Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo

The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo will initiate a new program at its February 1973 show, which will be beneficial to all youth interested in breeding rabbits. For 4 H or FFA projects, a hobby or just for fun. Included in the 1973 show will be a Youth Rabbit Show. This will be a breeding rabbit show, the purpose being to encourage youths to be interested in rabbits the year round, and not to "buy today, show tomorrow, and sell the next day."

Since this is the first year for this type of show, every possible effort and energy is being gathered in order to make this show worthwhile for the youth. The show will be sanctioned with the A.R.B.A. Youth Club and the Texas Youth Rabbit Breeders Association. All youths between the ages of six (6) through eighteen (18) will be eligible to exhibit. Entries will close February 1, 1973.

All breeds of rabbits listed in the show catalog will be awarded three trophies one for Best of Breed, one for Best Opposite Sex and one for Best Display. There will be Rosettes for each Best of Variety. Ribbons will be awarded through the 5th place. There will also be cash paybacks based on the number of rabbits entered in each class.

A Youth Rabbit Judging Contest will also be held. The entrants will be divided into two groups; one for ages 6 through 13, and one for ages 14 through 18. There will be a trophy for first place in each group. There will be a written and an oral test.

As a bonus to the youths, there will be a banquet held one night of the show, including awarding of trophies, Door prizes and fun for all.

Explanation: This is a letter from Tom Shufflebotham to be read at the A.R.B.A. Convention Dutch meetings. It has so much humor and information that we felt that we should share it with the general membership.

To the Board of Directors and all the assembled members of the A.D.R.C.

I had been planning on this convention for the past year. This would have been my 31st since the 1933 convention held at the Worlds Fair in Chicago. Have enjoyed every one of them and will be thinking of you all. / Words cannot express my regret at not being able to do a little trap shooting and elbow bending with all of you. Since I will not be there to put Don to bed, I am sure that some one will take care of my boy. This has always been my job, treat him nice, be kind to him, he can't help it.

Since I have been hospitalized for over two months and at home for the past two weeks, it has given me plenty of time to do some research and reviewing our past history and making a few suggestions that will be helpful to us in the future.

I was very much disappointed when I received my convention premium list, to find that I was not listed as one of the judges. I am a Director of this club and felt that I had been let down by not being notified of the changing of judges. Not that I feel that Don is not qualified, he certainly is, but this is my gripe and many of you have listened to this record before. I have sure played it enough that the record is beginning to scratch. I wish that the Directors of our club would pay a bit more attention to our Constitution and By-laws, which calls for two Judges/ All judging should be completed the same day, same thing this year as it was last year, seems as if everyone is afraid of offending someone by not standing up and saying, that everything was handled well, when it seems that at times it could not be worse. Last year was a prime example. Last year I brought my rabbits by train. No feed or watering crocks, and only pigeon coops with no protection between the coops. Two of my good bucks were injured by fighting and could have been spoiled for future competition, and then only having one judge to handle the judging and George Bayliss who was listed in the catalog as one of our judges, seemed to be judging about everything but the Dutch. It is not fair to the animals or the exhibitors, when the judges that are elected by the membership are judging other breeds leaving the Dutch to be cooped up in pigeon coops for an extra day and some more pulling around. I don't have to remind you that an animal can change over night, especially if it has been away from home a couple days. Different food and different handling can sure play hell with their condition. We should not have to stand for this kind of treatment. If it were not for the Speciality Clubs, there would not be an A.R.B.A. Convention, in fact there would be no A.R.B.A. in my opinion as the only thing that they are selling are shows and registrations. We the Dutch Club, pay the same membership fees as do the A.R.B.A. What I can't understand is who is really running the ship? The A.R.B.A. is supposed to be the parent organization, yet in the catalog, the home club states that they have the final say so, as who is to be the judge. We pay \$1.50 entry fee and furnish all the SPECIALS, you will also note by our premium list that it is always the same old gang. We the Dutch Club do the same thing at our National Dutch Shows. Why have show rules if we do not enforce them. There is one more thing that I hope that you will give some consideration to is the judges fees. Sure it is an honor to be selected to be one of the judges, just as it is to be an A.R.B.A. Director. If anyone should have their expenses paid, it is the judges, again I say, the thing that is being sold is the National Show. I would guess that I have attended, at my own expense, as many of these conventions as anyone in the A.R.B.A. and figure it as an annual vacation.

Now about another old record, the Dutch Reporter. I would say the same thing here as I mentioned about the show rules and judges. It is spelled out sound and clear in our Guide Book, who is to run it, and all of its policies. I know that it is a big job for the Secretary to be the Editor and carry the load that she is carrying/ Generally she has to do it herself. If all of the Directors would write one article a year as they are supposed to do and they know it when they accept the Directorship. If they do not live up to their obligations the membership should

Shufflebotham, continued of ... remember them at voting time. Personally I think it caters too much to the Sweepstakers and the show reports, more than they should. What good are they when you do get them they are six months old and what does it tell you. No ear numbers, no remarks on them, as there should be to be published to be interesting. I get no "kick" out of it, just to read where some breeder have some times three or four rabbits in one class, just makes a hell of a lot of CHEAP CHAMPIONS, and one good reason that the secretary is so busy publishing all this kind of stuff, such as N.M. listings, which all takes time and costs money. I feel that the Publicity Director could be a lot of help if some of the work could be turned over to them, such as sweepstakes standings. It works for the Checkered Giants, perhaps it would be well for us to explore some of these ideas. Every one speaks so well of the Hands and they are up there where the action is, Dutch Country.

