As mentioned above, we have lost the services of Nick Dyer, our Youth Director, due to ill health. While Nick's term was short, he brought alot of excellent ideas to the ADRC Youth. He designed the first Royalty contest ever offered by the ADRC. In the DUTCH REPORTER you will find a HELP WANTED advertisement. We desperately need a new Youth Chairman. It can be a single person or a couple, hopefully with experience working with youths. As Chairman, the ability to attend each National Dutch Show is almost a MUST. The Board of Directors have been flexible allowing our chairman and his/her committee to create and delete programs as they see fit.

Looking back to 1988, remember the HEAT of the SUMMER. Recently in our local Ag office, I came upon information for those raising livestock. I would like to share it with you. "This year's severe drought conditions have forced livestock producers to make critical decisions concerning culling and feeding. Recent warnings issued by university livestock and dairy specialists stressed that crops may cause nitrate toxicity and possibly result in animal death. Nitrates accumulate in plants that are stressed during pollination or grown under extreme drought conditions and harvested within a few days after a heavy rainfall."

"Symptoms of acute nitrate poisoning include muscular weakness, incoordination, accelerated heart rate, difficult or rapid breathing, cyanosis, coma and death. Less severely affected animals are generally listless and show rapid respiration when exercised."

While the warnings are directed mainly to large livestock, it behoves us to be alert for similar problems when feeding hay and grains.

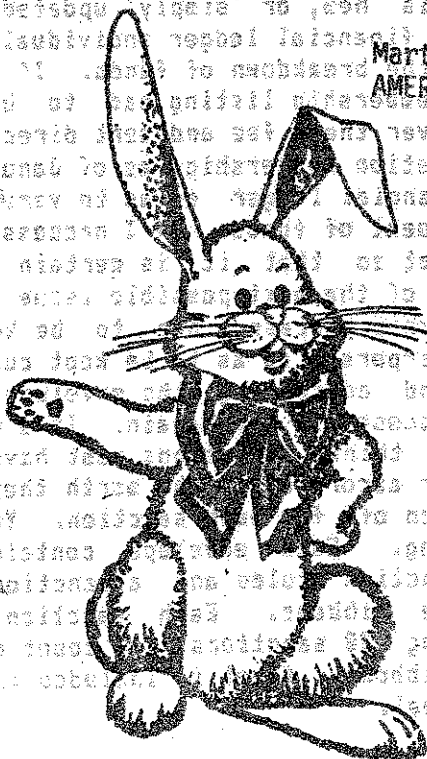

From the Desk of Your Secretary.....

It's a 'Brand New' year,... time for resolution making and looking ahead. I've done both. It's also time for decision making and changes,..and I'm about to make one! In January of 1982, I became your Secretary/Treasurer. It is now 1989 and I'm in my 8th. year. I've processed many sanctions and memberships during this period along with 'MANY' pieces of regular correspondence that are answered daily. This position allows the same rate of pay that it has now for many years. Larry & Doreen Bengtson would no doubt testify that you give much more than you receive with the monthly percentage allowance sometimes coming very close to what you spent from your own pocket during that period. I do not collect for 'ANY' phone calls made. If I return your call, it's at my expense. All of the ledgers, 90% of the scotch tape, paper clips, typing paper, and etc. are purchased by me from my personal funds. Many odds and ends mailing are sent with my stamps. A quarter here and there eventually add up. It becomes much simpler to pay for small items rather than write a club check for them. When a check is issued, it is first written in the checkbook, it is then listed in a ledger along with it's purpose, it is also written on a statement form with the billing attached and finally included in the main funds received and dispersed book. This is done in order to cross reference and totally check all of the records.

Payment for the Secretary/Treasurer is based solely on a percentage of sanctions and memberships received. There is 'NO' other pay received for any other service/s rendered. For example; I received a total pay of \$138.19 for the month of December. Let's take away nine (9) days for that month to cover weekends leaving twenty-two (22) days. (Mail is delivered on Saturdays also, but we're going to base the pay only on a five day work week). If I processed all correspondence daily for 22 days, I would have received \$6.28 PER DAY regardless of the number of hours worked. It is not uncommon at all to be at either the computer or the typewriter eight (8) hours a day. This would make my pay approximately 78 cents PER HOUR. To process a membership it must first be entered into the computer, totally if it is new, or 'simply' updated if it is a renewal. Each is then entered into the financial ledger individually as to the date it was received, the amount, and the breakdown of funds. If it was an ARBA combination membership, a complete membership listing had to be made out along with a check from this office to cover their fee and sent directly to the ARBA. (The ARBA no longer accepts combination memberships as of January 1, 1989). This had to be included in the financial ledger so as to verify the additional income along with the outgoing payment of funds. If I process a new member, I must list this on a separate sheet so that it is certain to be included in the 'Welcome New Member' section of the next possible issue of the Dutch Reporter. Each new and renewal membership processed has to be kept on another sheet and sent to the sweepstakes chairperson so as to be kept current. Then comes typing out the membership card and addressing the envelope. Now we're on to the next one,..... same process all over again. It's not as simple as 1-2-3 as some would like to have one think. Sanctions must have each piece of information entered into the computer according to the month they are being held. Once this is done, labels are run off for each sanction. You are now ready for folding, stuffing and labeling. Each envelope contains the sanction form and a sheet that includes sanction rules and a sanction and membership application form. Now comes the ribbons. Each sanction must contain a complete set. If you are processing 20 sanctions, you count out 20 BOB, 20 BOS and 20 of each of the variety ribbons. A set is included in each envelope. Once this is done, we're ready to seal.

Now we have a life membership to process,....five individuals requested lists of breeders in their area,.....a person wants to know what a sanction is and if they have to include that fee along with the cost of the membership,.....a complaint is received with regard to how do I get my pedigrees that were promised to me when I purchased the rabbits off one of your members,.....a letter wanting all of the necessary information needed in order to form a specialty club is awaiting,.....one person has requested information on what sweepstakes points are, how do they work and when do they receive them.....the list goes on and on. I believe each piece of correspondence deserves an answer. If it takes an entire day to complete the correspondence, it's a day that no pay (not even 78 cents an hour) is received.

