (we used to say that some raisers raised cowhocked Dutch so the Judge could better see the stops). Then carefully turn them over do not distort the hind quarters by squeezing them. Observe how the pads are worn. Cowhocked animals would show wear on the sides of the hocks. otherwise wear would be centered. If nothing else encourage the animal to move on the table and observe how they "track". If after these procedures the judge can't make a cowhock decision it is reasonable doubt, or a borderline cowhock decision.

There seems to be an ongoing game between the Breeder and the Judge. The breeder wants to see what they can put over on the Judge and the Judge wants to catch everything and yet be as fair as they can. Then we have the new Breeder that gets caught in the middle and wonders what the heck is going on.

Remember Type come first (no general disqualification) then work on the markings and color.

Nothing gives greater pleasure than to breed and raise that good Dutch then to make it a Grand Champion.

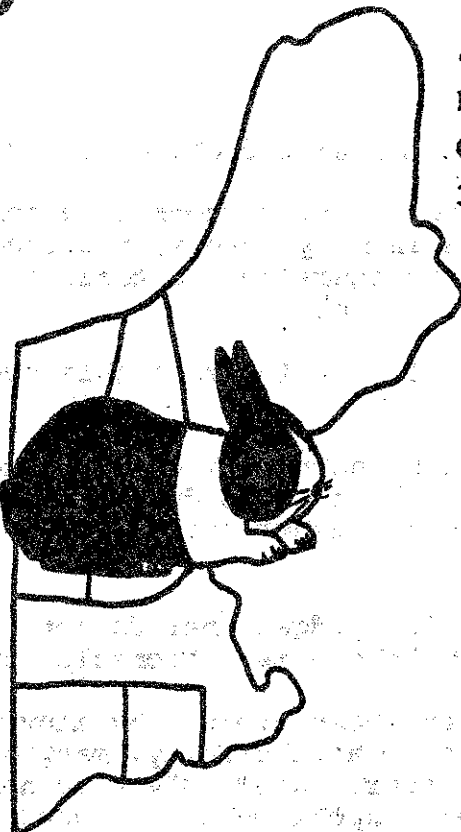

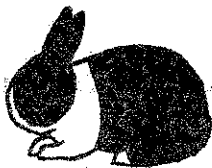

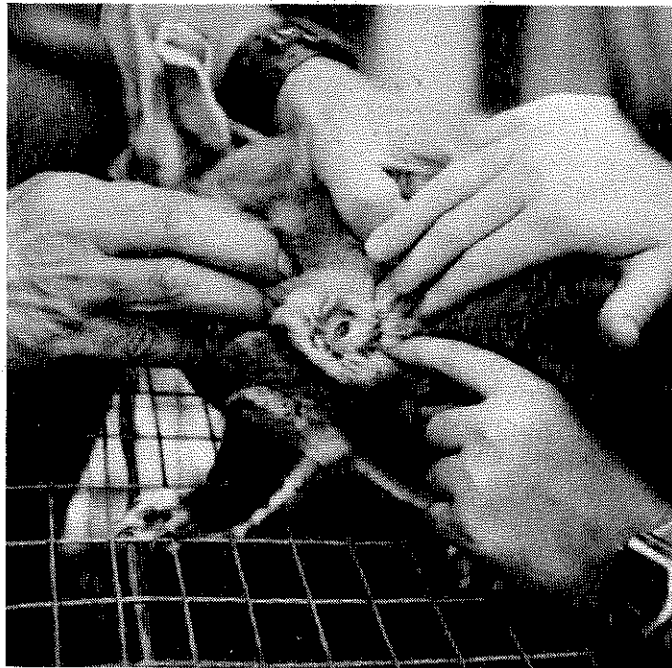

PERILS OF THE FLY SEASON

With summer comes flies in most parts of the United States. Those of us who house our rabbits outside have probably noticed, on close inspection, where a fly has laid an egg on the hair shaft of the rabbit. It appears to be nothing more than a speck, usually tan in color, that is attached to the hair. But for most of us, the first sign we see is hair missing around the throat, neck or in the saddle area. Upon examination you will find a swollen area, void of hair. It will show a cone-shaped opening about the size of a pea (2-3 cm) with an apical pore that is crusted over.

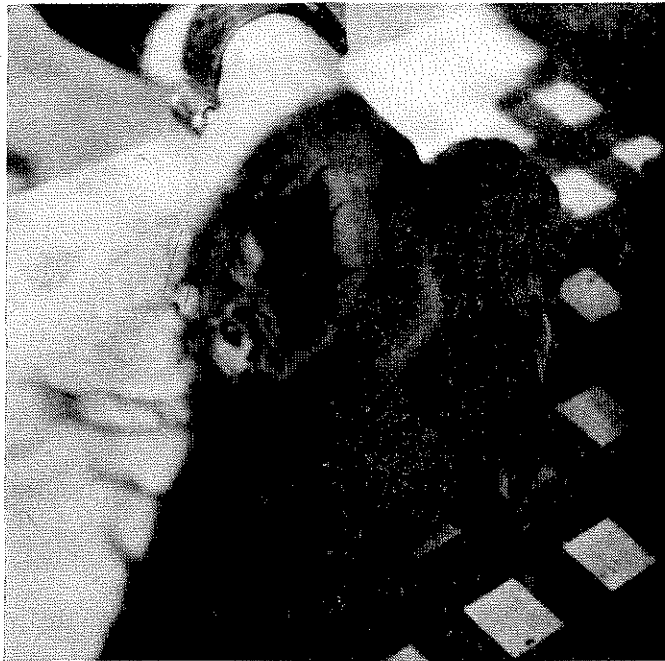
The fly has laid an egg which has burrowed under the skin where it develops into a larva or grub. The grub tunnels through the skin, leaving a swollen area of scar tissue. (Photo #1)



Removal of the grub can be done very easily. You will need a tweezers, hydrogen peroxide, a single edge razor blade or Exacto knife and a few cottonballs. Soak the cotton ball, one at a time in either warm water or hydrogen peroxide. Place the soaked cottonball over the pore and allow the skin to soften. After a few minutes, lift the cottonball off and scrape the crusty scab off with the razor blade or knife.

