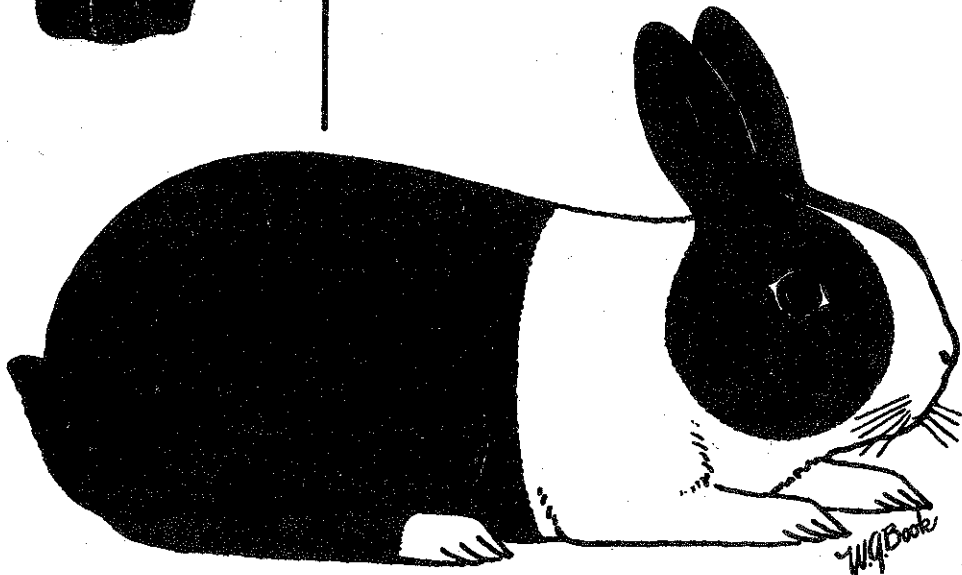

Minutes, General Meeting

The general meeting of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order on Thurs. morning, Oct. 30, 1962 at the American Rabbit Breeders Ass'n. Convention at Tampa, Florida by President George Bayliss at 10:15 A.M. The roll call of officers showed the following officers present, President Bayliss, Secretary-Treasurer, Jessie Weinhardt, Directors, Tom Shufflebotham and Bill Summers. Absent were: Vice-President Melvin Emery and Directors Roger Eich, E. C. Bickley, William Stedman and Don Reid.

The minutes of the Wilmington Delaware National Dutch Show meeting were read and approved.

The officers present had no report to make.

Tom Shufflebotham and Bill Summers collaborated in giving a lengthy report on the new Guide Book, Mr. Shufflebotham being general chairman of the committee and Bill Summers being in charge of advertising. Mr. Shufflebotham reported that in spite of a strong inclination to quit the job in the early days because of lack of cooperation, not only from the membership, but from most of his committee, he now felt very good about the whole thing as matters are now snowballing and indications are that we will have one of the finest Guide Books ever put out by any specialty club. He stated that it was his intention to keep this new Guide Book on a completely educational plane by not accepting articles on such subjects as "Why I raise Dutch" or "How I got started in Dutch", but rather to concentrate on articles that would give a beginner some really useful information with which to get started. He stated that due to the great cost of the book it was absolutely impossible for his committee to accept advertising that was not accompanied with full payment for same, and that the door is not, at this date closed for accepting further advertising. The more advertising that is received the more informative articles can be used. The secretary was instructed to include the blanks for the membership to send in their ads at least until Jan. 1st., in the Dutch Reporter. A sample of the new cover design was passed around for the membership's examination, along with samples of color prints of the six varieties that had been rejected by the printer. These were quite fine, so the ones that were accepted must be outstanding.

The committee asked those members present for suggestions and the question was

raised as to whether pictures of the officers were to be included. Mr. Shufflebotham stated that it was the thinking of his committee that these should be left out as the Guide Book would be current for at least five years and the officers are apt to change each year, so would soon be out-of-date. Also to be taken into consideration was the cost of the cuts for these pictures. Some of the members present felt that these pictures should be included, with each officer paying the cost of his own cut. There was a motion by Walter Cook, seconded by Clinton Dennis that the decision should be left up to the committee. Carried.

The report of the 1962 election was read by the Secretary.