I have never asked for an increase in pay, nor do I want one. However, just a few years ago, it was introduced by a couple of our officers at the ARBA Convention in Florida to pay the Secretary/Treasurer's way to both the ARBA Convention and National Dutch Show each year. The Secretary/Treasurer's books are audited at each of these shows. (I had to send them out to Florida with someone else as I was unable to attend).

\*(I had to drive 4 hours round trip to take them to the individual and again drive 4 hours round trip to pick them up when they were returned a week later. There is no reimbursement for this either. The books that are submitted for audit take an additional suitcase all of their own. In the years that I have held this position, there was only one case when the books didn't arrive when they were supposed to. Many of you already know that story, but for those who don't, I wasn't going to be able to make my flight to Portland in '87 due to family illness. I was going to have to reimburse the ADRC for my super saver coach air fare when my parents offered to watch over my family. By that time, I called for a flight out and was told I could get one that afternoon for a ONE WAY cost of 'ONLY' \$500+. (This was out of my pocket - after all, it wasn't the ADRC's fault that I couldn't make my original scheduled flight)! I took it! I had about thirty minutes to pack and a 60 mile trip to the airport. My ADRC books were in their suitcase at home right where I left them -- and it was too late to go back!)

In Florida, it was discussed that the Secretary/Treasurer should received either round trip coach air fare or 28 cents per mile round trip (whichever is less expensive) to both the ARBA Convention and National Dutch Show. If the show is held in my home town, no payment is made. If it is held within 125 mile radius of my home town, the sum of \$50.00 is to be paid. This was promoted to assist in some repayment and to insure that ADRC business could be completed at both annual shows. It was put out to the membership in 1985 and passed by a 88 to 9 vote. I was extremely pleased feeling that the membership fully realized the work involved with this position and the very minimal pay received.

Two proposed resolutions were received in this office December 31st, you will find them printed elsewhere in this issue. They were sent to this office in an envelope that carried President Dill's return address along with a copy letter, so I feel that I may safely assume that they are being submitted by her. One of the proposed resolutions is to take away the Secretary/Treasurer's travel allowance and return it to the \$50.00 fee as it has stood for MANY previous years. I have heard that this is being initiated to cut costs. I really don't believe that costs should be cut here -- If one feels that the pay received by this office is over bestowed, then they should try working these hours for less than \$6.00 a day! Are you aware that at least 18 pages of the Sept/Oct '88 issue and 17 pages of the Nov/Dec '88 issue of the Dutch Reporter were submitted the DR editor by this office 'stencil ready'? Are you aware that each issue of the DR contains approximately 10-15 pages sent stencil

ready to the DR for printing? Are you aware that the Dutch Reporter labels are issued the editor by this office for each issue in zip code order by state ready for labeling? Do you know that the membership list included in the March/April issue of the DR each year is provided and sent stencil ready for publication? Remember, the Secretary/Treasurer receives an allowance for sanctions and memberships processed only...no allowance for any of the above!

In any case, the proposed resolution succeeded in making New Years eve one I will long remember. It showed me how much the work and dedication done in this office is appreciated. I was totally shocked to say the least by whom it was presented and by some of the signatures that it contained. In speaking with some of the people who signed the petition, I was informed that they didn't realize that I received travel expense now and felt that this proposed resolution would be giving me a small token for all of the work done. They had no idea it was taking away from what the ADRC now provided! Many felt that they were misinformed stating that the resolution did not state how the Constitution read now, it only provided how it would read. They wanted to know the process needed for removal of their name/s! One officer was fully aware of what they had signed and stated that by the number of signatures on the petition they felt that the majority of the membership wanted the change. I must admit that I do not know all of our present Constitution and By-Laws word for word with all of the changes that we have had in the past years without first looking to see how it reads. I do like to check this out though before I sign my name to anything. I don't like to feel even partially responsible for something that I feel isn't in the best interest of all concerned.

Your Secretary/Treasurer's first year travel expense to Iowa and Ohio totaled \$236.00. In '87 to Texas and Portland, Oregon totaled \$455.45. In 1988 to Bloomington, Illinois and Madison, Wisconsin, the total travel expense was \$120.00. The total travel pay received for three (3) years to date is \$811.45 or an average of \$270.50 per year. The ADRC paid out \$366.00 alone during approximately the first four months of '88 in phone expense, postage expense and copy costs that we have never before been billed for. These payments can be found in previous treasurer's reports listed in past Dutch Reporters. I certainly don't believe this office is overpaid and I do believe that if we are going to consider cost cuts, we should start being realistic and do it in the 'proper' areas whenever it's feasible!!

ADRC open and youth sweepstake ribbons are one of the largest expenses the ADRC has. We sanctioned 624 open shows and 259 youth shows in 1988. The ribbons for these shows cost approximately \$1450.00. With the ribbons, the mailing of the sanction forms cost an additional 20 cents to mail over a regular letter. Each sanction costs 45 cents to mail. Therefore, mailing costs for sanctions alone last year was \$397.35 or \$176.60 excess postage due to the ribbons. One of the sad things is that over half of the ribbons are never picked up and if the show secretary returns them, they don't always take the time to get an envelope large enough to return them properly. They arrive folded, stapled, mutilated and often dirty or wrote on. These receive the privilege of going into the garbage as they are impossible to reissue. The Dutch Reporter's approximate cost is running around \$1000.00 per issue or \$6000.00 a year. Using the Nov/Dec '88 issue of the DR, the approximate payment received for the ads placed for the year (including the inside cover page ads) was \$700.00. A portion of the percentage of each membership that goes to the General Fund is used towards the Dutch Reporter but it certainly appears that the DR doesn't even come close to being self-supporting. From a \$7.00 membership, \$1.00 is immediately taken out and placed in the ADRC Contingency Fund BEFORE any percentages are taken out. The Secretary/Treasurer