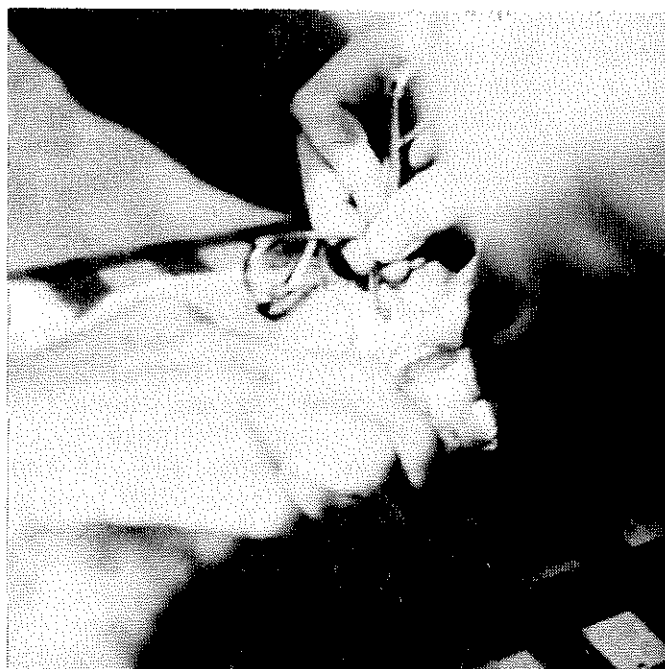
The next step is to pour hydrogen peroxide directly onto the opening, a few drops at a time. The peroxide will fizz. Allow it to fizz completely before gently wiping away the remaining liquid. Look carefully for movement of the grub coming to the top of the pore. If after 30 seconds to a minute you see no movement, apply hydrogen peroxide, wait, and remove the excess fluid. If after the second application, there isn't any movement, you may need to enlarge the opening around the pore to allow the larva a large enough passage to exit through. (Photo #2) If the larva has lived within the host (rabbit) for a period of time, the pore opening will be

smaller than the larva as it is used for an air supply only, once the larva has burrowed inside.



The enlargement of the opening is made by simply making a slit on opposite sides of the pore of approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch. The peroxide will have, to some extent, numbed the surrounding tissue so that no anesthetic is needed.

When movement is seen, wait - patiently - for the grub to come at least $\frac{1}{2}$ way out of the pore. With your tweezers, grasp the grub firmly and pull upward, making sure to get the entire grub. Crushing the larva in the subcutis may result in fatal shock reaction. (Photo #3) After the grub has been removed, you may want to pour another dose of peroxide onto the pore to disinfect. Pus may be seen inside the pore opening after the grub is removed. No suturing is needed.



If the animal is one that you intend on showing, you may want to apply a sauve or vaseline until the hair begins to grow back. You may have a permanent spot of damaged tissue around where the grub had burrowed. This will not effect the animal for breeding purposes but may keep it from being showed.

To keep animals from being subjected to larva, use good housekeeping skills of removing all manure from under and around the coop, wire brush and disinfect the coop floor and possibly spray around the housing area with barn fly spray.

I would like to bring up the subject of color breeding that is supposed to obtain the best coloring.

I find that here in New England it seems the practice of interbreeding all colors together. I purchased a buck from one of the officers of the New England Dutch Club, and this was a pedigreed rabbit, a paper was given. After using this buck and seeing the genetics thrown needless to say this buck was culled fast. He had every color in his ancestry except tort. You should have seen the babies, their color was something that we couldn't put a name on.

I think that there needs to be some rules put against this type of breeding. No more intermixing black into chocolates, or grays, or steel then back again.

The genetics shown in the offspring colors suffer as most of the litter shows the mongrel color and this comes from several generations.

I can't understand it when the A. D. C. tells in their book about color breeding. It seems like some clubs and it's members advocate doing anything, even if it is wrong.

This is going in reverse of trying for "THE PERFECT DUTCH."

I think that any clubs and it's members that practice bad color breeding need to learn genetics or let experienced breeders teach them, what has been learned over the years, and then, and only then, will this work for the better of the Dutch.

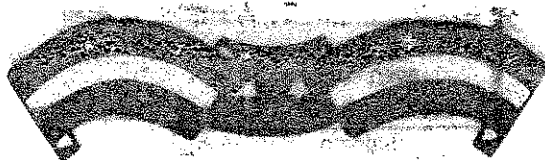
I disagree that breeding black into chocolate produces better color. I have seen the offspring of this and they have been bred back into blacks and other colors. The results seen has been a black and white with a chocolate streak running through the black fur.

If this type of breeding is allowed to continue, then sooner or later we will end up with mongrel colored Dutch. This will be the down fall of a good looking, and color established rabbit. Too Bad!

Again, I think it is time to concentrate at the process of trying to obtain the "PERFECT DUTCH" and not raising Dutch with mongrel colors just to say we raise Dutch.
