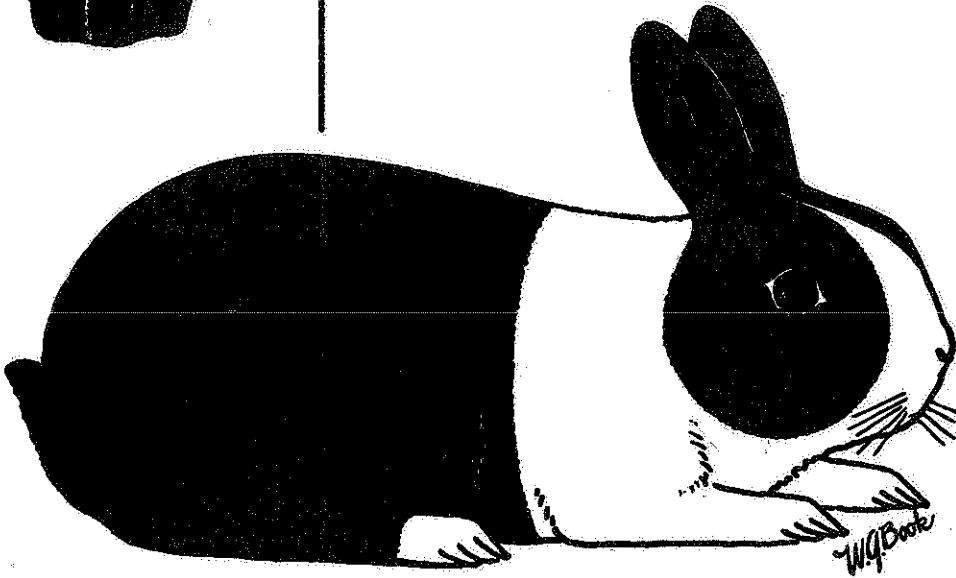

Any day now we can expect to receive our copies of the 1963 ARBA Convention catalog. I know you have been watching and grooming those Dutch very carefully attempting to have them in that "full-bloom" condition when they arrive at the show. Some of the best ones may have just started their fall moult and I know how you are brushing them and perhaps feeding them specially to try to hurry the moult along so their coats will be prime on that crucial day. In this part of the country the weather has been completely against us, what with a few very hot days changing quickly to late fall temperatures so that nature just doesn't know which way to turn. Condition always plays an important role in the decision of the judge as to which rabbits get the final top honors, but this year this could be of more importance than is generally true -- keep up thw work, brush and pet and handle with care so that we may have one of the tightest victories in the history of Convention Shows. Dutch entries have been down somewhat at the last 2 Convention Shows, but with the show so close to the heart of the "Dutch Country" (that area producing more good Dutch than all of the rest of the nation) we can hope to break all records for entries of Dutch in 1963. We have a fine list of specials on Dutch this year, thanks to the might efforts of our hard-working breed chairman, Bob Ernst, so let's get lots of Dutch in there to compete for them. Again this month I am forced to turn to the experienced breeders in the United Kingdom DRC for articles that I feel might be of interest to our members. BREEDING WINNERS

Our Secretary asked me to write on this subject for beginners in our breed. Let us say there is no easy way to breed a good Dutch, often a beginner will come up with an outstanding exhibit at our Shows. This is often called "beginners luck" but usually it can be the result of a right start with stock from an established stud.

The first thing any beginner should do is to decide on the color he is going to keep don't dabble in several colors until you gain knowledge by experience. There are six colors in our standard to choose from Blacks and Blues are bred together and must be to hold good color. I believe they are the most popular and easiest colors to control. Torts seem to come and go and are hard to get the real color, we are not seeing such good color in these as we did several years ago. The Steels and Grays are very difficult to control in colors, even our old experienced breeders of these admit it. Chocolates have improved in color and markings and with these a novice could do well by starting with good foundation stock. I have dabbled in all colors and have bred, like others some colors that are not in the standard. One of these is Whites, after 55 yrs. of breeding Blacks and Blues I always value a Black doe that brings a White in her litter, these have always proved breeders of good exhibition stock. One old Black doe some years ago that occasionally bred a White was the dam of 5 U.K.D.R.C. champions and best Dutch Bradford. A word of warning to the novice -- never be tempted to use a White for breeding, destroy them.

All old Dutch fanciers have their own methods of breeding and I often hear advice given to beginners to use heavily marked does. Personally I would want to know how such does were bred before using them. My method of breeding for the last 20 yrs. has been by counter-balancing markings and faults on the doe's side. I believe I can say it has proved itself by the consistency of results from a small stud of about 8 does. This is a simple method, say a breeding doe has heavy cheeks into whiskers, long stops very good saddle and undercut in right place, I would only retain any young does from her with standard markings on dams faults or less markings than standard and would give a bit on saddle and undercut as the dam was perfect in these. Of course, using this method the bucks used have to be exhibition standard, but keep clear of drags and runs in color markings, or otherwise in later generations these will surely crop up.

To follow this method records have to be kept and don't trust to memory. All breeders know that nature will reduce color markings, for example if near-perfect marked Dutch are bred together for several generations results are light cheeks, long stops,

and saddle halfway back. I will be honest and say I have never bred an outstanding exhibit from a good exhibition doe.

One or two warnings to beginners -- don't keep large studs, a few does that you know how are bred will give you better results than trusting to luck with large numbers. If you are lucky to get that one, consistency may not follow in future breeding.

Make your fancy a hobby to enjoy, not a burden. Don't depend on one buck, better keep an extra buck than extra does. If in the same strain one may blend with one doe better than the others. This way I think the Spring Breeders Show helps, one can only mate maiden does and perhaps get a likely exhibit for these early shows, or if the results are not up to expectations, there is still time to re-mate to another buck in time to get youngsters for Young Stock Show dates.

Last warning -- remember type, color and condition are bred in, not made. Even condition cannot be put on a poor bred one, the remedy is to start with mating only good conditioned rabbits with type and color and if then you do get a good marked one, you will have success with it. A good marked, poor typed and poor conditioned Dutch is a sorry sight.

All Dutch breeders admit it takes time and patience to breed a good one, but any beginner that starts right with good stock has a chance. The pleasure gained will more than pay when success comes along. If I asked what is the secret of success in Dutch breeding, I would sum it up by saying -- "Start right, with good stock, know your stock by records and never be afraid to cull and destroy all that do not come up to expectations." Far more of my stock are destroyed at birth than number kept.

If this article helps any beginner, then the pleasure will be mine.
