

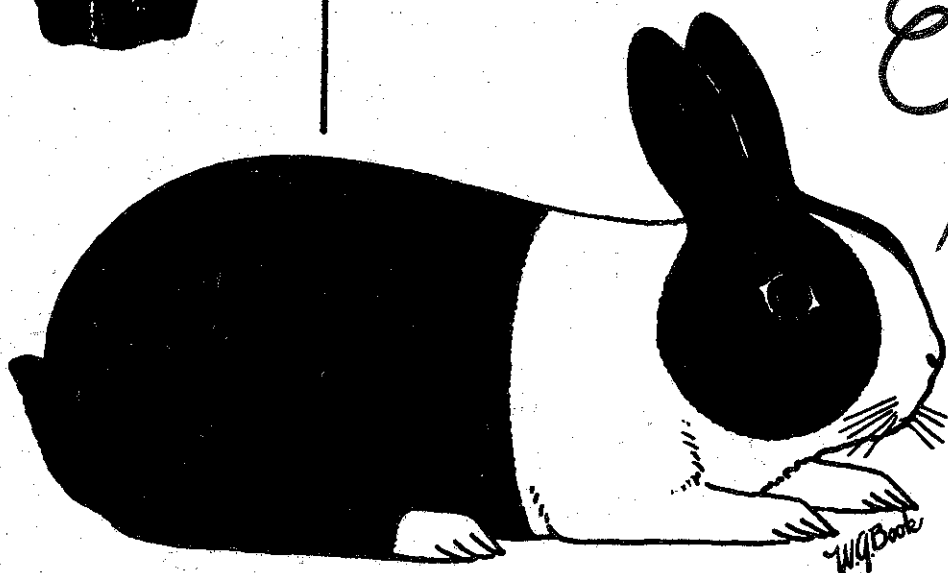

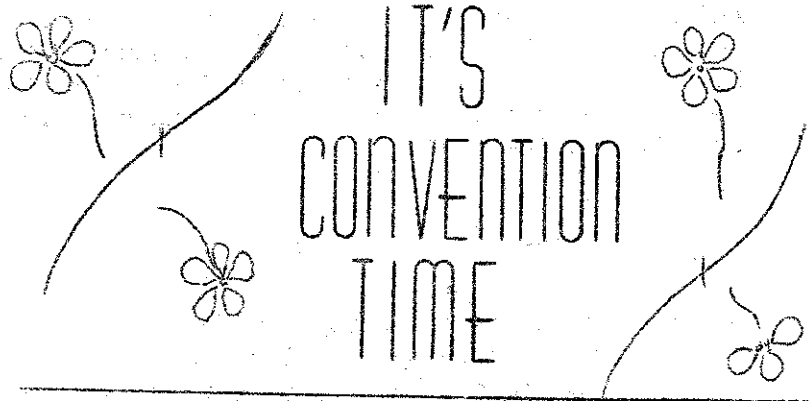

So, have a fine time at the Convention, we appreciate your support and interest and look forward to having you become a part of our organization.

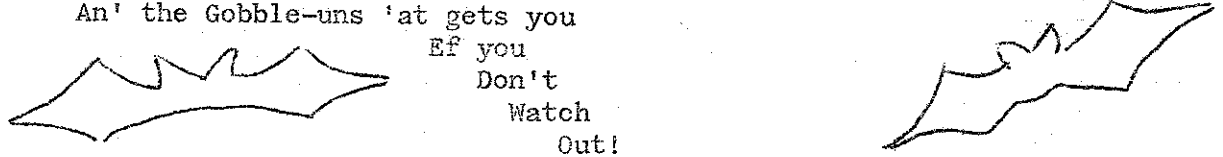

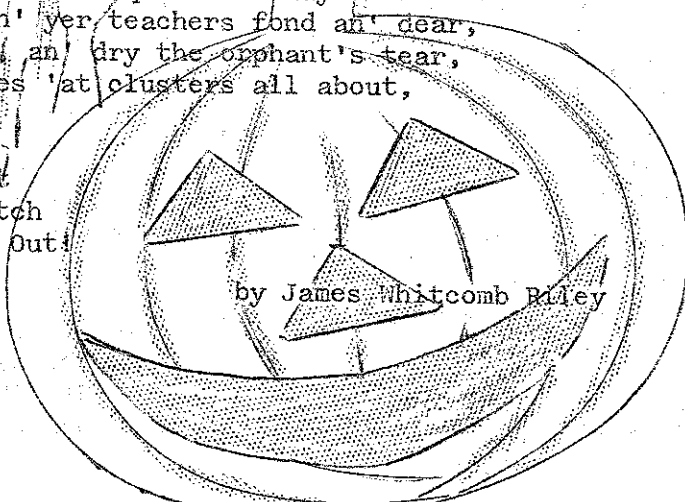
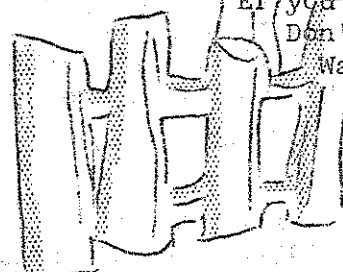

ESTABLISHING A SUCCESSFUL DUTCH STUD

In undertaking to write an article on a topic of this nature one does it with the full realization that many successful breeders will disagree, perhaps strenuously, with some and possibly many of the things said. So that there will be no misunderstanding of my intent, permit me to lay the groundwork for these remarks.

