

FAREWELL MESSAGE

This will be the last President's Message I will compose for the Dutch Reporter, at this time. While you read this issue of the Dutch Reporter, it will become obvious that there is much turmoil in the American Dutch Rabbit Club (ADRC). Some people believe that I am the cause of these problems. I do feel sorry for these people. People who look for trouble will often find it. I do not want to stand in the way of what some believe would be progress. Therefore, I turn my chair or leadership of the ADRC over the Vice-president, Marti Dill; effective immediately.

I certainly do appreciate the overwhelming support many of you, the members of the ADRC, showed for my leadership capabilities by electing me for another term by write-in. I thank you for this support!

Unfortunately, some officers felt that the outcome of the election was not in the best interest of the ADRC. So, they submitted their resignations at the A.R.B.A. Convention in Portland, Oregon. Before the convention was over these same officers had changed their minds and asked that I rescind their resignations. I informed them that I would not allow the rescission. This decision was followed by threats and vicious innuendoes by the resignees.

In order to regain their offices, they communicated with the ADRC board and implored them to consider my competency as the ADRC President. The majority of the newly elected and exo-officers supported the rescission of these resignees. Since these officers represent you the members, I will not contest these recommendations.

However, it is apparent through Secretary Hart's communications, that we can no longer work effectively together. So, I have decided not to accept the newly elected term as ADRC President.

Raising and breeding good Dutch has and always will be my favorite pastime and hobby. However, I do consider this a hobby, not a business. To be condemned by a paid employee of the ADRC because I do not have the same time and energies to devote to the club is simply unjustified and unwarranted. Secretary Hart has communicated with the board that my time and energies must equal hers. As a college professor, who is involved with other industry commitments, I must always keep Dutch a hobby, not a business.

The ADRC has come a long way under my leadership with the cooperation of Secretary Hart. I am proud to remind the members that I promoted the acquisition of a computer and printer for the Secretary-Treasurer. This has enhanced the efficiency and clerical abilities of this office. We also have divided the duties of the Secretary-Treasurer and kept her remuneration the same. We now have a sweepstake chair and Dutch Reporter editor. At one time these were all the duties of the Secretary-Treasurer. We have also just purchased two new typewriters and new printing equipment for the Dutch Reporter editor. Now, the personnel required to perform clerical tasks have the necessary equipment to function effectively.

Through the division of the Secretary-Treasurer's duties and the purchase of new equipment, I feel that the club has made great progress toward operating more smoothly and with less work for each person. My energies have always been used to make the working positions in the organization more efficient so we can all spend more time out in the barn raising good Dutch. In order to insure that business could be completed and recorded at the national shows, I encouraged the resolution to pay the Secretary-Treasurer's travel expense to both annual events. As you can see, I have always had the best interest of the ADRC at heart. However, I felt that my priorities as President were to implement changes toward the effcient use of other's talents and time.

When Secretary-Treasurer Hart, Vice-president Dill and Director Gehr decided to resign at Portland because they were unhappy, I chose to accept their resignations. I immediately secured a very capable and interested member to function as the Secretary-Treasurer after January 1, 1988. I would like to thank Vicki Hertel for offering to help our club in such a generous manner. However, when Secretary-Treasurer Hart, Vice-president Dill and Director Gehr decided to change their minds, the board felt the club should keep the original set of officers. The Secretary-Treasurer's position was up for reappointment for the term beginning January 1, 1988. There was not the required 2/3rds majority of the board to approve Vicki Hertel as ADRC Secretary-Treasurer. In my judgement, Vicki would have been an outstanding Secretary-Treasurer for the American Dutch Rabbit Club.

As you read through this Dutch Reporter, you will see that alot of people are playing politics in order to have you support their position. This tension may ease with time. The American Dutch Rabbit Club will survive and we will all still try to raise that illusive perfect Dutch rabbit that doesn't die in the nestbox.

In closing, I would like to leave you with an exert from a letter Dr. Terry E. Reed, President of the American Rabbit Breeders Association, sent me:

"Dear President Williamson:

I just received my first class copy of the "Dutch Reporter" in the mail today and I must say that the American Dutch Rabbit Club continues to grow and prosper under your direction. You are to be complimented for all the efforts you have put forth to see that the Dutch club remains one of the top specialty clubs affiliated with the American Rabbit Breeders Association. . "

Thank you to those members and officers who supported my efforts and leadership of the ADRC. To the few who had problems with my progressive leadership of the ADRC, I hope you realize my unselfish intensions were always for the betterment of the ADRC. I am sorry that there are a few of you who perceive my leadership was dictatorial. Last time I checked, we were still holding elections. I wish the ADRC continued progress and GOOD LUCK!

Word travels fast so I'm sure that many of you have heard of the difficulties that were brought to light at the Board of Directors meeting as well as the General Membership Meeting. While these problems have gone on for several years with the ADRC Board trying to solve the problem internally, it finally all came to a head in Portland. We have temporarily lost three officers, Secretary/Treasurer Hart, Director Gehr and myself. We have now been labeled 'The Three Musketeers'. May I Have a moment of your time to explain my thoughts. First, I resent the label as my decision was done with forethought and discussion with my family.

I based my decision to resign on three reasons: 1) To serve comfortably. Over the past three gatherings of the ADRC Board of Directors at ARBA Conventions and ADRC National Dutch Shows, I have suffered from tensions brought on over the prospects of what would happen at our meeting, would there be a blow-up? It has become like a tug-of-war. 2) Financial burden. Many dollars have been spent willingly on the Youth program, articles written, phone calls, letters to committee members and to attend ADRC functions. Often times we could have used the money for our home or other things to benefit our family instead of the Dutch family. Our trip to Portland, Oregon, which I get no reimbursement for as the Vice President and Youth Chairman, cost Vern, Paul and I - \$1500. Think what that could have bought but when I ran for the office of Vice President, our family assumed that burden. 3) Hobby. I enjoy rabbits, I think it's obvious in my articles. I also enjoy teaching other breeders ways of improving their stock through culling, fostering, experiments, promotion and breeding. My family and friends say I Eat, Sleep and Talk rabbits - non-stop. When one part of my hobby creates tension and is no longer a pleasant part, making it impossible for me to complete my duties as your past Guidebook Editor, Youth Chairman or Vice President because of another's thoughtlessness or neglect in answering correspondence, then I refuse to let that part destroy the rest whish is enjoyable.

All of the above were excellent, well thought-out reasons to resign - but why should three of the most active members of the American Dutch Rabbit Club give up their positions for one person who has continually shown lack of interest in their official duties and who has failed to answer correspondence of the club, all in direct violation of our American Dutch Rabbit Club's Constutition and By-laws. I have sent by certified mail my rescinding of

my resignation to our President. The support following the General Membership meeting in part, prompted my decision to rescind. The memberships support will give us the energy needed to solve the internal strife. Every director will certainly spent many hours in diligent thought in an effort to do what is in the best intrest for the ADRC. Please support them.