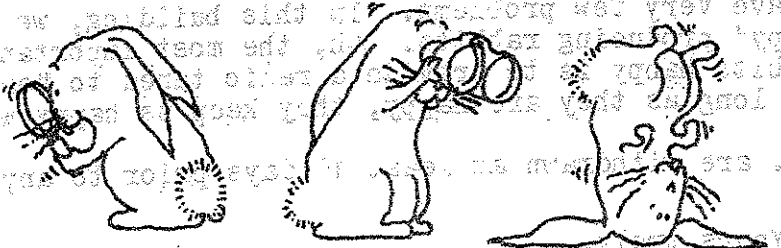


commission is \$1.50, the percentage allowed for the Publicity Department is 75 cents and \$3.75 goes into the General Fund. From a \$5.00 youth membership, \$1.00 goes into the Contingency Fund, \$1.00 is the Secretary/Treasurer commission, 50 cents goes to Publicity and \$2.50 is placed in the General Fund. (You will note that even though processing a youth, adult or N/W membership takes the same amount of time and effort, the percentages and commission are different due to the fees collected - the same applies to sanctions. Even though both an open & youth sanction are identical in work effort, etc., the percentages and commissions aren't the same due to the cost difference between the two). The General Fund is responsible for payment of all of the usual bills; postage, envelopes, DR supplies and editors fees and mailing costs, sweepstakes ribbons, sweepstakes awards, sweepstakes chairperson's pay, equipment upkeep, normal office supplies, usual youth contest awards, ARBA Convention special allotments, National Dutch Show allowance, and etc.. Costs should be cut, but let's be realistic rather than misinformed!

Another item that is in extreme need of addressing is something that has been brought out and up numerous times. The ADRC owns a Radio Shack TRS-80 Model 4 computer with only a 64K memory. It has been brought to the proper attention that this machine is in dire need of update in order to operate at full capacity. The ADRC has never purchased a program for this machine and the sanction program was written especially for it by one of our directors and will not run on any other machine. The membership program will hold 800 members only. Should we go over that amount, I'm uncertain as to what will be done. It is almost impossible to buy any computer today that has less than a 256K. The majority of the machines contain well over 388K memory. At the 1988 NDS in Bloomington, Illinois the situation was again brought up and the Board was informed that a committee had been appointed to look into the matter so that we could have our equipment updated. To date, no information on any of this has been received in this office. Again, I suggest that the Board address this as soon as possible.

As for the second resolution presented, it arrived in this office altered. It dealt with the election committee and a typed word in the proposal was lined out and replaced with another in ball point. The word inserted actually changes the content of the resolution and should not be allowed. The portion of the Constitution and By-Laws regarding the election committee was passed by 14B to 14 vote in 1985. It was done to insure that the election committee did not stay the same year after year. The membership felt that this should be moved around to "always enhance" the honesty and legality of the vote tabulation. I personally see no reason for someone wishing to remove this portion. Regardless, the legality of the one is up to the Board while the decision for either is up to the membership.

I hope that the membership will vote not to accept either of the proposed resolutions.

To Mrs. Jeanine Powers,

With at least fifty years of combined experience, my partners in rabbitry would like to let you know what drugs we use. We treat with sulfa quin-oxaline 20% diluted for 5 days on, then 5 days off, then repeat.

We also treat on the 5 off days with tetracycline and aureomycin mixture for the prevention of snuffles and mucoid enteritis. We carry silver nitrate sticks for broken toe nails that are into the quick. This is also good for sore hocks as it stops bleeding.

For the eyes we use terramycin ointment which cleans up infected eyes in several days. We use pennicillin injectible for the infections and other problems, also we have puramycin for any other problems. All of our drinking water contains 1 teaspoon of cider vinegar per gallon which gives extra vitamins as well as a sheen to the hair.

We have been lucky and have not had any hair ball problems as our rabbitry is ultra clean.

We tried Aqua Vite with some of our rabbits and with our feed we saw no advantage so we are not using this anymore. Sanitation and prevention are the key to success in any rabbitry, also all of our rabbits are on controlled amount of feed. We visit other rabbit growers and usually we find the feed bins are full of feed. This makes us quiver as we know what happens. For any surface problems we use Bacitracin ointment. This is a good topical antibiotic.

This gives you some knowledge of what we use and with a climate controlled building, we have very few problems. In this building, we have over three hundred "happy" producing rabbits. Oh, the most important thing we do to keep our rabbits happy is to provide a radio tuned to "easy music" 24 hrs. a day. As long as they are happy, they keep us happy with little ones.

All and any meds. are withdrawn at least 10 days prior to any rabbit leaving us.

I felt that a couple of years ago the ADRC made a stride forward, when the membership voted to pay the travel expense for the Secretary to attend the NDS and National Conventions. Evidently, some people do not believe this is necessary, as there has been a Resolution presented to take away the Secretary's "air-fare or 20 cents per mile, whichever ever is cheaper". This Resolution was sent in by President Dill. I wonder if those that signed this resolution were fully aware of what it meant.

As I sit here typing this, the Secretary is getting things ready for the Dutch Reporter also. She has been at it for about 10 - 12 hours the past couple of days. Whether you know it or not, the Secretary is the one that sends in all of the upcoming shows, welcome new members, mailing labels, the membership list for the Mar-Apr issue, the minutes from the meetings, the seller's class results, and various other things. These are all provided to the Dutch Reporter Editor "stencil ready". That means already typed up and ready to put right on the stencil cutter. She receives absolutely NO PAY for these things. She receives pay for doing the sanctions and memberships, and that is all. The information letters she writes, lists of members by state for those that ask for them, details on how to start a club, just general correspondence, and answering all of the telephone calls are "NON-PAID EXTRAS". She doesn't mind doing them, it is just that a couple of years ago when the membership voted to give the Secretary the round-trip air fare or 20 cents per mile whichever ever was cheaper, it seemed like a little bonus for the extra things. Now, some are wanting to take that little extra away.