First, there will be no attempt at discussing genetics and why things happen as they do in breeding rabbits. Second, I am humbly aware that no stretch of a vivid imagination would entitle me to write with authority on this topic. My writing will be solely from the viewpoint of one interested in breeding a line of Dutch rabbits that will be uniform in many characteristics and come close to measuring up to the standard set down by the fanciers, as desirable. My comments will be a review of my personal attack on this problem, my observations and my convictions as derived from 25 years of experience in rabbit breeding. Whether you agree with me is immaterial, but if from this you get a new idea that will help you down the road to successfully establishing your own stud of Dutch, my effort will have been amply repaid.

PATIENCE

is a truly essential ingredient in breeding winning show rabbits. To mate two prizewinning animals and from this mating be certain of garnering a number of prize-winning offspring is sheer folly. Many times such a mating will produce strictly "meat rabbits," the first mating, the second mating, and even more times. In cases where some particular characteristic was wanted I've made the same mating as many as four times before getting the one to suit me. It is surprising that after three meat-litters another mating of the same animals can produce the desired specimen. This will not always happen and such persistence may not be to your advantage in every situation.

The tremendous number of genetic variables and gene combinations is what makes this possible. This unpredictability is the stimulus which drives the true fancier to work and plan to mate his rabbits in a determined attempt to get that elusive "big winner" for the show table. For me, the satisfaction in setting out a string of very similar animals that will likely reproduce offspring very much like themselves is equal to that of garnering a string of ribbons. To do this, planning is also essential.

PLANNING

is studying your pedigrees and the animals with which you want to start your breeding program in order to inventory what characteristics you have and match these against the mythical "ideal Dutch" you want to produce.

If my experience has taught me anything it is that line-breeding is imperative in the development of a good stud of Dutch. My preference is through the male because in the reproductive process it is much easier to influence many more rabbits by line-breeding from the sire, than via the dam. Also, a traditional three-generation pedigree does not give me the same picture that a pedigree which reflects more ancestry will give. For my own use a five-generation ancestry is used.

The dam's pedigree is made out on the lower-half of the form. My herd sire is then pedigreed on the top-half of another form and the bottom half (which is blank) is then cut off. Now by placing the sire's pedigree over the blank top half of the dam's pedigree you have a complete and clear picture of the pedigree of that potential mating. Study it and see if the outlined plan looks as though it might produce good offspring. If so, make the mating and then keep a doe or two from the litter and plan your next generation and so on. Many times my matings have been planned as much as four generations into the future. This is my reason for continually discarding seniors, because my space permits only a limited number of

breeders, and the next generation is the part of the plan in which my interest lies. If you work on such a schedule, good records of what you have done are necessary.

RECORDS

are the history of what you have done. They reflect those things which you most want to remember about each animal that has become a part of your breeding program. For me the most essential information is the ancestry, the markings, color, fur, and type. My records of show winnings are very sketchy since they prove little beyond the fact that the animal is free of disqualifications as laid down by the fancier's standard of perfection and that is better than so many other animals, in the opinion of some judge.

To show the diffusion of the different colors used in a mating (black or blue is the only color in my breeding) I put the names of those having blue color in red ink, those with black color in black ink so that at a glance it is easy to see how much blue blood is in a particular specimen.

These two illustrations may serve as a guide in this field. They have been helpful to me and do not take a great amount of time to keep up-to-date. From this information it seems easier for me to plan future generations, so the matings are made and the next generation moves onto the stage. Now a very important step must be taken, observe how the plan is working.

OBSERVATION

of the new generation in relation to past generations and especially in relation to its matching up against that "imaginative ideal" Dutch you have in your architectural mind, is important. Is the type what you want? Is the color right? Is the fur short and of the density desired? Is the litter generally of the same appearance in all of these areas? Are the markings near what the fancier demands of the good Dutch rabbit? Some of them will not be, so should be discarded. Do not breed and just trust to luck that you might get the one "flyer" which will set the show world on fire. As a minimum, keep the doe which comes closest to measuring up to what you are striving for and cull the rest.

CULLING

is the ruthless elimination from the strain of all animals with characteristics which you do not want in future generations. It is often hard not to hang onto one that almost measures up. This will illustrate what is meant.

Some time back, a beautiful little doe carried my earmark in the thirties. At about six months of age she began to show some stray white hairs over her back and down onto the sides. It seemed such a shame to discard this beautiful animal that she was mated to a good buck. Her litter had a beautiful little doe in it but by the time it was three or four months of age it began to show a sprinkling of stray white hairs. Right here is the point at which "ol' flint heart" must take over. This mother and the entire litter were meated and now with the earmarks near 200 this fault has not recurred, although rabbits closely related to this doe were used in the breeding program. Do not keep offspring which show the same faults as their parents.

