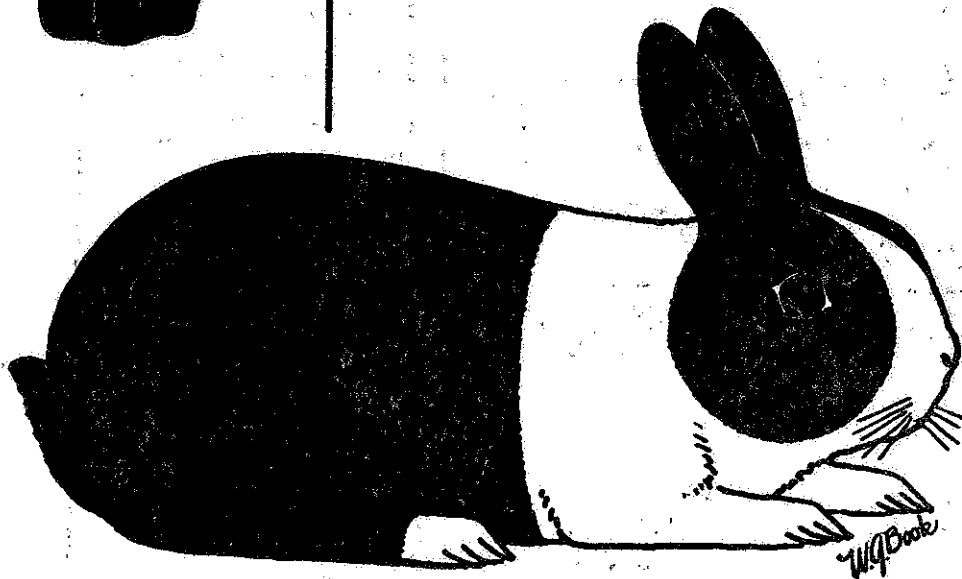

To those who are unacquainted with Dutch, and those who are just making their acquaintance, we direct our publicity. Then, too, others who have forgotten facts concerning our Dutch and their care may have memories refreshed or may pick up small ideas which can aid them in the future.

By helping these people to succeed in the breeding of Dutch, we help ourselves by enlarging our specialty club, also by selling stock.

Our "Dutch Reporter" could be used to better advantage if more breeders sent articles not only about Dutch, but also about ourselves. At our shows we come to know only a small percentage of the members of our club. If every member would write something, and tell us all about yourselves, we would feel more as if we knew you.

If we know each other better, we should be more friendly. And if we are friendly we should get along together to knit a club of closer relationships and better understanding.

Some of you may say, "I don't know that hall fellow. What about him?" Well, my first Dutch, which was a young, blue doe, was given to me in 1911, when a youngster. During World War I, I served with the 51st (Caldcat) Division overseas, and the rabbits were out. Following my return I went back to school and didn't raise any rabbits until about 1940, when I started again with White New Zealands. Now I am an engineering draftsman with the New York State Department of Public Works, and am interested in Tortoise and Blue Dutch, having raised Dutch continuously since 1944. (I discontinued White New Zealands in 1945.) I have specialized in Tortoiseshell, but blues and blacks have had a home with me recently. As for knowing all about Dutch, I disclaim that honor.

AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB

MINUTES - AREA CONVENTION at SPRINGFIELD, ILLINOIS - OCT. 12, 1958

The meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order at 3:15 P.M. Oct. 12, 1958 by President George Bayliss, with the request of a roll call of officers. The following officers and board members were present: George Bayliss, Pres., Jessie Weinhardt, Sec'y-Treas., Board Members, Tom Shufflebotham, J. Cyril Lowit, E. C. Bickley, and Roger Eich. Absent were, Vice-president, G. C. Leisenring, and Board member L. E. Kettle.

There was a motion by Tom Shufflebotham, seconded by E. C. Bickley that the minutes of the meetings held at the National Dutch Show at Wellington, Ohio, having been published in the Dutch Reporter, be accepted. Carried.

A financial report and a letter expressing his regret at being unable to attend was read from retiring Publicity Director, G. C. Leisenring. Under a motion by Bickley, seconded by Wm. Stedman, it was voted to accept the report as read.