Last year, the Secretary received \$120.00 to attend the NDS and the ARBA Convention. Just \$20.00 more than what she received under the previous rule, and what is being proposed again. 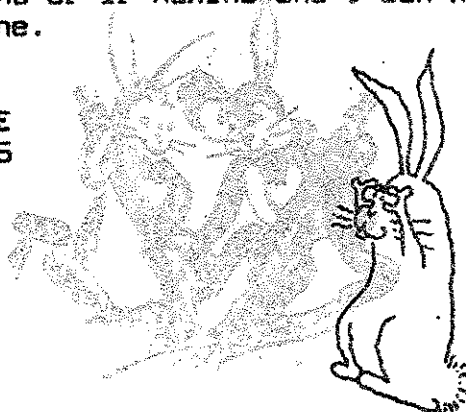

## HAY/STRAW BOX

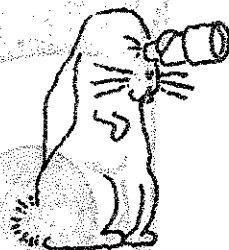
Vern Dill, Daffy-Dill's Rabbitry

If you have a small barn and don't have room for a grooming bench and a hay/straw box along with cages, feed, etc., you may want to try to build this handy wooden box.

I made frame of 1 x 1's - 49" long x 19½" wide x 41" high. If you choose, you can make the box taller or shorter, depending on the average size of your bales. I divided the box in half, front to back, again with 1 x 1's. I then cut a ½" piece of plywood to fit the frame which divided the box in two. One half inch plywood was used on the outside panels. I nailed the cut plywood to the bottom, back and both sides. The front panel was cut to fit the outside dimensions of the box but then I added additional 1 x 1's to fit inside the existing frame. When the front panel was pushed up to the box, the new 1 x 1's laid inside and next to the box frame. This allowed me to add a small board (inside) which would turn, either locking the front of the box or open to get the last bit of hay/straw out.

The top was also made from a frame of 1 x 1's with plywood top. Carpeting was then placed on it, allowing for tattooing, breeding, posing or culling animals on it.

As an afterthought, I drilled 2 holes (approx. 6" apart and 10" down) then placed a piece of fairly heavy rope through it, making knots on the inside. This made it easier to move the wooden box around when cleaning the floor.



A future ADRC youth member was born on October 19, 1988 to proud parents Fran and Jim Schettler of California. Matthew was 8 lbs 9 oz and arrived two and one-half weeks early. Matthew has already attended his first rabbit show on December 3, and was reported to be a "keeper" by all who saw him.