In culling, one must ruthlessly eliminate all rabbits that show a tendency toward too much white in the markings, long fur, long ears, long head or body, shallow body depth or flat over the back leading onto the rump. If we are to keep that "cobby" type (the dictionary defines cobby as a round mass) we must keep body depth onto the rump else the hips will soon protrude above the back. This shouldn't be, for they are supposed to blend smoothly into the contour from the spine down over the hips both to the sides and over the rump. Should one, as some breeders do, run into spots or off-coloring in the eyes, by all means cull these from your stud.

Establishing a Successful Dutch Stud con't.....

Unless a specific line would be broken by this elimination, my own motto in culling is: "if in doubt, destroy." It may take longer but the end result will be better if you stick to the longer, slower and harder path to reach that more perfect specimen. Such a procedure will require perseverance.

PERSEVERANCE

is a most important keystone in building this highly successful stud. After fooling around with a few Dutch and observing them for more than a year, my plans were formulated, my goal was projected to a time at least five years away, and the project launched.

A well known breeder sold me three black does which he was culling. He also recalled a black buck from the meat pen since his father hadn't had time to butcher him, and since he just happened to be the sire of these three does, he was used in line-breeding to his daughters. This buck was a good specimen but had lost a toe nail through an injury and he had developed a black spot at that point so he could not be shown. Also I had one other black buck with which the same program was used.

One of these bucks could be mated back to his offspring for three generations, the other four generations, before too much white appeared. During succeeding generations, the culling process eliminated undesirables and gradually it developed that all of my Dutch were from the one black buck except for one trio. At that point the trio was discarded so that everything stemmed from the one buck.

At one time a new line was introduced by the introduction of two does, and only used for one litter each, to pick up a little additional body depth and color intensity, otherwise no foreign blood has been used. Over a period of the last seven years, either directly or through ancestry, this stud has produced some very nice wins on the show table. This tends to assure me that the plan is feasible and should work for any breeder following the same procedure.

With the proper patience, planning, records, observation, culling and perseverance, any of you could do the same thing.

blue dutch

The way I have been breeding my Blues to get that good color of blue is to keep a pair of Black Dutch that came from a breeding of Blues. And whenever I see that the Blue color isn't a uniform medium dark Blue and very glossy running deep to the skin as your standard calls for, I use the black buck to serve the blue does and the black does to a blue buck. I have found that this doesn't take so long. I keep the best of the off spring from these matings and then breed the does back to the Black buck and the Blue does to the Blue buck. It has been working good for me.

A few years back I began to lose the blue color. They were always too light blue when ever I would show them. I know that some of the old-time breeders will not agree with me on this, but it has proven out for me, so I will keep on.

"DARE WE WONDER WHY"

Perhaps one of the most important functions of being an officer in any specialty club must be one of compassion. This compassion is encountered either through the written word or "visiting" ones peers and on tituents.

It was my pleasure to do both this past summer without restriction as is the case in the winter months. What I have to report will probably neither shake you up or depress you.

Having corresponded with a breeder of 7 years who quit this year, without much of an explanation, he poured out his heart to me in the form of troubles. It seems that he breeds for type first then markings second. I was told to look at the 1931-35 ARBA Standard of Perfection page 84 snap-shot then look in the ADRC Guide-book page 60 ideal Dutch. "Shoot" he said, "In no way was the Guide book photo even close to the standard in type." They are different, The guide book Dutch is rather flat! Also the cheeks in the ideal are quite impossible to attain. A Dutch cannot have a perfectly round head otherwise there would be no nose or mouth. A more ideal real Dutch would be the ARBA picture. The cheeks follow the head shape (not rounded) and exhibit color on the sides of the mouth or near the cheek-bone whereby with "rounded" cheeks there would be no color. He does have a point if you compare the two photo's.

The second point is one in which Dutch 3-3½ months old were shown in the junior class when two judges (in 2 weeks) both looked at the junior Dutch then said "too young for the class". This is a fallacy! They must be both posed and looked at because they were paid for and are in the right class! If they are junior Dutch in the correct class they are not out-classed. If this be so then "Mother Dutch Club" should accomodate the remark by developing a separate class for two different levels of juniors! Hey, what is a junior? Yes, less than six months old. How long has it been that a 3-3½ month old Dutch won the class at a National Convention or show? Or even did better?

Perhaps some judges may feel repercussions would ensue. Noe, we all want a fair shake on that day of the show with equal billing of our stock. Some of those "dute babies" are the best in the class.

The third point related to this writer was one or being beaten out by a particular mans stock repeatedly when the stock had crooked hind legs. This particular 4 rabbits were quite wonderful otherwise, but yes they were all disqualified once in three shows by a judge that nobody likes! Yet, he was doing his job and was not afraid to call them as seen that day. The breeder admitted that they were crooked legs, but rarely were they disqualified, Whose fault is this? The breeders or the many judges?

It is no wonder that this man who related this to me is now out of Dutch - and rabbits entirely when I know he loved his Dutch as I do. Must we continue to make mistakes to satisfy the breeders so that we can be called "Good guy judges?"