As noted in the minutes of the General Membership meeting, I will be relinquishing the position of Youth Chairman as of January 1, 1988. I have enjoyed seeing our Youth Department grow but time has come for new ideas to be implemented. I have supplied President Williamson with the following names as suggestions for new Youth Chairpersons. They are: Mr & Mrs. Rick Mintner of Michigan, Mr & Mrs. Dallas Meyer of Illinois and Mrs. Jeannie Maxwell from Ohio. We would certainly welcome any others who would be interested in this position. I will be happy to assist them until they feel comfortable with the job. If you are interested, please contact either myself or President Williamson for more details. Due to red tape, it looks as though we will be unable to have the ADRC Achievement contest this year. I do apologise for this.

GOOD NEWS! Charles Christ, one of our newest directors - from Arizona, was successful in de-railing the E&S Express. Chuck was able to accomplish this feat with a dandy little black Jr. doe. I understand that he purchased the mama to this beautiful bunny at the '87 Seller's Class from Katie Mead of California. Assisting Chuck in the win, was Mark Pecaric with a super Tortoise buck. I can honestly say that I've never seen such a sharp group of Tortoise Dutch - real barn burners!

We really enjoyed meeting a number of new folks from California, Oregon and Washington. While the west coast sequence for judging differs from our, it certainly has some positive aspects but thrownsome of washford toop wheneve wenter to coop our animals and found Sr. bucks, Jr. bucks, Sr. does and Jr. does. A real dear that took everything in stride was Breed Chairperson, Jim Kelly. When panic set in, Jim was cool and worked it out so no one noticed there was a problem. He certainly did an excellent job.

A special 'CONGRATULATIONS' goes to our newly selected A.D.R.C. LIFE MEMBERS.



"A PENNY FOR YOUR THOUGHTS"

From the Desk of your SECRETARY.....

I was fortunate to be able to attend the 64th. ARBA Convention in Portland, Oregon. It was touch and go for awhile, but "I made it"!

The Secretary-Treasurer receives round trip coach air fare or 20¢ per mile round trip, whichever is less expensive, for travel expense to the National Dutch Shows and ARBA Conventions. If either of these shows take place within 125 miles of the Secretary-Treasurer's home, only the sum of \$50.00 is paid. Purchasing my ticket well in advance to obtain the best possible price. I was able to obtain my air fare, and my busband's, for \$257.45 each. Our flight was scheduled to leave from Chicago O'Hare early Thursday morning October 8th. Our return flight was to be on Thursday, October 15th. The evening of October 7th. late, found us all packed and ready to go with our son and his wife both down with the flu and our youngest son feeling ' quite the same! Now, we had three sick people and a two month old grandson to take care of. Thursday morning came and went and we settled back and unpacked. Late morning Friday, our daughter-in-laws' parents took the little guy and said that they would look after both mom and dad. My mother and dad graciously offered to look after Kevin. I had my doubts due to health factors regarding my father but felt that they wouldn't have offered if they didn't want the responsibility. WE COUI.D GO: I called the travel agent who noted, along with an echo from the airlines, that our departure flight could not be rescheduled due to the type ticket and non-refundable restrictions. Rather than lose all and still get to attend the Convention, we booked two ONE WAY tickets to Portland on the only flight available that day. The cost of the tickets were \$1048.00! (Now remember, this is two tickets-one way each). I told my husband that we were probably going to be able to ride up front with the pilot, possibly even jet to fly the plane for that price: It turned out that they were just plain coach seats. You might say that we were DETERMINED! I wished Bill a Merry Christmas, Happy Valentines Day, Happy Fathers Day and wished his well for our anniversary -- he did likewise with the exception of Fathers Day! We now had \$1305.45 in just airline tickets that we paid alone. When we left, we were told that because we didn't leave on our regular scheduled flight that it was very possible that we would not be allowed the use of the return flight of our original ticket. WHAT NEXT ? " The flight left at 3:44 PM Chicago time and it was already close to noon. We live approximately 60 miles south of Chicago and

driving to O'Hare is not my idea of a picnic! We again packed --- only this time we weren't as neat and we only used one large suitcase with Bill filling his side while I threw my half together. We were almost there!! It was then that I realized that the ADRC books were still at home, right where I left them. It was only 30 minutes to departure and I was not going back! I had sent some of the necessary papers, previous meeting notes and the ADRC checkbook out with Director Gehr when I found out that I wouldn't be able to go, so all was not forgotten!

Portland was beautiful! They told me that the mountains were beautiful as we went over them but I can't say for sure. I wouldn't look! Me and heights don't get along too well and I try very hard not to aggravate that fact!

I would at this time like to express my appreciation for an excellent banquet! If you left hungry, it was your own fault! For the price of the banquet ticket, you received more than your monies worth. Thank you both! You do much more than your share of work at each National Dutch Show and ARBA Convention that you attend. I would like to note that it does not go unnoticed or unappreciated!! WHO??? GEORGE & MAXINE PARMER; 2 VERY SPECIAL PEOPLE!!

After the ADRC banquet was the Board of Directors meeting. Things began okay but later developed into what you might call a problem area. The ADRC has unfortunately had a very severe lack of communication. This communication gap is not recent and has been apparent for quite some time. It's extremely difficult to answer questions if you don't have any idea what is going on. In September of '85 I felt it necessary to submit my written resignation regarding this office much to the same problems that we are encountering at this time. There was an understanding met and I was asked to rescind my resignation if I felt right in doing so. Since I enjoy the Dutch, the American Dutch Rabbit Club and the people. I did so. My resignation was withdrawn with the understanding that there would be more cooperation to make for a better unified organization. Things go better ... at least for awhile. Then it appeared to slip back into the same state only worse! Those friends (?) that were close knew what was going on and had openly done their fair share of complaining in the past over these same issues. Many times remarks were made to the effect that. "I don't know how you take this ... if it were me, I know what I'd do with this job"! I kept feeling that things had to get better but each Board meeting and General Membership Meeting seemed to get a bit more out of hand. In trying to "hang in there" with many that I considered very close personal friends. [find that the tables are turning and it's time to sit on the side with those that you feel will win, regardless of cost. It was during the Board of Directors Meeting that I felt I could no longer remain in this position under these circumstances.

I offered my verbal resignation at this time. This is not a resignation that has been "held over the President's head" but rather something that he and others knew would happen if correspondence wasn't answered and we did not operate according to our Constitution and By-Laws. If these items were being done, there wouldn't be any problems. I personally don't feel that it takes that much effort to do what is expected of you when you take on a responsibility. Everyone is going to make errors and we're certainly far from perfect, but we have to give it our "BEST SHOT"! If we don't, what are we doing here?

It is really tough to work for the benefit of the membership and organization with a lack of communication. Reading what is expected of you via the Dutch Reporter is not my idea of "ideal communication"! I also do not personally believe that appointments and possible payments should be listed in the Dutch Reporter before the Board of Directors is contacted for majority approval. Should the Board find that the proposed appointment/s and/or payments are not favored by the majority, it leaves all concerned standing in "very poor light"!

There are many things that could be implemented for the benefit of the ADRC and it's membership. However, they have to be implemented properly and done with the best interest of all. Items' that are properly listed within the Constitution and By-Laws must be adhered to. Rules are rules! Until they are omitted or changed by <u>PROPER PROCEDURE</u>, we are all bound by them. Whether it be the OBJECTIVE of the organization; the AMOUNT ALLOTED FOR SPECIALS for the National Dutch Shows and ARBA Conventions: the DUTTES OF OFFICERS, or the need for THREE PEOPLE ON THE ELECTION COMMITTEE rules must be followed! If we break these rules, we are in direct violation of our own Constitution and By-Laws and in jeopardy of having a formal protest filed against one or all of us in violation with the American Rabbit Breeders Association. may wish to make note in the new ARBA Yearbook, page 257. ARTICLE V. Section 7).