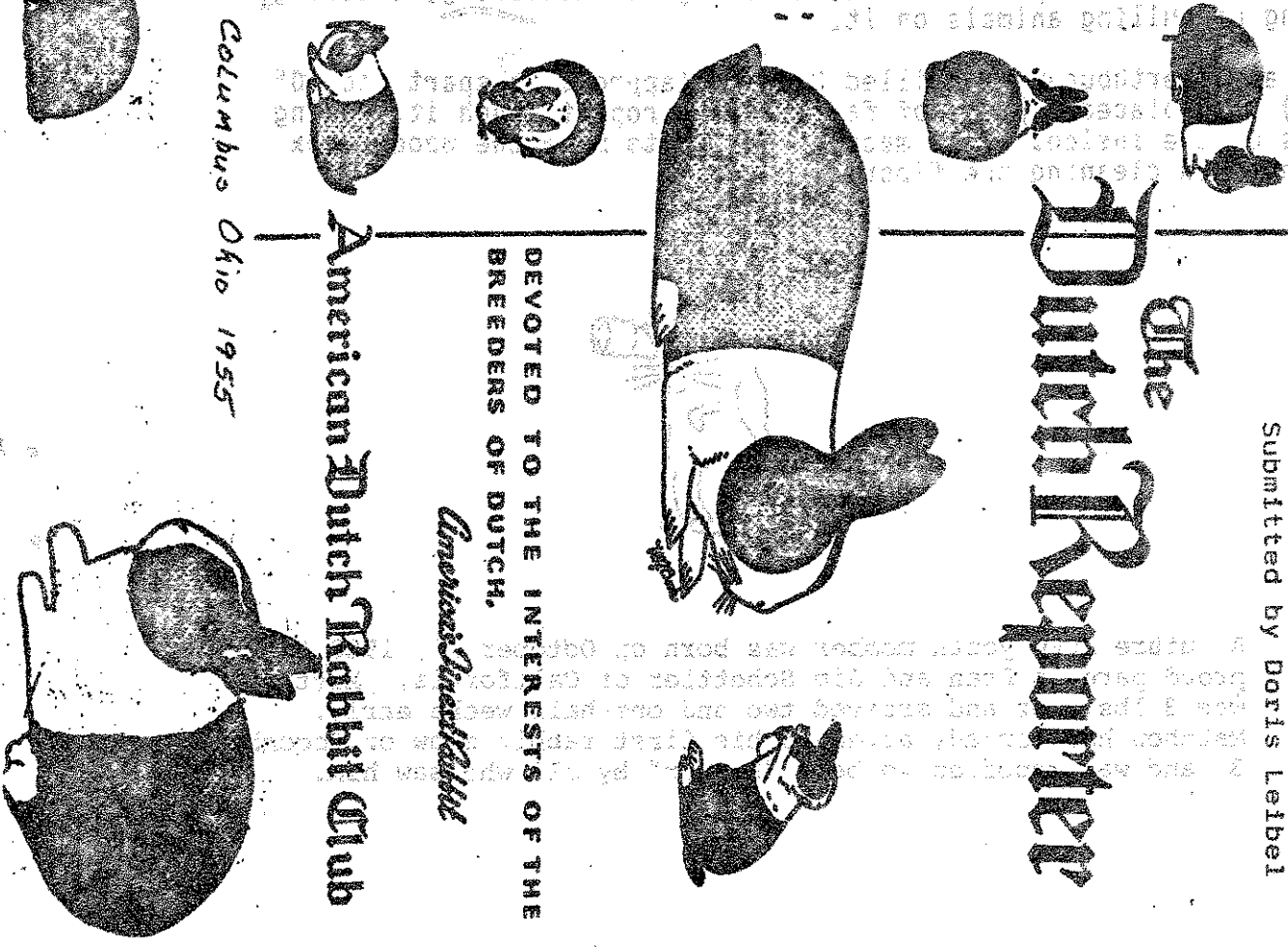

In response to the letter by Marti Gill sent to me. 8/4/88

Learning about rabbits was an interesting subject, as I was amazed by all the different colors and shapes of them. Back in the mid 70's I was invited to go along to a rabbit show and seminar with a friend. I went along and after an afternoon and then a very interesting lecture, I said to my friend, "I am hooked" and with the amount of space I had available I started building outdoor hutches. I finally finished after making about 150 holes and then I needed to fill these holes, I purchased my breeds (N.Z.) and sat back awaiting results. Meanwhile, I went to many breeders and after spending much time and money, I thought that I had seen and learned everything. How wrong a thought. There is much more to raising rabbits than feeding and breeding. I then set out to learn as much as possible again. I went to established rabbitries and learned also I attended every meeting that was around and read many books. The most helpful book was by Dr. Patton and this was teaching about diseases and also genetics. I am and have been practicing bettering of a breed, and again you wouldn't breed a collie dog and a doberman so this practice is the same in rabbits.

For a new person getting into rabbit breeding, you should go to breeders who have been doing this for years and look and listen. This person can and will give valuable lessons from years of experience and this is the best way of learning. I have been around rabbits a long time and I still learn every day, and some of my rabbits learn things from me. I have had rabbits play with our family dog and she is fascinated by them also. I have spoiled several as when they see me they will actually kiss me. This is not the normal ones as I will spoil one to see how far I can teach it. I had one one time that had a small cow bell in the cage and this rabbit would ring it for food. If you can teach mice these things then a rabbit can learn them also, this is what I thought again. Someone gets the best learning experience from hands on and from listening about them from the learned breeder who has learned from experience. This experience passed down is the invaluable way of learning, also when you raise a rabbit you should think about bettering this rabbit. When mating, find the best you have and try to better the breed. This way you can keep trying for perfection. No body has achieved perfection yet but we as breeders must try to reach it. When feeding rabbits do as the grain companys tell to do and their knowledge comes from research. We breeders will never know it all as no one has achieved this. The breeder who stands up and says he knows everything and cannot learn anymore is never going to surpass us as I admit I don't know as much as I would, and I am open to learning.

I am glad this is the '80's as much research has been done to rabbits and this knowledge is being passed on to us.

## Mix and Match?

The Dutch breed has six colors which are currently recognized by the ARBA. However in years past, there existed another show class of any other color. When the any other color class was accepted, it was less important than it is now to exercise care and selectivity in inter-color breeding. Although some of the unrecognized colors are beautiful colors, since they are not a viable showroom option, they are becoming less and less frequently encountered. Their use in breeding the recognized colors is also notably declined, and a goodly portion of dutch breeders would scoff at the very suggestion of such a practice.

In reading dutch reporter articles of some twenty years past however, I have encountered several articles from both here and abroad which advocate the use of non-standard colors for the improvement of other colors. Granted this practice would increase the likelihood of recurrence of these non-standard colors, but it also must have notable benefits as well.

It appears to me that the colors which are accepted in our standard are not what dutch raisers of twenty years ago would have called by the names we have given them. The colors are we see are changing, and so it seems to me we are changing our definitions of the colors to fit what we see.

In my own experience, I have encountered within one color several variations, even among blacks. One important aspect of this color variance, is directly related to the length of the dutch fur, which has been becoming shorter--to make a dangerous generalization. The length can make the difference between a beautifully finished, slick appearing black, and one which has a softer muted black color. It is therefore important to breed for fur which possesses these qualities to enhance the color.

However, even the fur won't make up for poor color. Personally I resist the temptation to keep a nice animal for breeding purposes if the color is not something I would like to bestow upon the future generations of my herd. Although I can not afford to purchase animals who come from the "top" lines or the "best" breeders, but I can be selective with what I have, and make what I have the best I can, by setting myself goals, and adhering to my decisions, though it is tempting to just try to keep that one animal that has such a nice head, but poor color. But if I do, I might set back my progress to the point that it could take years to regain what I had achieved.

PREVENTATIVE DISEASE CONTROL

A preventative disease control program is of utmost importance in the rabbitry. Controlling diseases in the rabbitry is easier, less costly and more effective than trying to treat any type of disease outbreak. If a person is going to have a successful rabbitry, they must have an outstanding and progressive preventative disease control program.

The major factors to a successful preventative disease program in the rabbitry, whether it be a large commercial rabbitry, or a one rabbit 4-H program, should include the following:

**A. MANAGEMENT.** Any rabbitry's success, whether large or small, in productivity and quality will depend upon the management program. This portion of the preventative disease program is oftentimes one of the most neglected elements because many of the management practices require extra work and labor for the preventative disease program to be successful. The management practices important to a good disease control program include the following:

1. **Proper Physical Facilities.** The physical facilities for a rabbitry should include such factors as the ease of cleaning and disinfecting the facility. This is imperative in new structures or in structures that have been adapted to the rabbit project. If the structure is constructed so that the cages can be easily and frequently cleaned and disinfected, the likelihood of proper cleaning and disinfection is much greater than in those physical facilities where it requires an extra amount of labor and work to clean the facilities.

2. **Adequate Ventilation System.** Proper ventilation is one of the most, if not the most, important factor in a sound management program to prevent diseases in the rabbitry. The entire ventilation system should be examined very closely so that the animals have a good constant supply of high quality air to inhale. It is very important that the ventilation system provide quality air, and assist in temperature control. Many individuals think of ventilation only in terms of temperature control.