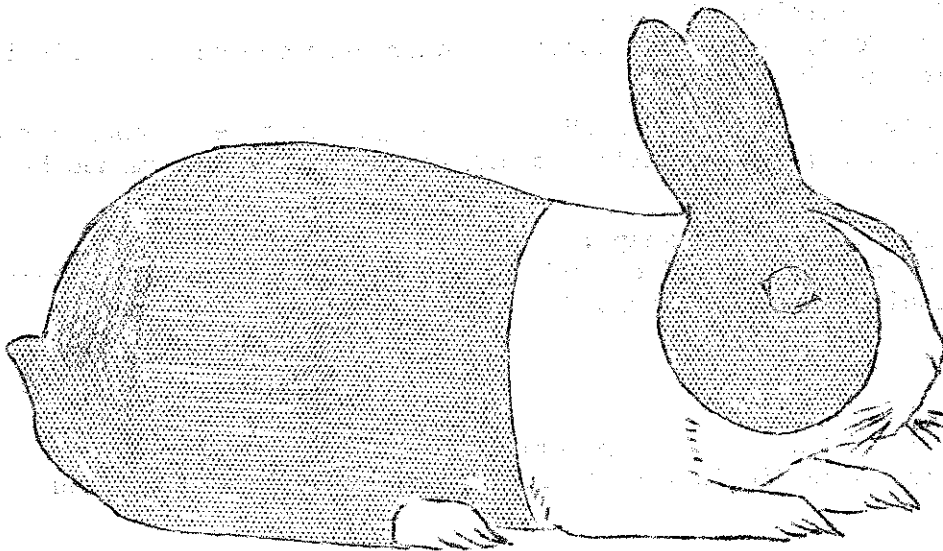

TYPE

1. The ARBA Standard of Perfection definition of type is:
..!"body conformation of a rabbit, ...the general description of the physical makeup of the animal."
2. The dictionary definition of type:
..."The general form, structure, style, or character common to or distinctive of a particular kind....."
3. The ARBA Standard state that "Shape" is a synonym for type -- meaning the general conformation; the animal's overall appearance as determined by body structure.
4. The dictionary definition of shape:
"The quality of a distinct object or body in having an external surface or outline of specific form or figure."

TYPE, SHAPE, CONFIRMATION

or whatever else you would like to call it is the basis of our beautiful Dutch rabbit.....!

Consider a house - no matter how you change it on the exterior, by painting, adding shutters, or whatever else tickles your fancy, it will still remain a colonial, a rambler, or a bungalow, based upon its structural type.

Put good cheeks, a blaze, saddle, undercut and stops on a New Zealand, and it still won't change it into a Dutch. No matter how good the markings, fur or color is, you cannot have a good Dutch without that good Dutch body underneath to show off the markings and style of a Dutch.

WHY

Surely you jest! There are only 15 points on type in the Standard of Perfection, so you can see that type is not very important on Dutch. Why there are fifty points on markings, so they are much more important, and according to that, the animal with the best markings should almost always win.

Allright you old-timers, calm down. After all, this article is a discussion on just what type is, and why it is so important. I agree - without type you don't have a Dutch.

THE

Starting with the basic definition of type, you can see that those items such as head, ears, eyes, feet & legs, and tail would also be a part of the type of an animal. So lets add those points into the type total: Head-5, ears-2, eyes-2, feet & legs-2, and 1 point for the tail. This totals 12 more points to add to the beginning 15 for type, giving us a total of 27 points. Now what do you think of that?

But this still doesn't give us the complete answer to our question. The vast majority of experienced Dutch fanciers and showmen will go even further than the 27 point emphasis, and will flatly state "IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT TYPE, YOU DON'T HAVE ANYTHING." All those fine experienced fanciers surely could not be wrong.

EMPHASIS

Where to now? Perhaps we should consider appropriate levels of quality - for example, an animal with poor type should not get a good placement in a class. Nor should an animal with poor markings get a good placement. Maybe that poor typed animal has excellent markings, but suffers from being quite racy in body, with pinched hips, cow hocked, and with a snipey head. This animal hasn't reached the minimum acceptable quality in type and thus should not be placed. On the other hand, that animal with excellent type, but not very good markings - there is no doubt about his being at an acceptable level. Markings come and go. Look at the average litter of even the highest quality Dutch and this is apparent.

ON

Let me ask a simple question to emphasize what I have been saying. Would you rather have mismarked (within reason) youngsters from a litter of apparent quality Dutch, or a well marked youngster from a family evidencing poor type, racy, with those snipey heads? I can hear a few tongues wagging right about now. They are saying, "fine, if you are talking about breeding stock. But how about here and now-on the show table."

TYPE?

Again, no simple answer for that question. It should be apparent that there are probably many animals from the quality herd that would only have to be fairly well marked to have enough to beat that poor typed/excellent marked animal on the show table. Most of the marked breeds of rabbits have this same problem. You have to know the breed before you understand the importance of their type. Look at the Checkered Giants. They have 44 points on markings - close to the 50 points on Dutch. Yet the type in their breed is again very important.

? COBBY ?

1. The dictionary defines cobby as "stout or stocky, compactly built."
2. The ARBA Standard of Perfection states:
"Stout and stocky; short legged and short coupled."
3. The Dutch Standard of Perfection defines cobby type as follows:
"Compact in form and limb"
Nicely rounded back, ...shoulders, loin and rump to tail
Rounded shoulders
A Good Dutch should have nicely rounded hips, very smooth, rounded under very gradually and smoothly

Should retain cobby appearance whether it weighs 3½ or 5½ pounds...