Rules were designed with the best interest of the membership and the organization. Granted, they don't please everyone, but the majority feel that they are more than fair. Those who are elected or appointed to office in this association should do so with the ability to set all friendship aside when necessary and put the betterment of the ADRC and it's membership first. We accept these offices. I feel, with this in mind. We should realize that there could come a time that we may hurt feelings and jeopardize friendships, but we should also realize that "REAL FRIENDS" will not ask you to perform in a manner other than what is proper. Friendship should never effect performance! Nor should we let friendships hinder us from doing what is morally and legally right!

At the General Membership meeting in Portland, I left the room almost immediately after the reading of the minutes from the Board of Directors meeting. I returned shortly to hear fellow officers. officer-elects and members of the American Dutch Rabbit Club stating that they would like for myself. Vice-President Dill and Director Gehr to remain in office and withdraw our resignations "UNTIL THE 1988 NATIONAL DUTCH SOW" in Bloomington, Illinois. at which time it would be determined if the problem/s still exist and what course of action would be taken. I realized then by the minutes that both Vice-President Dill and Director Gehr offered resignations effective January 1, 1988 if I did not reconsider my resignation. After the meeting which, in my opinion. was not as constructive as it should have been, there was an adjournment. It was at that time that I noted that we were fortunate to have among those in attendance, ARBA President Reed who is also and ADRC member and distinguished ARBA judge. I feel very fortunate to know that President Reed took time from his very busy ARBAConvention schedule to attend this meeting.

Please be aware that these resignations "WERE DEFINITELY NOT PLANNED"! We were all aware of the problems as we have all had more than our share. We are all also aware that there has been nothing done to correct them. We did feel that if something wasn't done soon, it would reflect on the American Dutch Rabbit Club.

After very careful consideration and discussion concerning the wishes of those members and officers who spoke out asking us to stay on, we decided that we would give it one last try and stay on until the '88 NDS to see if things couldn't be rectified and problems resolved. We approached President Williamson saying that we wished to rescind our resignations "AS PER THE REQUEST OF THOSE SEAKING" at the General Membership Meeting. President Williamson stated at that time that "HE WOULD NOT ACCEPT" our withdrawals and our resignations stood. President Williamson heard the membership, agreed that he was lax in his duties but now had some additional time. However, none of this appeared to effect his statement. We have since approached the Board by mail, with copies to all concerned parties, asking them not to accept our resignations.

Portland brought up many questions. Editorial policy was brought up and questioned. There have been a couple of articles that have been printed that carry no signature. The Dutch Reporter Editorial Policy clearly states that all articles must be correctly identified as to author. The President's Message in the July-August issue of the Dutch Reporter was discussed. There were a couple of paragraphs that contained material that could have been classified as being used for personal promotion. This is against Editorial Policy also. Any plea for a vota for yourself, by any means should, in my opinion, only appear in the form of a paid ad.

President Williamson declined the nomination for President and therefore would not have his name appear on the final election ballot. His message appeared to ask for write-in votes for himself. It has always been a practice that any questionable material submitted for the D.R. be sent to all members of the Editorial Committee for a majority approval before printing. The Dutch Reporter Editor is chair of this Committee while one member is the Publicity Director and three others are Board Members. I am uncertain as to who these three members are at this time.

There was awritten vote of the Board taken by President Williamson in July regarding the purchase of new D.R. equipment in the amount of \$3,022.16. I voted to reject this purchase at that time and included a letter to President Williamson along with my vote. I felt that since there was only one Dutch Recorter due out before Portland we should get together as a Board and invite our Dutch Reporter Editor to discuss what's needed. `What better way to find out "FIRST HAND" what the Dutch Reporter needs are than from the person most directly involved. Well, it was September 21st. before I found out the outcome of the vote. I received a call from President Williamson asking me to send a check in the amount of \$3,022.16 made payable to A.B. Dick and send it to the Dutch Reporter Editor. Upon my speaking with Vice-president Dill and Director Gehr, they were both informed by me of the equipment purchase. They were surprised to say the least that they had not been notified. However, it was found out that there were at least three people who knew the outcome of the vote prior to this time. None of these three were Board members. These persons knew how many votes were cast for and how many against. They even knew what Directors voted which way. This is just a sample of the communication problem.

Being asked questions and having no idea what is going on is both rude and inconsiderate! So frankly, I'm a bit tired of hearing the "STORY" about holding my resignation over the President's head! You don't hold something over someone's head where I come from. If you perform your job to the best of your abilty and according to the rules, I don't see where there is a problem. However, when this office receives complaints because this isn't being done, this office seems to take the flack for whoever is responsible! If I'm functioning in my job properly, I don't create problems and shouldn't have any worries. It's when you're not functioning properly that this happens. There are problem areas and they definitely need to be corrected immediately. There won't always be a "STORY" or a "SCAPE-GOAT" to lay the burden on. If it's stories, I'm aware of many!

Please take an interest into what is happening around you and get involved! If you have questions, by all means ask! Your ADRC Board members are here to assist the membership in every way possible. I feel that we have a sound, stable slate of Officers and Director-Elects and they are all willing to work with you. PARTICIPATE, ASK QUESTIONS;....EXPECT ANSWERS! This will steadily lead the American Dutch Rabbit Club in an uphill climb.

As always, I would like to leave you with something that I feel could be of great benefit to each and every one of us. It's called:

The Bank of Time....

If you had a bank that credited your account each morning with \$ 86,400, that carried over no balance from day to day and allowed you to keep no cash in your account, and every evening cancelled whatever part of the account you had failed to use during the day, what would you do?

Draw out every cent, of course!





BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING; PORTLAND, OREGON 64TH. ARBA CONVENTION OCTOBER 12, 1987

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by President Scott Williamson at 8:45 PM. Those answering roll were; President Williamson; Vice-President Dill; Directors Christ; Simonson; MacKinnon and Gehr and Secretary-Treasurer Hart. Director Parmer was finishing the banquet arrangements and arrived slightly late. Director-Elect Pecaric was also present at the meeting.

REPORT OF OFFICERS:

Director MacKinnon said that Dutch were starting to take hold in his area. He also stated that possibly the Directors could furnish a list of available people in their area willing to serve on committees. It was stated that the Directors should provide this to President Williamson by January 1st. President Williamson stated that those members could contact their Director through the Dutch Reporter.

Director Christ stated that he would like to see a job description of what is expected of a committee and their chair. Vice-President Dill is to put this information together and publicize it in the Dutch Reporter. It was stated that he was on the membership committee and had no idea of what was expected of him. It was also stated that it would be a good idea to make a draft of what is expected of a breed secretary and breed chairperson. The American Dutch Rabbit Club is looking for a volunteer to take on this responsibility for the 1988 ARBA Convention in Madison, Wisconşin. If anyone kn ows of anyone who may wish to accept this voluntary position, please advise President Williamson.

Director Gehr stated that alot of good animals are being shown but the numbers are down compared to what it used to be. He said that the main concern in his area at this time was the 1988 National Dutch Show.