There are many types of adequate ventilation systems; however, each should attain the goal of a minimum of at least ten complete air changes in the rabbitry per hour in the winter and the number of air changes per hour in the summer may need to be increased to assist in controlling the temperature. Improper ventilation will predispose the rabbits to many different types of diseases due to the stress factors involved.

3. **Marketing.** To the fancier, or the commercial operator, marketing is a very important management factor. Without proper time being allowed for marketing and the development of the proper markets, on a regular basis, many rabbitries will become overpopulated and stress the ventilation system as well as many other management practices in the rabbitry.

**B. CULLING.** This is one of the most important practices employed in the rabbitry to maintain an essential preventative disease control program. Culling sick animals from the herd, and those animals with hereditary predisposition to disease should be culled from the herd immediately. Only those animals that show signs of disease resistance and desirable disease resistant characteristics, should be kept in the herd for replacement animals.

With proper culling, each generation of the herd should improve the disease control program.

**C. SOUND GENETIC POOL.** It is imperative that one starts the herd with animals that possess sound genetic characteristics concerning health; and one that continues to replace animals in the herd with each succeeding generation with animals that have an improved genetic characteristics to disease resistance. Some of the inherited traits that one should look for are as follows:

1. **Reproductive capacity.** This includes such factors as being receptive to be mated on the "year-around" basis rather than seasonally, high conception rate, ability to kindle large litters with ease, ability to construct and maintain an adequate nest, ability to lactate a sufficient amount of milk without supplementation, raise the number of offspring you desire to weaning age with a low mortality rate, the ability to produce your desired end product economically, whether it be meat, laboratory animals, fur, wool, or show stock.

2. **Disposition.** The disposition of the animal is a highly inherited trait. One should look for animals with the proper disposition to meet the needs that you require in your existing facilities. Most growers prefer an animal that is not nervous and excitable to extraneous noises. Eating habits, maternal instincts, feeding and watering procedures, and defecating and urinary habits all appear to be highly inherited and those traits should be selected to meet your own personal housing situations.

3. **Disease resistance.** One should select animals that are thrifty and tolerant to the environmental extremes that your particular situation demands. One should select animals with sufficient respiratory capacity to perform to your desires under the conditions that exist.

Your animals should have an amount of inherited resistance to a variety of bacterial diseases. The resistance to the bacterial diseases should increase with each succeeding generation of your rabbits through proper culling.

Although not all rabbits with "buck teeth" (malocclusion) are due to heredity, one must select animals that do not have the predisposition of weak tooth beds so that malocclusion can be kept to a minimum.

Another highly inherited trait is the predisposition for "sore hocks". The predisposition factor to "sore hocks" are large bodies that do not have the necessary corresponding foot size to withstand the pressure of the large bodies. Thin furred foot pads (front and rear), thin skin in the foot areas, and excitable disposition are all predisposing factors to "sore hocks". "Sore hocks" cannot be tolerated in the rabbitry due to the fact that they often lead to the predisposition to other bacterial diseases. The use of resting board to assist in preventing "sore hocks" also increases the concentration of bacteria within the rabbitry.

**D. PROPER RECORD KEEPING.** This is an area that is neglected by most rabbitries, rather a commercial operation or the fancier. Proper record keeping is essential for the manager to have a proper culling program that will maintain a sound disease prevention program. Proper records are essential to allow the manager to examine the susceptibility of the animal to certain disease

condition. Good records also allows for a selection of animals with the greatest potential for replacement, which is an area that is very important to the producer.

**E. RODENT AND PEST CONTROL:** This is an absolute must for all rabbitries. Mice, rats, birds, flies, strange dogs, cats, and et cetra do not have any place in the rabbitry where they can gain access to the animals or to their food and water supply.

Rodents and strange animals will frighten the rabbits and is often the cause of maternal neglect at kindling or shortly after kindling. These pests are the most common carriers of external parasites, as well as carriers of some of the most dreaded bacteria that can infect a rabbit colony. These pests should be banned from the rabbitry, the feed storage area, the bedding area in your rabbitry as well as at the local feed stores.

**F. NUTRITION:** Nutrition has a large contribution to make toward a preventative medicine program and we must follow the advice of the professional nutritionist's guidelines to provide a good preventative disease program.

Much has been said and written about rabbit nutrition; but basically most commercial rabbits are very similar in nature and basically meet the rabbits nutritional requirements to the best that we are aware of at this time. Many producers fortify the commercial pellet with other food stuffs. One should remember that when the commercial pellet supplemented by other materials, this will "unbalance" the ration unless the feed additives are in the proper ratio that are also balanced.

Water is an important element of nutrition and must be considered seriously. Water must not only be abundant in supply, but should be of high quality. Periodic water samples should be taken to assure that the high quality standard in the rabbitry is always maintained. Adequate maintenance of the water supply system, flushing the lines and cleaning the crocks is an essential portion of any rabbitry's disease prevention program.

Chlorination of the drinking water in the rabbitry is just as essential as chlorination of the drinking water in our metropolitan cities. This practice not only helps control the bacterial level in the watering system, it also helps in the sanitation and ease of cleaning the watering system. Continuous chlorination of the drinking water will assist in controlling many of our respiratory and enteric diseases.

**G. DISINFECTION AND CLEANING.** The amount of time and the method of cleaning a rabbitry will depend entirely upon the physical make up of the rabbitry. All rabbitries must have rigid cleaning and disinfection programs. There are many disinfectants on the market that are of high quality; however, it is important to remember that the disinfectants are less effective in the presence of organic matter (manure) and it is essential that the organic matter be removed prior to disinfection. This can be done by the use of wire brush or high pressure water before the disinfection process. The effectiveness of the disinfection process is in proportion to time that the cages and utensils are in the presence of the disinfectant. To be totally effective, it is oftentimes necessary to submerge or have a long contact time with the disinfecting agent.