Additionally under weight and condition:

Flesh firm and solid, skin to be tightly drawn over the flesh making the coat tight and hard to grasp.

Also, under faults are listed the following comments:

Faults - large protruding hips - that lose the smoothness and roundness which are so desirable.

Faults - Pinched, undercut, or cut off hips,

Flat broad shoulders,

avoid potty and flabby specimens!

avoid narrow racy animals

avoid flat bodied commercial appearing specimens

cut for prominent dewlap

IMPORTANT TO COBBINESS:

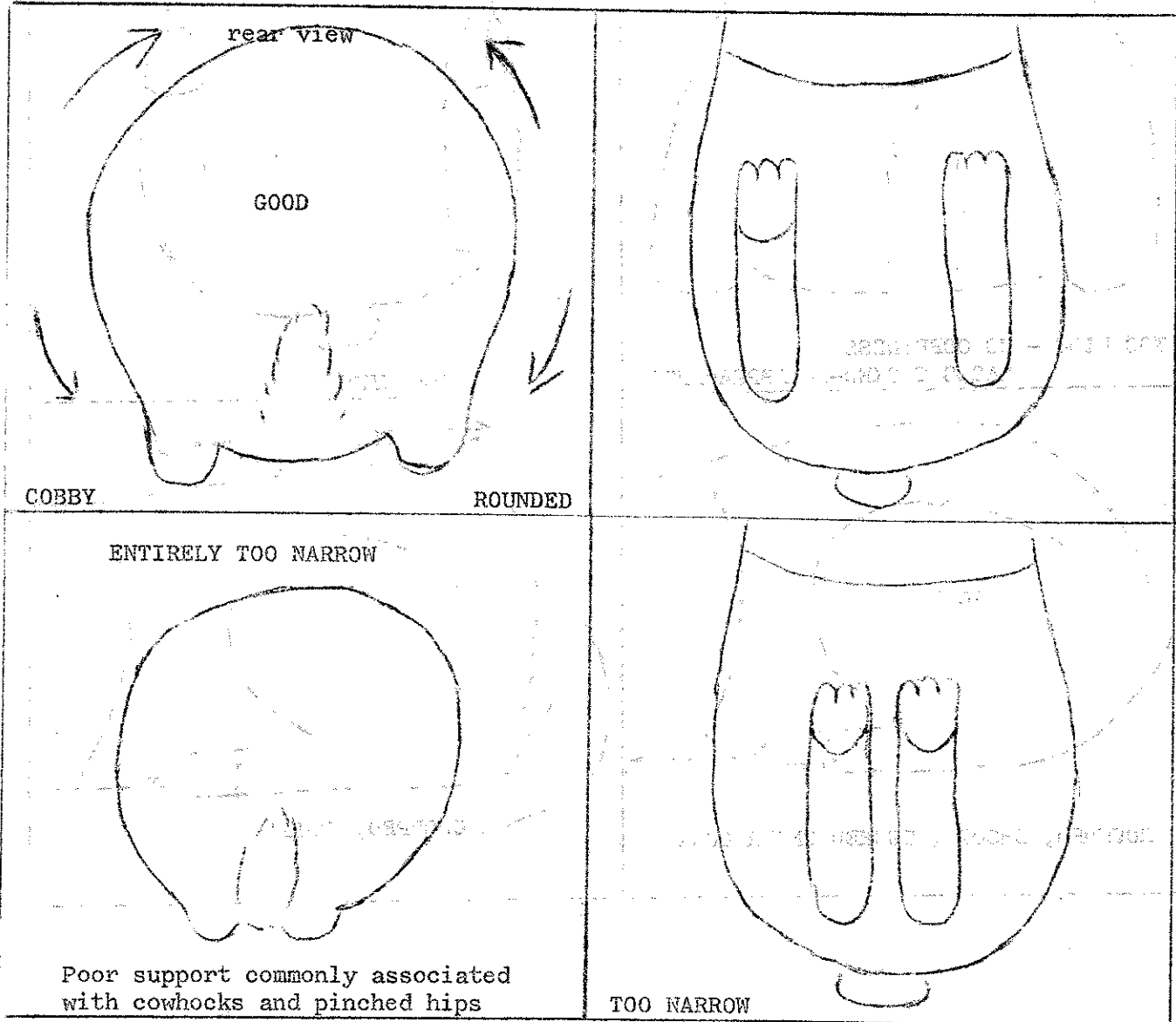
1. Rounded body, no angular surfaces, smooth flow from any point to any other point.
2. Shapes, and sizes of all parts of the body should be proportional to each other and to the whole of the body. This is also covered by the term balance.
3. Rounded, slightly tucked-in appearance where the body meets the table.
4. Type is determined by bone structure. Condition and flesh can help it to show off at its very best or worst, but otherwise does not determine type.

