

#### THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The 37th, annual A.R.B.A. Convention and Show goes down in history as another well planned and managed event. A little over 2,000 rabbits were entered; out of this number very close to 300 were DUTCH. Some of the Dutch that were entered were outstanding animals; the Black Junior Classes were very outstanding, the Blues and Chocolates were up there fighting for top honors; but when the chips were down the two top honors went to the Tortoise Sr. Buck, Best Dutch; Best Opposite to a Black Senior Doe. One other thing on the judging of the Dutch - all Grays were disqualified, - For Undercuts - this was done to bring the Gray Standard to a head. I am somewhat disgusted in the way the Gray Standard has dragged some two years without any satisfactory results; but after what action was taken at the judging table and also in the meeting, I feel the Gray Standard will now meet with the approval of all concerned. I made the statement while judging the Grays, "that I lost in the judging some very good Gray colored Dutch"; the color on some of the Grays at the convention was very clean and well defined.

At all shows there are always the unsung workers, and the convention show was no exception. We have in our membership ranks many hard workers, and one of these unsung workers is Jack Boughton of Cleveland; Jack stayed on the job from the first to the last Dutch judged. I feel pretty safe in saying that Jack carried at least 50% of the Dutch to the judging table; Jack was there if anything special was needed for the Judges; Jack was on the job VERY EARLY the second day at my request. Thanks, Jack, for a job well done, and also to many others that helped around the

judging table.

The annual meeting of your Club was well attended; and in the absence of our Sec'y, Mrs. Weinhardt, Sue Dennis took the honor, - or perhaps the headache, - of acting Jec'y for the meeting; for a while in the meeting I thought that Sue would throw in the sponge, what with some hot discussion and the D\_\_\_\_BLASING of the public address system within the showroom, it was somewhat hard for all. Neverthe-less, the minutes of the meeting, found elsewhere in the DUTCH REPORTER, will give detailed account of what action was taken.

#### AMERICAN DUTCH RABBIT CLUB

Minutes of Annual Meeting - Fort Worth, Texas - October 10, 1960
The meeting was called to order by President Beorge Bayliss at 3;00 P. M. at
the appointed place. In the absence of the Secretary the President appointed Sue
Dennis to act as recording secretary for the purpose of preserving minutes of the
meeting.

Roll Call of Officers found President Geo. Bayliss, Directors, Tom Shufflebotham, Roger Eich and Clinton Dennis were present and Vice-President Gerald Leisenring, Secretary Treasurer Mrs. W. A. Weinhardt and directors E. C. Bickley, William C. Stedman and Jimmy Sinclair were absent.

Report of Officers: None.

Report of Committees: Ways & Means Committee Chairman, Clint Dennis reported for his committee composed of Roger Eich, William C. Stedman and J. C. Lowit, that his committee had been directed by the President to explore means of raising money for the ADRC and to try to find some way to cut expenses so that we could continue to give our membership the services they are entitled to without running our club in the red. It was reported that this committeee recommended certain projects to the meeting at Harper, Iowa including raising the Advertising in the Dutch Reporter,

printing up Decals and Stamps for sale to the membership, all of which were adopted by the membership at Harper and that the Decals and Stamps were now available from the Publicity Director. Mr. Dennis expressed his personal opinion that since many of our expenses were fixed by people over shich we have no control that our opportunity to cut expenses was very limited. He pointed out that according to the figures furnished to his committee by the Secretary that we are going in the hole about \$300.00 to \$400.00 on the publishing of the Dutch Reporter each year and that as a result each year we are showing a smaller balance on hand than in the year before which points up the urgent need to do something. He also pointed out that his committee had checked into the possibility of raising the sweepstake sanction fee and found that we are making a small amount on each show and that his committee had unanimously recommended leaving the sweepstake sanction as it is. Mr. Dennis then read from the ADRC By-Laws, Art. III APPORTIONMENT OF FUNDS, Section 1 - "The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive  $12\frac{1}{2}\%$  of all membership dues including renewals and 50% of all other income as full compensation for his or her services". He also expressed his opinion that this included such items as, Sweepstake sanctions, income from sale of advertising in the Dutch Reporter, Income from Seller's Class, any surplus which might be turned to the Treasurer by the Publicity Director from sale of publicity items, in short all money coming thru the treasurer. In response to a question from the floor. Mr. Dennis stated that his best recollection was that according to the past two quarterly reports the Secretary-Treasurer was being paid Approximately \$220.00 a quarter or from \$800.00 to \$900.00 each year. He stated that if the Club could afford this amount that he thought the services now being rendered by the Secretary-Treasurer were well worth the amount, however he expressed doubt that the Club could afford this amount.