Relative to how many issues of the Dutch Reporter, I feel that six a year would be plenty. The Dutch Guide Book. I believe that the Dutch Club is just beginning to get on their feet financially and perhaps it would be possible to issue a good year book such as the U.K.D.R.C. as you know it gives a history of their trophy winners, also a list of all of the Champions issued that year. This project would be a good one for the Publicity Dept. and would be in good Hands. With the Hands at the steering wheel, would be able to finance the whole thing and do away with the Dutch Reporter, which has always been nothing but a head ache and a big expense generally.

I believe that the pen is mightier than the sword and that the American Dutch Club if it wants to live up to its motto should pay more attention to its advertising and for that reason I would be in favor of a Special Dutch edition in the Rabbit World. If we do decide to go ahead with this project I would hope that a good committee will be appointed to generate the real interest of Dutch Fancy and that they will support whichever publication is selected to handle the Special Edition with some good advertising of their own. After all, the magazines have to make a living and we really do need them. It is my hope that the A.R.B.A. will some day decide to turn our semi-monthly publication over to a private public publication, one where every one is given equal rights and equal time, which is not so in publications like the Dutch Reporter and the A.R.B.A. Bulletin, where everything for publication is left up to the Editor.

I see no reason that we need any changes in the length of time in the term of our officers. I would like to see our present constitution and by-laws, which states that any officer that neglects his appointment, can be replaced by our President and the approval of the Board.

There is an article in Rabbit World which is very interesting to myself and Judge-Director, Don Lovejoy. Quote R.W. twenty years ago, October, 1947, Harry Wellenkotter, moaned the passage of resolution limiting the issuance of judges licenses and registrations licenses to anyone under 21 years of age.

This was at the Milwaukee convention where they were trying to organize the Young Fanciers of America, our present youth organization and amongst them, those present and elected to office were our present judge and Director Don Lovejoy, Judge, Tom Coatham, Johnny Richards and Johnny Baker. They were all guests in my home and it was here that Coatham saw his first Fur and Feather publication.

I mention this fact to prove a point, Once in Dutch always in Dutch. Lovejoy and Coatham and I think Baker are still very active. These are my thoughts on the points requested in your letter to the Board Sept. 19th. Would have enjoyed expressing them in person.

I am very pleased that the Dutch Club is sponsoring a Banquet at Tacoma, been quite awhile and I myself always looked forward to them as I like to be "where the action is". This has been a poor summer for me, hospitalized for six weeks, will be quite some time before I will be back in full form again, but am feeling better

but am feeling better day by day. If it were left up to me I would be delivering all this garbage in person and enjoying it, but Mrs. Dutch, my doctor and good friend and partner, Bonnie are so much against it that I have to at least try to please some one besides myself. Started out to be a heart attack, which was not as severe as first suspected, then they started to look me over, took them three weeks to do this. They found everything in the world wrong with me and what you used to say was Rocks in my head, turned out to be kidney stones. 200 of them. I suppose all the jogging that I had done finally dislodged them. Also had my gall bladder removed, don't have so much of that anymore, which is sorely needed at times. Whilst they were doing all these things to me, I got one of the nurses in Dutch (she will have her teen agers in 4-H)

It was some of the things that they did to me that galled me that caused the stones. Seems like some one was poking at my rear end all the time, funny that they did not strip my gears. Must have mistaken me for a Greek sailor instead of a good Dutch Breeder. So o o sore, I could not sit down for a long time. I have callouses on my hands and knees. Hope that they dislodged what they were looking for. I told my doctor that I knew quite a few of my friends in the A.D.R.C. that needed those enemas worse than I did, a few of them, Don and Doris especially. Also put in a "plug" for Al Meier, Don Lovejoy, and George Bayliss. Take a tip from me, they have "do it yourself kits" named Fleet 4½ oz plastic bottles with a nice adapter on the end. Would have bought some of them myself, if I had known about them sooner. You can hold them yourself, use them as a plug, until you reached the target, which I missed a couple times with the ones that they gave me. Did not want to get so messy with this little story of my operation. I had better close now or some of you will think that I am still full of the same old stuff. Also have to leave a little time and space for some of you to start slinging your own stuff.

The Board of Directors of the American Dutch Rabbit Club was called to order by President Reid at 9 P.M. at the Sherwood Inn, Tacoma, Wn. Attending were, President Reid, Vice-President Mike Stinehelfer, Secretary-Treasurer, Doris Leibel and Director, Don Lovejoy. We did not have a quorum.

President Reid reported that he had letters from David Paul and Tom Shufflebotham that they would not be able to attend.

Mike Stinehelfer moved that we dispense with the reading of the minutes as they had been published, seconded by Don Lovejoy and carried.