Nest box sanitation is one area that requires extra special care and disinfection. This is the area that many disease causing bacteria are passed from the dam to the offspring. Sunlight is a very cheap and effective disinfectant.

Caution should be used in the disinfection process in that a lot of disinfectants are corrosive to the cages and very injurious to human skin. Therefore, adequate protection to the operator and thorough rinsing of all rabbit equipment should take place following the disinfection process.

Through the proper disinfection and cleaning process, the rabbit manager will be able to hold the total bacterial level to a tolerable level as well as controlling the pathogens for certain diseases.

**H. CONTROLLING DISEASE OUTBREAKS.** Since rabbit medicine is a specialty field, each rabbitry manager should have a source of knowledge located ahead of any disease outbreak that he can call upon in case of an outbreak of some acute disease. This may mean locating a laboratory in your local area that will perform cultures and sensitivity tests that can be interpreted by and advice sought from a source that specializes in the field of rabbit medicine.

Irregardless of the size of the rabbitry, the rabbitry manager should have the ability to perform simple necropsy procedures and be able to relate to his advisor the different abnormal changes that have been seen in the necropsied animal. This type program involves much planning but will be very beneficial over the long period of time.

**I. ANIMALS RELATIVELY FREE FROM INTERNAL PARASITES.** The presence of internal parasites in abnormal numbers in your rabbitry will decrease the resistance of the rabbit to many different types of diseases. It is imperative that each rabbitry have a parasite and coccidia control program. The frequency of use of parasiticides and coccidiacides in the rabbitry will depend upon the management practices. The type of parasiticide and cocciacides should be altered on a routine basis so that the organisms do not develop a resistance to these chemical agents.

It is totally impossible to prime and condition animals on a regular basis where there is a moderate to high level of parasite infestation. This is particularly true of those wool and fur producing breeds of rabbits.

**J. OBSERVATION.** To have an adequate disease prevention control program, one must spend a great deal of time in the rabbitry observing the normal rabbits behavior so that one can detect abnormalities. The animals should be observed at a sight where the animals are maintained. One should examine the quality of air at the level of the rabbits habitate and not at other areas of the rabbitry.

In summary, for a good disease prevention program, one must start with and maintain breeding stock with individuals of a sound genetic pool of desirable disease resistant characteristics, have a sound nutrition program, keep adequate and informative records, have an effective rodent, parasite and pest control program, impliment rigid cleaning and disinfectant programs, locate a good source of professional information concerning disease control, and bind all the above factors together with a good sound management program and your rabbit enterprise will have a workable disase prevention program.

...is the area that many disease causing bacteria are passed  
...to the offspring. ...is a very cheap and effective  
...disease.

Quarantine should be used in the disinfection process as that a lot of  
disease-causing are convective to the cages and very injurious to human skin.  
Therefore, adequate protection to the operator and thorough cleaning of all  
rabbit equipment should take place following the disinfection process.

Through the proper disinfection and quarantine, the rabbit manager will be  
able to hold the total bacterial level to a desirable level as well as  
controlling the pathogens for certain diseases.

A RESOLUTION TO CHANGE SECTION 3, ARTICLE III

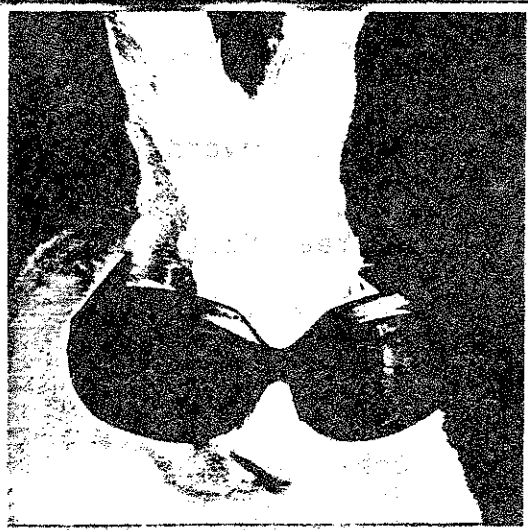

# Dutch Breeders

## FOR ALL THOSE BORN BEFORE 1945

**WE ARE SURVIVORS !!!!!**

Consider the changes we have witnessed:

We were born before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, Frisbees and the PILL.

We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, lazer beams and ballpoint pens, before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes—and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be?

Being a Dutch breeder and a senior veterinary student, I get several questions concerning management and treatment of common rabbit diseases and problems. So, when I saw the request in last months issue of the Dutch Reporter for a list of medications to keep in your rabbitry's medicine cabinet, I decided to write this article. There is some medical basis for what I use and why, but there is also some logical considerations and useful information passed on to me by other rabbit breeders.

- Things to keep in rabbitry's medicine cabinet:
- Chloromycetin or Gentamycin eye ointment
- Vet-RX
- Mineral oil or Tresaderm or Mitox
- Procaine Penicillin G or Combiotic
- 3 cc. syringes with 21 gauge needles
- Sterile eye wash
- Betadine scrub or Ivory dish soap
- Vaporizer
- Papaya digestive enzymes
- hydrogen peroxide
- Triple antibiotic ointment- Triple sulfa or Neomycin-Bacitracin- Polymixin

There are three primary body systems that rabbits have problems with: eyes/nose/ears, gastrointestinal, and skin. Granted, other problems do occur, but from my experience, these three categories are most common.

First, concerning eyes, ears, and nose problems. The most common eye problem I've seen occurs in young kits 10 days to 2 weeks old. They will have swollen eyes with a yellow-green discharge. I usually treat these initially by rinsing both eyes with a sterile eye wash, hot packing the eyes, and treating 2 times a day with either Chloromycetin or Gentamycin eye ointment. I usually treat both eyes for at least 5 days even if one eye appears involved.