Director Simonson stated that the Dutch are down slightly. He said that they used to be one of the top breeds shown and now rank 4th. or 5th.

Director Parmer said that Dutch are down a bit in Oregon. He said that a few good Dutch breeders were lost but that we've picked up a few new ones.

Vice-President Dill stated that Dutch in her area seem to be spiratic depending on the show you attend. There have been 120 shown at one show while only 30 are shown at another. She said that the youth are really coming up.

Secretary Hart said that basically, her notes were the same as Director Gehr's with the 1988 National Dutch Show being the main concern in her area.

President Williamson stated that Dutch were on the rise fast in California. He said that there are now 100+ Dutch being shown at those shows that once only had entries of 50 to 60. He stated that there was a constant demand for stock with alot of double shows being held lately. He said that the competition was very exciting and the officers and members should encourage everyone to go out and promote the Dutch and keep the excitement growing.

Vice-President Dill said that she went through the Grand Champion listings for Dutch in the Domestic Rabbits and sent a note to those congratulating them and also asking them if they would be interested in joining the American Dutch Rabbit Club.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES:

Vice-President Dill gave a report on the youth contests and stated that they wanted to hold a King and Queen Royalty Contest at the 1988 National Dutch Show.

Director Gehr stated that there was alot of controversy regarding "freckles" on the Dutch. The majority of the Standard Committee felt that these should be classified as flesh spots and are a discoloration and should be judged accordingly. Director Gehr wrote an article for the ARBA judges education release. He also stated that he would like to see the ARBA list cowhocks under disqualifications as it once did. This past standard omitted this section and cowhocks can only be looked at as an abnormality. President Williamson asked that Director Gehr write an article on flesh spots and make it a concern of the membership. It was also stated that questions regarding Dutch should also be directed to the judges education committee and members are "encouraged" to write Bob Wallace of Iowa.

Secretary Hart gave a report of the financial status as of October 7, 1987. There was new Dutch Reporter equipment purchased leaving a balance at that time in the General Fund of \$2703.63; The Life membership Fund total is \$1019.59 and the Contingency Fund Money Market Account balance is \$3227.28. The total funds available on October 7, 1987 is \$6950.50.

President Williamson gave a report of the Publicity Fund as Barb and Al Butler were not able to attend. The Publicity Checking balance is \$405.21; the Savings Account balance is \$642.60 and the Petty Cash balance is \$24.84. They also sent out a copy of the new Dutch pamphlet available for informational purpose. It was noted that Barb & Al wished to extend their best to all.

George and Maxine Parmer tried to run the ADRC booth with help from Kelly's and others since Butlers were unable to attend. They thanked everyone for their assistance.

Applications for the new Sweepstakes Chairperson were gone over by the Board.

The Election Committee sent a report and it was given by President Williamson. The results will be published in the November-December issue of the Dutch Reporter.

Vice-President Dill stated that she thought that she would like to investigate the possibility of having our next edition of the Guide-book in spiral notebook form or 3-ring binder form. She stated that as changes may occur, a page could be omitted and a new one added.

President Williamson stated that he would purchase the 1986-1987 Sweepstakes Awards by the first of the year.

It was suggested that the ADRC form a budget and/or finance committee for next year.

NEW BUSINESS:

Discussion was held on the granting of Life Mamberships for Myrl Milhahn, submitted by Vice-President Dill and Doris Leibel, The Ohio State Dutch Rabbit Club, Warren MacNamara and William and Wilma Griffith, submitted by Director Gehr. For Doris Leibel, there were 5 for and 1 opposed; for Myrl Milhahn, there were 5 for and 1 abstain; for William and Wilma Griffith, the Ohio State Dutch Rabbit Club and Warren MacNamara it was unanimous to award Life Memberships. These Life Memberships for each of those listed become effective as of this date.

The Publicity Department suggested that they would offer \$100.00 toward the purchase of two (2) show coats for winners of a King and Queen Royalty Contest if approved by the Board. It was stated that this would help to let people know that we are working with our youth. The Royalty contest will take place at the 1988 National Dutch Show in Bloomington, Illinois. A motion was made by Vice-President Dill and seconded by George Parmer that a transfer of \$100.00 be made from the Publicity Department to support the youth contest. M.C.

There was some discussion on the new equipment that is being purchased for the Dutch Reporter. This equipment is being purchased to help assist the Editor in making the Dutch Reporter a better publication.

Director Parmer stated that he had encountered problems getting the correct specials listed for the Convention.

*There was discussion regarding a lack of communication. President Williamson stated that he doesn't have as much time as he would like to correspond by mail but said that the Board Members are welcome to phone him at home or at his office.

Secretary Hart noted that due to complications and the lack of communication, her verbal notice of resignation as Secretary-Treasurer would become effective as of January 1, 1988.

Director Christ and Vice-President Dill asked that this communication problem be corrected.

There was discussion on the amount to be spent on sweepstakes awards. Secretary Hart made a motion that \$400.00 be alloted President Williamson to purchase the awards for this past sweepstakes year. The motion was seconded by Director Christ. M.C.

It was suggested that we consider changing our sweepstakes to run from January 1 through December 31st. and hand out the sweepstakes awards to those winners present at each National Dutch Show. Director Gehr to write an article to the membership regarding this issue for the next Dutch Reporter.

Quality points will be discussed in the Dutch Reporter and a discussion will be held at the '88 NDS. The Directors are to solicity comments from their district.

It was suggested that names be submitted to serve on the next Election Committee.

Vice—President Dill made a motion, seconded by Director Gehr that all exhibitors at a National Dutch Show must be American Dutch Rabbit Club members or join before the show. M.C.

Discussion was held in regard to the new sweepstake chairperson. The Board voted 4 no and 3 abstain to the appointment of Lesley Haynie. The Board then approved Martha Jackson, Iowa, by 4 yes votes and 3 abstain. It was stated that Martha Jackson would be contacted to see if she would still like to take on this responsibility.

The youth ARBA scholarship program was brought up and tabled for discussion at the General membership Meeting on Tuesday, October 12th.

Along with the money alloted the Convention for Dutch specials and those specials collected, we were short \$32.61 of having enough to cover the awards purchased by President Williamson. A motion was made by Vice-President Dill and seconded by Director Parmer that the ADRC pay the additional funds needed. M.C.

District #4 Director effective January 1, 1988 was appointed by President Williamson. Bill Reid of Hurst, Texas was unanimously approved by the Board.

Director Gehr suggested that in the future, all votes taken in the Board of Directors meeting be recorded so that the membership may see how they are being represented.

Vice-President Dill and Director Parmer are to develop guidelines for Breed Chairpersons and have them ready for the 1988 NDS.

There was discussion regarding the renumeration for work done by the ADRC Sweepstake Chairperson. After consideration, Secretary Hart made the motion to pay Vicki Hertel \$250.00 for recording the sweepstakes. The motion was seconded by Director MacKinnon. There were 5 votes for and 1 abstain. M.C.

Being no further business, Director Gehr made a motion, seconded by Director Christ that the meeting be adjourned. M.C.

The minutes of the last General Membership Meeting were dispensed with as they had been previously printed in the Dutch Reporter. Motion by Director Gehr and seconded by Director Christ. MC.

The Secretary read the minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting from Monday evening, October 12th. President Williamson asked if there were any additions or corrections to the minutes; being there were none, the minutes stood approved as read.