The Ways and Means Committee Chairman, Clinton Dennis stated that his committee had received no instructions and hence had taken no action and had no report.

Mrs. Shufflebotham reported that the Publicity Committee was functioning well under the set-up of State and Area Representatives. She regretted to report that one of the very best of her workers, Mrs. William (Virginia) Pierce had finally been forced by ill-health to give up, not only all of her rabbits, but all rabbit activities and could no longer represent the club in Colorado. She stated that she was all out of shoulder patches and back patches. She still had a good supply of pedigree books and some decals. She also reported that she had been promised an oil painting of a Dutch Rabbit which she had planned to sell tickets on at this Convention to raise extra money for her department, but to date it had not arrived. She stated that at the present time she had only about \$40.00 on hand which was a far cry from the needed amount for re-ordering the supplies that are needed.

There was a motion by Jack Boughton, seconded by Bill Summers that the Publicity Director be instructed to notify the Secretary-Treasurer when she was in need of operational funds, stating just how much and for what purpose and the Secretary-Treasurer then contact the Board of Directors for authority to advance such amount (if available) in the form of a loan to the Publicity Department. Carried.

There was no unfinished business on the books.

Under new business the subject of the junior classes was re-opened by Walter Cook, who wanted to know why we had no top weight limit for our juniors as did all of the larger breeds. It was pointed out that the ARBA identified junior Dutch as being those up to six months of age. Also that the ARBA would permit no change before 1965. Mr. Cook felt that we were in need of a change and unless we made our minds up as to what we wanted to do about it, 1965 would come and go and we would have done nothing about it. Quite a bit of discussion followed. Mrs. Bayliss stated that should a weight limit be placed on junior Dutch, the large juniors would be handicapped by lack of development when forced into the senior class and some thought that many more underweight seniors would appear in the junior classes than now is the case. It was stated that from past attempts to make such change it was believed that we would be batting our heads against a stone wall with the ARBA as they had shown no interest in accepting such a change.

The Secretary stated that no replacement trophies had been purchased for this Convention because there had been some criticism of the cost of the ones purchased for the Wilmington, Delaware National Dutch Show, as the motion providing for their purchase had not been quite clear, and she wanted clarification before procuring those for this show. Also, she wanted to know just how far back these should go. Should it be for all trophies retired in the past, or for those just immediately retired. She was instructed to go ahead and spend the \$10.00 each stipulated in the original motion for those listed in the Tampa catalog.

Bill Summers stated that he could purchase plaques at a very reasonable figure and made a motion that such plaques should be accepted in lieu of three win trophies and one win cups and there should be no leg trophies given the winners. The name of the winner to be engraved on the plaque each year. Such plaques to be held by the Secretary and be placed on exhibit at all National Dutch Shows and ARBA Conventions. The motion was seconded by Clinton Dennis and carried.

The question was raised as to whether all trophies that had been retired in the past should be replaced immediately and it was the concensus of opinion that this could be done one or two each year, or periodically. Some expressed a desire to contribute such plaques and the Secretary was instructed to furnish a list of all

trophies that have been retired to Mr. Summers and Mr. Bayliss.

Mr. Summers asked for the floor and stated that he thought something should be done with regard to the present system of selecting judges for the National Dutch Shows and Convention Shows. He said he did not think it looked well for any judge to be elected to this position with only a handful of votes. It was his suggestion that the names of these judges be handled in the same manner as all candidates for office, that is, they should be nominated on a nomination ballot and then the ones having the highest number of nominating votes be listed for final vote on the election ballot. After some discussion, Mr. Summers made a motion that a nominating ballot for such judges be sent out in the Dutch Reporter. This motion was seconded by Clinton Dennis and carried.

The question of the inactivity of some of the officers was raised by President Bayliss and considerable discussion followed with no decision.

The meeting was recessed at 12:00 noon to reconvene at 2:00 P.M.

The meeting was re-opened at 2:05 with the reading of the following suggestions from Board member, Don Reid, by the Secretary:

1. Publish six issues of the Dutch Reporter per year instead of 12. Most special-clubs have done this. This may save our club some money? This is only a suggestion. I would like to know what other members think of the idea.
2. Is it necessary to publish complete show reports in the Dutch Reporter: Could it be condensed to winners of Best of Breed, Best Opposite of Breed, Best of Variety, Best Opposite of Variety, and list points members won at these shows? Would this cut down a lot of bulk in Dutch Reporter?