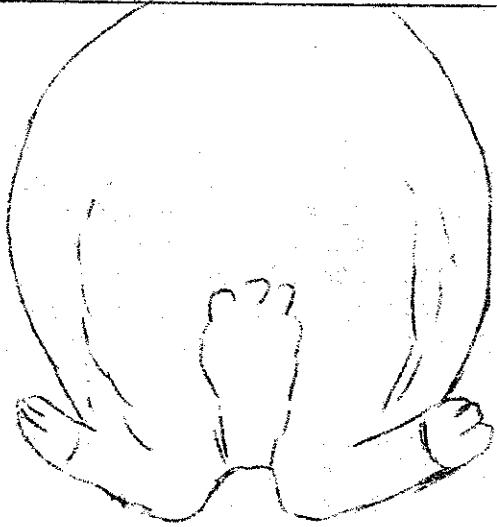
Understanding just what is the desirable type gives you the tools to begin appreciating a good Dutch type. The following rough illustrations are an attempt to emphasize the desirable and undesirable aspects of some of the main features of type.

Keep in mind always the words smooth, rounded, balanced, and let me throw in a new term, NEAT. Neat is not a rabbit term, but it would be a welcome addition as far as I am concerned. It means simply trim, clean in appearance - avoiding flabbiness, dewlap, and anything else not necessary to make a good Dutch type. It would fit in well, as if the Dutch fulfill the requirements of the standard, being compact in form, with firm flesh, tight skin, and a nicely rounded appearance (avoiding all those faults, such as potty, fleshy, flat bodied, etc.) it certainly would be described as being very trim and neat.

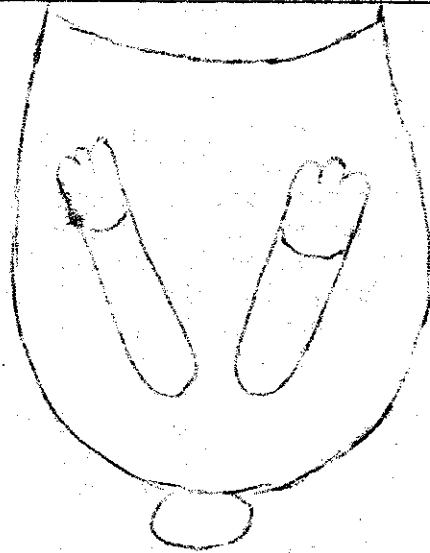
(A note: Personally I feel that our standard describes a BUCK more than a doe. Males and females usually have differences in body structure and I feel that the Dutch standard's idea of cobiness applies more easily to the males that we see.)

Take a look at the Dutch picture in the ARBA standard of perfection for an example of rounded tucked in appearance. Look also at the cover of the Dutch Reporter, at the perfect Dutch drawings. The example showing the Dutch from the back, the second one down on the left, gives a beautiful example of the rounded, tucked-in appearance where the body meets the table.