President Williamson introduced the Officer and Officer-Elects present to the membership. He also expressed a "Thank You" to the show committee for all their hard work, George & Maxine Parmer and Jim & Bonnie Kelly.

It was stated that a breed chairperson is needed for the next ARBA Convention in Madison, Wisconsin. It was stated that there is already \$150.00 from the ADRC for Open specials along with ½ of the collection from the ADRC banquet in the amount of \$86.00. Total Open specials already totals \$216.00; Youth specials alloted already are \$50.00 from the ADRC and the remaining ½ of the collection from the ADRC banquet of \$86.00. Total Youth specials so far are \$136.00. If you are interested in being the breed secretary and chairperson, please contact President Williamson.

A budget and finance committee was brought up. If you are interested in this, again, please contact President Williamson.

The ARBA Youth Scholarship was brought up. They are trying to build a \$10,000.00 pool for youth scholarships. No discussion at this time.

A report of the Committees was read via the minutes of the Executive Board.

NEW BUSINESS:

Director Christ expressed thoughts on the youth scholarship program. He questioned if we were to donate to such a fund, wouldn't the ADRC rather it went to a youth interested in the Dutch breed! Ellis Houseman asked about how often and how funds for this would be generated. ARBA President and ADRC member Dr. T.E. Reed commented on this, He stated that it was a long standing foundation and only the interest off the principle will be used towards the scholarships. He stated that the guidelines are very strict and it is very well organized and structured!

Ellis Houseman asked that the American Dutch Rabbit Club approach the ARBA Standards Committee and ask them to return cowhocks to "general disqualifications". Director Gehr commented that abnormalities is the only thing that cowhocks can fall under leaving it wide open to criticism. He stated that we need to do something about it. Vicki Hertel expressed "where should we draw the line"? Director Gehr stated that one of the biggest problems is the strong inconsistency of judges's interpretation of the standard. He stated that the ARBA glossary definition of cowhocks could include 99% of the rabbits shown today as being cowhocked. He stated that we need to try to improve the quality rather than chastise. We definitely need guidelines as to where to draw the line!

Director Christ expressed concern over the resignation of our Secretary, Norma Hart. He asked that Secretary Hart reconsider her resignation. Director-Elect Mark Pecaric expressed his concern over the resignation and asked that Norma Hart reconsider and stay towards progression of the ADRC rather than regression. Director Gehr expressed his concern over the Secretary's resignation and stated that unless Norma reconsiders her resignation, the American Dutch Rabbit Club had his resignation as of January 1st. also. Director-Elect Bill Reid voiced his concern of the resignation and the regression of the ADRC. Debbie Zimmer of New York remarked to President Williamson that she wondered how he would have enough time to handle two clubs now that he was President of the Holland Lop Specialty Club when he didn't have enough time for one before! The President asked if there was any other good and welfare for the club. Vice-President Dill said she was very concerned over Norma's resignation and she was considering resigning as ADRC Youth Director as she was also submitting her resignation as of January 1st. Director-Elect Reid again asked President Williamson for an aswer to Debbie Zimmers remark on how he will correct the problems and those of the Board. Ellis Houseman asked that the Secretary reconsider her resignation and stay on until the '88 NDS to see if the problems couldn't be resolved. Director MacKinnon remarked that he too was concerned with the resignation of the Secretary and Board Members and asked that they rescind their resignations until the '88 NDS to correct the problems. He stated that if things did not improve then the Board would take some action. President Williamson remarked that he had



DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE: Tom Dietrich, MI.

The ARBA Convention has come and gone, I didn't get to attend or send my entry due to some unforeseen changes at the last minute.

Recent letters and articles about the 'Sellers Class' has our committee going over the sugestions and debating the good and bad in all of them, more on this in future Dutch Reporters.

The recent controversy in our club over the resignations of 3 officers & their rescinding the resignations has producted alot of thought on the part of all the officers on how to deal with this situation. I feel all the parties involved have been and can still be important members and officers. I hope all will continue in present offices and get on with improving the Dutch Club.



Although Kay picked the topic of steel dutch for this issue , my article will deal with selection and breeding of your first rabbits since I have never raised steels. When an individual decides on the breed to raise, he/she must the make the hard choice of who to purchase these animals from. The breeder to buy from should be one of the best and most highly respected in the breed of your choice. Often the best breeder produces winning animals consistantly and can compete on the national level. When picking we individual rabbit look at its good qualities and then its bad ones ; that way you may purchase a mate with stengths opposite to those of the first animal. It would be wise to take along the standards for the breed or someone that you can trust and nows the breed. Very few breeders will sell you their very best animals and there for you must take what they are willing to sell and start your own line. Before you pay for the rabbits take a good look at the pedigree to see the bloodline and what type of rabbits it has produced. A mismarked rabbit can produce a winner just as a show rabbit may produce junk. Take the rabbits home and introduce them to their new homes. providing them with plenty of fresh water and the food of your choice. If you already have rabbits in the rabbitry it would be wise to keep the new ones way from the existing herd for several days. When breeding the rabbits you may wish to set up a breeding program that tells what animals are related and their qualities. If the breedings are outcrosses then your first litter may be a poor one , but you need to keep some breeders out of it so that they may be introduced back to the breeding program. I am a firm believer in breeding true bloodlines, meaning that you should work with one at the most two bloodlines and NO more. This allows for the offspring to be related and offers better chances of producing the type of rabbit that you want. If you breed your rabbits and after a period of several years see a need to ad a certain quality to your herd then do it selectivly and try to obtain a rabbit of related bloodline.

Congratulations to the winners of the 1987 A.R.B.A. convention in both the open and youth , although I personally could not attend the show I heard the quality of dutch was It is a sad thing for such a prestigous show to be scared by the actions of a select few , leaving the membership to wonder about the soundness of our organization. In the weeks following the convention my mailbox has been stuffed to the top with letters of concern and disbelief of the events that have occured and their causes. For those members who doubt where the problems are , I would suggest doing some reseach into past Dutch Reporters and also reading the letters that should be published in this issue carefully. member of the Board I feel it is my duty to the membership to report any wrong doing in the club so that you are not in the dark. During the meetings in Portland events took place that made Secretary Norma Hart feel the need to resign from her office , which was soon followed by two other verbal resignations by Director Gehr and Vice President Dill. The verbal resignations were rescinded by those invovled after the members at the convention showed support for these officers. For those members that are new to our club , both Norma Hart and Dick Gehr were responsible for publishing in my opinion one of the best series of Dutch Reporters in the years that I have been a member. In many of the classes, I would have been proud to take the 9th or 10th place rabbits home.

A couple of the classes were extremely difficult to judge, because of the excellent animals. The one that stands out in my mind was the Blue Jr. Doe class. I hope to see some of these animals exhibited at the NDS in Bloomington next year.

Congratulations to the winners, and to all those that exhibited. In a show with such tremendous quality, you did not have to place first to be a winner. Just owning one of the animals should be reward enough.

With the close of the ARBA Convention in Portland, there are many mixed emotions running around in my head. For those of you that were fortunate enough to attend, and made it to the ADRC General Membership meeting, you may be aware of what I am talking about.