A part of the financial report prepared by the Sec'y-Treas. was read and accepted with instructions that the entire report be published in the forthcoming issue of the Dutch Reporter.

Under Committee reports - E. C. Bickley reported that the uproar over the Gray Standard had died down and everyone was apparently satisfied and due to the fact that no changes were allowable under the ARBA rules until the time of publication of its next Book of Standards, he had nothing to report except that he felt that as far as the Standards were concerned, his committee didn't feel that there was much room for improvement - now all we have to do is raise Dutch to fit the Standard.

J. C. Lowit as Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee reported the accomplishment of the raise in dues, the Dutch Pot, and the adoption of the Seller's Class, as means of increasing the ADRC revenue. There was a suggestion brought up and offered to this committee that the ADRC establish another "first" and provide, through the secretary's office, for a fee - some sort of card or certificate for display on the hutch of a Grand Champion.

Tom Shufflebotham as Chairman of the Educational Committee reported that he was continuing to furnish replies to all queries forwarded to him by the secretary's office, and that said replies were appearing at intervals in the Dutch Reporter. He stated that all he needed to do a better job, was to have more questions sent in.

The matter of the "Sunflower" rosettes as awards for Sweepstake winners, that was left unfinished from the Wellington meeting was again brought up. The portion of the minutes of that meeting pertaining to this subject were read by the secretary, and after a clarification as to the purpose of requesting the change, was made by the secretary, i.e., that the rosettes were too large to be generally acceptable, and that it wasn't felt that the winner was getting value received commensurate with the cost of such rosettes, alternative awards were discussed. The secretary passed around a small cup with room for engraving the pertinent information regarding the winning, which could be purchased at somewhat less cost, and would provide a more permanent and more readily displayable record of accomplishment. A motion was made by Wm. Stedman, seconded by Clinton Dennis that we make the change to such cups, after the close of the present series with the National Dutch Show in 1959. After ascertaining that there were none of the "Sunflower" rosettes either now on hand, or on order, the motion was amended to read, such cups to be awarded at the end of the current series which would be April, 1959. Carried.

There was a motion by Al Emery, seconded by Merle Emery that the cost of the first place Trophy for the Sweepstake be reduced from \$25.00 to \$15.00 plus the engraving on same. Mr. Bickley stated that disregarding the fact that he had been the winner of this award for the past two years, he felt that the effort put forth to enable a breeder to reach the top of the Sweepstakes warranted a bigger award. He also stated that the second place winner, because of his extra effort, was entitled to something a little better than the awards made those who finished further down in the Top Ten. He suggested that a larger second place Trophy be also awarded. The Messers Emery amended their motion to read - a Trophy for \$15.00, plus engraving for 1st.

place in the Sweepstake Series and a Trophy for \$10.00 for second place winner be awarded. Carried.

There was a discussion of the Seller's Class and it was brought out that this matter had been discussed in the board meeting, and that Mr. Lowit had been instructed to re-write the rules. There seemed to be considerable dissatisfaction by the membership in general with the pay-back of only 25% of the selling price to the donor. Several alternative plans were offered. It was felt that the plan was entirely too good a thing to discontinue, but that it did need some alteration. Mr. Lowit was instructed to re-work the rules as per some of the suggestions. He stated that he would do so and send them for publication in the Dutch Reporter giving the membership an opportunity to vote in favor of one of three alternative plans. 1. That the rabbits be donated outright, with the only return to be the prize money offered. 2. 25% to be paid the donor and 75% retained by the club (which has been the past practice). 3. 50% to be paid to the donor and 50% retained by the club.

The question was again brought up, as at Wellington, as to why there had been no authorization for prize money to be offered for a Seller's Class at the National Dutch Show. It was pointed out that such authorization should come from the membership in general, through the secretary. The secretary stated that there had never been such authorization, that the original authorization had been for Convention Shows only.

A motion was made by E. C. Bickley, seconded by _____ that the secretary be empowered to authorize the sponsoring club of National Dutch Shows to publish the rules as set up by the committee. Carried.

Under New Business it was announced by President Bayliss that his appointment of Roger Eich to fill the vacancy on the Board of Directors created by the resignation of James Blyth, and his appointment of J. Russell Hall of New York, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of G. C. Leisenring as Publicity Director, had been approved by the Board of Directors.