Mr. Bill Summers suggested that perhaps we could work out an arrangement whereby we could divide the work somewhat and take some of the work and responsibility off the shoulders of the Secretary-Treasurer and thereby lighten her work and allow her to continue working but for a lesser amount.

Director Tom Shufflebotham expressed agreement with Mr. Summers and suggested that one way to do this would be to give the work of publishing the Dutch Reporter to someone else and preferrably to the Publicity Director.

Clint Dennis stated that in his opinion we would have to change the Constitu-

tion and By-Laws to effect this change.

Director Shufflebotham stated that he believed that since the Dutch Reporter was behind two issues at this time that the President had the authority to appoint someone to get out the Dutch Reporter.

President Bayliss stated that under the present set-up that the Publicity Director had no funds to operate on independent of the Secretary-Treasurer and that this was one of the most important functions of the club, publicity, and that perhaps a change here to make more funds available for publicity would be a good idea.

Mr. Jack Boughton asked if the ADRC had thought about putting the Secretary on

a flat salary.

President Bayliss stated that this had been done in the past but that experience had dictated the fee arrangement.

Mr. Boughton said he thought that the Secretary-Treasurer should be paid but that he felt we could not afford to pay as much as we have been paying.

Mr. Al Neier stated that he felt that he was familiar with the work of the Secretary of the New Zealand Club and that their secretary did not receive over \$400.00 a year and he felt that we could not afford to continue the present pay scale. altho he realized that it was a lot of work.

President Bayliss expressed concern if anything happened to our present Secretary-Treasurer, that with the tremendous load she was carrying that it would be almost impossible to replace her and that there was room for thought in the idea of splitting some of the responsibility of the office.

Mr. Al Herman stated that he had always thought the Secretary-Treasurer worked

for free and that he felt that it should be that way.

President Bayliss remarked that he believed there was too much work to expect

anyone to do it all for free.

President Bayliss then asked if the Ways and Means Committee had any recommendations to make and Mr. Dennis stated that his committee recommended that this meeting instruct the President to appoint a committee to draft appropriate proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws which would take into consideration the following suggestions. First, provide for a division of the work of the Secretary-Treasurer by giving the responsibility of the Dutch R porter to the Publicity Director; Second, to provide for additional help for the Publicity Director by making provisions for the appointment of a Publicity Committee, the Chairman of which will be the Publicity Director and third, to provide for a new schedule of paying our Secretary-Treasurer based on the lessened work load and our ability to pay and that as soon as this committee makes their report to the President that he will forthwith cause the proposed changes to be submitted to the Membership for a vote in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws.

Mr. Kirk Moore moved that we accept the recommendations of the Ways & Means Committee, seconded by Mr. Al Herman. Motion was called for. Motion carried unanimously

President Bayliss stated that he did not like to talk about Director Bickley in his absence, but that the Standard Committee of which Mr. Bickley was chairman, did not seem to be functioning with reference to the Gray Dutch Standard and that he would appreciate the membership who were interested in the Gray Dutch writing Mr. Bickley instead of the President. He also asked if anyone had read the standard for Dutch as published in the new ARBA Standards of Perfection, no one present had, so he read "Eliminations applies to all colors. Lack of Surface or Under-color in belly thus failing to show an undercut; except for Grays."

President Bayliss then called for comment and there resulted considerable discussion as to why, wherefore, who did and who did not, resulting in the apparent conclusion that we would have to work thru normal channels and approach the ARBA

Standards Committee.

Motion by Bill Summers that we instruct the Standards Committee of the ADRC to start the necessary action to eliminate the phrase "Except for Grays" from the color elimination above. Seconded by Reger Eich. Motion called for. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Bill Summers stated that there had been a mistake on the printed ballot with reference to the Judges names who were disqualified from judging. President Bayliss acknowledged that this was true but felt that the voting would take care of the

mistake.

Mr. Al Herman wanted to know about the color of blue eyes in Blue Dutch. The Standard calls for Dark Blue but he felt that many being exhibited sure could not

qualify as dark blue.

Mr. Al Meier, Chairman of the Election Committee requested that all members carefully read their ballots before casting their votes and not cast an unlawful ballot as this only complicated the work of the committee and usually resulted in the ballot being veided. Particularly in instances where directors were already serving from one state and people were voting for people from that state or voting for judges which had previously served.

President Bayliss stated that the National Dutch Show would be held in Colorado next year and asked for report from Mr. Bill Summers who reported that everything was shaping up and they were soliciting specials and advertising from the member-

ship who were interested.

Mr. Al Herman wanted to know what happened to Gold Dutch at last years ARBA Convention Show. Clint Dennis reported that he had been interested and that he was present when the ARBA Standards Committee checked the ones exhibited at Syracuse and that they had stated that the breeders had not eliminated the shadings from the Golds and had made no progress and that since that was the third year for showing under the working Standard that they would not consider them further.