Several times during that meeting questions were asked or comments were made that warranted a response, yet none was given. It seemed as though we were trying to be rushed through the meeting. This does not exemplify unity or best interest of the club, to me.

Upon hearing of Secretary Hart's proposed resignation, many members stood up and verbally expressed their concern for this. It was asked by many that she reconsider her resignation until the National Dutch Show in Bloomington. As the request of the membership present reflected upon the welfare of the club, Secretary Hart DID reconsider her resignation. It was stated though, that her withdrawal would not be accepted. It was previously stated that due to the antiquity of the Dutch Reporter equipment, the quality has been bad. Last July, the Board was asked to vote on purchasing new equipment for this duty. The Board was informed at Portland that the purchase had been approved. With this, I am sure that the quality of the Dutch Reporter should improve greatly.

With the passing of the Portland Convention, it is time to start thinking of the NDS in Bloomington. I am sure it will be a good show, and we of the 5th District are looking forward to seeing each of you there.

AMENDMENTS AND/OR RESOLUTIONS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ADD TO ARTICLE IV OF THE CONSTITUTION:

SECTION 2: Any member having paid 35 consecutive years adult membership, regardless of age, or that has twenty five (25) consecutive years membership in the ADRC upon reaching the age of sixty five (65), shall be awarded a Life membership.

CHANGE ARTICLE IX OF THE CONSTITUTION TO READ:

Any alteration of, or amendment to the Constitution shall be made by way of a resolution. This resolution to be submitted to the Secretary of the ADRC with the signatures of twenty-five (25) adult members in good standing of the ADRC. Said resolution to be submitted no later than January 1st. of the year in which the resolution will be voted on. The Secretary shall send copies of the resolution to each Officer of the ADRC, and shall have the resolution printed in the January-February issue of the Dutch Reporter so that the membership shall have ample time to form an intelligent opinion on the resolution. The resolution shall also be printed in the issue of the Dutch Reporter containing the final ballots on which the resolution will be voted. The ADRC voting membership shall then cast their ballots by mail. The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of all eligible votes cast. All amendments shall take effect January 1st. of the year following their acceptance.

ADD TO ARTCILE III OF THE BY-LAWS; SECTION 2A:

(ADD) —— The ADRC requires three open judges, chosen by and from the membership at each National Dutch Show. The ADRC Board of Directors has the authority to change the number of required judges if deemed necessary according to the entry. If a third open judge is required, the ADRC will make payment for this judge up to \$250.00. The open judges at the National Dutch Show shall be the top selections from the ballot if possible.

FLESH SPOTS

Previously, it was brought to the attention of the Standard Committee that there were quite a few Dutch running around with little "freckles" on their noses and lips. I called them "freckles" due to the lack of a better word. This subject was tossed around between the Standard Committee members, and the majority of this Committee felt that these "freckles" were indeed FLESH SPOTS.

As FLESH SPOT is not defined in the ARBA Standard of Perfection Glossary, it became necessary for this Committee to determine what a FLESH SPOT is. The majority of the ADRC Standard Committee felt that a FLESH SPOT was "an area of skin where the skin does not match the surrounding skin color. This can be either in the white section or colored section." In all actuallity, this would constitute a white spot in a colored section, or a colored spot in a white section of the rabbit, which is plainly described in our Standard as a disqualification.

By no means should a judge prod, pull, or poke at a rabbit trying to find such a spot, but if it is plainly visible, and detracts from the animals appearance, it should be considered a disqualification.

The ADRC Standard Committee is working with the ARBA Standard Committee regarding this area of concern, and we will hopefully address it in a more easily understandable manner in the next ARBA Standard of Perfection. Until that time, we should remember that animals carrying these FLESH SPOTS are subject to disqualification.

Any input from the membership would be most welcome regarding this situation. January 1, 1988 is the deadline for items we want addressed in the next ARBA Standard of Perfection, so if you have any thoughts regarding this subject, please notify me as soon as possible.

Breeding Dutch Rabbits

By HAROLD E. BREAR

The novice is generally told, after starting with his mated doe, never to pair any two with the same failings. To the experienced breeder this is a simple problem, but to the beginner it is a different story.

We will presume that we have a fair stud of say a dozen Dutch, and have been breeding them for a year or two, but cannot seem to be making much headway. What is the reason? One good way to answer this question is to make notes of every litter and mark down the worst failings.

After noting a fair number of litters it will probably be found that the stud carries at least one very bad fault in particular, and others in lesser degrees. For instance, if the bad fault is in the saddle, and the others are in necks and stops, it can be seen at once that saddles must be given first place in breeding operations as regarding markings. If not, the fault will crop up every time on the otherwise best marked youngsters.

One way to help is to save all the best saddled youngsters, sacrificing all other markings (on common sense lines, of course), and breed them back in this stud. It is the same with necks and stops, etc., but if we breed good faces together for a long time there will be a tendency for the cheeks to creep up the jaw. The remedy is to reserve a few heavy or low cheeked does and breed these back in the stud. When I say heavy-faced does, I don't mean dirry necked ones, or those with a drag on cheeks, I don't breed from them in any case, unless they carry some very good point that I must have. It must be remembered that if we put faults in, we have the job of clearing them out

Type is one of the most important things in Dutch although many breeders entirely disregard this factor. A Dutch without type is a poor thing at best. What we want is a smart, sprightly, cobby fellow, not a racy type like a miniature Belgian Hare. To me, ears carry a lot of weight as regards type. A small cobby rabbit with long ears looks poor in type, but with small ears it would be a smart rabbit. On the other hand a big rabbit with small

ears is out of proportion. The remedy is to breed shorter-bodied rabbits. The fault lies largely with our does. Some think if a good buck is paired to an indifferent doe it will throw winners. It may sometimes, but there would be much more chance if the buck had been mated to a better doe. It is best to aim at having breeding does of "buck" type that is thick and cobby. I believe that the buck and cobby. I believe that the buck and does both influence type, because if we mate a bad type buck to a good type doe, or vice versa, and take a censor of two

years breeding, the had type youngsters that turn up will cause surprise. To sum it all up, breed for short cobby body and small cars, well set up.

Color is the fad of many breeders. It is generally a good Dutch, shining like a black diamond, that sets them going.

It is a good plan in breeding to keep a record of each rabbit bred from. Keep it in a book or on loose leaf, and then file it. Note all the faults and also the good points.

The breeder will then have a valuable reference always at had to guide him on any point he is doubtful on.

I am not suggesting these are the only ways to breed Dutch and correct their faults, as there are many ways, all starting at a different point, but all leading to the same end.

I am writting in reference to a Directors messagr from District #7, Wayne MacKinnon. In the Sept.-Oct. issue, he brings up the unsolved problem of cow hocks.

Well, I am sending you my views on the problem.

First: there is nothing in the Dutch Standard of Perfection that takes cow hocks into consideration. It is a conformation fault.

Picture in your mind the perfect Dutch rabbit. Now give it cow hocks?

If we, as Dutch rabbit fanciers, and breeders are to be striving to improve and promote the breed, a strong stand must be taken.

I have seen beautifully marked and colored Dutch rabbits with great body type and severe cow hocks cleaning up at the shows.

The problem should not be ignored!

I feel Cow hocks past a very slight degree, should be a disqualification. By drawing a line and taking strong measurers, breeders and showman will be discouraged from recognizing these rabbits. They will think twice about breeding this weakness into their lines.