A request was made for a report from the secretary on the status of the plan for exchanging memberships with the members of the United Kingdom Dutch Rabbit Club. Mr. Bayliss stated that he had started the ball rolling by exchanging membership with James Read, President of said organization and that the secretary had followed with an exchange with Mr. Stone the secretary of the UKDRC. It was reported that to date, ten such exchange memberships had been arranged for. The secretary explained that this was done by an ADRC member paying the dues of a British member in our club and having his dues paid, in return, by a UKDRC member. In this manner an exchange of Guide Books and other publications was made possible. It was reported that the present list of persons interested in such an exchange had been exhausted and the secretary would welcome the names of any other members who might be interested. Several volunteered.

Mr. Jimmy Sinclair requested the floor to be heard regarding the action of the secretary in disqualifying a show put on at the Roanoke (Va.) County Fair and sponsored by the Roanoke Rabbit Breeders Ass'n. It was explained by the secretary that certain rules and regulations had been set up by the ADRC which must be complied with in order to qualify as a Dutch Sweepstake Show and when such rules were broken, or as in this case, the required printing completely omitted from the show catalog, she was left with no alternative but to disqualify such a show.

Mr. Sinclair stated that he realized this situation, and for this purpose wished to bring the matter before the open meeting. He said that he also realized, now, that he had been remiss in not familiarizing himself with the rules as set up in our Guide Book, and when the Fair Secretary called him at the last minute for the necessary information, he did what he thought was right. He went on to explain that he, for one had learned a very valuable lesson and that some of the people who were directly affected by this action, were new members who would either be "in or out" depending upon our decision, and that he hoped for the sake of future relations in his part of the country, the general meeting would see fit to take some action in their favor. He stated, very firmly, that any show with which he had anything to do in the future, would comply with the rules to the letter.

Clinton Ferris made a motion, seconded by Cyril Lowit that we recognize the Roanoke Fair and award the ribbons and points earned there. Carried.

Meeting adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

SECRETARY'S CHIT CHAT

We are approaching the joyful holiday season. Shows are rather few and far between for the next six weeks, there being only seven sanctioned for Dutch Sweepstake in December and four in January, so if there is any time left from our busy holiday schedules we can devote it to the care and well-being of our bunnies. I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of the present membership, and their families the very happiest of the Season's Greetings. May the Good Lord take a liking to you, and fulfill your every desire.

I have a few little problems that perhaps some of you can help me out with - on another page you will find a list of past shows for which I have the show reports on file, but have never received copies of the show catalogs. It is my practice to notify the show secretary immediately upon receipt of the show report, if I do not have a catalog for that show on file. I know that the the post office is a very overworked organization and that much of our third class mail goes astray, for one reason or another, therefore, unless the show is close enough to our home that there might be some chance of our attending it, I appreciate having the catalog included with the mailing of the show report. There is only one drawback to this. Occasionally a catalog comes to me in which the specials are not listed completely as required by our By-Laws. In a case of this kind, if I have received the catalog a week or ten days before the show, I can write and instruct the secretary to post the omitted specials in the show room and thus qualify their show. My next step, if I am still not in receipt of the catalog after ten days or two weeks, is to check through the list of exhibitors to find one who I am certain is anxiously awaiting his ribbons, and write him a note explaining the situation and requesting his help in securing a copy of the catalog. This system has worked out very well, but you can see how much letter writing is involved, which increases the overhead of this office. Now if you should see one of the shows in which you are interested, among those on this list, I would appreciate it if you would either contact the show secretary with a gentle reminder, or if this is not convenient, perhaps you would be willing, for the sake of getting your ribbons or points, to send me your copy. I will post lists of such shows from time to time in the Dutch Reporter and feel certain that the membership will cooperate with me completely. Any show secretary who finds their show listed here, please don't blame me, and if you DID mail me a catalog, remember that I am giving you the benefit of the doubt and blaming it on Uncle Sam.