There was practically no support for the idea of cutting the Dutch Reporter to six issues per year and a motion was made by Sue Dennis, seconded by O. G. Stevenson that we continue to publish the Dutch Reporter 12 times a year, but cut down the show reports as per Mr. Reid's suggestion. An amendment was made to this motion by Mrs. Bayliss, and accepted by Mrs. Dennis and Mr. Stevenson, that such reports also include a list of the exhibitors in each color. The motion carried.

Some discussion was held on the voting procedure as used this year, and Mr. Bayliss reported that the election committee had found that it worked out quite well.

The question was raised as to whether there would be a Seller's Class at this Convention and it was stated that such a class would be held on Thursday at 1:00 P.M.

It was announced that the 1963 National Dutch Show would be held in Bakersfield, California, probably April 19-21.

The meeting was adjourned on a motion by Clinton Dennis, seconded by Bill Summers, at 2:40 P.M.

SECRETARY'S CHIT-CHAT

Before I get into the grand time we all had in Florida, I want to correct an error in the September Dutch Reporter. In Mr. Shufflebotham's article regarding the new Guide Book, it state: "All of these prices for SQUARE INCHES and none smaller than six square inches will be accepted." This should have read: "No cut for less than \$3.00 will be accepted." Bear this in mind when you use the blank included in this issue to send in your ad for the new Guide Book.

Well, the Dutch have finally proved our slogan that "You Can't Beat the Dutch" by having an entry of 105 Dutch with 100 being judged, thus being the being the breed with the most entries in a Convention show. The total of all breeds was approximately 1,200 head. Mr. Shufflebotham handled the Dutch classes with his usual aplomb and made the following placements: Black Dutch, Senior Buck, owned by Jack Boughton was Best Senior Black and Best Senior Dutch. Black Senior Doe, also owned by Mr. Boughton was Best Opposite Black. Black Junior Buck, ditto, Mr. Boughton, was Best Black Junior, Best Junior, All Colors, Best Black and Best Dutch. Mr. Boughton also had

the first place Black junior doe. In Blues, Mary Stohrer had first place Senior buck. First Senior doe was owned by Bill Summers and was Best Blue senior, Best Blue and Best Opposite Dutch. The first place Junior buck was owned by G. A. Burke, Sunset Rabbitry and was Best Opposite Blue. The first place Junior doe was owned by Mr. Summers and was Best Blue Junior. In Chocolates, the first place Senior buck was owned by W. R. Griffiths and was Best Senior Chocolate and Best Chocolate. The first place Senior doe went to Arthur Osmon. The first place junior buck was owned by Vrooman's Rbtry. The owner of the first place junior doe was James Collins and was judged to be Best Junior Chocolate and Best Opposite Chocolate. Wells' Modern Rbtry. was the owner of the first place Tortoise senior buck which was Best Tortoise senior and Best Tortoise. Cook's Rbtry. had the first place Tortoise Junior buck (no senior does shown) and this was Best Junior Tortoise. Mr. Cook also had the first place junior doe which was judged Best Opposite Tortoise. Only one Steel was shown, a senior doe and was owned by Mr. Cook, being automatically, Best Steel and Best Steel Senior. Only one Gray was shown, owned by Weinhardt's and this also was automatically Best Gray and Best Gray Senior, it being a senior buck. Best Display's were awarded as follows: Best Display of Blacks, Jack Boughton: Best Display of Blues, Mary Stohrer: Best Display of Chocolates, James Collins. No displays were shown in Tortoise, Steel or Gray. A full report will be published in the December Dutch Reporter. Oh, yes, one Display not listed above -- Best Display of Dutch was awarded to Mary Stohrer.

Our trip to Florida made us almost wish we could go back to Florida to live, but not quite. The weather was ideal, not being too hot for transporting the rabbits, and some, such as Mr. Summer's Best Opposite Dutch were on the road for as many as five days, but warm enough to delight the hearts of the exhibitors. The showroom was more than adequate and could have housed four or five thousand rabbits had they been entered. You people who stayed away for one reason or another can be very sorry that you couldn't make it.