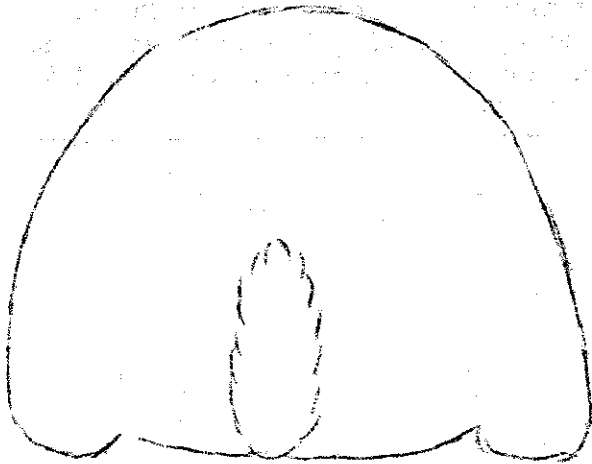


PINCHED IN HIP -- COWHOCKED FEET

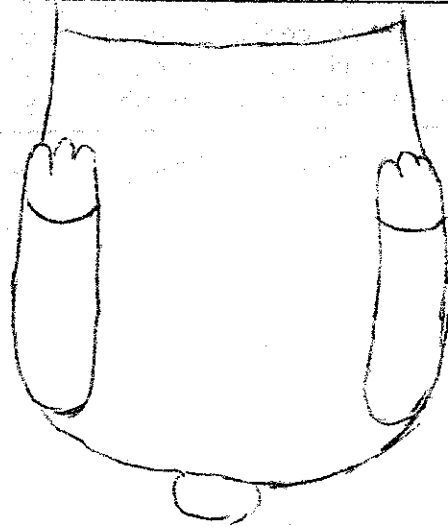


COW HOCKED

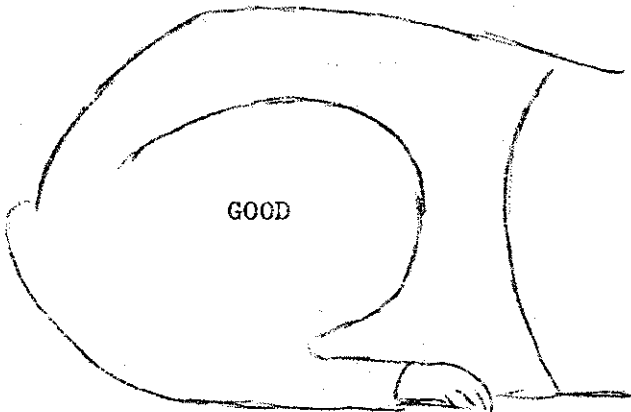
PINCHED IN HIP

LACKS TUCKED-IN APPEARANCE

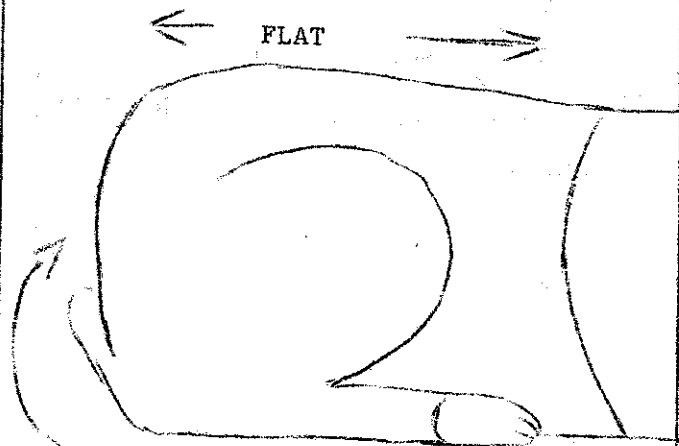

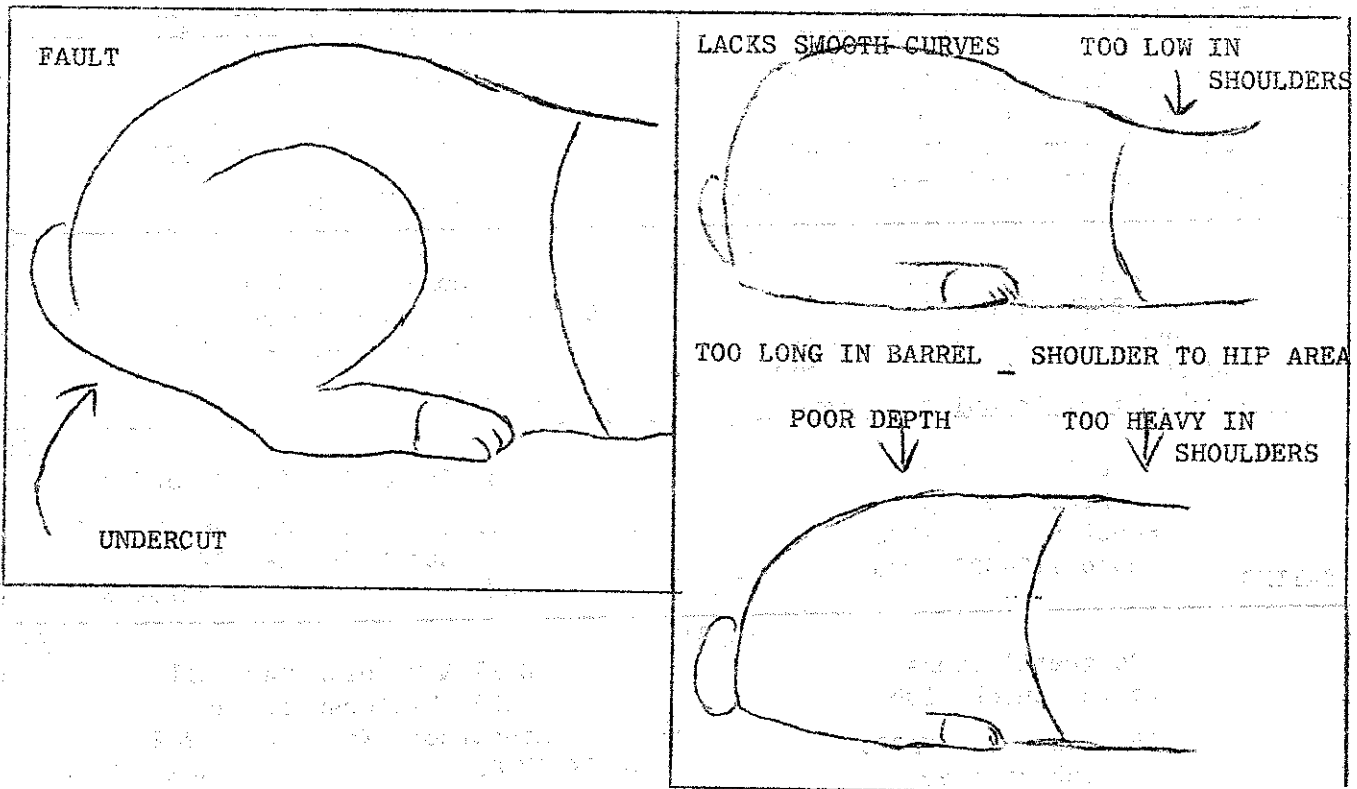

ROUNDED, SMOOTH, TUCKED UNDER LOOK



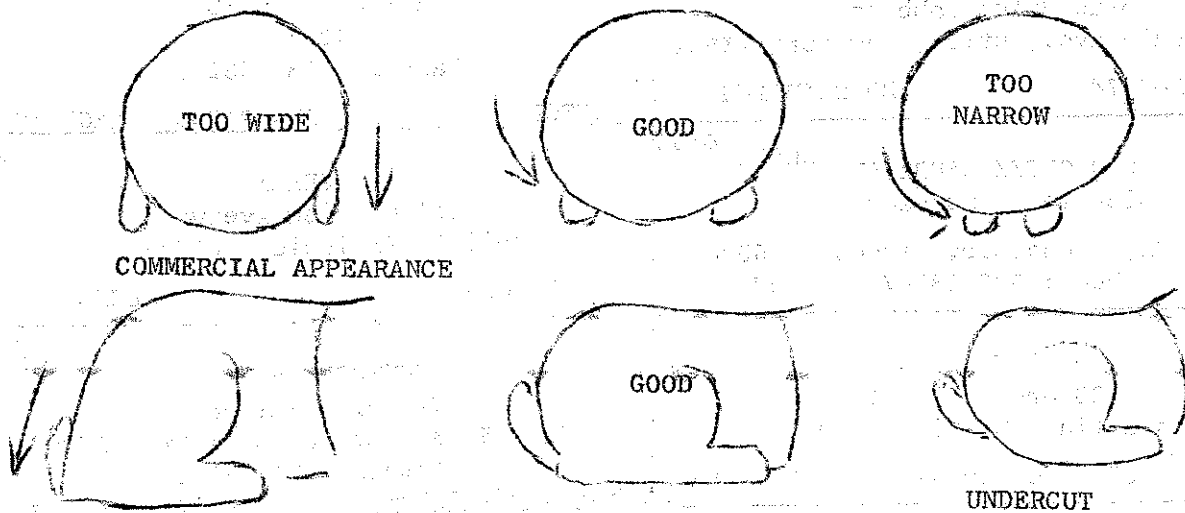

TYPE PROBLEM PECULIAR TO COBBINESS:

In order to have a rounded tucked in appearance where the body meets the table it is necessary that the legs be placed slightly more underneath the body than would otherwise be the case. Where the problem enters is that there can be a tendency for the legs to be placed too close together, causing potential problems, the most commonly seen of which are cowhocked and undercut in the hindquarters.



As you can see, it is a matter of degree as to how far in the legs are set from the side and from the back.

black dutch

It is my belief that the Black Dutch is the most fascinating of all the Dutch rabbits. The contrast makes them more eye appealing than any of the other colors, though I will have to admit that the contrast also makes their faults stand out more; but when you are fortunate enough to come up with that well marked, good furred, cobby little specimen, there is nothing on the show table that will stand up to him.

When starting your herd, start small, a buck and possibly two does, from the same strain. If possible, get them from a well established strain. Visit his rabbitry, check the lineage of your potential purchase, make sure they are of straight black breeding. Note the qualities and faults in his stock. You will find that faults are more apt to crop up in youngsters that appeared in their grand and great-grandparents than their sire and dam.