Secretary's report; We are now officially incorporated and have the non profit mailing privilege. To date I have not been able to convince the Minnesota Department of Taxation that we qualify for the tax exempt status.

We have ten thousand covers for the Dutch Reporter, professionally printed, courtesy of Purina Mills for the inside cover advertising.

The 1971-72 Sweepstakes Series has been completed and the standings published in the September issue of the Dutch Reporter. It was a close contest, with winners scattered over the nation. The total bill for 28 trophies was \$168.00. This includes twelve A.R.B.A. Convention trophies and six Youth trophies plus the Sweepstakes trophies.

I accept the responsibility of "blowing" the nominations with the observation that an effort was made to correct it. The cost was borne by Pat Herman and myself with a \$20.00 donation each.

There is an increase of eighteen sanctions this year over last.

A letter from Tom Shufflebotham was read. President Reid commented upon several points in the letter.

President Reid asked that we attend the Speciality Club Officers meeting.

Don Lovejoy moved that the secretary be instructed to poll the Board of Directors re: that we have a combination May-June issue and a combination November-December issue, making ten issues a year. Discussion followed on Dutch Reporter contents and timing of show reports. There are also many late requests for sanctions received and this accounts for late listings in the coming shows in many instances.

Mike Stinehelfer reported upon some plastic Dutch rabbit figures with magnets that his daughter makes and the cost is 60¢ each could sell for \$1.00 each. President Reid commented that he preferred to give the Publicity Directors a free hand as to items handled.

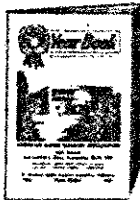

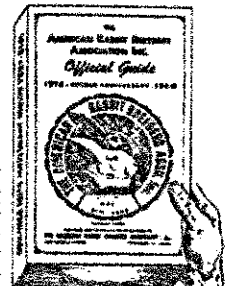

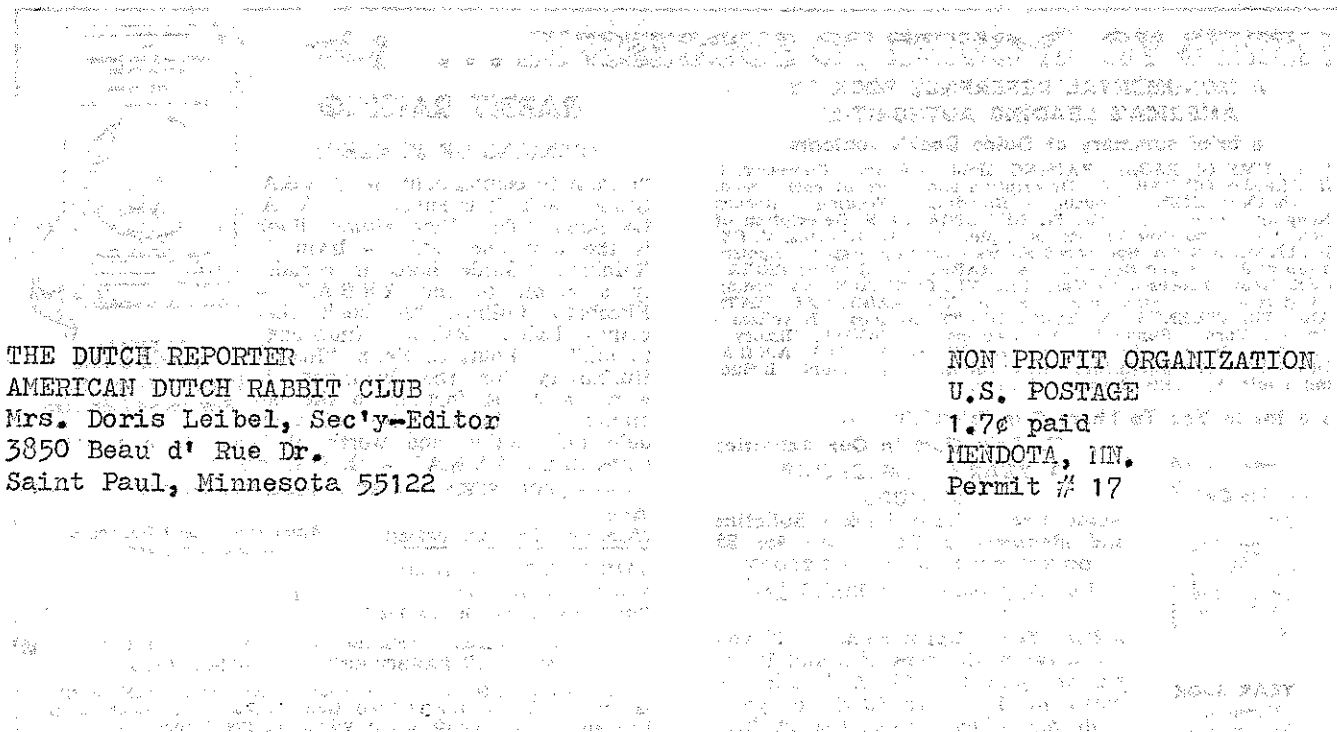