The most common ear problem breeders encounter is ear mites. In large commercial rabbitries where cost is of concern, 1 cc. of mineral oil placed in each ear for 5 days along with removal of ear wax and other debris should control the problem. I prefer to use either Tresaderm or Mitox- both are veterinary preparations. Tresaderm contains an antibiotic to decrease chances of secondary bacterial infections and a small amount of steroids to decrease inflammation as well as an insecticide to kill the mites. Mitox contains only an insecticide, but tends to kill the mites faster than mineral oil with less of a build up in the ears.

As most breeders have encountered, the most common nasal problem in rabbits is snuffles (Pasterella sp.). In most cases, treating snuffles is uneventful. I have, however, been able to bring a few rabbits back to health. My protocol for snuffles includes both a prophylactic and a treatment regime. I dose all my rabbits with Vet-RX (1 drop in each nostril) immediately after returning from a show or at the first signs of nasal irritation. Any rabbit that sneezes for any length of time is put in my isolation area away from the rest of my stock. These rabbits are treated twice a day with Vet-RX. If the nasal dis-

charge turns green or yellow, I give them 20,000 IU per pound of Penicillin G intramuscularly once a day for three days. Rabbits that are really snotty and have difficulty breathing, I use a vaporizer containing water and Vet-RX. I cover 3 sides and the top of the cage with plastic and let the steam blow into the cage for 30 minutes at a time 3 to 4 times a day. Remember, it is possible to overheat a rabbit this way, so never leave a rabbit unattended while the vaporizer is going. Vet-RX works basically the same as Vicks vapor rub does in people. It causes the blood vessels in the rabbit's nose to dilate allowing more blood to infiltrate the nose and sinuses. Hence, when more blood enters so does more white blood cells. White blood cells compose the majority of a rabbit's immune system.

Occasionally, rabbits will get gastrointestinal upsets with the most common complaint from the owner being diarrhea. At the first signs of a loose stool, I give my rabbits some dry oatmeal, bran, or oats, and take away their pellets for at least 24 hours. Once the diarrhea stops, I slowly wean them back on pellets. First, I'll give them hay. Then, I'll give them hay and pellets, until finally just pellets. If the oats, oatmeal, or bran does not work and the diarrhea has persisted for more than 48 hours, I'll start force feeding them water- 1 cc. at a time every hour. When rabbits scour, they will become dehydrated rapidly so it is very important to make sure they get adequate water. If you have difficulty force feeding water, you can try and see if they'll drink a mixture of warm tea and sugar. Surprisingly, rabbits have a sweet tooth and will drink it readily if there's enough sugar in the tea. Another problem I've encountered both in my rabbits and several other rabbits I've seen is hairballs. Unlike a cat, a rabbit can't vomit. Consequently, what happens if the hairball gets big enough is that it will occlude the valve on the stomach where the food empties into the intestines. In cases where this happens, the situation becomes life threatening. The only treatment when cases get this severe is surgery to remove the hairball. This can be expensive. So, as in most cases, prevention of hairballs is the only solution.

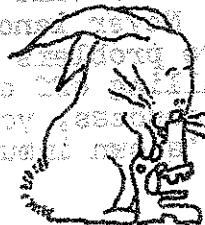
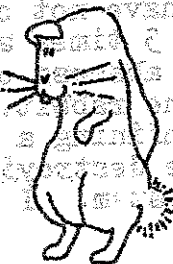
Grooming to remove loose hair is one easy way to prevent hairballs. Feeding small amounts of hay to your rabbits is helpful. Basically, hay catches up some of the hair and helps push the hair through the GI tract. In my rabbitry, I give my rabbits papaya digestive enzymes which I get at the local health food store. Papaya and pineapple both contain an enzyme which helps break down hair. Additionally, papaya is sweet and most rabbits eat the tablet as a "treat". If, however, a rabbit won't eat it, you can dissolve it in the water.

Finally, I see a skin problem or two. The most common being abscesses. My way of treating abscesses if they have not opened is to hot pack them for 20 minutes at a time 2 to 3 times a day until they open on their own. Never lance an abscess on a rabbit unless it's causing severe problems to the rabbit. An abscess is a rabbit's way of walling off or confining a localized infection. By opening an abscess, you are destroying the capsule produced by the rabbit's own immune system. I have

seen several cases where bacteria causing the abscess to form has entered the bloodstream and the rabbit has gotten very ill due to septicemia. Additionally, by opening up the abscess, you are running the risk of allowing other bacteria to enter and in some cases allowing a fungus to invade. Fungal infections are extremely difficult and costly to treat. If you find an abscess on a rabbit that has opened on its own, clean around the open wound with a gentle soap- Ivory dish soap is mild as is Betadine scrub. Betadine scrub is an iodine based surgical soap that is nonstaining and can be found in most pharmacies or obtained from your veterinarian. On the first day and first day only, flush the abscess with peroxide. Peroxide can cause tissue damage and keeps the abscess from healing if over used. However, it will flush out a lot of debris that water will not. Hence, the reason to use it only on the first day. Generally, once an abscess has opened on its own, it will heal without any other treatment if it is kept clean. It may drain for a couple of days, but that is all part of the normal healing process. Additional skin problems a breeder may encounter are urine scalding or sore hocks. The best treatment for these problems is keeping the area clean and dry. Occasionally, you will need to use an antibiotic cream to clear up an infection or prevent an infection. First, clean the area with a mild soap. Then, dry the area with a dry cloth. Placing a board in the cage so that the rabbit can keep off the wire aids in healing. If concerned about infection, you can rub a small amount of triple antibiotic cream on the area. I would not use the cream any longer than necessary because rabbits tend to lick it off and ingest the antibiotics. If a rabbit ingests too much antibiotics, it will scour which only creates additional problems.

As I stated earlier, I am a senior vet student about to graduate, but the advice I've stated in this article is advice from one breeder to another. There is some medical basis to some of the treatments I've talked about, but more importantly, they are treatments that have worked well for me as a breeder. As in any case, always consult your veterinarian when in doubt as to the cause of the problem or the proper treatment. Good luck, and hopefully I've shared something that will be beneficial to you as a Dutch breeder.