Obtain the best buck possible, he must have type, color, fur and cheeks. Secure the best marked does possible, a little heavy on the color is quite all right, in fact, it is desirable at times. I prefer my does on the larger side, 4 to 5 pounds, this enables them to carry and nurse a good litter. Again, emphasis on the cheeks, a little low perhaps but never high. Make sure your selections have good fur; you will find that good fur means good color. In selecting a herd, make sure your buck and does do not have the same faults. When breeding rabbits with the same fault you will intensify this fault in your stock and in time will find it hard to eliminate from your herd, though this fault may not appear in your first generation.

A program of line or inbreeding is by far the best to follow. Again, never breed two rabbits with the same fault or two successive generations of bucks or does with the same fault. Be as selective as possible in your breeding program.

Check the litter, when the doe kindles, discard your badly mis-marked and extra-large babies. I usually keep four to six youngsters on a doe. When a litter is weaned, at six to eight weeks, check them carefully, discard any with poor type, long fur and lightly marked animals. Check them again after their first moult, this is when white hairs and grizzled ears will show up. Discard all bucks with this fault. Any does with a few white hairs may be all right but are not preferable. Be sure and check their fur, keep only the ones with the short, dense fur that the standard calls for. Check on eye color at this time, discard any that fail in this respect.

By this time, you will have decided which ones will go on the show table. Be sure and handle them every day, pose them so they will show their qualities to the judge. A badly behaved animal will be tossed off early in his class.

In closing, I might suggest that you keep your herd small, be very selective in your breeding, be patient. If you have started with good blood, you will find that your "Best Dutch" will appear.

Perhaps in the article is something that will assist a young Dutch fancier to improve a breeding program, or some "old" fancier to win BOB at the next National Dutch Show in Kansas.

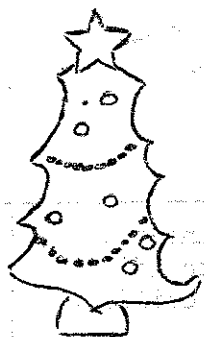
1945 Rabbit Shows

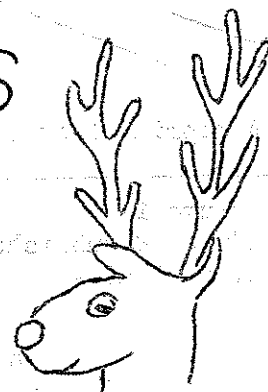

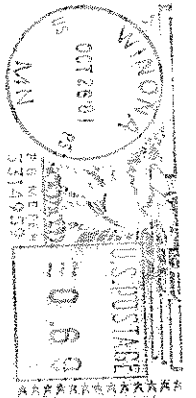