Mr. Byron Wilson said that he had flocded the country with Golds and that the

ARBA would have to put up with them as long as he lived.

Mr. Al Herman stated that he still wanted to show Golds and the President sug-

gested that he take this up with the President of the ARBA.

Motion to adjourn by Roger Eich, seconded by Jack Boughton.

Meeting adjourned at 4:50 PM, Oct. 10, 1960

Dear Vern:

I am in receipt of a letter to James D. Collins of the Florida Dutch Club relative to the judging of meat pen classes in the coming show of the Florida Dutch Club.

I presume that as I am to judge this show the copy has been sent to me.

However, though I will judge to this standard, I consider such a ruling slightly ridiculous to apply disqualifications that apply to open classes to meat entries. In applying this interpretation literally you are eliminating the Dutch from the meat pens, and I and many other Dutch breeders are finding the Dutch an extremely successful and saleable source of meat. The Dutch rabbit is hardy in all climates and is producing a nice sized carcass.

The disqualifications applied to the open classes in Dutch eliminate many of the best producers of meat stock from the classes themselves, as many breeders find the animal that will not register the best parent of show stock. Most of the old Dutch

breeders use heavily marked stock as breeders.

We do agree that sick animals - vent disease, colds, etc., should be eliminated; but we hold that the meat pens are made up of the culls that will not meet open

show requirements (as to markings).

I cannot see that an animal with split-stops or a tied front leg can effect the desireability of the dressed carcass and after all is not that the purpose of the meat producer - to produce economically a good meat item?

P. S. In the matter of the Gray Dutch, the American Standard Committee has been of no help to the fancier and has allowed the same standard to stand on the books for a number of years. When it was written I protested that it was unworkable and could not be applied and yet it has been allowed to remain in the standard. I do understand that your committee took action at Ft. Worth but such action cannot be applied for another five year period, can it? Tom

#### SECRETARY'S CHIT\_CHAT

There are only one or two small items I would like to bring to your attention at this time. One of these is the manner in which your local clubs are handicapping themselves in waiting so very late to apply for their sweepstake sanctions. Our rules read, and I quote, "Sanction must be applied for sixty (60) days prior to date of show." One of the most important reasons for this is to give your secretary ample time to list this show at least once in the Dutch Reporter, IN TIME FOR OUR MEMBERS TO WRITE FOR A CATALOG AND RETURN THEIR ENTRY. It does our members no good to find a show listed in their area after that show has become history, and it certainly cannot benefit the show if our members are not informed that a Dutch Sweepstake Show is being held within traveling distance of their homes. So everybody loses and nobody gains by this delay. What the reason for so much dallying is, is something I cannot see. The problem of securing a judge for your show, anymore, has become quite a task. I have heard some judges state that they are all booked up for next spring already. It seems to me that any show that is contemplated for less than four to six months in the future is doomed to dissapointment before it gets off the ground. Why not see if we ADRC members, as members of our locals can hurry the action on these things and help make our shows more successful.

Speaking of shows, a very interesting catalog crossed my desk the other day, one with an idea that I think perhaps some other clubs might find well worth incorporating into some future show. The catalog is from the South Euclid, Ohio Rabbit Club, and the idea is for a "Nominated Dutch Display". This is what their catalog had to say about this class:

"This is a completely NEW CLASS, never offered before in any known show. In this class the breeder must nominate four of his rabbits that he wishes to compete for this award. All FOUR must be designated on the entry blank at time of making your entry.

Any FOUR DUTCH, regardless of color, class or sex are eligible.

Only four rabbits may be nominated by an exhibitor.

To be eligible for this award, the four nominations must be designated by the exhibitor at time of making entry.

Substitutions will be allowed ONLY for a rabbit entered but not exhibited in this show."

I have received the show report for this show, but no mention was made of how this class was received by the exhibitors, nor what the outcome of it was. I know I would be interested to hear and I wonder if other members wouldn't like to know.

I hope you will all make use of the enclosed ballot and mail it back to Al Meier before the deadline date on it. He and his committee have graciously volunteered to take on the extra work of counting these ballots which would not have been necessary were it not for your secretary's dumb carelessness. I would like to take this opportunity to publicily thank them for their kindness.

While in the "Thank you" department, I would like to pass on my gratitude to Sue Dennis for the wonderful job she did in recording the minutes of the Ft. Worth ADRC meeting. It was a very clear concise job of recording and I do not think there can be any questions as to the subject matter contained in the report. Thanks

again. Sue and I hope to see you at Colorado Springs next spring.

Before I wind this up I mustn't forget to let you know that our Fublicity Director, J. Russell Hall has informed me that the new Decals (which are really beautiful, by the way) are priced very reasonably. They are  $50\phi$  each or 3 for \$1.00.