It was a great pleasure to meet many of the people, personally that we had only known through correspondence in the past and we made visits to a couple of fine rabbitries while in the area. We stopped at others on the way home, and came home with some new ideas and conceptions which we will try to put into practice.

The meetings were well attended and as you can see from the minutes published in this issue, many things were accomplished for the betterment of your club.

It now behooves us all to get down to the business at hand for the time between now and the next National Dutch Show to be held at Bakersfield, California. You will find in this issue, besides another blank for sending in your ad for the new Guide Book, a blank for your ad for the 1963 National Dutch Show Catalog. Mr. Elmer Paquette is really getting on the ball, along with the rest of the sponsoring club, The Dutch Rabbit Club of California to produce an outstanding show for 1964. It is the hope of your secretary that you will all do all you can to help them make it so.

You northerners, tuck those bunnies in for the long, cold season ahead and save as many of those good juniors as you can for the spring shows that are being planned. We already have sanctioned quite a few and wouldn't be surprised, with the vast upsurge in new and renewal memberships that "You Can't Beat The Dutch" will be proven in show after show in 1964.

WHY ALL THE FUSS?

I enjoyed Mr. Zimmerlay's article in the Dutch Reporter relative to the Pre-Junior class, and agree 100% with his thoughts and comments, so am penning these few lines as per his request that some licensed judges give their views.

As a director of the Club and a Judge, I expressed my views on the floor when the matter was brought up at the Dutch show at Wilmington this spring. I see no use for having a pre-junior class. What would it accomplish? Nothing.

Points would not be counted on this class. The pre-junior classes that the larger breeds have are not a regular class, this is pointed out in the ARBA Guide Book. They are an educational class. I would like to draw your attention to our own Guide Book under INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES, quote:--"Juniors with proper type and markings, REGARDLESS HOW YOUNG THEY ARE, must be given due consideration." I think a lot of our members and judges too, should spend a little more time reading our own Guide Book.

When a rabbit is being judged, regardless of age, it is being judged on WHAT IT IS TODAY, not what it may be, or what it has been. I know that many undeveloped seniors are shown as juniors, and that is the reason the ARBA has the stipulation that one of the required wins for a grand champion must be made as a senior.

One change in age that I would be in favor of would be the lowering of the age of junior classes to 4½ months. This was voted on and passed by our own Standard Committee but rejected by the ARBA. Most of you will admit that a Dutch has reached maturity at this age and should be bred. In the United Kingdom Dutch Club they have to be shown as seniors when they reach 4½ months. Or perhaps better yet, if a Dutch has reached senior weight it must be shown as such, there is no rule prohibiting an exhibitor from entering a well developed youngster in the senior class. In most of the larger breeds the show classes are governed by the weight of the exhibit. As Mr.

Zimmerlay so truly stated in his article, NO ONE KNOWS the real age of the exhibit except the one that bred the doe, therefore the judge is relying on the honesty of the exhibitor when he is judging any class. I believe that I have placed many juniors that should have been entered in the senior class, but have to judge it as it is entered. Likewise the exhibitor has to rely on the honesty and integrity of the judge.

FROM THE EDITOR'S MAIL BAG

Dear Mrs. Weinhardt:

The Dutch Reporter is a fine magazine and you are doing a fine job as editor.

In the past few months numerous articles have appeared in the Dutch Reporter on a Pre-Junior class for Dutch. I am not in favor of this class.

I have seen these baby Dutch be put off the table as too young for the class and also I have seen them placed first. I, for one, do not believe in showing Dutch until they are 10-12 weeks old or older, but if someone wants to show them at 6-8 weeks, then let the judge decide if it can compete with an older, more mature rabbit.

If the judges think that a 6 week old rabbit can compete with a 5 month old rabbit and places the younger one first then I will go along with the judges. The fact that a baby may not place when it grows should not enter anybody's mind because the rabbit is to be judged as it is the day of the show, not as it will be later.

Some people, because they may have been beaten a couple of times by a baby Dutch have decided to make certain the Baby Dutch would not compete by wanting a Pre-Junior class. To these people who want the Pre-Junior class, I believe this will encourage the showing of more babies rather than discourage the breeder from showing them because you will find people putting up specials on these pre-juniors. My vote is against a Pre-Junior Dutch class.