In the long run, the breed will benefit and so will the Showman. Sincerely working for the best,

STEEL DUTCH

The Steel Dutch are without a doubt the most impressive color of the six colors of Dutch. This color is maintained by blending four(4) of the colors: Black, Blue, Grey and Steel. A proper balance of them will insure a good colored Steel.

In breeding for Steel you must use crossed colors: Steel-Blacks, Steel-Blues, Steel-Greys, and breed them with the Steel. They must be at least ½ Steel and ½ the other color. This will speed up the color breeding, and you must keep these cross-bred colors to use at some other time.

The Steel color does not stay the desired color in all breedings. Thus you need to use the cross-color rabbits. The Steel-Blue will give you the under color and the blue cast in the Steel. The Steel-Black will darken the body color and undercut. The Steel-Grey will give the ticking needed to make a good Steel. The more Steel you have in the Black, Blue, and Grey, the more chance you have for a good Steel.

In choosing the Black, Blue, or Grey-cross rabbits, it is important to select small type animals. The reason for this is, in hybrid breedings using the cross colors, the rabbits tend to be more robust, and get larger. Many Steel are over 5 pounds. That is taking a chance of going over the standard.

Breeding Steel Dutch is not too good a choice for beginners, unless there is an experienced breeder handy to help out in a crisis. Too many start and then give then

crisis. Too many start and then give them up.

Steel breeding is also not for someone that doesn't have much time or room. It takes a lot of cages to keep enough does and bucks, including the cross colors.

I started three people in breeding and showing Steel, and all have quit because they didn't raise all Steel, like you would with Black or Blue Dutch.

Here is an example of what you might get in a few breedings. I had a Steel doe and buck bred together. I saved two bucks, a Black and a Grey. In another breeding, I bred a Grey-Black doe and the same Steel buck. I saved a Steel doe and a Black doe. The Steel doe I only used to show. The Black doe I bred to the Grey buck and got 5 Grey. I didn't save any. Next litter I bred the Black doe and buck together, and got 4 Steel; 3 does and 1 buck, but one doe was mismarked. They are still young and I haven't gone any farther with them.

I needed the room for my Chocolates, so I disposed of all three bucks. That was a mistake. I thought I could buy a good Steel buck, but I was wrong. Therefore, I'm in limbo at this time.

All this has been my ideas and my experience. I have had Dutch for 40 years, and I'm getting too old to do much extra work with them.

STEELS

To begin with let it be know that I don't consider myself as an authority on the subject. These are all personal opinions derived from limited experience, study and observations.

A good Steel is a beautiful. But what should a good Steel look like - As far as I am concerned, the discription in the Standards doesn't clarify as what to look for.

A good Steel to me is but a black with evenly distributed silver-gray guard hairs over its entire body, including head and ears, with a belly as dark as possible to match the body color.

Genetically Steels do not breed true as it is a combination of genes that makes the color. Steel to Steel usually produces mostly grays, as one has to use alot of grays to produce Steels. If per chance one would get one that would resemble a Steel chances are, it would be too light and have tan tipped guard hairs and light a belly. To produce good Steels, I would use only grays and blacks.

Breed your grays out of the gray and black cross back to a black with a Steel parent : as you can see from the foregoing, it takes alot of animals to produce a few good Steels, what with markings to contend with also.

Now as to good color in Steels. I know beforehand, here I will run into a lot of disagreement from what I have seen on thw showtable. The preference seems to run towards the real dark ones with the real fine ticking. Nearly all these are almost devoid of ticking over the back and especially the head and ears. After about 2 or 3 moults they are so dark, that they look like they just missed being black. I prefer a Steel with even ticking all over, including head and ears, and maybe give and take alittle over the color of the ticking. After all I don't want it to be so dark, that if I stand about 4 foot away, I'd have to pick it up to see if it is a Steel or Black.

I probably forget to mention some other things that don't come readily to mind. But while I am at it, I may as well throw in a few opinions about the brown grays. The Standard calls for Brown Grays. What should a Brown Gray look like? To me a Brown Gray should look like a wild rabbit as far as surface color is concerned. From what I have observed the judges prefernce seems to run towards the dark ones, that to me just missed being Steels.

The Standard calls for tan tipped guardhairs, not gray tipped guardhairs, which these dark ones run towards.

Hope to have been of some help to some, and I'm sure some disagreement to others. But as a very good friend of mine always says, We can disagree without being disagreeable.

All in all, with all the challenges, heartbreaks, disappointments, and a now and then BOV - BOB or BOS, it makes it all worth it.

RAISING STEEL DUTCH

IT'S HARD TO BEAT A GOOD STEEL. THE TROUBLE IS IT IS ALSO HARD TO GET A GOOD STEEL. I HAVE HAD WHOLE LITTERS OF EVERY COLOR EXCEPT STEEL. WHICH CONTAINED ALL SHOW QUALITY BUNNIES. SEEMS LIKE THEY ARE TOO LIGHT, TOO DARK, PATCHY IN TICKING OR HAVE LIGHT COLORED BELLIES. WITH A LITTLE WORK, IT IS POSSIBLE TO GET GOOD STEELS.

MY FIRST STEEL CAME FROM A CROSS OF A BLACK BUCK TO A GRAY DOE. AT THAT TIME I HAD NEVER SEEN A STEEL BEFORE, THEREFORE, I THOUGHT IT WAS A GRAY. (I WAS ELEVEN.) I DIDN'T KNOW WHAT TO USE IT FOR AND I DON'T BELIEVE I EVER HAD A LITTER FROM HER. THIS BRINGS ME TO MY FIRST POINT, YOU CAN GET STEELS FROM BLACK TO GRAY CROSSES. THIS WILL GIVE YOU INSTANT STEELS. HOWEVER, IF YOU DO THIS, YOU MUST CULL VERY CAREFULLY. I RARELY TRY THIS CROSS ANY MORE. THE PROBLEMS YOU RUN INTO WITH A BLACK-STEEL CROSS ARE: GRAYS WITH NO RING COLOR, STEELS WITH A TAN-LIKE TICKING, OR LIGHT BELLIED STEELS. IF YOU CULL CAREFULLY, ONLY KEEPING THE DARKER STEELS WITH A MORE BLUEISH-GRAY TICKING, YOU SHOULDN'T HAVE ANY PROBLEMS WITH THIS CROSS.

ANOTHER METHOD OF OBTAINING STEELS IS A STEEL TO BLUE CROSS. IT IS PRE-FERABLE TO HAVE A BLUE WITH SOME STEEL BACKGROUND. THIS CROSS WILL HELP KEEP THE TICKING OF THE STEEL MORE OF A BLUE GRAY AND WILL AVOID ANY BRASSINESS. MIKE STINEHELFER OF BUCYRUS, OHIO, HAS TOLD ME THAT MANY OF HIS LITTERS CONTAIN GOOD BLUES, STEELS AND GRAYS, OUT OF STEEL PARENTS.

I HAVE ALSO BRED STEEL TO BLACK. THE BUCK WAS A STEEL WITH MUCH STEEL BACKGROUND, AND THE DOES WERE BLACK WITH MOSTLY BLACK AND BLUE, WITH SOME GRAY ANCESTORS, I USUALLY ONLY GET ONE STEEL OUT OF THIS CROSS, BUT IT GENERALLY SEEMS TO BE OF GOOD QUALITY.