Here is another thing that only the membership can help me with - Quite often I am asked for information on some State Dutch Club. Sometimes I can give this information, but more often than not I have to refer the writer to the office of the ARBA where these clubs are on record. I occasionally hear from someone that a new club has been formed and they follow this up with a list of the first years officers and perhaps that is the last I ever hear from them. I am planning with the beginning of the year, on setting up a file, listing these State Clubs by name, and listing the name and address of the secretary. I think it would be nice if I could list the number of members current at the time of their election of officers. The only way that this can be done, is for each State Club to include in their By-Laws a rule instructing each new secretary to send me this information as his or her first duty of office. If cooperation is great enough, and enough Club secretaries send me news of their organizations doings, we might work up a short newsletter, periodically, perhaps not as often as once a month, but perhaps every third month and thus all be able to work together better for the good of the parent organization.

I have a note on my desk from Merle Emery, stating that he, in cooperation with E. C. Bickley, have been working very hard toward building up a "4 Best Dutch Pot" that will equal or exceed the results of the efforts of J. C. Lowit in 1957-58. To

date they have a subscription of \$60.00 for 1959. This amount is \$44.00 short of the amount collected and paid out in 1958 and \$40.00 short of 1957. I think it would be nice if we could make this pot even bigger for 1959, don't you? Why not write to one of them today and send them your bit? Mail your contribution either to: E. C. I don't know how many of you have noticed, but the number of breeders advertising their stock in the Dutch Reporter has been on a steady decline over the past eighteen months. 1959 NATIONAL DUTCH SHOW

Plan now to enter your Dutch and to attend the National Dutch Show at the Erie County Fairgrounds at Hamburg, New York next April. Hamburg is a suburb of Buffalo the "Queen City" of the Great Lakes, and the second largest city in the State. Nearby world-famous Niagara Falls is a tourist attraction, where 23 million tons of water plunge 167 feet into Niagara Gorge every hour. Other major attractions are Old Fort Niagara, on Lake Ontario, and Buffalo's Museum of Science, Buffalo Historical Society, and Delaware Park. The historic Peace Bridge connects the United States and Canada at Buffalo. The New York State Thruway is only a 3-minute drive from the site of our show, thus is very accessible to all who travel by auto.

(Sec'y's Note: Due to the fact that many miles may be saved by persons living in Michigan, Northern Illinois, and Indiana, Northwestern Ohio and points on west and north, by crossing from Michigan, either via the Blue Water Bridge into Sarnia or by the Ambassador Bridge from Detroit to Windsor and on across Canada, my husband and I plan to take a day off and go into Detroit and Windsor and confer with the customs authorities and find out just what can be done to facilitate the transportation of our show rabbits through Canada, by these routes. GOLD DUTCH - DO WE WANT THEM?

I read with thorough observation our Secretary's GOS for the beautiful Gold Dutch in the last bulletin and I wish to do my bit to try to get them into the Standard of the ARBA.

I would like to match our Secretary's offer of a Trophy for the Gold Dutch at the next Convention to be held at Buffalo, New York. The offer is as follows: "An engraved Trophy for Best Gold Dutch, ARBA Convention, 1959 by A & P Herman."

I feel that all of us would proudly have the Gold Dutch added to our lustrous Standard colors. I'm well aware of the fact that they will challenge some scientific breeding, but so do all of the accepted Standard colors. I know many successful Dutch fanciers are of the school that believes that in order to retain a real jet black, an infusion of blue is essential and vice-versa; in fact all of the existing colors have the color pigments strengthened by the infusion of out-colors. After all, bluing makes white wash whiter. Naturally, at least I will admit that Gold may need to be supplemented with other colors from time to time to retain a real deep color.

At this time we are studying with anxiety the development of a litter of six all Gold Dutch that are the result of a Gold to Gold mating. This litter has a very well balanced color reproduction; the young are carrying the same shade as the parents.

The Galloways of Lubbock, Texas have in the past made real progress with the Gold Dutch. Gerald Vaught has also had very good color in Golds.

The Gold Dutch is without a doubt a real challenge to the tru rabbit fanciers, yet I refuse to be pessimistic about this color. The Dutch family retains some of the most scrupulous breeders the ra bit industry has. These are the rabbit lovers that will develop the Gold Dutch to the stage where they will be acceptable to the ARBA Standard Committee in 1959.

The call should be sent out for each and everyone of us to do our fair share during the next eight or ten months to develop and retain the best possible for representation at the proving grounds in Buffalo, New York. The cry after the next Convention should be: "Gold Dutch accepted to ARBA Standard "