THE MAIN METHOD I USE IS STEEL TO STEEL. WITH THIS, I USUALLY GET MAINLY STEELS WITH SOME BLACKS AND OFF-COLORED GRAYS. I SELECT ONLY THE GOOD COLORED AND DARKER STEELS OF THE LITTER FOR USE IN MY BREEDING PROGRAM. I HAVE FOUND THAT THE DARKER STEELS USUALLY HAVE A BETTER COLOR OF TICKING THAN THE LIGHTER ONES. THESE ALSO SEEM TO PRODUCE LITTERS WITH BETTER COLOR. I RARELY KEEP LIGHT COLORED STEELS.

ONE LAST POINT TO MAKE. AVOID USING OR HAVING ANY CHOCOLATES OR TORTS IN THE BACKGROUND. I STARTED WITH STOCK FROM A WELL KNOWN OHIO DUTCH BREEDER AROUND FIFTEEN YEARS AGO AND HE SEEMED TO HAVE CROSSED ALL COLORS TOGETHER. THE LITTERS PROVED THIS.

I HOPE I HAVE HELPED SOME OF YOU DEVELOP SOME IDEAS TO USE WITH YOUR STEELS AND I HOPE A FEW MORE PEOPLE HAVE DECIDED TO TRY RAISING THEM.

I hope that you have generated some articles on the Steel variety. It is currently one of the most popular colors in the Dutch breed, but in talking to the breeders at Portland I found out that we all have a little different idea about the color. I also found out that not too many of us are at all sure about how to get it right! Hopefully someone out there sent you a scientific understanding of the color, but if not, here are my thoughts on the subject.

The following opinions about the steel variety are just that - opinions. And it is only the bloodline which I have raised for the past 8 years on which I draw these opinions.

- My Steels are a recessive trait out of my line of grays, yet I have never had a steel from this line be too light or show any hint of ring color. Grays in the same litter with steels have always been true to standard grays.
- Chocolates are a recessive, although I cannot find a chocolate rabbit anywhere in their pedigree. I have only kept one of the chocolates out of a steel to steel mating to see what would happen in a successive mating. Her first litter of eight were 50% mismarked. The other 50% were what I call a chocolate-gray with beautiful markings. No need to keep her around any longer!
- The only time I find an occasional blue fleck in the iris in my barn will be in a steel.
- My steels carry the best type and fur of the other varieties. They are generally smaller in size and weight and very bold in the head, with a well-arched, cobby body.
- The markings are usually straighter and more defined.
- I really feel that the steel color is the least dominant color of the six varieties of Dutch.
- The color of steel that I like to see is not too light that is not having excessive amounts of light hairs in the backdrop of black. I like to see a darker animal that is evenly distributed with a light gray guard hair. If there are too many of these guard hairs and/or the accent color is tan or orange, they should be cut severely for brassiness. Also beware of a steel that has a black strip running down its back. This really spoils the overall appearance of the steel and usually means that there is too much black influence in the bloodline.
- Judges should not place, and breeders should not exhibit a steel Dutch that has a light colored belly. Usually this rabbit will also have ring color somewhere on its body color. If such a rabbit does not fit into the gray standard, it should be disqualified.
- I, too, would like to hear more discussion on the steel color.

Yes I'm afraid that is what I still like to call them Steel-Gray. We have had the Steels almost from the time we begain raising Dutch. The first Steel popped up from I'm not sure where, but that did it, I liked it and started in to breed for them.

We had a nice Gray Buck, a good Blue Doe and a nice Black Doe. I got real nice Steels from both. From then on we bred Steel to Steel for a generation or two. but when they start to get too dark (not enough Steel ticking) we will go back to a good Blue again. By the same token when they began to get too light or revert back to the Gray we will breed back to Black again. When I am looking to replace a Steel Doe I always like to take my best Black Buck and breed my Steel Does. This has been going on now for approximately fifteen years at our rabbitry.

One thing you want to stay away from is not mixing Chocolate in with your Steels. It will come back to haunt you.

Steel is one of my favorite colors. The does are always good producers. They hold their condition and in normal conditions go through a slow molt so that you hardly know they are molting.

Time to run - everyone keep plugging - keep those nest boxes full.

THE DUTCH REPORTER

Your reporter missed the excitement of the Portland show as he was on vacation in the United Kingdom. It was a busman's holiday as he visited several Dutch breeders, and he would like to share some observations which may be of interest.


The equivalent to the ARBA is the British Rabbit Council (BRC), an organization every bit as contentious and political as any rabbit club in America. Angry editorals and letters abound in each issue of "Fur and Feathers," the BRC magazine. There also are various specialty and regional clubs, including the United Kingdom Dutch Rabbit Club, which has fewer members than our ADRC but which has many more shows and much larger entries, typically 75 in a local show and as many as 2000 in their annual national show. As the country is so small and distances short, the shows go on year round.

Judges are not licensed and are assisted by stewards who bring the rabbits to the table and help to pose them. Often they handle their own animals and try to show them to best advantage. There are complaints about stewards who depart as soon as their rabbits are shown leaving the judge to fend for himself. Rabbits are posed in a style very different from the customary static, compact poses in American shows (see page 32 of our standard.) The British like to have their smaller breeds with heads up and a bold, alert look, especially Polish and dwarfs, and to see movement across the table. Prizes are like OUT own except there trophies-handsome engraved cups and bowls-- that have to be returned each year and recompeted. Breeders are reminded by name in "Fur and Feathers' to return the trophies on time.

Rabbits are not tattooed for identification but rather have a rear leg band with a number registered with the BRC. Breeders buy however many bands they need for the numbers of rabbits they intend to show. Sales are recorded by registration number with the BRC, and the buyer may not show a purchased animal in a "breeder's class," as the British place great store in raising show animals from birth rather than buying proven animals for exhibition. A breeder can win championship legs and get a certificate; breeders and the names of their champion animals are published in "Fur and Feathers." The judges are expected to write narrative reports of the shows they judged, for publication in "Fur and Feathers."

In the next issue your reporter will tell about his visit to the premier Dutch breeder in the United Kingdom.

SHOULDERS SHOULD BE ROUNDED AND SLIGHTLY NARROWER AND LOWER THAN HIPS. RIB SPREAD SHOULD BE SO THAT THE SIDE LINES CARRY STRAIGHT THROUGH FROM THE SHOULDERS TO THE HIPS. A GOOD DUTCH SHOULD HAVE NICELY ROUNDED HIPS, VERY SMOOTH, ROUNDED UNDER VERY GRADUALLY AND SMOOTHLY. THE DUTCH SHOULD RETAIN THE COBBY, STOCKY APPEARANCE WHETHER IT WEIGHS 3½ POUNDS OR 5½ POUNDS.



WEIGHT AND CONDITION

IDEAL WEIGHT - SENIOR BUCKS AND DOES, 4½ POUNDS. REGISTRATION WEIGHT - SENIOR BUCKS AND DOES, OVER 6 MONTHS OF AGE, 3½ TO 5½ POUNDS. FLESH FIRM AND SOLID, SKIN TO BE TIGHTLY DRAWN OVER THE FLESH, MAKING THE COAT TIGHT AND HARD TO GRASP.
